GHI ADOPTS 1965 BUDGET MONTHLY CHARGES RISE

With some minor adjustments, the Greenbelt Homes, Inc., board of directors Friday, November 27, adopted a \$1,551,792 budget for 1965. The board approved increases in monthly charges ranging from \$1.75 to \$3.50 per unit and an increase in monthly garage rents of \$1 per unit. These increases will go into effect Jan. 1, 1965.

The board also recommended to the Greenbelt Development Corporation (wholly-owned subsidiary of GHI), operator of the apartments on Parkway, that the charges go up \$5 per month for one-bedroom units and \$3 for efficiencies. These recommendations will be taken up at tonight's GDC meeting.

Only about 10 members attended the public hearing preceding the adoption of the budget. Director Ed Burgoon attributed this low turnout to the confidence of the membership in the ability of the board and management to produce a sound, realistic budget. He observed that most co-ops falter when the board of directors, composed of part-time workers, tries to run the corporation. In the case of GHI, he said, past and present boards wisely have followed the policy of hiring competent management personnel and then letting them do the job.

Breashears Praised

Director John O'Reilly reinforced Burgoon's views by asserting that the real credit for keeping GHI costs and monthly charges to a minimum belongs to manager Roy Breashears and his staff, who are on the job day after day.

GHI president Charles Schwan, however, cautioned that GHI is facing continual increases in labor. materials, taxes, etc. It was noted that more than four-fifths of the new increases in monthly charges were due to items beyond the control of GHI board - namely, taxes and trash collection costs. . In the next two years, he continued, GHI will have to meet the problem of paying 18 months' city taxes in one year as the result of state legislation that requires all municipalities to convert from a calendar to a fiscal-year basis. (At present, the city's fiscal-year budget is being met by taxes raised on a calendar year basis, thus creating a six month's lag in revenue.)

Concern Expressed

From the audience, Sam Cornelius praised GHI for keeping monthly charges stable during the previous four-year period, when the corporation itself was subject to considerable inflation of costs. However, he expressed concern over future budgets and wanted more data gathered on how such factors as depreciation, shifts in area market values, reserve needs, additional tax adjustments, and other inflationary pressures would affect these budgets.

increase as the result of the 3 cents per \$100 assessed valuation hike for 1965 in the State real etate tax rate. This tax, which is used to meet State debt requirements, was 15 cents per \$100 last year.

More than offsetting this increase were two reductions in the budget.

(1) the amount allocated for personnel in the heating department was reduced \$3,000 to account for the fact that turnover and other factors usually produce "lapsed funds" — that is, personnel funds authorized by the budget but never expended. The budgets for the other departments had allowed for such lapsed funds.

(2) the depreciation period for the closed doors on garages was lengthened, thus reducing the annual depreciation costs from \$4,500 to \$3,000.

As a result of these changes, the amount required in monthly charges to balance the budget came to \$1,395,802, or \$52,533 more than in 1964. The remainder of the budget will be met through income from source: other the monthly charges (\$141,000) and through established contingency reserves (\$15,000).

On November 8, while visiting relatives in Somerset, Pennsylvania, little Donald and Jonathan Lynch, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Lynch, 6-N Plateau, were seriously burned when a coffee pot overturned on them.

The boys were rushed to Wimber Hospital in Somerset County, where Donald, age 5, was placed in a cradle frame to keep the coverings from touching his body. His brother, Jonathan, age 2, who was burned on the lower part of his body, was released from the hospital.

Council has indicated general approval of the major features of the Greenbelt Master Plan, especially with respect to the land use plan. The only changes being contemplated are a shift in the site of the neighborhood shopping center for the Boxwood-Lakeside North area and the addition of a neighborhood shopping center on the Smith-

Ewing properties. Some school sites may also undergo change as the result of new decisions of the county board of education. It is understood that the latter is now proposing elimination of one of the two elementary and one of the two junior high schools in the Springhill Lake section. Also the school site for the Smith-Ewing properties may be shifted closer to the NASA properties.

The council has instructed the planners to add a library site in the Center to the plan.

Road Plan Changes

With respect to the highway plan, council has in mind a shuffling of the road system in the northwest part of town. It is felt that the proposed perimeter road would bite into too much Federal property with its attendant problems. An alternate suggestion for having the perimeter road follow the city boundary from Kenilworth Ave. east to the water tower is being favorably considered. The road would then head north as presently proposed by the planners. There would be some sort of tie-in between the perimeter road and Ridge rd. near the water tower.

Another change involves smoothing out Crescent rd. near the Beltway so as to avoid an angular road. Council members have expressed their desire to the planners that open spaces and green areas in the central core of town be preserved

as much as possible. The problem is that much of this land is in private hands. Council is thinking of a land acquisition program financed through long-term bonds. The planners were asked to draw up a catalogue of such areas so that priorities and costs could be established.

DEC. 10 DEADLINE

December 10 is the deadline for senior citizens in Prince Georges county to file for real estate tax reductions. Applications for exemption may be filed by persons 65 years of age or older who have resided in the county for the preceding five years and whose total gross income does not exceed \$4000 per year. The application has to be resubmitted every year.

Homeowner Query On GHI Addition

Greenbelt Homes, Inc. procedures for approving requests for additions again came up for questioning at Nov. 19's GHI board meeting. This time, a member stated that he vent to the expense of purchasing architect's plans for an addition, only to find out after submitting his plans to GHI that a storm drain ran through the proposed site of the addition. He charged that GHI was remiss in that he had had preliminary talks with GHI officials regarding the addition, but was never informed of the easement on his property until he submitted a written plan. Director Ed Burgoon defended the corporation by saying that the GHI staff gets many casual inquiries regarding additions and it would be burdensome and expensive for it to make a search of plats for easements until it had a written plan before it. The member, however, said that everyone knew his intent was serious, since he had just built one addition. The member is now faced with the choice of moving the storm drain at his own expense or of constructing the addition and guaranteeing to pay for any future maintenance costs that might arise in connection with the present drain. The city, which is responsible for

Post Office Plans Special Xmas Hours, New Stamps

Longer post office hours, expanded delivery services and large-scale extension of the ZIP-coded parcel post speedup are planned for Christmas, Postmaster Emory Harman has announced.

In detail, the major new features are: expanded post office window hours Dec. 5 to Dec. 26, at the discretion of the Postmaster; a 6-day week Dec. 7-31 for parcel post deliveries instead of a 5-day week; completion by Nov. 1 of Phase III of Zip Code parcel handling at about 130 more "Sectional Center" post offices (strategically located mail massing points), providing faster delivery (by 24 hours or more) for parcels with Zip Code.

1964 Christmas Stamps

The post office expects quadruplets for Chrstmas - four different 5-cent postage stamps printed in bright holiday colors on the same sheet. The four regular-size stamps portray holly, mistletoe, poinsettia, and pine cone respectively, in red and green on a white background. They will be sold in sheets of 100, each sheet containing 25 blocks of the four different stamps.

Although the Department has issued a single Christmas stamp during the past two Christmas seasons, this will be the first four-in-one issue in the United States Postal history.


