City Is Working to Develop Racial Equity Action Plan

of the Greenbelt City Council, City Human Resources Director Dawane Martinez briefed council on the city's participation in Advancing Racial Equity in the DMV Region, a project that is part of the Government Alliance on Race and Equity (GARE). GARE is a national network of governments working to achieve racial equity and advance opportunities for all. Currently, 370

At the January 24 meeting governments at the city, county, regional and state level in 36 states are participating.

> The program is organized into cohorts. The DMV (District, Maryland, Virginia) cohort is led by Chuck Bean of the Metropolitan Council of Governments and includes Prince George's, Charles, Frederick and Montgomery counties and the cities of Greenbelt, College Park, Takoma Park and Gaithersburg, plus the District of

Columbia, four Virginia counties and two Virginia cities.

The DMV cohort will focus on four main areas: public safety and court services; community development, planning, zoning and housing; transportation and mobility; and governing and business, procurement, human resources and leadership, and workforce development.

Through participating in this work, each jurisdiction will develop a racial equity training curriculum; a racial equity action plan to be used in policy, practice, program and budget decisions; sample policies and practices to advance racial equity and trained facilitators to implement staff training.

A GARE portal will allow participants to share resources, materials and jurisdiction work. Greenbelt's GARE team consists of Martinez, Economic Development Coordinator Charise Liggins, Director of Planning and Community Development Terri Hruby, City Treasurer Bertha Gaymon, Police Chief Rick Bowers, Director Greg Varda and LaToya Fisher of the Recreation Department, CARES Director Liz Parks and Co-Acting Director of Public Works Brian Townsend. Four GARE members are assigned to the cohort: two as trainers, one project manager and one resource person. The cohort

Green ACES Briefs Council On Achieving Sustainability

Green ACES, the City of closer benchmark, with the sug- ing the Community Center from Greenbelt Advisory Committee on Environmental Sustainability matters, briefed the Greenbelt City Council on February 7 on its latest recommendations to help steer Greenbelt toward a future more reliant on renewable energy and with lowered carbon emissions. Council was eager to begin implementing and incorporating these ideas as soon as possible, with some potentially being voted on at the second council meeting on February 28. Green ACES was represented by Chair John Lippert, Staff Liaison Luisa Robles and members Lore Rosenthal and Steve Skolnik.

The meeting began with recommendations concerning greenhouse gas reductions, with the ultimate goal of achieving 100 percent carbon neutrality by 2050. An interim goal of reducing emissions by 50 percent of levels set in 2005 was set as a

gestion made for the city to hire a consultant who would provide the best strategy.

At present, the city's electricity usage is completely derived from wind, thus achieving one of Green ACE's goals. The challenge now is to transition from the use of fuels and natural gas to renewables. It was stressed several times that these goals do not deal with reducing the use of electricity, but rather the emissions that are the result of its production, such as from coal plants. Lippert said that a nearby solar farm is approaching completion and would be, if not a complete replacement of nonrenewable energy, a huge step in the right direction.

Skolnik stressed that some of these ambitious goals, while important to set, are realistically not completely achievable. As an example, he said that convertits existing use of natural gas to only electricity would be a huge and very expensive project.

A chart was presented that showed the city's CO2 emissions from 2019. The city's fleet of

Flee

In Danish with English subtitles

Flee tells the true story of a man, Amin Nawabi, on the verge of marriage, which compels him to reveal a painful secret he has kept hidden for 20 years, one that threatens to derail the life he has built for himself and his soon-to-be husband. Recounted mostly through animation to Director Jonas Poher Rasmussen, he tells for the first time the story of his extraordinary journey as a child refugee from Afghanistan. Flee pushes the boundaries of documentary filmmaking to present a moving memoir of self-discovery. The film was selected as the Danish entry for the Academy Award for Best International Feature Film, where it received a nomination, along with nods in the Best Documentary Feature and Best Animated Feature categories simultaneously, becoming the first film to do so.

The Velvet Queen In French with English subtitles

In The Velvet Queen, a documentary shot in the heart of the Tibetan highlands, multi-award-winning nature photographer Vincent Munier guides writer Sylvain Tesson on his quest to document the infamously elusive snow leopard. Munier introduces Tesson to the subtle art of waiting from a blind spot, tracking animals and finding the patience to catch sight of the beasts. Through their journey in the Tibetan peaks, inhabited by invisible presences, the two men ponder humankind's place among the magnificent creatures and glorious landscapes they encounter along the way. Said critic Tambay Obensen of Indiewire about the film, "It's enough to inspire even the non-nature-minded to seek out new adventures, whether on untamed land or in one's backyard."



