Springhill Lake Airs Objections, Offers Proposals On Master Plan

In a carefully worked out critique, the Springhill Lake Citizens Association submitted to city council on Tuesday night its objections and alternative proposals on the proposed Greenbelt-College Park Master Plan.

The Association objected strongly to the increase in traffic problems by the development of the area as proposed. It expressed distress over the physical isolation of Springhill Lake Apartments from Greenbelt and the fact that residents would be bottled up in an area from which there is the barest minimum of access and egress.

It proposed that Edmonston Rd. be made accessible once again to Kenilworth Ave. and that the construction of a road crossing the Beltway connecting Springhill Lake with Greenbelt be speeded up. Moreover, it objected to linking this road with Ridge Rd., preferring it linked with Crescent, as Edmonston Rd. used to be.

The Association saw no improvement in the proposal for a four-lane highway coming out of Springhill Lake west of the Greenbelt Junior High School since the egress would be in the midst of a heavily congested area. It pleaded for special traffic control measures placed along Greenbelt Rd. as temporary remedies.

Attacks Commercial Zoning
The Association also took a stand on other, non-traffic features of the Master Plan. It opposed the proposed commercial zoning for the triangular patch of land bounded by Greenbelt Rd., Kenilworth Ave., and the Beltway as being unreliable, unnecessary, and unsafe.

It argued that the proposed office park for the triangle could quickly deteriorate into general commercial zoning and thence into a major shopping center. "Beltway Plaza and the access that the Beltway affords us to other major shopping centers in the Washington Metropolitan area," the report said, "is quite sufficient from our point of view." It also deplored the additional outside traffic that such a commercial center would bring to the area.

The Association also objected to any commercial zoning of the strip of land opposite the Junior High School. It felt that commercial structures should not be tucked into a dead end street directly opposite the school, because of the traffic hazard. Moreover, it felt that part of the land would serve a more useful purpose if used for access to Kenilworth Ave.

The Association noted that the Master Plan emphasized the goal of preserving Greenbelt and developing to the maximum owner-occupied homes and apartments, but stated that "the proposed commercial zoning surrounding Greenbelt, and the inadequacies of proposed roads system to service the area tends to belie this."

Some proposals, the Association concluded, would tend to choke off rather than preserve Greenbelt.

Master Plan Public Forum

Every citizen who is interested in the Master Plan is invited to attend and discuss his views on this Plan.

A public forum on the Area 13 Master Plan for the College Park-Greenbelt Area will be held at 8 p.m. on Thursday, June 25, at the College Park Municipal Building, 4500 Knox Rd., College Park. The Board of Directors of the Prince Georges Citizens Planning Association will serve as a panel to lead the discussion. William J. Stevens, Chairman of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission, has been invited to attend the forum and answer such questions as may arise.

City Notes

Last Thursday the Public Works Crew constructed curbing around the two islands at the East and West entrances to the new parking lot. On Friday the men sodded these islands to improve the overall appearance of the lot. Over the weekend the lot was used extensively by swimmers and visitors to the Greenbelt Consumer Services 25th Anniversary Celebration.

Public Works Crews also improved several of the playgrounds in the City last Thursday by spreading sawdust around play equipment where the children have worn away grass. The sawdust absorbs moisture and helps to keep the play areas more suitable for children playing. The crew hopes to use larger wood chips on some of the playgrounds in the future. Sawdust was also spread over the infield at Braden Field and on the softball diamond. The sawdust will keep the fields in better playing condition.

On Tuesday the final half of the 150-foot strip which is being resurfaced on Lakeside drive was broken up and a 6 inch base of concrete was poured in preparation for the final topping, which will be applied soon. The final asphalt surface will be a big improvement on this section of Lakeside Drive.

Part of the General crew spent most of Tuesday in the park area between Hillside, Lakewood and Woodland Hills subdivision applying a base coat of asphalt surface for a neighborhood basketball court. The court, which measures 29 by 29 ft., will be equipped with a single pole basketball backboard, and will be open for play as soon as the final inch of topping is applied. The heavy equipment used to grade the court and roll the asphalt was moved into the area over the new bridge constructed over the drainage ditch.

