## County Re-zones Disputed Tract; GCS Plans 6-Bay Service Station

The Prince Georges county commissioners last Friday unanimously approved rezoning of the 300-foot tract on Southway between the Armory and the 10 Court from residential to commercial "C-2" to enable Greenbelt Land Improvement Corporation (a Warner-Kanter subsidiary) to construct a gasoline filling station there. Greenbelt Consumer Services is to lease the station for 20 years with options to renew for two additional 10-year periods.

In announcing the decision the commissioners did not issue a statement of reasons. According to Commissioner Francis J. Lastner of Greenbelt all five commissioners had viewed the site between their zoning hearing March 21 and the Friday decision. Stating that he had "lived with" the question for three months and studied it most carefully, Lastner said the decision was "... based on proper land use, not popularity..." He agreed the site was not suitable for residential use, because of its location at the proposed new entrance to the Washington - Baltimore Parkway and next to the Armory, which will have a large parking area adjacent to the filling station and is a commercial-type operation. The American Legion home further down the road also is non-residential, and the proper use for the rezoned site is therefore commercial, he concluded.

### Open By Labor Day

The firm of McGaugan and Johnson, Washington architects retained by GCS, has already started work on plans for the 6-bay station, which GLIC is to build at an estimated cost of about \$60,000. It is hoped construction will start within 30 days and the station will be in operation by Labor Day.

Under the agreement between GCS and the city, a triangular parcel of 75-foot frontage next to the 10 court, dedicated to the city as a park is to be planted with trees by GCS before the station begins operations, according to specifications drawn up by the city council. The co-op has applied to the city to connect with its water and sewer systems and expects approval from the city and the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission. (The filling station will be located in the WSSC sanitary district.) GCS is to pay the cost of making the connections.

## U.S. Information Man Addresses Lions Club

William G. Hamilton, Jr., of the U. S. Information Agency, told of the functions of that government agency in a talk to the Greenbelt Lions Club at the Community Church Monday night. He gave an interesting explanation of the U. S. I. A.'s work with the Voice of America and other methods used by the agency to spread information about America throughout the world.

## Council Hears Gilbert Pledge Cooperation

The city council is making definite progress in its continuing efforts to develop a "Master Plan" for land use within the city, according to city manager Charles McDonald. The council is holding special semi-weekly meetings in order to meet its June first target date for completion of the plan.

Councilman Alan Kistler stated that the appearance of Alfred Gilbert, owner of all the commercial property in the center, except the food store and filling station, before the council Tuesday proved very interesting and informative. Kistler said that Gilbert voiced his intention of lending his full cooperation with the council in working out problems related to parking, rights of way, and other phases of development in the areas adjacent the center.

"We have now reached the stage in our work where tangible results are beginning to take shape," said councilman Robert Hurst. "I believe we will have completed a satisfactory plan within the time we have allotted ourselves," he said.

## REC Dep Director Wolfe To Resign

Recreation director "Donnie" Wolfe may resign to accept a job as Recreation Supervisor of Sports with the Defense Department. The position depends on a physical clearance, which will be complete within a week. If Wolfe accepts, he hopes to leave in June for Army bases in Germany or France.

Wolfe went to work for the city about 12 years ago as a field attendant at 65 cents an hour, during summer vacations. Later he served as swimming pool attendant, lifeguard, and senior assistant recreation leader. In 1950 he started working full time and in 1952 moved up to his present position as recreation director at a salary of \$4409 a year.

He received a bachelor of science degree in physical education from the University of Maryland in 1950. Wolfe moved to Greenbelt in 1938 when he was ten years old. He served one year in the Naval Air corps, 1945-46, and now resides at 29-B Ridge with his wife and 14-month old daughter. "Donnie's" father James recently announced his resignation from the city council.
