Hour of Crisis

TO THE EDITOR: Words cannot express my gratitude to the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad when they rushed to my aid last week in my hour

of crisis. My daughter Mary Joan was in great pain when she stepped on a needle which pierced her foot completely. I immediately started to take her to the hospital, although I am pregnant; I had driven just a short distance from my home, when I realized I

could not make the trip.

Fortunately, the firehouse was nearby, and I rushed theore on the verge of collapsing myself. On hand at the firehouse were Jack Swisher and junior member Bill Bingham. Mr. Swisher took one look at me and thought I was in need of assistance for myself alone because of my condition. When they were able to calm me down enough to talk, I explained that it was my daughter who was in need of emergency treatment. They found that Mary Joan had passed out in the car. While she was being revived, they were already sterilizing some carpenter tools and then with great gentleness and self-assurance, the needle was extracted and the wound neatly bandaged.

Before I knew it, an ambulance crew had been summoned and we were rushed to the hospital. My daughter was taken to the emergency room, and was given a few cc's of penicillin to fight off any possible infection. Nothing else had to be done. It had already been done skillfully by the men in Greenbelt.

My sincerest appreciation goes to all the members of the-department.




