## American Heritage Series Starts Here

A new community discussion program called the American Heritage Project will be inaugurated on Tuesday, January 29, 1957, at 8 p.m. in the Greenbelt Library.

The purpose of the project, which is sponsored by the Fund for Adult Education, is to provide an opportunity for men and women to meet together through the facilities of the public library and discuss the problems of today in the light of the basic documents. Examples of the topics to be discussed are States' Rights, Civil Rights, Pressure Groups, American Foreign Policy, and Juvenile Delinquency.

The program will be conducted for two hours every other Tuesday for six sessions under the leadership of Mrs. Matthew Phillips, a trained leader from the county in this work. There are no fees for the program, which aims to help people to become better informed, to gain awareness of their responsibilities as citizens in a democracy, and to apply their own thinking in building better communities.

## Local Boy Scouts Need Asst. Scout Masters

Newly reorganized Boy Scout troop 202 needs assistant scoutmasters and additional committeemen. There are 29 active boys, ages 11 to 14, the majority of whom are just starting up the Scout trail and are anxious for Scout advancement and outdoor activities, especially camping, according to Earl Knickelbein, Scoutmaster. An assistant scoutmaster can instruct in first aid, signaling, campcraft, and handicraft at the Thursday evening meetings, Fellowship Center, Community Church, and on Saturdays. Committeemen can help by serving as chairmen for special activities such as transportation, parties, equipment management, finances, and special events.

One active scoutmaster and assistant scoutmaster are now overloaded with work, and there are three big cub pack units in Greenbelt developing potential new scouts, some of whom are already clamoring to be admitted to the troops. These boys can be admitted only if adequate leadership is available.

## Volunteers Coordinate Help to Needy Families

The Volunteer Christmas Bureau of Prince Georges county is in operation for the third year in an effort to coordinate Christmas giving to needy families in the county. The purpose of the bureau is to avoid duplication of giving to the same families and at the same time assure that every family needing help at the Christmas season receives it. It supplements what families may already be receiving during the year from welfare agencies and organizations. Last year 479 families were assisted through the efforts of the Christmas Bureau.

The bureau will accept gifts of canned food, good used clothing, toys (either new or repaired), money, and some other items. Special needs are dolls, canned meats and milk, and gifts suitable for teen-agers and old people. Gifts of money are used to purchase meat for distribution with the canned goods for Christmas dinners. Gifts may be brought to the Hyattsville Armory, Baltimore avenue and Jefferson street, beginning December 17 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Cash may be mailed to the Christmas Bureau, 3723 34 street, Mt. Rainier. For information call UN 4-0332.

The bureau also maintains a service of supplying the name of a needy family to any group wishing to give directly to such a family. Any needy family not referred by an organization may apply directly to the Christmas bureau. In addition organizations giving directly to families should register the names with the bureau, so all names may be checked for duplications.

The Christmas bureau is sponsored by the Family and Child Welfare Committee of the Community Chest and Planning Council. It operates entirely with volunteer help. Mrs. W. Howard Hunt of Greenbelt is chairman. The services of individuals are needed to maintain the office during December and the distribution centers during the week before Christmas.

## Council Cuts Budget by \$44,664; Tax Rate Scheduled for Reduction

Apparently struck speechless by the revelation that the city council had slashed the proposed 1957 budget so heavily that there will be an actual tax reduction, citizens attending the public hearing on the budget Monday, December 17, made only a few scattered comments and adjourned after a meeting of less than 90 minutes.

The original budget submitted by city manager Charles T. McDonald would have made necessary a tax rate of about \$2.35 per \$100 assessed valuation, or an increase of about 55 cents over last year's rate. The tentative budget approved by the council after cuts totaling \$44,664 is \$330,259, which would establish a tax rate of \$1.66 or two cents less than last year. The council was scheduled to give final approval to the budget at meeting on Wednesday, December 19.

### Cuts

The department receiving the heaviest cut was recreation, which includes the swimming pool, recreational programs, and municipal parks. About \$14,000 was deleted in this area. Originally about \$6,900 was budgeted for summer tot playground personnel, umpires, scorers and coaches, a senior recreation leader, and clerical help for the recreation leader. This was cut to about \$1,000.

