City Requests Public Input On Buddy Attick Master Plan

The city welcomed public input to plan for the future of Buddy Attick Park in a community meeting at the Municipal Building last Thursday evening, ahead of the launch this week of an online public survey. The output of the process will be an updated master plan for the park.

"This will be a roadmap to help staff manage the park well into the future," said Greenbelt Recreation Director Greg Varda in a phone conversation on Fri-

Community members filled the council chamber, calling for greater accessibility, protection of the park's biodiversity and enhanced infrastructure for

Stronger Summer Storms Highlight Grid Vulnerability

Last summer's storm took out hundreds of trees and several utility poles. This fire truck blocks Crescent Road at Hillside where a tree brought down live wires.

Tornado warnings on August 7 led to early closures of federal offices, the University of Maryland and other workplaces in the metro area. But it was a series of summer storms the weekend of July 28 and 29 that interrupted moviegoers, swimmers and the postal service in Greenbelt. Pepco posted on July 30 on the social media platform X that 70,000 of its customers in Maryland and Washington experienced outages.

Summer power outages cause inconvenience and can be lifethreatening. But they also highlight the vulnerability to severe weather of the electricity grid and the systems it powers.

Cynthia Brown, aquatic coordinator at the Greenbelt Aquatic & Fitness Center, said the Friday evening storm on July 28 shut down the motor to the outdoor pool's filtration system overnight. Staff could not open the pool to the public until 1 p.m. the next day, after all 190,843 gallons cycled through the system.

"If you think about it the pool's filtration system, it's like the human heart," Brown said. "The human heart pumps the blood through the body system so that it can function properly. It goes through our kidneys and it cleans everything out."

Greenbelt's indoor and outdoor pools have separate filtration systems that regulate the levels

A Wish List

Greenbelt roads are maintained by the City of Greenbelt, Prince George's County, Maryland State or the National Park Service. Consider this wish list when funds are available.

1) Ridge Road @ Laurel Hill Road. Replace the current stop signs with red flashing lights attached to stop signs like those installed at Lastner Lane @ Ivy Lane. Greenbelt Elementary School is next to the intersection and increased pedestrian traffic safety at this intersection is needed.

2) Northbound (NB) Hanover Parkway @ Greenway Center Drive. Install a left turn green arrow and synchronize with the southbound Hanover Parkway @ Ora Glen Drive left turn light. This would improve traffic flow and safety.

3) Ora Glen Drive and Greenway Center Drive @ Hanover Parkway. Replace the shared green light of Ora Glen Drive and Greenway Center Drive with separate green lights. This would improve safety and the flow of traffic. Greenway Center Drive has numerous drivers turning left to go NB on Hanover Parkway.

4) Baltimore-Washington Parkway @ Greenbelt Road. Both access ramps from the Parkway need additional yield signs, roadway markings or even rumble strips added. Access ramp drivers regularly fail to yield to other drivers heading east on Greenbelt Road at Greenway Center, and access ramp drivers at westbound Greenbelt Road fail to yield to drivers turning at Southway.

5) NB Southway @ Ridge Road. The right turn lane requires drivers to turn right at Ridge Road. Many do not. Increase the solid white line that separates the straight and turn lanes to at least the site of the telephone pole. Install an additional Right Turn Only sign at 7 Southway. Paint an additional white right turn only roadway marker.

6) Enforce existing traffic laws relating to bicyclists. Bicyclists are required to follow the rules, the laws of the road.

Harsh Vegetation Management

Earlier this summer, 13 Court Hillside was suddenly besieged by a number of GHI workers who showed up to clear a fire lane between units T and U. The problem was the abrupt and confrontational manner our trees and shrubbery were cleared.

Math has its place, but to rely on it to reconfigure yard after yard into identical units simply doesn't add up as improvement. Our quality of life suffers when each yard is systematically cut back to clearly visible chain link

Must every leaf be cleared away and eliminated? Is it necessary to enforce this utilitarian assault, for looks? This strippeddown institutional approach reeks of austerity gone mad. Our garden town was envisioned with shady trees and walking paths, gardens, meadows and playgrounds - appeals from the living world, not from industrial conveyor belts in factories.

What's to become of the blue jays, cardinals, luna moths, the butterflies and bees? What's to become of their homes and

food? Surely they and we deserve more than chainsaws and unannounced raids. Moving forward, we hope GHI will cooperate with us to manage our green spaces, instead of using a power-mad, top-down approach in contrast to GHI's neighborhood ideals.

