Persistent Problem of Poor Playgrounds Plagues Parents

Playgrounds, and the question as to who is responsible for their maintenance, was the main topic of discussion at last week's G.H.I. Board of Directors meeting. The official duration of the meeting was about a half hour due to a lack of a quorum until about 8:30 p.m. when the necessary fifth member of the Board appeared, and the end of the meeting was around nine because another member of the Board had to leave.

Because of the number of young mothers who appeared at the meeting, acting chairman Nat Shinderman invited them to speak. One woman, acting as spokesman for the group, inquired as to the responsibility involved for the playgrounds and their maintenance. She described the bad conditions existing in several particular areas where playground equipment is placed.

Shinderman explained that 18 of the existing 25 playgrounds are on city land and that many other playground areas, although on G.H.I. land, have city play equipment on them. He further stated that it was the understanding of the Board that the city would be responsible for the care and maintenance of the land where the equipment was placed.

Shinderman assured the ladies, who were ready to present a petition bearing over 100 signatures, that G.H.I. would consult with city officials for an answer to the playground problem. He assured them that any requests from members would be supported by G.H.I. and that a report on the matter would be made in writing.

Other matters were discussed although no decisions could be made. Among them was the report that plans have now been completed for the construction plans on the four large homes soon to be built. A few minor items were to be ironed out with the four families involved. After that, the next step will be to let out bids to contractors. The construction of large townhouses was also discussed. Plans are going ahead to build about twenty-five of these townhouses in the area of Ridge Rd. between Laurel Hill and Research Rds.

Shortly after 9 p.m. the meeting was recessed for a brief period followed by an Executive Session which was a closed meeting.

Burch Guest Minister At Community Church

On Sunday, July 24, the Rev. Hobart A. Burch will be guest minister at the Greenbelt Community Church morning worship service. Burch, an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, presently serves as Liaison Officer with Voluntary Organizations, Welfare Administration, Department of Health Education and Welfare.

Educationally, he has received an A.B. from Princeton University, an A.B.D. from Union Theological Seminary in New York, and an M.S.W. from Columbia University, and a Ph.D. in Social Welfare from Brandeis University. Prior to his transfer to the Welfare Administration, Burch was a Special Assistant to the Assistant Manpower Administration for Youth Programs in the Department of Labor.

Republican Candidates Night

A "Meet the Candidates Night" will be held by the Prince Georges County Young Republican Club on Thursday, July 21, at 8 p.m., in the Perpetual Building, across from the Prince Georges Shopping Center, at the intersection of Route #410 (East-West Highway) and Belcrest Road.

Parkland Suits Filed As City Gets Approval

The City of Greenbelt instituted condemnation suits for the purchase of 22 acres of parkland around Greenbelt Lake on July 19. This action followed the failure of the owners to respond to offers made by the city for the purchase of the land. Parcels 9 and 10 are owned by Crescent Leasing Corporation, and Parcels 11 and 12 by Charles Bresler and Associates.

Early this week the city received the "go-ahead" signal to purchase the parkland from the National Capital Regional Planning Council. Approvals are also expected from the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission and the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments by the end of the month. With these approvals, the city will qualify for Federal financial assistance under the open spaces program of the Housing Act of 1961 as amended.

Rally at Lake Sunday For Carlton Sickles

Gubernatorial candidate Carlton R. Sickles will speak at a giant rally Sunday, July 24, to be held at 2:30 p.m. at Greenbelt Lake. Democrats from Greenbelt and adjacent areas are urged to attend to meet Congressman Sickles and his running-mates in the State and on the Sickles slate in Prince Georges County.

The rally will be held by the First Legislative Subdistrict campaign group headed by Louis Pohoryles of Greenbelt. The group opened its Sickles Slate headquarters Monday, July 18, at 8505 Baltimore Avenue, College Park.

The rally, one of two scheduled for July 24 in the county, is being billed as "Sickles for Governor Day in Prince Georges County" by the Democratic Steering Committee, Pohoryles said. The second rally will be held at 5 p.m. at 5201 Silver Hill Road, Suitland, across from Suitland High School.

Democrats to Hold "Candidates Night"

Interested Democrats in the Greenbelt area will have a chance to meet many of the candidates running for Democratic nominations to statewide and countywide offices and to seats in the State Legislature. They will be present at a "Candidates Night," to be co-sponsored by the Greenbelt Democratic Club and Springhill Lake Democratic Club on Wed., July 27, at 8:15 p.m. in the Springhill Lake Community Building. The "Candidates Night" will be the first of a number of joint meetings and events that will be co-sponsored by the two clubs which represent all three voting precincts in the Greenbelt area.

New Principals Appointed At Center and North End

Center and North End Schools will have new principals in the fall. Robert Ellis has been assigned to Center School and Mrs. Helene Poland will serve at North End.

