Speaking Sternly . . . by David Stern

In accordance with its annual custom, Speaking Sternly has predicted the 10 top stories of 1970. Since, naturally enough there is less than complete agreement as to the actual occurrence of any or all of these events, the following choices are not necessarily listed to inform the reader but merely to give the writer an opportunity to say "I told you so!"

—Cornerstone laid for public comfort station at lake park. Just as Mayor intones, "On this spot there will rise, not just a mere Johnny, but a full-size John . . .," a voice from the rear yells, "Where do I go now?"

—Prince Georges becomes the first county in the U.S. to replace the haphazard actions of a zoning board with the impersonal precision of a zoning lottery. General Hershey, as guest of honor, dips his hand in the bowl and draws the first lot which, to no one's surprise, rezones Braden field for heavy industrial use.

—Sit-in is staged by students of the Greenbelt Co-op Nursery School, whose non-negotiable demands include coffee, cigarettes and natural hair styles on campus, courses in child culture and baby talk, a seat on the board and unconditional amnesty to all who wet their pants during school hours. Negotiations collapse and the insurrection is ended by a flying wedge of helping mothers, braving a rain of building blocks and play-doh.

—School activities resume in Center School classroom as library abandons it for brand-new million-dollar building. Patrons of new library are delighted with its many modern and ingenious features, most of all with the ease with which its halls can be converted into emergency classrooms, should the need arise.

—First run of the Greenbelt Grand Prix motor race features the Klein Plaza Dodge, the Beltway Entrance Back-up and Greenbelt Roulette, played at the southway-Glenn Dale intersection. First run is also going to be the last one, since sponsors later unanimously agree that the course laid out is too difficult and too dangerous, even for veteran race drivers.

—Completion of Gentry Drive is set at no later than the fall of 1971, following delays occasioned by the finding of dinosaur bones, landslides and the discovery that the mapped right-of-way passes smack through the A & P store on Beltway Plaza.

—By a superhuman effort leaf collection is completed in time for the 4th of July celebration. Fireworks are termed "best yet," but city denies that cherry bombs that landed near new State Roads Commission building on Kenilworth Ave. were a hint to expedite the construction of the circumferential highway.

—School buses tumble down into Beltway Plaza as county issues absolutely last order to fix that #\$\$%&!+?+* slope.

—Labor Day Festival features "Fight for Peace" town meeting, which turns into general free-for-all. Moratorium is decreed on all public displays of nonviolence.

—Due to simultaneous widening of the Beltway and the Parkway, State Roads Commission announces that Greenbelt will have to go. Sorry about that readers - enjoy your 1970 while it lasts!

City Notes

The ice on the Greenbelt Lake is not yet hard enough for skating, city officials have warned.

The Christmas Day snowfall interfered with the municipal trash collection service since many of the workers, who live in the District, were unable to reach Greenbelt or work on Friday. The trailer which was parked in the north parking lot at the Center for trash deposits has been heavily used.

The snow removal crew worked from 4 p.m. on Christmas Day till 6 am on Friday. They salted streets and also plowed.

Advanced First Aid Course

The Prince Georges County Red Cross Chapter will offer an advanced course in first aid at the College Park Municipal Bldg., 4500 Knox Rd. Classes will be held on Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. for nine weeks. Registration and first class will be January 8, 1970. The classes are free and open to anyone 15 years of age or older who holds a standard Red Cross Certificate no more than 3 yrs. old or an Advanced Red Cross Certificate no more than 5 yrs. old. This is the same class used to train firemen and rescue squads and would be valuable for campers, hunters, boating enthusiasts who are often in situations away from regular medical facilities. Ten Top Stories Of 1969

In accordance with its annual custom, the Greenbelt News Review has selected the following as the ten top Greenbelt stories of 1969, listed in the approximate order of their occurrence.

—The year starts with ruffled feelings between Springhill Lake and city council as council delays approval of a separate polling place for Springhill Lake voters. Council approval later in the year mollifies only in part Springhill Lake resentment.

—City council, Greenbelt Homes, Inc. and other civic groups oppose special zoning exception for a privately-owned nursing home on Lutheran Church site. Subsequently, an ad hoc committee is set up to consider other uses of the site, and at year's end council accepts ad hoc committee suggestion that city entertain possibility of purchasing property for recreational and community purposes.

—Plans for a \$950,000 capital improvement program, approved by electorate in November 1968, go forward as public hearings are held on Youth Center addition, Springhill Lake recreation building, and improvement of Southway road and Federal Government approves "open space" grants for purchase of parkland.

