## Lakewood Builder Active Citizen



W. Evans Buchanan, builder of the Lakewood Homes subdivision in Greenbelt, was literally raised in the construction business. His father, J. Wesley Buchanan, has been a builder in the Washington area for many years and was one of the founders of the National Association of Home Builders. The son has continued the family's support of this organization, acting as vice-president of its Region IV and serving in addition as a director and member of the executive committee.

Born in Washington, D. C., Buchanan grew up in Bethesda. He is a graduate of Landon School in Bethesda and of the Wharton School of Finance of the University of Pennsylvania. During World War II he served with the Temporary Coast Guard Reserve. He now resides in Rock Creek Hills, Kensington, Md., with his wife, the former Mary Clifton LaForce, and their four children, Robert Evans, Dorothy Elaine, Hope Louise, and Jane Adele.

Active in the Home Builders Association of Washington, D. C.,

fourth largest in the country, Buchanan has been Chairman of the Home Show, which the Association sponsors, and now holds the office of President. He is, in addition, a member of the National Real Estate Board and of the Real Estate Boards of Washington and Montgomery County.

Besides his membership in organizations related directly to the building trade, Buchanan participates in a wide assortment of civic and social organizations including the Kensington Lions Club, the Touchdown Club of Washington, the University Club, the Columbia Country Club, the St. Andrews Society, the Metropolitan Area Economic Council, and the Chamber of Commerce. He is also a Trustee of the Warner Memorial Presbyterian Church in Kensington.

Also active in sports, Buchanan especially enjoys hunting, fishing, skin diving, and boys baseball. He served last year as President of the Montgomery County Boys Baseball Association and himself sponsored three little league teams. He also enjoys music, at one time playing in a Dixieland band.

### BLOOD DONORS FOR PATTY

Blood donors wishing to credit their donations to Patty Glover, the little Greenbelt girl who is suffering from leukemia, may do so through any of the American Red Cross blood units, it has been learned by the News Review. Although the National Institutes of Health, where Patty is undergoing treatment for her illness, maintains its own blood bank, it also accepts credits through the Red Cross blood bank.

## French Instruction

French classes for Greenbelt elementary school children will begin in October under the instruction of Professor Leo Lemaire of the French Department of the University of Maryland, according to Mrs. Lisa Dalton, chairman of the recently organized Foreign Language Committee.

The classes will consist of two half-hour lessons per week, held immediately after regular school hours, with the tuition, payable in advance, set at \$18 for the year. Classes will be held at both the Center and North End schools.

Registration for the French Classes will be held Wednesday night, Sept. 10, beginning at 8:15 in the Center School. Half of the yearly fee of \$18 must be paid at the time of registration, with the remainder due in a month. If two children from the same family sign up, the second child is charged half rate.

Professor Lemaire will be present to talk to parents. Interested parents who cannot register at that time should contact Mrs. Lisa Dalton, Chairman of the Foreign Language Committee, by phoning 9608.

All youngsters in the second through sixth grades are eligible, but it is understood that second graders will attend on a trial basis.

Huge steel frames were placed in position last Saturday to form the outline of the Greenbelt Baptist Church building now being erected on the church property across from the Lakewood model homes. Completion of the steel work is expected this week. Following quickly, brick layers will lay golden tan brick this week or starting on Monday.

Earliest possible date for completion of the first unit to provide for 250 in Sunday School and worship services is set for Sunday, Dec. 21. With the anticipation of delays of shortage of materials, inclement weather, or other factors, January may be a more realistic time for completion.

Sunday, Sept. 7, will be "Back to Sunday School Sunday." All who are enrolled are encouraged to attend Sunday School at 9:45 a.m. temporarily meeting in the Center School. A fully graded Sunday School is provided for all ages, beginning with a nursery for crib babies to five adult classes.

## GHI Ponders WSSC Contract Costs; Rebuilt North End Homes for Sale

A decision to sell and not rent the remodeled North End property was made by the board of directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. at last Thursday's meeting, Aug. 28. Following the recommendations of a special 3-man committee consisting of directors Lloyd Moore, Hans Jorgensen, and George Eshbaugh, the board voted unanimously to handle the renovated property in the same manner as other GHI housing units.

The North End building, which formerly housed the GCS grocery store, has been refurbished into four 2-bedroom units with new kitchen and bathroom equipment, new electrical fixtures, and other face-lifting features. The board suggested to management that a price tag of \$7,000 be affixed to the end units and \$6,500 to the middle units. A 13 percent down payment would be asked, amounting to \$910 and \$845 respectively, plus a \$30 membership fee. It was estimated that the monthly charges would come to about \$82 for the end units and \$77 for the middle units.

GHI, which owns the property outright, plans to carry the mortgage which will run for 24 years at 4%. A purchaser of one of the units, like any other GHI member, will receive a perpetual lease to the property. He will be entitled to the same services and be subject to the same rules of the corporation as any other member.

The board stipulated that the down payments and other principal payments from the property will first be used to repay the corporation for the \$4,500 that was advanced from working capital to complete the remodeling job. One expected feature of the mortgage will be a provision for accelerating the amortization payments.

Incidentally, management reported that the exterior paint job of the North End building has so impressed members that the co-op has been swamped with requests for similar decorating of other frame units. As a result, management is considering adoption of a policy which will permit the utilization of different color schemes in the various courts.

