Huge Fireworks Display for July 4th

Greenbelt will have the biggest and most expensive display of fireworks in its history on the Fourth of July this year.

As a result of the initiative and enterprise of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad and the action of the city council at its last meeting on June 9, close to \$1,000 will be spent on the annual display this year, nearly double the usual amount. The display will be held on the athletic field instead of at the lake.

Originally the council and the Fire Department, which is putting on the fireworks display this year in conjunction with a carnival, each agreed to put up a matching \$250 to make up the total of \$500 usually spent on fireworks. The Fire Department was expected to raise its share by soliciting donations from local merchants.

The Fire Department decided, however, to put up \$250 in cash in addition to whatever might be collected in donations. Tom Snoddy of the Fire Department requested the council to double its previous appropriation and thereby assure Greenbelt of a display that would compete with anything in the area. He estimated that between \$150 and \$250 would be collected from local business interests.

Councilmen Ben Goldfaden and Alan Kistler were both strongly opposed to spending more than the usual total of \$500 on fireworks, although Kistler cast the only negative vote. Councilman Jim Smith pointed out that the Fourth of July is a great occasion on which we commemorate our forefathers.

County Playgrounds

Facilities of the Board of Education, the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission and municipalities will be used in the summer playground program. Playgrounds will be open five days a week and a wide variety of activities will be conducted including softball, volleyball, and other sports, games, crafts, nature, dramatics, story telling, special events, and family nights.

Communities in this area in which playgrounds will be conducted are: Adelphi, Beltsville, Berwyn Heights, Bladensburg, College Park, East Pines, Greenbelt, Hyattsville, Hollywood, Mt. Rainier, Riverdale, Riverdale Heights, and University Park.

A special four week program will be conducted in cooperation with the Prince Georges Association for Retarded Children.

New Ordinance to Govern Lake Area

A proposed city ordinance setting up a body of rules and regulations for the use of Greenbelt Lake Park and other park areas in the city was submitted to the city council for first reading at the last city council meeting on Monday, June 9.

Some of the rules, which cover everything from how late cars can be parked at the lake to ice skating on the lake, are already in force. However, this is the first time they have been brought together as one city ordinance. Final passage is expected at the next council meeting on July 14.

The first regulation in the new ordinance rigidly restricts parking at the lake. No car can enter a park or playground area but must park in designated parking areas. Cars cannot be occupied while parked in the parking area, and no parking is permitted between 11 p.m. and sunrise.

Some discussion by the council centered on the regulation which bars vendors from occupying parking space in parking areas while selling their merchandise, although they can enter the parking lot. Councilman Jim Smith argued that this rule was an unnecessary restriction on ice cream trucks and other refreshment vendors who would be forced to park on the road, thereby creating a traffic hazard. City Manager Charles McDonald maintained, however, that most of these vendors do not need parking space since they remain for only a short time.

The new ordinance also permits canoes on Greenbelt Lake for the first time. As in the case of row boats in the past, city permits for use can be granted to residents of Greenbelt over 21 years of age. The permit holder must be in charge of the boat or canoe while it is in the water, and approved life preservers must be available for each person in the boat or canoe.

The rules also require permits to be issued for all group picnics, with only Greenbelt residents eligible for these permits. Fires must be confined to established fireplaces and must be extinguished before leaving the area. A specific exception is made, however, in the case of portable charcoal grills.

Ice skating will be permitted on the lake but only after it has been tested and posted for safe skating. Bathing or swimming in the lake is prohibited as before. Fishing is permitted and encouraged, but a license is required by all persons over the age of 16 years.

Anything that can be thrown, from javelins to model airplanes, is prohibited except in special areas set aside for that particular recreation. Dogs have not been overlooked. They must be on a leash at all times in park areas, and the leash must be no longer than five feet.

The fine for disobeying any of these or the other rules and regulations in the new ordinance would be a minimum of two dollars and a maximum of 25 dollars.

Summer Readers-Not^e

The passion for giving names to everything from guided missiles to hurricanes has spread to the county library which has decided that its three bookmobiles must have appropriate names. The library has turned the task over to county youngsters in a Bookmobile Naming Contest that will be conducted as part of the county library's annual summer reading program.

This year school children and older students in grades one through twelve who read and report on at least three books acceptable to the branch librarian will be eligible to pick up to three names for the bookmobiles. The contest will run from June 23 through August 2. The winner or winners will receive a book as a prize and get a picture taken.

The Greenbelt Library's summer reading program, which under the direction of Librarian Marjorie Muir has been highly popular, is expected to provide many contestants for the bookmobile naming competition. At least five books are read by readers participating in the program in Greenbelt, and their reports are carefully reviewed by the librarian.

Greenbelt youngsters who read seven books will get a special star on their certificate. A gold seal will go to those who can manage to read and report on 21 books. Mrs. Muir had one note of caution for those already thinking about names for the bookmobiles. Don't submit names like "Eeny, Miny, and Mo" or "Tom, Dick, and Harry."

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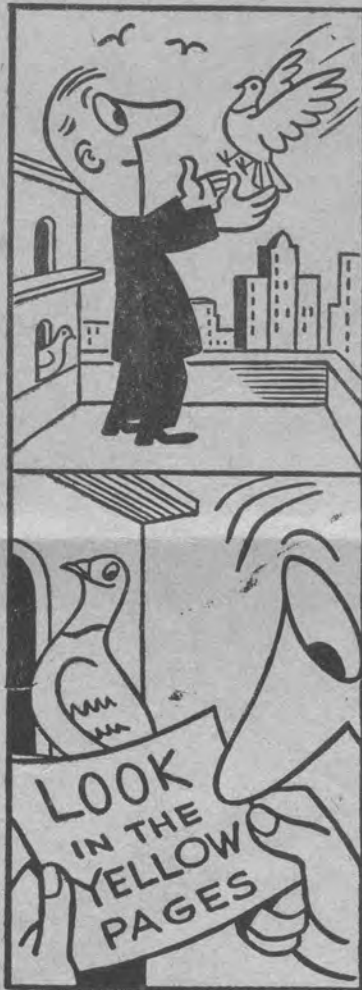
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