Center School principal, Ferd Cardano, has been transferred to the Kenmoor School and John Moran, principal of North End, will go to Parkway.

Mrs. Ethel Golden, principal of the Chillum school, has been assigned to the new Springhill Lake elementary school.

STATEMENT ON DEMONSTRATOR'S RIGHTS DISCUSSED BY COUNCIL

At a special meeting of city council on Monday, July 18, the greater part of the evening was devoted to the wording of a declaration on the city's position with respect to the rights of pickets and demonstrators.

Mayor Edgar L. Smith opened the discussion with a prepared statement on behalf of city council:

"The city's position is that any person engaging in his constitutional rights of freedom of speech, expression, or other rights given to our citizens will be entitled to equal protection by our Police Department as all of our citizens are entitled to. I would like to request at this time if any person knows of any instance where this protection has not been received, and we hope that if there is any denial of this protection in the future, that it will be brought to our attention."

The statement immediately brought Al Herling to the floor. He said the statement fell short of what he understood at a previous meeting, would be the council's declaration.

Herling explained that the request of his group was for a simple statement or declaration by council of the rights of all citizens — a statement which he said should be repeated over and over again for the benefit of a small minority of citizens who need to be reminded of the genius of the democratic spirit involved.

The difficulty that city council had in preparing such a declaration was demonstrated throughout the meeting as a goodly number of the citizens, as well as all the members of council, spoke on the subject with varying philosophies.

Council recessed twice during the discussion and finally decided that it had been remiss in not referring the subject to its Community Relations Advisory Board for its recommendations.

School Site Plan Received

At the end of the city council meeting Monday night, council was presented with a preliminary plan drawn up by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission for development of the projected three-school site on parcels 1 and 2. It has been referred to the Advisory Planning Board for their recommendations.

The preliminary plan divides the tract into three sections: a 10-acre site located on Northway extended, at a point closest to Ridge Rd., to be used for an elementary school; a junior high school site of 19.77 acres, adjacent to the Hamilton St. offices of GHI; and a 31.6293-acre site for a senior high school near the sanitary landfill and behind the Methodist Church. Total acreage is 61.50.

No provision is made in the plan for a perimeter road. The only roads shown are extensions of Hamilton Place and of Northway (the current road to the landfill).

Woman's Club News

The Woman's Club of Greenbelt will hold a Clothesline Sale on July 23 at the Center. The Sale will begin at 10 a.m. and will feature clothes and accessories for the entire family.

The chairman of this Board, Gerald Gough, after consulting with his Board, notified council that it could have a report by Friday, July 22.

Other Action

In earlier action, city council amended the swimming pool ordinance to provide for non-resident children guests. It turned down a proposed amendment to permit swimming privileges to Greenbelt Regional Park campers.

An ordinance was approved establishing a 15 MPH speed limit for trucks in Boxwood Village, but an additional ordinance to declare Lastner Lane an Arterial Highway was held over for the opinion of the city solicitor as to the propriety of the action before the street is actually dedicated.

Another ordinance which was passed restricted traffic on the Youth Center Road.

At the opening of the meeting City Manager James Giese introduced Darald Lofgren as the new City Director of Recreation. Lofgren succeeds Richard Stevenson who will be attending University of Georgia for graduate work.

Darald Lofgren Appointed New Recreation Director

To fill the vacant post of Recreation Director for the city of Greenbelt, city officials sorted through applications submitted from many parts of the nation and interviewed a candidate from as far away as New York state; but the choice finally rested upon a man very close to home. He is Darald G. Lofgren, 26, of Hyattsville, currently Community Director for the Calverton-Beltsville-Adelphi area of the Prince Georges County Recreation Dept. His main headquarters has been a new school in Calverton, the first combined school and recreational program in the county; but he has also worked at other locations in the area.

Lofgren, who will assume his city post on August 1, brings to his new job a wide variety of experience in the field of recreation. He has managed a swimming pool, directed a teen club and a gymnasium, acted as an instructor in diving, and assisted a commercial artist. He was assistant manager and recreation director for Adelphi Recreation Inc., a private organization which includes a swimming pool and other facilities.

Married and the father of one child, Lofgren is a graduate of the University of Maryland, where he majored in recreation. He has also done postgraduate work there. He served for three years as an officer in the U. S. Marine Corps. Long interested in the Greenbelt area, he had been looking for a home here even before he heard of the vacancy in the Recreation Dept.

The departing director of recreation, Richard Stevenson, will be able to provide some orientation for his successor, before he leaves on August 12.

Put Your Poisons Well Out of Reach

Accidental poisonings caused 12 deaths in Maryland homes during 1965; three of these fatalities occurred among children under 11 years of age. The greatest incidence occurs in children between one and five years of age.

