CARE Drive For Tibetans In Final Phase

Greenbelt's campaign to aid Tibetan refugees in India moved into its final phase this week as local organizations cooperate in sharing gifts with those in need overseas.

Churches, co-ops, the American Legion, the News Review, and others are helping to get the word around town. Ministers from their pulpits, bulletin boards, and the representatives of the various cooperating organizations are pitching in.

The idea is appealing. You are able to honor a friend or a relative by sending a gift of life—of food to the hungry who have fled Communist oppression. Your friend receives from you a card stating that a package has been sent in his name via CARE. A Tibetan gets the CARE food package. Every cent collected in Greenbelt goes into the CARE package fund; all the local expenses of the Greenbelt CARE drive are being borne by Twin Pines Savings and Loan Association.

A CARE food package costs \$1. You may pay the \$1 (as many as you wish) to the representative of your organization—he or she has the cards you send to those in whose name the gift is sent.

Anti-Loiter Law Defeated

An anti-loitering ordinance proposed by city police, which would have made it unlawful for anyone to loiter around any highway or public place in the city between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. was defeated by a 3-2 vote of the city council at its regular meeting Monday night.

The major objection of the council was that the measure, which was primarily designed to curb juvenile vandalism and misconduct, would create problems in enforcing it against adults. First offenders would get a warning, with subsequent offenders fined from \$5 to \$100 or up to ten days in jail.

Voting against the ordinance were Mayor Alan Kistler and Councilmen Tom Canning and Bruce Bowman. Voting for it were Councilmen Dave Champion and Edgar Smith.

Elderly Housing Plans Studied by GHI Board

Work sketches and plans for housing for the elderly were unveiled by architect Victor Smolen before the directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. at a regular meeting on Thursday, December 15. The project, which calls for 14 one-story buildings, would be located in the area behind 30-34 Ridge.

Xmas Tree Saved From Bulldozers

Once again this year, colored lights have been strung on the "GHI tree" at the entrance to Greenbelt. The tree was saved from the bulldozers that have been constructing the improved Greenbelt Road and the new parkway entrance.

More than a year ago, the question arose of the destruction of this tree, for originally plans called for the use of the plot of land on which it stands. A series of consultations was called with the engineers. City Manager MacDonald, who was active in the campaign to save the tree, commented, "It has certainly become a city landmark at Christmas time. We consulted the engineers and they were most cooperative in working around it."

The tree has been decorated for four Christmases now, after a three-year campaign to work out the details and secure the necessary permission. The land it stands on was originally the property of the Department of the Interior, and a special concession to decorate it was, after many complications, finally granted. Pepeco laid a special electric line under the road. At present, the venture is a cooperative one, with the city of Greenbelt paying for the electricity and providing a high ladder truck, and GHI supplying the decorations and paying the workmen who put them up and remove them.

The tree has drawn much favorable comment as one of the handsomest in the Washington area. It is visible from the Baltimore - Washington parkway, and serves as a colorful Greenbelt signpost during the holiday season.

Junior Hi-Lites

To help less fortunate children in the hard pressed southern mountains of West Virginia, Tennessee and Kentucky is our school's goal this Christmas season. The name of this project we have taken on is called Save The Children Federation. On the bundle days Dec. 12-22, the students brought in old, used clothing and shoes. The bundles were sent to a Knoxville, Tennessee warehouse where they will be sorted, fixed up and sent out to country stores, schools and churches to be sold to families for very low prices. As an example, a pair of shoes may be sold for as little as 50¢. This project is taken up by many all over the United States. It is nationally sponsored and we are proud to be a part of it. It has truly helped our school to get into the Christmas spirit.

Tuesday, Dec. 20th, Rev. Wyatt from the Greenbelt Community Church spoke to the Tri-Hi-Y, F.H.A. and Hi-Y clubs of G.J.H.S. at their Christmas program. He talked on the True Christmas Spirit. Refreshments were served.

NEW GREENBELT ROAD

Traffic is now operating on the newly-paved west roadway of Greenbelt Road. The surface of the old roadway has been demolished, preparatory to raising it several feet. It will then be repaved, to form half of a dual-lane road. At present, the new section is in use both ways.

Each building would contain a cluster of 4 self-contained units. Six of the buildings would consist of efficiency-type apartments and 8 of 1-bedroom apartments. The efficiency units will be 11' by 18'6"; the others will have a living room 18' by 11' and a bedroom 12'6" by 11'6". Both will include a kitchen, including a 9-foot refrigerator.

UNIQUE DESIGN

The design for the project is supposed to be one of the first of its kind in the country. Instead of the buildings being of rectangular shape as are the present GHI row houses, the structures will be square-like, giving a cottage effect. Each unit will occupy a corner of the building, with two adjacent walls facing the outside.

Other unique features incorporated in the homes with the elderly in mind are grab bars in the bathroom, eye-level ovens and other kitchen appliances planned so as to minimize stooping, and outside emergency light signals operated from the inside which will blink to attract attention.

Special attention will be given to the landscaping and outward appearance of the project. There will be sitting areas located between the buildings. The terrain is taken advantage of so as to avoid inclines for the walks. Smolen said he also hopes, if costs permit, to have a separate community building where people can meet for social activities.

The project will be heated by hot water baseboard radiation, with one boiler in each building servicing the 4 units. This, said Smolen, is the best type for the aged since it provides a steady heat. Also, its floor location will help to offset the coldness of the concrete slab. Vinyl floors are also being considered in an effort to conserve heat.

The buildings will be of solid masonry construction interspersed with redwood siding under the windows and near doors. The roofs will be peaked, utilizing asphalt shingles.

FHA SUBMITTAL

The next step is for the work sketches and plans to be submitted to Federal Housing Administration for their determination as to the feasibility of the project. FHA will examine the site to determine whether it is proper for elderly housing and will review the cost estimates accompanying the plans to determine whether they are reasonable and will permit rentals low enough to meet the pocketbooks of the aged.

The cost estimates are not yet firmed up but Smolen hopes to keep them down to \$10 a square foot. What this will mean in terms of monthly rentals is not clear, said GHI manager Paul Campbell, since there are several imponderables such as method of financing yet to be determined.

The GHI board will call a special membership meeting as soon as more precise information is available on costs and financing and the reaction of FHA to the project becomes known.

INSURANCE BIDS

The board renewed its automobile and workmen's compensation insurance policies for the coming year with Nationwide Insurance Co. which submitted the low bid. However, its 3-year policy for dishonesty, disappearance, and destruction insurance was awarded to Liberty Mutual Insurance Co. which underbid Nationwide by \$400. Total insurance costs will come to \$5,486, some \$500 below previous costs.