In Memoriam

Dorothea Leslie

I moved to a GHI court from Washington, D.C., in 2003. Within a day, I'd met Dorothea, who lived two doors away.

We started taking those walks around Greenbelt mentioned by Rick Ransom in his memoriam article last week. Almost immediately, I found myself in her encyclopedic history class of who's-who, and long before the current day, in homes for blocks around. Who had lived in my house over the decades, including a Pioneer family.

One day she called, asked me if I would be willing to meet an old friend, a daughter in that Pioneer family. "Of course, Dorothea!" was my reply. Mrs. Winker came right over. She told me of their arrival in 1938. How they'd been rescued, as it were, from a dismal, damp basement apartment in D.C.

Mrs. Winker is shown with her mother in a photo hanging

on the ground-level corridor wall in the Community Center. She is on the gardenside of their unit, picking flowers. I guess her to be about 8 or 9 years old.

Dorothea said that most of the families had multiple children, and in those days the peaked roofs of brick homes were still open to the other units through the attic. Kids would run through to adjacent homes to suddenly appear for play.

Dorothea and her family were always out front on Crescent Road in their lawn chairs for the Labor Day Parade, flags awaving, greeting friends.

One day, as in almost any day, a fire truck and ambulance went past, sirens blaring. She turned to me and said, "I whisper a prayer every time they pass." I know she meant that for both the persons who needed help, as well as the Fire and EMS folks. May she rest in Peace.

Ida B. Wells: Trail-Blazing Black Journalist, Suffragist

The film Ida B. Wells: A Passion for Justice is this month's Reel and Meal at the New Deal feature, on Monday, February 21. A Black journalist in post-Reconstruction America, Ida B. Wells was an investigative journalist who compiled statistics about lynching cases by conducting eyewitness interviews in the South. In 1892, an angry mob burned down her newspaper's office. She organized some of the first economic boycotts by lecturing in Great Britain about American lynching in 1893 and 1894 and encouraging the British to stop purchasing American cotton. A prominent Black suffragist, her stance on racism made her unwelcome in the largely White suffrage organizations. She helped to found the NAACP but was edged out of its leadership. She was perceived to be too radical in her time and was sidelined by more conservative, mostly male activists.

Nicki Mayo, multimedia journalist and Baltimore City native, will lead the discussion after the film. The film begins at 7 p.m. either live on the New Deal Café's new wide-screen film projection system or via Zoom. The Café uses a UV light filtration system that kills viruses. Attendees must wear a mask and show proof of vaccination. Registration





Zooming with the Family

"Families don't get together enough for the good reasons," Renna Komisar remembers her father saying often, pre-pandemic, about family gatherings at funerals. Now in Covid days, when family gatherings are even sparser, Renna and other Greenbelters have turned to family video calls to fill the gap.

Renna's family has held a weekly Zoom call since March 2020 with her father, her immediate siblings and a few cousins. Throughout Covid lockdowns, Piri Powell Jenkins's family has met every day. They use Facebook Messenger video calls, because Piri's grandfather had trouble with Zoom.

Both families have celebrated family milestones, including engagements, over their calls. Discussion topics can include dinner plans, favorite new Netflix shows or homeschooling ideas. Renna says that her dad has a gift for remembering conversation threads: if you mention getting oranges at Costco, then next week, he'll ask you how the oranges were.

I participate in three regular family Zoom calls, alternating Sunday calls between the maternal and paternal sides of my family. Every Wednesday evening, my dad hosts a Family and Friends game night. We play Codenames, a word guessing game, using horsepaste.com. Three weeks ago, I taught the group how to play Wordle.

Holidays on Zoom

Melanie Lynn Griffin's family uses Zoom to meet for birthdays and Halloween. They have "a real flurry" of Zoom calls between Solstice and Christmas, she says. Her Seattle-based nephew and his wife, who celebrate Solstice, used to fly to the East Coast for the holiday. Now, on Solstice eve, Melanie says, her nephew and his wife use Zoom to lead the family in lighting candles and writing down intentions for the year ahead. On Solstice morning, the East Coast family members can wake up early to watch the sunrise, then greet the sun again, over Zoom, when it rises in Se-

Between Solstice and New Year's Day, Melanie's family uses Zoom to play games. They play Telestrations (also known as Telephone Pictionary) with Yuletide phrases. They also play Jackbox party games, which involve using a cell phone to draw, type or click an answer. Melanie also looks forward to chatting with the family and just hearing what they are doing.

