GHI Board Supports City Council In Opposing Jaeger Tract Decision

In two moves at last Thursday's meeting, the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors gave support to the city council's decision to appeal the court decision allowing high-rise apartment zoning on the Jaeger tract adjacent to the Greenbelt Regional Park.

The Board voted (1) to send the membership a letter calling for a write-in campaign urging the county commissioners to join the city in appealing the case; and (2) to kick off the Jaycees fund drive by donating \$100 to help defray the costs of the appeal. The board felt that the city's case would be strengthened if the county also appealed the case.

In other zoning matters, the board voted to make the GHI zoning committee a permanent body and authorized the committee to prepare a report for the next regular board meeting on May 14 on the Smith-Ewing zoning applications pending for the area east of the Washington-Baltimore Parkway. The county commissioners will consider these zoning applications on May 20 at Upper Marlboro.

Leo Gerton, chairman of the zoning committee, informed the board of the position of the Goddard Space Flight Center on the petitions, as presented at the Feb. 28 hearing before the Prince Georges County Planning Board. In general, the Flight Center was concerned that industrial and commercial development would generate traffic congestion and create unacceptable levels of radio-noise interference.

Tax Reassessment

The board heard a cautiously optimistic report on developments with respect to the county's reassessment of GHI properties. GHI manager Roy Breashears stated that the county assessor's office has agreed to lower the reassessment on GHI vacant land so as to equal that of vacant land owned by Bresler (about \$1,500 an acre). As for the frame homes, the county assessor is still trying to use the market value (based on rental income) of Kent Village row houses as a criterion for measuring the value of GHI homes.

Moreover, certain GHI land is being assessed at higher values than other properties in town, Breashears claimed. As an example, he stated that the assessment of the land on which the houses sit averages out at \$10,150 per acre, which is more than that of many areas in Lakeside and Lakewood. The county assessor justified this on grounds that more homes per acre were involved in GHI.

Additions

The board adopted a set of revised regulations with respect to additions, alterations, and improvements, but left open for further consideration by the standards committee the question of the circumstances under which the consent of members other than next-door neighbors might be required for approval of an addition.

The regulations call for no additions on the service side except storage additions and minor alterations to existing porches. They prohibit free-standing structures other than storage structures. Also banned are additions to one-bedroom frame units.

Tid-Bits

GHI has available new kitchen sinks which it will install in brick or frame homes for \$141, plus the cost of removal of radiator where necessary. A model sink can be viewed at the GHI office.

The board heard that doctors presently practicing in Greenbelt have no objection to Group Health Association opening a clinic in Greenbelt. Such a clinic has been proposed in connection with the development of the GDC land along Parkway as a professional office building site.

Youth Center Smoking Rules Okayed by Council

The problem of how to limit smoking by teenagers at the Youth Center came up for discussion at the city council meeting April 20. The Recreation Advisory Board had proposed a plan to set aside a special area of the Youth Center to permit persons aged 16 or over to smoke, and the council gave approval to this plan. (The legal age to purchase cigarettes in Maryland is 16.)

Mrs. Leonie Penney, 127 Northway, argued that smoking should be banned completely at the Youth Center, especially now that the health hazard has been established. She said that permitting teenagers of 16 or over to smoke openly gave it status and encouraged others to follow suit.

Charles Collins, speaking for the RAB, said that it is impossible to suppress smoking completely without driving the youngsters out of the Youth Center. He said it was preferable to keep them in the building where the smoking can be controlled and where at least those under 16 can be prevented from smoking.

He also noted that the teen club plans to conduct a program of education against smoking. It is hoped that such a program directed by the teenagers themselves will have more effect than edicts from adults. Mayor Smith indicated that he felt the Recreation Advisory Board was experienced in these matters and that its judgment could be trusted.

Mrs. Penney, however, was vigorously supported by Councilman Simonson, a non-smoker, who argued that smokers didn't realize how they were imposing on non-smokers. Councilman Bernstein won an agreement that the teen club would report periodically to the council through the manager on its progress in educating teenagers out of the smoking habit.

Four GHI Board Incumbents Announce Candidacies; Six Seats Are Up

Four members of the present Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors have announced their decision to seek election to the board at the coming GHI annual membership meeting, Wednesday and Thursday, May 20 and 21. The meeting on Wednesday night will be held at the Center School, starting at 8 p.m. Balloting will begin that night and resume the next day at the corporation's sales office in the center, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. The membership this year will elect 6 members to the 9-man board, four for 2-year terms and two for 1-year terms.

Nominations Committee Wants More Candidates

Members of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. were urged this week by the Nominations and Election Committee to give thought to the naming of candidates for the GHI board of directors and audit committee. The only announced candidates so far are four incumbents on the board: Nat Shinderman, Mrs. Jo Seay, Steve Polaschik, and Ed Burgoon. In addition, the News Review learned that Gerald F. Gough, 22-C Hillside, will be a candidate for the board.

