Traffic Safety Week for Children To Feature Prizes, Pennants, Films

Greenbelt's traffic safety week for children begins this Sunday, Jan. 11. There are three big programs for the children; Wednesday night, Saturday afternoon, and during school hours, according to Police Sergeant Austin R. Green, program chairman.

A special feature of the Wednesday night program beginning at 8 at the Center School will be the awards of traffic safety pennants to each of the elementary school principals in Greenbelt and to the principal of the Berwyn elementary school. The pennants are flown underneath Old Glory at each school for the entire school year. Awards also will be presented at the Wednesday night program to the Greenbelt school with the best traffic safety program. There will be an award to the child with the best safety slogan, and a merit certificate will be given to the captains of last year's patrols. The Maple Glen Drum and Bugle Corp of Laurel, and the Greenbelt North End Drill Team will furnish entertainment.

Prizes

At the Saturday afternoon program 75 prizes will be given to holders of lucky ticket stubs. Indian Chief Cloud will be there. Inspector Dick Mansfield will draw cartoons. The Saturday afternoon program is at the Greenbelt Theatre and will begin at 2 p.m.

For the third part of the safety week program, during school hours, Corporal Dave Lowder will show a film on school traffic safety at Greenbelt's three elementary schools.

The beginning of traffic safety week will be announced by Greenbelt churches on Sunday, Jan. 11. The prizes for the Wednesday night program will be furnished by the American Legion and its Auxiliary, and the Lions Club. The city council and the Greenbelt theatre are also cooperating.

Air Raid Sirens Will Wail On Saturday Noon

At 11:55 a.m., Saturday, Jan. 10 all air raid sirens in the Greater Washington Area, including Greenbelt, will wail for a one-minute period.

The test will include Air Raid Sirens recently linked to the master control of the Washington Warning System.

"Prince Georges and Northern Va. will also sound sirens simultaneously with the Washington Area test, although," according to County Civil Defense Director, R. Hal Silvers, "the Office of Civil & Defense Mobilization has not as yet completed tie-in installation of all the Air Raid Warning Sirens in this area under present plans of the O.C.D.M.," which is responsible for warning in the Greater Washington Area, he pointed out, a total of 230 sirens in a 20-mile radius of downtown Washington eventually will be linked to the master control of the Federal Air Raid Warning System.

"No Public Action Is Requested," Silvers said, since this is a mechanical test for the benefit of O.C.D.M. and Area Civil Defense Warning System Engineers.

City Manager Inaugurates New Year With "Progress Report" to City Council

City Manager Charles T. McDonald started the new year with a "progress report" to the city council at its meeting last Monday night which summed up the stages of various civic problems confronting the community. The report disclosed: The manager is still awaiting word from the county board of education regarding the payment for the Center elementary school. The board offered three annual payments which is unacceptable to the city unless payment of interest is included. The board is probably awaiting word from the county commissioners before notifying the city of its decision.

The board of education will approve development of the North End school property as a playground providing it receives assurance of nearby residents that they would not object. However, McDonald disclosed that the development requires an engineering drawing which is difficult to achieve without assistance. The site also requires a great deal of "fill" dirt, now scarce and unavailable, from the new housing developments in the city. The board nixed the idea of reclaiming the land through the sanitary land fill method.

There is still no definite decision on the dedication of land that lies between the Woodland Hills and Lakewood subdivision for park and playground. However, the council was assured that the land between Crescent and the backs of Woodland Hills homes will remain a green belt of trees.

The new site of the proposed community building is still awaiting word from the Gilbert interests, who are to sell or trade properties with the city. (The Gilbert interests are awaiting another decision on the part of the proposed apartment builders who are to purchase their land. The apartment builders are awaiting word about financing from the lending agency.)

The city is planning to pave the shoulders of Ridge between Northway and Southway soon. Following that project, curbs and gutters will be constructed if the budget permits.

Signs prohibiting double parking in the Centerway area will be erected as soon as they are delivered.