For Christmas 2020, Sarah West and her wife Jenifer Callahan West organized a 50-person family call, with relatives from across the country. A friend agreed to make a special appearance as Santa, in a costume with

a North Pole background.

The Wests planned an itinerary including prayer, toasts, songs and a Show and Share. During the Show and Share, each person got to share a talent, tell a joke or just discuss something from their lives. Sarah called this gathering a way to "express our love for each other when you can't give that physical hug."

Practical Considerations

Planning a family Zoom call? Melanie recommends remembering that older family members may not be comfortable with technology. She suggests holding a "pre-call" before your event, so that your relatives can learn about Zoom features such as muting and the text chat box.

Sarah recalls watching her son on his iPad, coaching his aunt

about Zoom features. He was a pro, thanks to online school, Jenifer observes. Sarah recommends making sure that all expected guests have arrived before the festivities begin. Then, nobody will miss a planned activity while trying to connect.

With their group size and their two-hour Christmas schedule, the Wests had to buy a paid Zoom membership. On their weekly chats, Renna's family uses the free account. For them, the automatic 40-minute limit becomes an advantage, since nobody has to be the person who says goodbye and ends the call. Sometimes, that limit even cuts them off midsentence.

"I think this helps us get together for the good reasons," Renna says.









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Local Covid Trends Continue To Move to Lower Levels

The ZIP Code data for 20770 new Covid cases continues to improve steeply. According to the Maryland Master ZIP Code database, the rolling averages for the last week have dipped into the low single digits and are currently in the 1 to 3 new cases a day range. A week ago, they were more than twice that.

Although community transmission remains in the high range over the last seven days, the downward trend is echoed in the Prince George's County data. Of particular note is that the number of hospitalized Covid patients in the county is at its lowest since December. Compared to the peak numbers in the start of January, where some days had 364 beds occupied by Covid patients, numbers in the last week have dropped from 115 on February 7 to 72 on February 13.

County key metrics are also trending toward more modest levels. The percentage of tests

returning positive results is now down at the medium level (of low, medium, high and critical). Bed availability is also in the medium range and though the average daily new case count continues in the high range, it is now trending closer to medium. The cases associated with fully vaccinated people are generally much less serious so, though new cases are still high, only the unor partially-vaccinated are taking up hospital beds because they are much sicker.

The latest infographic from Luminis Health Doctors Community Medical Center bears this out. It also shows a steep decline in cases. Of 18 Covid patients remaining, one unvaccinated person remains in intensive care. There are no fully vaccinated (including boosters) individuals in the hospital and of the 18 patients, all were unvaccinated except for four partially vaccinated individuals.

Check Your SmarTrip Card: Some Soon May Not Work

The Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority is installing new faregates at Metrorail stations and, starting on March 1, plastic SmarTrip cards purchased before 2012 will no longer work. A card must be replaced if "0167" is not included in the serial number on the back of the card. SmarTrip is needed for entry to Metro trains, buses and parking lots or garages and is accepted on Prince George's County TheBus, DC Circulator, Montgomery County Ride On and some other regional transit systems.

Transfer Balance

If a card needs to be replaced, the balance can be transferred to another SmarTrip card at wmata.com/fares/smartrip/gocard-replacement.cfm; the card must then be tapped at a faregate, bus farebox or fare vending machine to complete the balance transfer. Or, an expiring card can be mailed in, and a new card, with the old card's balance added, will be mailed to the applicant within 10 business days. Go to the above website to download

the form that must accompany the card; the mailing address is on the form.

New Cards, Mobile Pay

New SmarTrip cards can be purchased online (see wmata.com/fares/Buy-SmarTrip.cfm), in a vending machine at any Metrorail station, or locally at Giant Food in Beltway Plaza. Mobile Pay is also now available, allowing tap-and-go entry from iOS and Android devices; see wmata.com/fares/mobilepay for details.

Senior SmarTrip cards, which offer discounted fares for passengers aged 65 and older, can be obtained at the Greenbelt Library. People under the age of 65 with disabilities also qualify for reduced fares with a Reduced Fare SmarTrip Photo ID Card. These cards are issued in person at either the Transit Accessibility Center, 600 5th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., or at the TRIPS Commuter Store, 8404 Colesville Road, Silver Spring; go to wmata.com/fares/reduced. cfm to see open hours and the documents needed to obtain a

vehicles capped the list at 60 percent, followed by the Aquatic & Fitness Center at 15 percent, the Community Center at 14 percent, Public Works at 4 percent and the Youth Center at 3 percent.

