By holding back on the piling of bulky trash and leaves in the streets or courts until these special pick-up days, you can help the general appearance of our city to visitors in the city during weekends, the roadside appearance, unblemished by bulky piles of debris, will leave a most favorable impression.

A special note of appreciation goes to the principals and teachers of our schools for helping us reach the homes through the children with the lessons and values of cleanliness. The parents of our children sometimes don't realize the degree of cooperation that we always receive from our schools in any civic venture of this type.