### WSSC Contract

GHI manager John O. Walker summarized the provisions of the proposed contract dedicating the city's water and sewer system to Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission. WSSC has agreed to absorb all maintenance costs involved in the operation of the dedicated system and to forego the front foot benefit charge for 35 years. Thereafter, charges will be made for actual costs incurred in the reconstructing or relocating of water and sewer lines.

Title to the land housing the sewage treatment plant will be retained by the city, but the plant will be maintained and operated by WSSC until such time as the present sewerage lines and those of the new subdivisions which lead into the plant are connected by a new outfall sewer line with the Commission's Indian Creek trunk sewer line.

Upon the dedication of the system, GHI will be assessed the amount of \$34,810 for the expenses involved in metering the water. Of this amount, \$2,285 will be charged against original Greenbelt for the abandonment of lines that formerly served the heating systems and \$32,525 against defense Greenbelt for the installing and setting of 120 water meters. The contract calls for additional amounts to be levied for metering against other sections of Greenbelt such as Lakeside, Jewish Community Center, etc.

No decision was reached by the board on how the \$34,810 assessment would be met or allocated among GHI units, though there was sentiment for prorating the cost over a period of years through higher monthly charges. In addition to the assessment, GHI expects to face each year a WSSC charge of approximately \$3,200 for meter service. Also a property (ad valorem) tax which in Prince Georges County is 9 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

Walker reported that the contract is now being reviewed by GHI attorneys Krooth and Alt-

man for clarification of certain items such as the timing of the GHI payments, the right-of-way and easements granted WSSC, and the substitution of 35 years for the perpetuity clause on relief from maintenance charges.

## Another Festival Passes

Greenbelt's annual giddy, gaudy whirl, the oddly-named Labor Day Weekend Festival, has again slipped into the past. Each year it has become a bigger, more elaborate affair, with the result that increased funds are pouring into the Youth Center Building Fund, the principal beneficiary of the Festival. Chief credit for this yearly massive enterprise must go to Eli Don Bullian, the short, stocky veteran Greenbelter, whose white hairs belie his energetic, dynamic activities on behalf of the Festival. It was Don Bullian who fathered the Festival four years ago. More than any other single person, he has been responsible for its overall management ever since. At the same time, he himself has pointed out that the Festival would not be possible without the full cooperation of the city council and City Manager Charles McDonald.

It is only fair to note, however, that the Festival has a few rough spots in it. With something new and different tried each year, there are always some mistakes which are ironed out the following year. We should like to call attention to a few, which might be watched next year. For one thing, the Labor Day parade has become a rather, anemic repeat of the earlier Fourth of July parade. An added unfortunate note was the poor taste of the local television celebrity, who is accustomed to announce the parade. Some of his comments definitely did not fit into the spirit of the occasion and were even rather boorish.

We also have noted that fewer Greenbelt organizations set up their own booths and that concessionaires are becoming more prominent. This detracts from the local atmosphere of the Festival. On the other hand, one very promising trend is the increase of sporting events, exhibitions, and special competitions, which are attracting top talent and skilled athletes in the area and also from far points. Also, the radio coverage by station WDON was thorough and well done, a feature which should be made permanent.

It is, of course, impossible to have a Festival that would make everyone happy. The noise and disturbance is bound to bother some. However, we think that as long as the Festival continues to be handled by responsible local people, there is little chance that it will get out of hand. In fact, the Festival is rapidly becoming a Greenbelt tradition that is unique in the Washington area.

## Come Back Next Year

The Greenbelt American Legion baseball team is to be heartily congratulated for winning the Maryland state championship and coming so close to winning the regional play-offs that the boys must have almost started to pack their bags for the semi-finals. The Greenbelt team had already beaten the Washington Gas Light team, perennial winners, in the first game and needed only one more run to achieve victory in the second game.

Fate, however, and a classy Gas Light pitcher stepped in to shut the door. It must have been a bitter disappointment for our boys who had been fired up by their first experience in the heady heights of the play-offs. We can be sure of one thing. It will not be their last experience. And so we can say with full confidence—wait until next year!

## Businessmen Erect Signs, Plan Sales

Immediate action was urged at the Monday night meeting of the Greenbelt Businessmen's Association to have five one-by-four-foot directional signs erected at nearby intersections outside Greenbelt. These signs, to point the way to the Greenbelt shopping center, would be located at the exit from the Parkway on Greenbelt rd., at Edmonston and Greenbelt rds., and at the exit from the Beltsville farms on Edmonston rd. President Donn C. Liston was authorized to contract with the Suburban Sign Co. immediately for their manufacture. Hope was expressed that the signs might be in place in time for the Labor Day Festival weekend. After checking with the sign company, however, Liston reported that the signs could not be completed before Friday and possibly not until Tuesday of next week.

On a suggestion by Vice-president Abraham Chasanow, the group agreed to experiment in the future with various advertising media to promote the Center. They are already making plans for a city-wide promotion on Sept. 17-21 as reported in last week's News Review. Announcement of the sales event will be made through a two-page flyer, to be printed by the Marlin K. Tomford Co. of Branchville. Later in the fall the Association will try a similar major sales event, to be advertised in the pages of the News Review. Further tests of various media for advertising should also be made, the group agreed.

At least twenty commitments for membership in the Association have now been received. Mrs. Virginia Beauchamp, Secretary - Treasurer, reported. In addition, over thirty notices of scheduled meetings have been sent to individual business people in Greenbelt. Expressing some concern, nevertheless, that any local merchant or businessman might have been overlooked, the group stressed that any person in Greenbelt engaged in any kind of business enterprise would be welcomed into membership.