Golda

Golda is a ticking-clock thriller set during the tense 19 days of the Yom Kippur War in 1973. Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir (Helen Mirren), faced with the potential of Israel's complete destruction, must navigate overwhelming odds, a skeptical cabinet and a complex relationship with U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger (Liev Schreiber), with millions of lives in the balance. Her tough leadership and compassion would ultimately decide the fate of her nation and leave her with a controversial legacy around the world.

The film follows Milton (Ben Kingsley), who lives a quiet life of routine in a small western Pennsylvania town, but finds his day upended when a UFO and its extraterrestrial passenger crash-land in his backyard. Before long, Milton develops a close relationship with the extraterrestrial he calls "Jules." Things become complicated when two neighbors (Harriet Sansom Harris and Jane Curtin) discover Jules and the government quickly closes in. What follows is a funny, wildly inventive ride as the three neighbors find meaning and connection later in life - thanks to this unlikely stranger.

Insurance worker C.C. Baxter (Jack Lemmon) lends his Upper West Side apartment to company bosses to use for extramarital affairs. When his manager Mr. Sheldrake (Fred MacMurray) begins using Baxter's apartment in exchange for promoting him, Baxter is disappointed to learn that Sheldrake's mistress is Fran Kubelik (Shirley MacLaine), the elevator girl at work whom Baxter is interested in himself. Soon Baxter must decide between the girl he loves and the advancement of his career.

Prince: Sign o' the Times
Highlights from Prince's 1987 European concert tour, including selections from the rock star's album of the same title. Says critic Dave Kehr of the Chicago Tribune, "The utopian rocker, whose manner and music promise a blissful, dreamy union of the races and the sexes, doesn't need a story line to communicate his meanings, which remain by pop standards unusually complex and considered."



I learned only a couple of months ago of Dawn Payne's death on December 23, 2021, from lung cancer. In honor of her upcoming birthday, I put together the obituary below (her family was unable to write one at the time) and offer some fond memories of our time together over the years.

Dawn Arnold was born on August 23, 1960, and grew up in Greenbelt on Ridge Road near Centerway. She went to Mary Bethune Junior High School and attended Massanutten Military Academy for her first year of high school. She then transferred to Parkdale High School for 10th grade (1975-76) before being shuttled to a different school, the newly-built Eleanor Roosevelt High School (1976-77), where she graduated in the summer of 1977, ahead of our class. Dawn married Steve Payne in 1979 and gave birth to daughter Michelle in 1980 and son Daniel in 1983.

She was predeceased by her parents, Frances and Gerald Arnold; daughter Michelle Lvnn Payne-Jean; and husband Steve Payne. Dawn is survived by her son Daniel Stephen; granddaughter Brianna Lilly; sister Laura Seilhamer; son-in-law Rodney Jean; and Sarah Coole-Kneale.

I met Dawn in junior high school. We were best friends for about a decade. Our paths







Greenbelt Middle Selected For Future Engineer Program

In May, Greenbelt Middle School was notified that the school was selected to participate in a three-year pilot program, the Amazon Future Engineer program. BCauseICan is a local STEM community-based organization and is the program administrator. This program is supported by the Maryland Center for Computing Education and Project STEM, an Amazon partnership.

In addition, Patriot Technology Training Center, under the direction of Thurmont Jones, will

conduct after-school programming in the areas of cybersecurity and aerospace engineering. Through this program, students will learn STEM skills and applications that can be used in local scholarship competitions.

County Schools Spent Over \$87,596 at Three Brothers

Some county public schools' expenditures are surprising.

In Prince George's County, the public school district spent \$87,596.83 at Three Brothers Italian Restaurants between Fiscal Years 2019 and 2022. To be more specific, the district spent \$55,321.53 at Three Brothers in Greenbelt during the 2018 to 2019 school year and another \$32,275.30 at the restaurant's Hyin the 2021 to 2022 school year.

The district appears to have a longstanding relationship with Three Brothers. While most school districts in the state didn't start reporting their vendor expenses to the state until 2019, Prince George's County has been doing so since 2012. Those older figures show the school district spent \$82,505.60 at Three Brothers in 2017 and 2018.

Asked for an explanation, Raven Hill, the district's associate superintendent for communications and community engagement, indicated that Three Brothers is a go-to category for school events.

ERHS Student Attends Science and Tech Institute

Vanessa Gray, a student at Eleanor Roosevelt High School, was one of 43 high school students attending the Joint Science and Technology Institute (JSTI) East, an educational opportunity to expand their knowledge and experience in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM). The Institute is a two-week residential program in Maryland for current high school students, teachers and alumni of the JSTI program that exposes them to scientific research through handson projects.