—City and local developer Charles S. Bresler reach accord on outstanding litigation whereby city would drop its action to enjoin the construction of 21 additional apartment units on Charlestowne tract in exchange for permanent injunction against any further construction on the tract. In addition, Bresler agreed not to appeal a court order requiring him to convey as promised 3.3 acres of Charlestowne tract to city as parkland.

—Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission adopts revised Master Plan for College Park-Greenbelt area which meets general approval of city council as in keeping with major goal of preserving Greenbelt as a planned low-density residential community. Features of plan include (1) single-family residential development of parcel 1 (north of Northway Rd. along the Baltimore-Washington Parkway) and parcel 15 (south of Greenbelt Lake along the Beltway); (2) designation of a perimeter road to join together the parts of Greenbelt which are separated by the Beltway and Parkway; (3) designation of such tracts as parcels 7 and 8 at the Crescent road entrance to the city near Boxwood Village for parkland; and (4) development of 30.5 acres of Springhill Lake property north of Capital Beltway for commercial-office buildings and possible motel-convention center.

—Plans for 101-room fully air conditioned Greenbelt senior high school to accommodate 2,400 students receive school board approval, but location of school on 72-acre tract between GHI property and Baltimore-Washington Parkway raises many problems. Those include dedication of land for perimeter road, pavement and location of access roads to school tract, and complications caused by assertion of former owners (Charles Bresler, Theodore Lerner, and associates) of right to repurchase back land not needed for school purposes at original price plus 6 percent per annum interest.

—Council adopts \$985,300 budget for 1969-70, with a reduction in the tax rate for the fourth straight year — to a new low of \$0.80 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

—With Springhill Lake votes a major factor for the first time, two newcomers and three incumbents are chosen among a field of 10 candidates in the September city council election. High vote gatherer incumbent Francis White subsequently elected mayor by his colleagues — newcomers Joel Katz and Elizabeth Maffay and incumbents Edgar Smith and Richard Pilski. At same election, an advisory referendum produces an almost 2 to 1 vote in favor of stronger state gun-control laws.

—U. S. Supreme Court agrees to review Maryland Court of Appeals decision affirming \$17,500 libel judgment awarded Bresler against the Greenbelt News Review by a Prince Georges Circuit jury in January 1968.

—Dedication, location and pavement of Gentry Drive — a major access road to Springhill Lake running alongside the A&P Supermarket at Beltway Plaza — absorbs attention of MNCPPC, Beltway Plaza developer Sidney Brown, Springhill Lake representatives Edward Perkins and Harold Kramer, and city council. At year's end, agreement is reached whereby Brown dedicates 60-foot right-of-way for Gentry Drive, city and Springhill Lake share costs of pavement, and MNCPPC approves plans for further commercial development of shopping center.

Jaycees Meet Jan. 8

Two Army helicopter pilots who are combat veterans of Vietnam will be telling their personal stories at the Jan. 8 meeting of the Greenbelt Jaycees, to be held at 8 p.m. at the Municipal Building.

Chief Warrant Officers Thomas L. Standley from Green Lawn, New York, and Chester F. Jezierski (juh-sur-skee) - from Scranton, Pennsylvania, flew helicopter gunships in numerous battles in the Republic of Vietnam. Pilots Standley and Jezierski have accumulated a combined total of more than 1,600 hours of combat flying time. The warrant officers are currently assigned to the Air Cavalry Troop of the 6th Armored Cavalry Regiment at Fort George G. Meade, Maryland. The public is invited to attend.

DRESSMAKER'S COURSE

An eight week, three hour Dressmaker's Fitting course, sponsored by Prince Georges County Adult Education will begin on Wednesday, January 21, at 9 a.m. at the Co-Op Hospitality Room in Greenbelt. Since this class will enroll a minimum number of students, the regular fee will not apply. For information, call 474-8795.

Pre-College Courses For High Schoolers

A series of programs for high school students interested in improving academic performance before entering college will be offered by the University of Maryland this spring.

The programs offer skilled assistance in the following areas: reading comprehension and speed; study organization and time scheduling; techniques of improved textbook comprehension; preparing for and taking essay, objective and college entrance examinations; notetaking and listening skills; vocabulary and spelling development; and grammar, composition writing and penmanship.

The programs will be available Monday, 7:10 p.m., starting February 9, ending May 4, 1970; Wednesday, 7-10 p.m., starting February 11, ending May 6, 1970; Saturday, 9 a.m. until noon, starting February 14, ending May 9, 1970.

The Audit Committee is considering a review of Mr. Hoffman's study but it has not yet done so and has not acted upon it.

The Audit Committee has not asked for a meeting with the Auditors of the corporation for any reason whatever. The Audit Committee, at the suggestion of the Chairman, Tom White, did vote to ask to be permitted to observe a year-end audit in order that we might better fulfill our duty to advise the Board as to the extent and scope of the Audit.