Tom Snoddy, city director of civil defense, intends to resign that post soon and will make a final report. Snoddy is also president of the Volunteer Fire Department. He hopes to recommend a successor.

Greenbelt road between the Parkway and Kenilworth avenue is slated for construction soon, the State Roads Commission notified McDonald. The money has been allocated but bids cannot be requested until settlement with one property owner is completed.

J. Wesley Buhanan, builder of Lakewood, had indicated he would assist in the improvement of the Greenbelt Lake park at the time he had started construction. "I do not feel that I have had just the appropriate opportunity to request a definite answer from him," McDonald stated, adding "but he will be meeting with the council sometime in the near future to discuss the planning of the Ridgewood property, on the land adjoining his Lakewood project." A pavilion and sanitary facilities are the items the city has in mind.

City Endorses Silvers For Civil Defense Post

R. Hal Silvers, local resident and director of civil defense for Prince Georges County, was endorsed by the city council for the post of Maryland director of civil defense in a resolution to be presented to newly-elected governor J. Millard Tawes. The resolution followed a similar endorsement made to the county municipal association, which requested that the city add its approval to the other communities in the county.

Silvers was appointed to his present post three years ago by the county commissioners and has been acclaimed "man of the year" by several civic chambers recently. His work as civil defense director was termed "dynamic and inspiring" by mayor Tom Canning

Doubt Exists on Who Fired Maglothin Gun EXCLUSIVE

The question of who fired the gun that critically wounded Mrs. Lila Mae Maglothin, 26, of 32-H Ridge rd., Tuesday night, shortly after 10 p.m. remains to be solved by the police, the News Review has learned exclusively in an interview with Greenbelt Chief of Police Jim Williams.

The mystery may be cleared up if Mrs. Maglothin, now at Prince Georges Hospital, is able to be questioned. Her husband, Private Donald Lee Maglothin of the District motorcycle police, who has been charged with assault with intent to kill in the shooting and suspended, has refused to give any details, except to call it an "accident," and has steadfastly referred all questions to his wife.

It is now considered possible that it was not Pvt. Maglothin who fired the one shot from his .38 caliber service revolver that penetrated Mrs. Maglothin's forehead but that she shot herself with the gun. There was some early confusion over finding a bullet hole in the bedroom ceiling as well as the bullet in Mrs. Maglothin's head. However, it has been ascertained that the shell broke off after hitting her and part of it hit the ceiling.

First to arrive on the scene at 10:15 p.m. after being called by Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Meadows of 32-G Ridge, neighbors of the Maglothins, were the Greenbelt rescue squad and city police officer Bud Zoellner. Members of the rescue squad answering the "door" were Henry Wynkoop, Gilbert Wier, Henry Ogden, and Jack Snoddy.

Officer Zoellner reported that Maglothin, who had frantically summoned the Meadows following the shooting, was highly excited and hysterical and that he kept trying to staunch the flow of blood from his wife's head. Coincidentally, Zoellner used to live in the 32-court and knew Maglothin. Although no powder burns were found by hospital attendants, the usual mark of a self-inflicted gun shot, it is believed that Mrs. Maglothin could have fired the gun at herself from a distance or that the blood could have washed off the powder marks.

Several facts were learned by the News Review as a result of a preliminary investigation by the Greenbelt police, who are now off the case. Although Maglothin had last been on duty for the previous midnight shift, he was still in uniform. He had not been home all day.

It was also learned that Maglothin had all his clothes downstairs apparently preparatory to packing them. There is no indication that a loud violent quarrel preceded the shooting as implied by one story in the local press. One neighbor was awakened by a loud voice, which might have been male or female, followed by a sharp thud which he later identified as the shot. The Meadows had not heard any voices.

The Maglothins have two children, five-month old Kenneth and six-year old Larry who is in the first grade at the Center School. As of yesterday, Larry has not been informed of the shooting. The Maglothins have lived in their home in the 32-court for several years and are well-liked in their court.