Gray collaborated with scientists and was mentored by Department of Defense scientists and experts in STEM fields. They worked with their peers to com-


plete a hands-on research project in a professional lab setting. Project topics included: electronic and military packaging design, the science and art of storytelling, design engineering in the era of AI, cycling smarter not harder: a study in experimental design, flight design and dynamics, and mathematics and modeling mania.

The educational program, held July 15 to 28, was a fully-funded research opportunity for high school students from the U.S. and from U.S. Department of Defense schools around the world. It was sponsored by the Defense Threat Reduction Agency and managed by Oak Ridge Institute for Science and Education. The program encouraged students to gain

confidence in their own abilities, increased STEM literacy and exposed students to the importance of STEM through hands-on research

and distribution of chemicals in each pool, protecting swimmers' health.

Storm-related power surges on Saturday, July 29 triggered back-to-back cooldowns of the projector in the Old Greenbelt Theatre's main auditorium, during the second weekend of Barbenheimer, according to Lucy Cortez, operations manager and rental coordinator. Each cooldown, which prevents the bulb in the projector from exploding, takes about 10 minutes, so surges at 4:55 p.m. and 6:05 p.m. caused a half-hour of interruptions.

"It's always funny to me," said Cortez. "Whenever it's predicted that there's going to be rain is when we get more peo-

The U.S. Post Office on Ora Glen Drive lost power and was without internet for three days, according to Postmaster C. Tillery, after a power surge broke the internet service box. Staff were unable to make transactions until USPS IT personnel ordered and installed the part.

Brown, Cortez and Tillery each said outages are uncommon and highly dependent on weather.

But master electrician Steve Skolnik, of Greenbelt, said grid reliability "the consistent supply of electricity to meet demand" will become a "huge issue."

The Maryland Department of the Environment identified "grid stability," alongside reduced fossil fuel use, as a top priority in its June 2023 Maryland Climate Pathways Report and flagged intense storms as a particular threat climate change poses to the state.

Skolnik said that high winds and lightning strikes are the biggest threats to local electricity infrastructure. "As storms intensify, we're seeing the kind of damage that you never used to see - but transition to cleaner energy, while necessary, will present additional challenges to grid reliability." Large-scale use of electric vehicles and all-electric buildings increase electricity

demand, which requires electric utilities to increase their capacity.

"If you park a hundred electric school buses in a parking lot ... then the infrastructure you need to charge them all at the same time every day is going to be huge," said Skolnik.

Because electric motors run more efficiently than gas and diesel engines, Skolnik believes that the transition is worth the cost of expanding grid capacity - even running on Pepco's 2022 mix of less than 7 percent renewable energy sources in Maryland. According to the federal Office of Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy, EVs run at more than 77 percent efficiency, while gas-powered vehicles run at 12 to 30 percent. Heating buildings with electricity rather than oil and natural gas will also present challenges, according to Skolnik.

"What that really means is that we're going to need bigger electric services for our buildings and more capacity integrated in order to feed all these heat pumps that we're going to be putting in," Skolnik said. "Well, that's a challenge for the future for sure." He went on to say that "keeping the power on will require planning and policymaking and the fact that we've all grown up completely taking for granted that the power is [always] going to be on is a mistake I think we need to correct."

sustainability while praising the park as a bulwark of the Greenbelt community.

"We're here to listen," said Tom McGilloway, planning director of the Baltimore-based landscape architecture and urban planning firm Mahan Rykiel Associates, whom the city has contracted to undertake the process.

McGilloway and Brian Trusty of PROS Consulting, the subcontractor on the project, asked attendees to provide input verbally and through live polls on their smartphones.

Attendees noted that the coarse gravel and rocks covering the lake trail exclude people using wheelchairs, the elderly and some with disabilities but that benches make the park more accessible to those with limited

Varda said Friday that the city will search for a material to make paths safe and accessible, while resisting erosion and maintaining stormwater permeability.

"We certainly don't want to put stone that's large enough that you can twist an ankle," said Varda. "Nor do we want stones that move under your feet and could really cause somebody to get hurt. That's something we really need to figure out."

Attendees called for improved signage to mark the park's multiple entrances, highlight side trails to access the park, such as the one linking Crescent Road and the parking lot from Boxwood Village and label entrances closed to cars.

One attendee noted that the park lacks signage in Spanish, and that all notices for the community meeting appeared to be in English.

Another attendee suggested signage to clarify rules of conduct on trails, such as right of way between pedestrians and

After the meeting, Trusty echoed a need for "a consistent, more complete regimen for sig-

nage," including wayfinding signs and "rules of the road."