Increasing the city's use of electric vehicles and charging station infrastructure was another major recommendation. Robles indicated that the Public Works Department is committed to this and is purchasing electric equipment if feasible, as the existing technology is not conducive to certain tools, such as large lawn mowers or heavy cutting saws.

The future of the city's composting process was a major point of discussion. In addition to the Backyard Composting organization and community composting at the Springhill Lake Recreation Center, Aquatic Center, the New Deal Café and the Greenbelt Coop, the city has a contract with Compost Crew, whose collection site is Buddy Attick Park. Food scraps from this site are hauled to the county's Western Branch facility near Upper Marlboro.

Green ACES is recommending that the city consider entering into an agreement with the Four Cities Coalition "to explore possibilities for establishing a collaborative composting facility serving, and in close proximity to, member jurisdictions," including nearby communities like University Park and New Carrollton.

A strong contender that was debated for such a move would be making Trinity Assembly of God church, off Good Luck Road, a drop-off and processing site, using Compost Crew and its Compost Outpost system that would have collection bins and also create the actual compost. Trinity has just signed an agreement with Compost Crew to do just that. Both council and Green ACES were keen on looking into having the city be part of this. Mayor Emmett Jordan said it would be "closing the loop" by keeping it all within city limits.

The goal is to have more drop-off sites throughout the city, thus increasing the number of households involved.

Jordan said that any resolution put forward to the Four Cities Coalition should be "focused on a

clear outcome" for any meaningful results.

Jordan pledged to sign on again to the ongoing Monarch Joint Venture (monarchjointventure.org), a nonprofit organization committed to the conservation of the monarch butterfly and related pollinators. Robles said that Sustainable MD is involved, with a large local consensus focused on creating a pollinator corridor in the area.

Acting City Manager Timothy George said that a letter was sent to Governor Larry Hogan expressing the city's support of the Transportation and Climate

Green ACES asked the city to send a letter to the county council requesting the adoption and implementing of the Prince George's County Climate Action Plan. The council hoped that a draft with additional comments from Green ACES can be provided as soon as possible, because, as Jordan said, "time is of the essence," with action to be taken on Thursday, February 17.

Luminis Health Implements Changes to Crisis Care Status

Luminis Health has deactivated the Crisis Standards of Care protocols put in place on January 4 for its hospitals, including the local Luminis Health Doctors Community Medical Center.

"It will take some time to return to normal operations," said CEO Victoria Bayles of Luminis Health. "However, we are now at a point where the surge is currently not exceeding the health care resources available."


Surgeries, which had been postponed except in urgent situations, will now ramp up, with a goal of reaching a full surgical schedule as soon as possible. For those whose care or treatments (e.g., surgery or other clinical care) were deferred, it is time to reschedule.

Dr. Sherry Perkins, president of Luminis Health Anne Arundel Medical Center, said, "We encourage all patients to seek the care they need. The hospitals are safe, ready and open for those requiring emergent care. Those with non-emergent conditions should seek care from their primary care providers or urgent care centers. In addition, consistent follow up with your care provider is important."

Luminis Health continues to assess its visitor restrictions and to require masking to keep patients, employees and visitors

Foiling Catalytic Converter Thefts: What Owners Can Do

Ten catalytic converter thefts from Priuses were reported in Greenbelt between February 1 and February 5.

Greenbelt Police Department recommends that a car be parked in a garage, if possible. If not, parking in a court or a driveway, rather than on the street, may offer some deterrent, though if a Prius is parked anywhere visible it could be a target. We recommend getting catalytic converters spray painted and etched through a program in Takoma Park (which is also high in Prius ownership). Below is some infor-

The City of Takoma Park Police Department and RS Automotive (7224 Carroll Avenue, 301-270-4418) run the "Etch and Catch" program, which provides free etching and painting of catalytic converters. While etching and painting the catalytic converter does not prevent thefts, it acts as a deterrence by making each converter identifiable and easily traced.

Visit RS Automotive with any paid service that requires your vehicle to be lifted on a rack, and you can request to have your catalytic converter etched with your vehicle's license plate number and painted with a high heat, bright white-colored spray paint at no cost. If you just want your catalytic converter etched without other vehicle work at the same time, call RS Automotive for an appointment.

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