Record Crowd Visits Pool

This weekend the swimming pool registered record crowds on Saturday and Sunday. After a few cold days in the middle of the week, averaging about 500 swimmers per day at the pool, some 2000 passed through the gates on Saturday and nearly 2100 were counted on Sunday. Passes are still available for anyone wishing to get into the swim.

Mrs. Maxine Cunningham, principal of Greenbelt North End School, has been appointed as principal to the new Buckingham Elementary School in Belair. Mrs. Cunningham holds a Master of Arts degree from the University of Maryland and has served as a principal since 1954 in Prince George's County.

Zoning Member's Absence Key to Appeal Ruling

The Maryland Court of Appeals this week overturned a Montgomery County zoning decision because one of the three Board members who concurred in the resolution was not present at the hearing but read the transcript. Two others did not attend the hearing or participate in the decision.

The court held that the Board's decision was improperly reached and remanded the case for further proceedings in Montgomery County Circuit Court according to the Washington Post.

County Commissioner Frank Lastner told the News Review that this decision reinforced the position he has taken with respect to the Jaeger tract zoning case. Lastner had refused to take a position on that case on the grounds that he was not legally able to vote, since he had not heard the evidence in formal session.

Councilmen Sharpen Views On Greenbelt Master Plan

City Council held a special meeting on Tuesday, June 23 to discuss its actions regarding the Greenbelt-College Park Master Plan (Area 13). Present were about 40 citizens, including representatives of the Advisory Planning Board, GHI Board of Directors and of Springhill Lake, Lakewood, Woodland Hills and Lakeside Associations.

Attorney Joseph De Paul, retained by the city to help in dealing with the plan and other zoning matters, outlined the latest developments and noted that with two exceptions all zoning cases in the Greenbelt area have been deferred by the county commissioners until September.

George Marcou, the planner hired by the city, then summarized his course of action: (1) review of the Master Plan, (2) interviews and collection of public opinion and (3) drafting of alternatives to the plan wherever indicated.

Councilman Cliff Simonson and John Gibson and Ed Wuermsler of

the Advisory Planning Board outlined the city's own Master Plan which is nearing completion; it was indicated that at least one public hearing will be held by the city before that plan is finally adopted. Among the points of this plan it was noted that the APB supported the new parkway interchange, provided a new arterial road skirting Greenbelt from the north be built to carry its traffic.

GHI Board President Charles Schwan briefly reviewed the stand of GHI and rejected any claim to a "partnership" between the city and GHI. He said that GHI has offered the city its support to help "... develop a plan which will benefit the whole community and, as part of it, GHI."

The highlight of the evening was provided by the Springhill Lake Citizen's Assn. which presented a comprehensive review of its stand on the Master Plan (see accompanying article). Their comments — mostly concerned with roads and traffic — were well received and Wuermsler later noted that they provided a pleasant refutation of the claim that "apartment dwellers take no interest in city matters."

Mayor Edgar L. Smith closed the meeting by noting that this was probably the first in a series of meetings designed to elucidate the city's stand.

CORRECTION

Last week's News Review erroneously stated the location of the 4.268 acres which NASA hopes to purchase from the city. The site is adjacent to the city dump, not the old sewage disposal plant.

Status Report Issued On Greenbelt Road Traffic Lights

City Manager James K. Giese issued the following report concerning the status of obtaining traffic signals on Greenbelt Road:

There are three locations along Greenbelt Road with serious traffic flow problems of concern to city officials. They are at Southway Road, at Edmonston Road, and in front of the Beltway Plaza Shopping Center. The problems at each location are somewhat different and require different actions. The Greenbelt City Council has discussed these problems on a number of occasions. City officials have been in contact with both State and county officials for more than a year concerning these problems.