However, the new recreation director, who has a salary of \$4,750, was given an assistant (probably a woman) at \$3,000 to help with arts and crafts programs, drum majorettes, and the Youth Center. Other sharp cuts in recreation were a deletion of about \$4,500 for laborers and attendants to take care of the park areas and of \$1,500 intended for a new build-

ing at the lake and a small one for the tennis courts. These cuts brought the total recreation budget about \$2,000 below the amount approved for this department last year.

Another sharp reduction was about \$11,000 from the highways department. Included in this cut was \$900 which had been proposed to provide street lights for the new Woodland Hills and Green Valley developments. The council refused to consider providing street lighting for these homes until construction was actually completed. It was indicated that if necessary money might be found for this purpose if the homes are completed sooner than anticipated. Otherwise, the lights will have to wait until next year.

The experimental three-a-week trash collection, which, according to McDonald's estimate, would have resulted in a ten cent a month increase in the service fee, was eliminated, thus reducing the budget by another \$4,000. The trash collection will continue twice a week. There was also \$4,000 cut from the expenses of the finance department and about \$8,500 sliced from Miscellaneous. Most of the latter was \$6,800 slashed from the original \$9,000 for salary increases during the coming year.

One cut that was questioned was \$300 for a dentist under the health department. However, it was revealed that this sum covered only an inspection of school children's teeth and not a regular examination. McDonald received a report from the Prince Georges County PTA which recommended that a school should be able to get a dentist to donate his services for this purpose.

In connection with the health department a question was raised about the duties of the part-time nurse, for whom \$1,900 is provided in the budget. McDonald explained that the nurse visited the schools each morning to look at children who were reported by the teachers to be ill or needing attention. McDonald stated in his budget that this "is one of the extra services Greenbelt offers to its citizens not common to any other municipality in Prince Georges County." It was explained that other schools in the county are visited by nurses about once a week.

### Dogs

One citizen asked whether something might be done to get rid of the dogs in Greenbelt, perhaps by hiring a pound man. McDonald said the police were doing their best to collect stray dogs and had picked up two that very day. He added that this was a difficult job even for trained personnel. He also made an emphatic statement that dogs do not belong in a place like Greenbelt.

It was noted that there is no provision in the budget to expand the city's sewage and filtering plant. Mayor Tom Canning pointed out that a decision would have to be reached soon whether or not to join up with the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission.

Despite the sharp cuts inflicted on his budget by the city council, McDonald declared that he could live with the funds voted by the council and provide the services that are specified. The city manager was complimented on this year's presentation of the budget, which is laid out in greater detail and easier to read and understand.

The city council had met until one a.m. Friday, December 14, to complete its review of the budget so that the tentative approved budget could be mimeographed in time for the public hearing on Monday. The council met for a total of six special sessions and one regular session to review the city budget.

## BULLETIN

City council gave final approval to the budget as tentatively approved at its special meeting last night. It provides a tax rate of \$1.662 for 1957. A fight led by councilman Ben Goldfaden to delete \$5000 from the \$14,000 fund for replacements, which would have lowered the tax rate by 7 cents more, was defeated 3 to 2.

These ladies will take office in January and serve through 1957.

At a Christmas social sponsored by the Ladies of the Auxiliary, the ladies presented the Fire Department and Rescue Squad, jointly, with the flag of the United States and the State of Maryland flag. Both flags were accepted by Officer Bud Zoellner for both groups, when presented by Auxiliary President Mrs. Joseph D'Agostino.

At the same party, Chief Joseph D'Agostino of the Greenbelt Rescue Squad advised those present that the Rescue Squad is now the proud possessor of a portable iron lung and he had the lung there for inspection. It was an out and out gift with no strings attached and we are under the impression that Greenbelt is the only Rescue Squad in Prince Georges County to have this equipment.

## ISAAK WALTON LEAGUE

The Greenbelt chapter of the Iszaak Walton League held its annual election of officers last Thursday evening, and "Pop" Bell becomes the first former president to be elected a second time. Installation of officers will be held February 9, 1957.

The chapter held its annual Christmas party on Saturday evening.

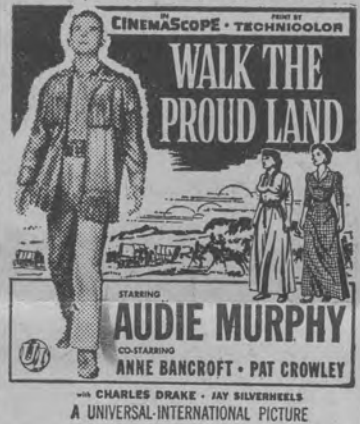
