County Plans 4 New Schools As Population Keeps Growing

The Prince Georges County Board of Education is planning four new schools for the Greenbelt area: two elementary schools, a junior high, and a senior high. Details of the county school-building program were revealed at a public hearing at Bladensburg Junior High School on March 15. No opposition was voiced to the School Board's proposals.

A site has already been donated for the proposed elementary school in the Springhill Lake area. It will have 12 classrooms (as does the existing North End School), and cost \$620,000.

Three additional schools are included in the School Board's "Budget Recommendations to the County Commissioners for the Fiscal Year 1965-1966." A 12-room elementary school in the Charlestowne Village area will cost \$700,000 and be ready for occupancy sometime during the period 1966-68. The same period will also see completion of a 1200-pupil Junior High School, to cost two and a half million dollars, and an 1800-pupil Senior High School, to cost well over four million dollars. Land has not yet been acquired for these three schools, but negotiations are under way.

Existing Facilities

Five schools already exist in Greenbelt: Center and North End (elementary); Greenbelt Junior High; and DuVal and High Point (senior high schools). Of the five, three are overcrowded. The Center School, with a capacity of 390 pupils, has 445 currently enrolled. DuVal High School has 2584 stu-

dents, substantially in excess of its nominal capacity of 1775, and High Point High has 2402, in comparison with its capacity of 2100.

Greenbelt's population is increasing steadily, and the School Board predicts that the North End elementary school will also be overcrowded by end of 1965.

Improvements to be Made

Not only will new schools be built, but the old schools are also slated to be improved; funds for these improvements have been included in the School Board's budget recommendations. According to present plans, the cafeteria, kitchen, and lavatories at the Center School will be remodeled; re-grading, sodding, and fencing outside the North End School will be done; and at Greenbelt Junior High, driveways and parking areas will be resurfaced, and additional gym lockers installed.

Handbook for Greenbelters

New in town? Don't know whether you're coming or going? If you've got questions, the city of Greenbelt is providing answers—some of them, at any rate—in a 16-page handbook of information for residents. The booklet should be ready for distribution next week.

The brochure, which was prepared by Ron Dick, administrative assistant to the city manager, will be distributed to all citizens of Greenbelt.

It answers the questions most commonly asked by residents who telephone the city offices, and covers voting and election regulation, taxes, schools, the city government, a brief history of Greenbelt, and a few city ordinances of daily interest (such as the ones dealing with traffic and parking regulations).

Election Meeting

The week-long GCS area delegation election begins April 27, the day of the annual area meeting, which will be held at the Greenbelt firehouse. GCS members may enjoy a chicken dinner at 7 p.m. and then participate in the 8 p.m. meeting.

The ballot boxes will be at the firehouse the night of the annual meeting and at the GCS store from April 27 to May 1.

All Greenbelt area GCS members may participate in the area meeting, whether or not they attend the dinner, and cast ballots in the Congress delegation election.

Heightening the attractiveness of attending the meeting is the announcement of a meeting attendance prize, which will go to one lucky GCS member for attending one of the area meetings—either the one at Greenbelt or in the case of GCS members who live elsewhere, in one of the other store areas.

The prize will be a trip worth about \$200: either round trip ticket for one person, to Brussels, Belgium, on a GCS chartered flight next fall, or a weekend trip for two persons to the New York World's Fair.

"Each One Teach One"

Teachers of the "Each One Teach One" Plan to help adult illiterates learn to read and write will speak at the semi-annual meeting of the Prince Georges County Literacy Council Tuesday, March 30, at 8 p.m. in the Frederick Sasser Jr.-Sr. High School in Upper Marlboro. The meeting is open to the public.

House of Delegates Approves New Re-zoning Legislation

Zoning legislation of interest to Greenbelters was given preliminary approval by the Maryland House of Delegates this week. Supported by the Prince George's civic federation, planning association, and home rule charter committee, the measure is designed to block patchwork development and land speculation.

One provision permits rezoning petitions by the county commissioners to be appealed in court by residents living within three miles of the property in question. The measure specifies that courts cannot weigh evidence in a case, but decide only if the commissioners were arbitrary and capricious in their decision.

The bill would ensure that citizens would be able to obtain technical staff reports on rezoning applications at the planning board office in Riverdale. Under the bill, all rezoning applicants would be required to state why they sought a change in land use, and what they feel justifies the new classification.

Cross-Examination

All witnesses appearing at rezoning hearings would be subject to cross-examination. Applications rejected by the county commissioners could not be resubmitted for 18 months. After the second rejection, a petitioner would have to wait 24 months before filing another application for the property or any part of it.

Rezoned land not under development within five years after rezoning would automatically revert back to previous land-use classifications.

The omnibus zoning bill now goes to the Senate. If passed and signed by the Governor, the measure could go into effect June 1 or July 1.

Rezoning Petition For Golden Triangle

A public hearing has been scheduled for Friday, April 23, at 10 a.m. in the County Commissioners' Hearing Room, County Service Building, Hyattsville, Maryland, on Petition No. A-4834—petition of Mr. Milton E. Selig, owner, for reclassification of a parcel of land containing 56,8789 acres, bounded by Greenbelt Road, Kenilworth Avenue, and the Capital Beltway, City of Greenbelt, from the R-55 (single family homes) zone to the C-2 (regional shopping center) zone. This is the so-called "Golden Triangle."

CLU Defends Teacher

Volunteer attorneys of the National Capital Area Civil Liberties Union are challenging the action of a public school system in firing a teacher because he assigned a high school English class a book that is on the county's approved reading list.

The book is Aldous Huxley's "Brave New World." The teacher is Ray E. Parker, whose contract to teach in North Western Senior High School, Prince Georges County, was not renewed.

In January, Federal Judge Roszel C. Thomsen upheld the Prince Georges School Board on grounds that Parker was still a probationary teacher, with only one year's service. Tenure in the county system comes after two years' service. The dismissal stemmed from the complaint about the Huxley novel from a parent. The case has been appealed to the Circuit Court of Appeals.

Kearns stated that, when the Federal Government wanted to make a pilot film dealing with Juvenile Bureaus, they chose Prince Georges County over all the other bureaus in the country. The P.G.C. Juvenile Bureau was started in September of 1959 and its staff consisted of two members of the Metropolitan Police force and three from Prince Georges. Currently the Bureau has a staff of twelve. There are 175 police officers in the County. Of the 7,000 juvenile cases listed

in 1964, about 50% have been handled through this Bureau. Of these, about 1,200 were actually referred to Court. A Conference Bureau for parents with problem children has also been set up. Lt. Kearns stated that Prince Georges County has one of the finest probational departments in the country and has done a tremendous job in rehabilitating juveniles.

The film, which runs about thirty minutes, plus a 10 minute trailer on a panel discussion about the film, is available for showing at organizational meetings. Con-