Maryland U. Elected To Membership in AAU

The University of Maryland has been elected to membership in The Association of American Universities, an organization of approximately 50 universities in the U. S. and Canada that are considered pre-eminent in the fields of graduate and professional study and research.

Each member university is represented by its president, and Dr. Wilson H. Elkins, president for the past 15 years of what is now the 7th largest state university system in the nation, will represent the University of Maryland.

The AAU, which has headquarters in Washington, D.C., was founded in 1900 with a membership of 14 universities that included Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Stanford, Clark, Columbia, Cornell, and The Johns Hopkins Universities, as well as the Universities of California, Chicago, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, and the Catholic University of America.

Only 34 universities have been chosen for membership over the intervening years, including the four added this year. Besides the University of Maryland, they are: Case Western Reserve University, the University of Southern California and the University of Oregon.

Dr. Michael J. Pelczar, vice president for graduate studies and research at the University of Maryland, will also become a member of the Association of Graduate Schools, composed of the same member institutions as the AAU.

Winterize Your Car

Snow, sleet and ice present problems aplenty to motorists, says the American Automobile Association, and the time to prepare for winter weather is now.

"Winterizing" consists of the following safety checks and services:

Drain and flush the cooling system and install a proper thermostat and antifreeze. Check radiator and heater hoses and replace them if they are found defective. Check the ignition system, points, plugs and condenser and tune up if needed.

Inspect snow tires for cuts and bruises and make certain there are no worn or broken links on tire chains.

Clean the carburetor and adjust the automatic choke.

In cold weather, a battery which was performing satisfactorily in warmer weather suddenly loses efficiency, contributing to the largest number of service calls. Check the battery and charge if necessary, also inspect the cables for cracks and corrosion.

Lubricate the car to eliminate dust, dirt and moisture from moving parts.

Survey Rates Information Media

Does the city publish enough information about its operations? In what ways should the city provide information to residents and what local weekly newspapers do Greenbelt residents read? These questions were among those put to voters in a questionnaire at the September city election. The results are tabulated in the remainder of this article.

In our survey of voters, 62% of those responding thought that the city was doing an adequate job in 77%; Springhill Lake residents getting published information out were nearly evenly divided in opinion to the residents, while 30% thought 45% were generally satisfied information services were inadequate while 43% were dissatisfied.

The next question dealt with various ways in which the City could provide information to residents. Voters were asked to check as many responses as desired from the list provided on the questionnaire.

The vehicle for information receiving the most support from respondents was that of "news reports in local newspapers." This response rated highest in G.H.I. housing and Single Family areas and received strong support in Springhill Lake. Presently, the primary newspaper for City news is the Greenbelt News Review; there are other weekly area papers.

The second most desired news vehicle according to our survey is "monthly newsletters," which received a 47% overall response. In Springhill Lake, the response for this item was 59% and in G.H.I. 47%. The two areas of the city that were most in favor of monthly newsletters are areas where residents presently receive monthly newsletters. Springhill Lake Community Center publishes an informative monthly newsletter for residents, while G.H.I. does the same. Perhaps the City might be able to make use of these two newsletters to publish a monthly report.

City Annual and Special Reports ranked third as ways to publish information. The City presently publishes an annual report which goes to each household. Into the preparation of the annual report goes much time, effort and money. A poll of other area municipalities shows that most who publish monthly newsletters do not prepare as extensive an annual report as Greenbelt; in some cases no annual report is published. As to Special

Reports, these are usually quite necessary for certain issues such as bond referendum, the budget brochure and for recreation programs and activities.

Other ways in which the City could publish news, such as by placing bulletin boards in shopping centers, and providing speakers, receive some support from Greenbelt voters.

News Review Widely Read

According to our survey, 78% of local residents read the Greenbelt News Review. This figure would have been much higher but for Springhill Lake, where only 44% of the respondents read the News Review. In G.H.I. and Single Family areas, the percent of people who read the News Review was 97% and 95% respectively. It should be noted that at Springhill Lake many residents indicated they didn't get delivery of the News Review or that delivery was sporadic. The News Review has been aware of this situation and has taken steps in the past few months to bring more complete delivery to residents of Springhill Lake.

The Prince Georges Sentinel is also read by quite a few Greenbelt residents, 27% as is the Prince Georges Post. Questions were confined to weekly newspapers; thus no figures were obtained as to circulation of the three Washington daily papers in Greenbelt.

In summary it would appear that Greenbelt residents are generally satisfied with the amount of information they receive from the city. As to ways in which news should be presented, many residents favor a city newsletter, be it monthly or otherwise, to supplement newspaper stories and articles.