Greenbelt Road at Southway: The combining of the principle entranceway to original Greenbelt with a major interchange of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway has resulted in a serious traffic problem which has been further compounded by the opening of NASA. Several steps are being taken to relieve the situation. With the opening of the new Beltway, a ramp connecting Greenbelt Road and the Parkway will be opened so that eastbound traffic on Greenbelt Road can make a right turn on to the southbound lane of the parkway. Plans are being prepared and construction should start shortly on a second bridge across the Baltimore-Washington Parkway to help relieve traffic congestion. Also expected to be under construction this year is a new interchange to connect Goddard Space Flight Center directly to the Parkway. With these improvements completed, the traffic situation at this intersection should be greatly improved. In the meantime, a Greenbelt police officer is being stationed at this intersection to direct traffic during morning rush hours.

Greenbelt Road at Edmonston: The City Council and city officials have been concerned with the lack of roads into the Springhill Lake Apartment development as has been the developer. Several new roadways have been proposed by the developer, the city, and the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission for this area, and efforts to acquire the needed right-of-way are being made. In the meantime, however the only entrance is Edmonston Road.

As Greenbelt Road and Kenilworth Avenue are State highways, nothing can be done to improve this situation without the approval of the State Roads Commission. The City has requested the State Roads Commission to do or give permission to do the following at and near this intersection.

1. Install a "Stop Sign" in place of "Yield Sign" for traffic making right turns on to Greenbelt Road from Kenilworth Avenue southbound lane. This has been done.
2. Install "Do Not Block Intersection" signs at Edmonston Road for the eastbound lane of Greenbelt Road. This has been done.
3. Reopen the temporary road between Edmonston Road and Kenilworth Avenue North of Greenbelt Road as a one-way road for southbound traffic. The State Roads Commission has denied this request.
4. Provide traffic signals at Greenbelt and Edmonston Road which will be coordinated with the traffic signals at Kenilworth Avenue. The State Roads Commission has agreed to study this request and has indicated that it is giving high priority to the study.
5. Provide left-turn signals for Greenbelt Road traffic turning on to Kenilworth Avenue. The State Roads Commission has agreed to study this request.
6. Close Edmonston Road at Greenbelt Road and instead open a road along the north side of the Junior High School to intersect with Kenilworth Avenue. The State Roads Commission has agreed to study this proposal.

The city does not presently have sufficient manpower to provide police officers at this intersection. The city has requested the county to provide officers here. In the meantime, motorists wishing to exit from Edmonston Road to go left (eastbound) on to Greenbelt Road are advised to turn right on to Greenbelt Road, proceed one block west to 63rd Avenue, turn left on 63rd and go around the block so that the eastbound lane can be entered by making a right turn.

Beltway Plaza Shopping Center: The State Roads Commission is nearing completion of a study of the need for traffic signals at one or more of the three entrances to the Beltway Plaza Shopping Center. Presuming that it will determine a need for traffic signals at at least one intersection, the problem then arises as to who will pay for the cost of installation. The State Roads Commission states that it is its policy to put in traffic signals in front of shopping centers at the expense of the shopping center. The shopping center has indicated that it feels that the taxes it pays justifies the installation being done by the State.

The city is interested in having signals installed as soon as possible. It will continue to try to resolve the differences as to payment of expenses between the State and the property owner.

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Who's Against Planning?

The *News Review* regrets that its headline of two weeks ago "Attorney, Planner, Hired to Fight 'Master Plan'" left the impression among some readers that the city was opposed to future planning of any type for the community. Of course, quite the contrary is the truth. The city hired a professional planner with explicit instructions to prepare a master plan for Greenbelt that would be in harmony with the goals of the community as adopted by the city council last November.

What the city went on record against was a particular Master Plan proposed by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission. Moreover, its main opposition was centered against certain features which are not in harmony with the development of Greenbelt as primarily a community of homeowners. This, of course, does not mean that some parts of the Master Plan would not be acceptable, and presumably the professional planner hired by the city will advise the city fathers accordingly.