More than half of the poison cases were caused by ingestion of internal medicines: Common headache pills accounted for a high percentage. Also frequently ingested were miscellaneous cleaning agents, bleaches, detergents, waxes, pesticides, paints, inks, dyes, gasoline, kerosene, turpentine, lighter fluid and cosmetics.

The following precautions are suggested:

- Keep any product which may be poisonous out of children's reach - preferably in a locked cabinet.
- Household products, paints, bleaches, etc., should never be stored even temporarily in cups, soft drink bottles, bowls or any container which a child may associate with eating and drinking.
- When leaving a work area - even for a few minutes - place any possibly dangerous liquid or solid where it cannot be reached by a crawling, walking or climbing child.
- Refer to medicines by their correct names; to call them "candy" makes them appealing and may lead to a child's taking an overdose.
- Dispose of old or unused medicines by flushing them down a drain; rinse containers and discard where they will be inaccessible to youngsters.

If an accidental poisoning occurs, it is vitally important to call a physician immediately, read him the contents listed on the container label and follow his instructions exactly. Or call the Poison Control Center at Children's Hospital, 837-4220. They will suggest an antidote.

City Notes

A broken drinking glass, carelessly disposed of, was the cause of a serious injury to Chester Jenkins, a 22-year employee of the city. Working as a trash collector last week, he cut a tendon in his wrist. Not only did the injury require surgery, but he will be unable to resume his job for sometime to come.

City manager James K. Giese particularly urges citizens to wrap dangerous items of trash very carefully to avoid future accidents of this sort.

Ben Dyer and Associates, who double as design engineer for Charles Burton Builders and as inspector for the city on the streets in the Lakecrest subdivision, predict that Lakeside extended and the court streets in the subdivision will receive their final paving within the next two or three weeks.

The firm has also informed the city that approval has been received from the State Roads Commission for the lowering of a storm sewer pipe on Ridge Rd. This culvert, which was long ago set in at a grade now too high, accomodates run-off from Boxwood Village, has been the major cause of drainage problems in the subdivision. After city approval is given for the change—an approval expected to be expedited—a contractor will proceed with actual construction.

With an advertisement in this week's News Review, the city is requesting bids for the smoothseal road paving program. In the meantime, the Public Works Dept. is hurrying its program of street patching throughout the city. The patching of Crescent Rd. should be completed this week. Next on the agenda is an emergency situation which has arisen on Ridge Rd. near 51 Ct., where the pavement has suddenly shifted, settling in one place and rising sharply in another. Following repair of this spot, the crew will begin patching Lakeside Dr. Eventually also they will be called upon to repair damage to the pavement of the north parking lot, caused by the operators of last week's carnival. The sponsoring organization, the DAV, deposited a sum of money with the city for any damage that might ensue, and it is expected that the cost of the repair will be deducted from that sum.

To date Giese and Mayor Edgar L. Smith have interviewed three applicants for the post of research lawyer on zoning matters, a position authorized by council after they received the resignation from the Bresler-covenants case of Assistant City Solicitor Joseph DePaul.

Giese and Assistant Manager Michael Fischetti met Tuesday with officials of the Small Business Administration and with Mrs. Blumberg, consultant on Urban Renewal, to explore further problems with the commercial center and to ascertain whether any federal assistance might be possible in updating the area.

Resolution of the City of Greenbelt adopted Pursuant to the Authority of Article 11E of the Constitution of Maryland and Section 13 of Article 23A of the Annotated Code of Maryland (1957 Edition as amended) Title "Corporation-Municipal", sub-title "Home Rule", to amend the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, said Charter being Section 40 of Article 17 of the Code of Public Local Laws of Maryland (1963 Edition) and Containing in Whole or in Part the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, by Repealing and Reenacting with Amendments Section 40-60 title "Audits" to provide for the Making of an Independent Audit Each Fiscal Year instead of as soon as Practicable after the Close of Each Fiscal Year.

Resolution No. 97

Resolution of the City of Greenbelt Adopted Pursuant to the Authority of Article 11E of the Constitution of Maryland and Section 13 of Article 23A of the Annotated Code of Maryland (1957 Edition as amended) Title "Corporation-Municipal", sub-title, "Home Rule", to amend the Charter of the City of Greenbelt said Charter being Section 40 of Article 17 of the Code of Public Local Laws of Maryland (1963 Edition) and Containing in Whole or in Part the Charter of the City of Greenbelt by Repealing and Reenacting with Amendments Section 40-45 title "City Solicitor" to Provide that the City Solicitor shall Maintain an Office Within the State of Maryland and to provide that the City Council shall have the power to Employ Other Legal Consultants as it Deems Necessary from Time to Time and to Delete the Provisions that the City Solicitor Shall Prosecute all Offenses Against the Ordinances of the City and for such Offenses Against the Laws of the State as May be Required of Him by Law.