The Nominations Committee members have "Candidate Consent Forms" (see printed form in this week's newspaper) available for completion by candidates for office. These forms should be returned to the committee as soon as possible, and must be returned to the committee by Sunday, May 10, accompanied by a short biographical sketch of 200 words or less, outlining education, experience, family background, and any other pertinent information. Members of the committee are Bev Fonda, 6-A Ridge; Mrs. Velma (Jeff) Chapman, 35-F Ridge; George Adams, 46-D Ridge; Mat Amberg, 6-E Hillside; and Bill Hoff, 71-E Ridge.

Nomination by Petition

GHI members may also be nominated by a petition signed by ten members. The committee has available the necessary petition forms.

The committee calls members' attention to the GHI rules that make one member of a husband and wife occupying a unit; that means that "he" may sign a petition and that counts as one signature, or "she" may sign a petition and that counts as one signature, or "he and she" may both sign and that also counts as one signature.

In addition to nominees for the Board, the committee is seeking nominees for the 3-member audit committee. Nominations for the 5-member nominations and elections committee will be made only at the May 20 annual meeting.

Board Members receive a salary of \$500 per year and officers \$750. In addition, board members are eligible to participate in GHI's group hospital, surgical, and major medical expense plan for its employees. The insurance plan is jointly financed with GHI paying 65 per cent of the cost.

North End PTA

The North End School P.T.A. will hold its last meeting of the school year on Tuesday, May 5, at 8 p.m. A musical program by the Glee Club, under the direction of Mrs. Guy Cook, will be followed by a business meeting and the election of new officers.

After the balloting is over, Bruce Bowman, vice-president of the Maryland Congress of Parents and Teachers, will install the new P.T.A. officers for the 1964-1965 year.

Mrs. Frank Lewis, the out-going president, will present 10-year awards to Mrs. Maxine Cunningham, principal, and Mrs. Bruce Bowman, kindergarten teacher.

BOYS CLUB BASEBALL

Boys interested in playing Junior Boys Club Baseball, 16 years and under. (Anyone having his 17th birthday in 1964 is eligible). Report to Braden Field Saturday, May 2, at 10 a.m.

The announced candidates are Nat Shinderman, Mrs. Josephine Seay, Steve Polaschik, and Ed Burgoon. The first three were appointed by the board to fill out the terms of members who had resigned. A fifth incumbent whose seat is up for election — Bill Helm — stated that he is uncertain about running, acknowledging that he has plans for the purchase of a non-GHI home. Joe Cherry — the final incumbent whose seat is up — has already announced that upon doctor's advice he will not seek reelection.

Election Problems

At its April 23 meeting the board wrestled with several problems raised by the Elections and Nominations Committee. Mat Amberg, speaking for the latter group, pointed out that the by-laws do not spell out how to fill seats when more than the regular number of four or five are up for election. Legal advice has indicated that there must be separate elections for the 2-year terms and for the 1-year terms, unless all Board candidates agree to run on a consolidated list under which the top four candidates would get the 2-year terms and the next two the 1-year terms. This consolidated list method was used in 1960 when the corporation shifted to a staggered term of office.

Sentiment expressed by the board was in favor of the consolidated method. It was suggested to the Nominations Committee that the "Candidate's Consent Form" have added an additional statement certifying as to the candidate's willingness to run on a consolidated list.

To avoid this problem in the future, a proposed by-law change was recommended to the board to provide that where there are more vacancies than the staggered number scheduled, the top candidates will fill the 2-year terms and the next in votes will fill the 1-year terms.

Proxies

Another problem concerned a change in the proxy procedure. Under present procedures, proxies can be solicited on a door-to-door basis and it was generally felt that this method leads to abuses, since the person signing the proxy rarely knows who will be voting for him. Moreover, it discourages members from attending the annual meetings, which is contrary to cooperative principles.

The Nominations Committee proposed a by-law change, which would not go into effect until next year's election, whereby a member could vote by proxy only if he has personally appeared before an authorized representative of the corporation and signed a proxy form in which he named a specific member to vote in his stead. In case of bed-ridden members, the designated representative would visit the home to get the proxy.

Both these proposed by-law changes will be considered by the board at a special meeting. If approved, they will be submitted to the membership for approval at the annual meeting.

By-law Approved

The board did approve one by-law change for submittal to the members. This change was recommended by the By-Laws Committee and provided for the naming of two officers of the corporation who need not be members of the board of directors. This by-law change was needed so as to meet the ruling of the State Real Estate Commission that a corporate broker's license can only be issued to a true officer of the corporation.

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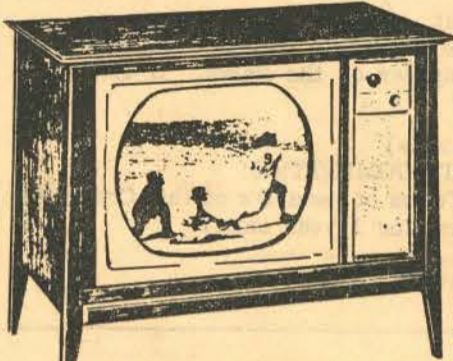