Protests Hiring of Planner SEES PLANNING NECESSARY

To the Editor:

The reporting of Mr. Claude Wimberly on my objection to the City GHI agreement for the master plan of Greenbelt was excellent.

The meeting and decisions of the City Council, GHI, and Advisory Board, made during the recess of a budget meeting, should be made public.

The necessity for all citizens to realize the seriousness of this decision makes it necessary for me to request that the *News Review* print my following petition to council in its entirety:

I am here this evening with regard to the co-operative effort of the City and GHI action of hiring a planner and attorney to fight the Master Plan of the Maryland National Park and Planning Commission's Plan 13. It is indicated that the costs are to be shared two-thirds by the City and one-third by GHI with the exclusion of others such as Woodland Hills, Lakeside, Lakewood and other property owners.

I would like to know what type of agreement was reached; what are the rights of GHI in the agreement; who controls, and who gives the final approval.

I would also question the legality of the City entering into such a partnership.

You, the City Council, have broken a campaign pledge regarding City Boards.

Your action has constituted a vote of No Confidence to the Advisory Board. Did the Advisory Planning Board indicate it couldn't do the job? What parts of Plan 13 are objectionable, or is it all objectionable?

The Council, by your action, have now given an indication that previous action of Greenbelt Citizens to Park and Planning and the County Commissioners has not been effective; and more expert opinions of a planner and attorney are needed.

This may now be construed by Park and Planning, and the County Commissioners that the city was not sure of our desires in the beginning.

Has the City Council found that Park and Planning, with their technical staff, have acted unwisely in all parts of the plan, and want to destroy the image of Greenbelt?

Will they accept suggested changes, or must we take the whole plan?

Has the City Council GHI, and the *News Review*, through their action, created a situation of fear to the citizens that is not true!!

You, the Council, by your action

To the Editor:

David Stern's letter published last week, on the Master Plan, expressed just what I've been thinking, and I wish to join him in "heresy".

Isn't it a little absurd for our community, noted as a planned community, to go on record against a Master Plan? I fear that many who are criticizing the Plan haven't even looked it over. (See, for example, page 56.)

Located at the intersection of the main route to Baltimore and New York with the circumferential highway, Greenbelt cannot expect to be rural in character. Population is growing rapidly all around us. In the main transportation hubs of a growing metropolis, a rustic estate for each family is an economic impossibility.

I remember a talk given by Hale Walker, the planner of Greenbelt, before the Citizens Association when we still had one. Mr. Walker wished to avoid rows of separate bungalows, each with a picture window and each picture window with the latest lamp copied from the *Ladies Home Journal*. When each bungalow has a yard of its own, land is used wastefully and public conveniences are sacrificed. Neither is open space conserved for the use and benefit of all. Mr. Walker said he wished to combine the best features of urban and rural environments. This takes a very special kind of planning, and certainly does not rule out tall buildings properly located.

As a delegate from the Greenbelt area in Prince Georges County I received these impressions at Monday's State Democratic Convention in Baltimore. (Tuesday's "Sun" had half a page on it.)

What was settled there? Four of the Tydings group and ninety others were chosen for the National Convention. This was in very peculiar proportion to the primary vote of 279 thousand for Tydings and 158 thousand for his Old-Guard-backed opponent.

When national attention comes to a focus on the Atlantic City Democratic Convention, very many Marylanders may not be happy at this odd image of our local Democratic processes — and may wonder why the proprietors of their State Convention did not do better. Possibly earlier conventions, other states, and the other party put on about the same corny spectacle, caricaturing responsibility. This is to cast no blame upon individual delegates, but upon the management which confines them to a rubber-stamp role.

Instead of full control by the 171 elected delegates, the convention was completely dominated by numerous other persons who were not elected for this. No agenda was published nor offered for adoption. Robert's Rules of Order were often ignored. Except in two forced roll calls, all actions (as that of the Resolutions Committee) were upon basis of a unit rule system, so dearly loved by bosses.