Community members voiced concern about the lake's water quality, but Varda said the master plan will not address water quality directly. "This master plan is not specifically geared toward water quality of the lake," he said, and told residents they'd need a different study for that. "Water quality will need to be studied separately and at this time there is no plan to do so," Varda told the News Review.

Several community members noted repeated flooding on the south side of the lake, near Lakecrest Drive, after heavy rains, adding that the stagnant water attracts mosquitoes.

Larry Hilliard of Greenbelt, said that placing a recycling bin next to each trash can would encourage people to recycle.

Hilliard said of the lone trash cans, "You see them fill up with bottles and cans. People want to do the right thing."

The online survey, which will be available in English and Spanish by the end of this week, will be open through the month of September. McGilloway and Trusty said they will report back on survey results, present draft concepts and invite more feedback during a second community meeting later this year.

In a poll asking what's missing in the park, an "accessible surface," "more benches" and a "food forest" were among the popular responses. "Nothing" was also popular.

McGilloway voiced a commitment to preserving the park's best



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

Successful ERHS Girls Soccer Program Grows and Gears up for a New Season

A record-breaking 71 girls registered for the Eleanor Roosevelt High School girls soccer program this summer. Perhaps the excitement of two FIFA World Cups in eight months energized interest in local soccer or maybe the enthusiasm of last season's league and county championships for the Raiders caused the staggering turnout this season. Therefore, the Raiders will have 25 players on both their junior varsity and varsity squads, which began their pre-season with two scrimmages last week. The opening contest against Southern High School on August 15 served as an opportunity for new players to earn their spots on the talented rosters, while the August 17 victories over the Albert Einstein Titans allowed both teams to tinker with their lineups.

Ill Met By Moonlight Show Promises a Darker Dream

"Fairies were not always wee Tinkerbells," according to Joshua Engel, director of the Rude Mechanicals production of Ill Met By Moonlight, which will run weekends from August 25 through September 9 at the Greenbelt Arts Center.

Fairies were once seen as dark and dangerous, Engel notes, arguing that William Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream was part of the shift toward the friendly fairies of today. But the play "still contains echoes of these older, more terrifying fairies," a notion Engel said he explores in his adaptation.

"Shakespeare's rendition is lighthearted and its consequences easily forgotten, but the Rude Mechanicals (who draw their name from this play) have a talent for finding the play within

the play," said Engel. "My goal for Rudes productions has always been to strip off the varnish of centuries of tradition and find the story that was always there."

"I can confidently say that, no matter how familiar you are with Midsummer, you are in for some cool surprises," said Kate Medwar-Vanderlinden, who plays Nick Bottom. Some of those surprises come from the innovative set designed by Erin Nealer.

"We're using a deceptively simple black-box construction for the stage, but with some tricks and some creative lighting effects the actors get to redesign the space as they're using it, turning a black room into a magical forest," said Nealer. "The audience will be surprised right alongside the mortal characters as the magical fairies manipulate the world

around them."

Engel has been planning this production for seven years with the Greenbelt Arts Center's black box in mind. The production was originally scheduled for 2020 but was postponed due to the coronavirus pandemic.

"This is my first experience with the Rudes and I love the camaraderie, the incredible talent pool and the warmth with which the troupe welcomed me into the fold," said Aparna Sri, who plays Titania. "This particular adaptation promises a gloriously dark, magical, glowing experience for

MDOT Launches Greenbelt East Trail Feasibility Study

The Maryland Department of Transportation/State Highway Administration (MDOT/SHA) launched a feasibility study of the Greenbelt East Trail (greenbeltnasatrail.org) on August

To kick off the study, MDOT/ SHA engineering contractors walked along parts of the proposed trail route with Greenbelt and county officials, volunteers from Friends of the Greenbelt East Trail and designers from the Neighborhood Design Center (NDC). NDC's work is funded in part by the Anacostia Trails Heritage Area and Maryland Heritage Areas Authority.

The design and engineering consultants walked from Eleanor Roosevelt High School past Goddard Space Flight Center to the commercial district between Good Luck Road and Lanham Severn Road. The trail would ultimately

continue past Lanham Severn Road to the WB&A trailhead at the Glenn Dale Splash Park, thereby connecting the WB&A trail system that runs between Baltimore and Annapolis with the Anacostia River Trail System toward Washington via Greenbelt. The trail would thus fill a key missing link for people walking and biking locally, regionally and even nationally along the East Coast Greenway.

MDOT's feasibility study is scheduled to be completed in December. Friends of the Greenbelt East Trail want MDOT/SHA to install a two-way protected shared-use trail on the existing Greenbelt Road (Md. 193) rightof-way. The goal is to improve safety and access all along the route, as well as to connect two of Maryland's major trail systems via Greenbelt.
