## City Notes

Following a request from city council, the Greenbelt post office has moved its fleet of over 20 postal trucks from the west to the north parking lot in the Center. Council's action stemmed from a series of complaints concerning the domination of the large, square vehicles of the available spaces in the lot. In actual fact, however, postal vehicles were occupying no more room than they had before, according to Postmaster Emory Harman. Previously many drivers used their own cars or rental sedans; but under a new federal post office policy, transport of mail will henceforth be accomplished in official vehicles. The large trucks will shortly be replaced, however, by left-hand drive jeeps. As soon as the local post office receives delivery of the jeeps, parking in the former lot behind the post office will be resumed. All vehicles are in daily use in the Greenbelt area alone, the postmaster advised.

City manager James K. Giese, in a Jan. 15 meeting with Howard LePoirs, Open Space representative for the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development, learned that the city will be able to make application for development funds for the lake park. According to the terms of the matching grant program, in which the federal government would match the funds for park development which are committed by the city, Greenbelt would be able to apply for similar grants in successive years.

LePoirs also indicated that the acquisition of the Lutheran Church property could also be partially funded under the Open Space program. He suggested that the city apply for a grant to purchase both the vacant land and the building on the site, though he intimated that probably only the land purchase would be augmented by such a grant, since new urban programs are taking top priority at the present time.

## New 1040 Tax Form

All Maryland and District of Columbia taxpayers will use a new 1040 income tax form this year, according to Irving Machiz, District Director of Internal Revenue. The one-page form takes the place of the card Form 1040A and the form 1040 used last year.

With the new form taxpayers can claim deductions or credits which could not be claimed on the old 1040A card form. The sick pay exclusion and the retirement income credit, for example, could not be claimed on the card form.

The option of having IRS compute the tax due will be provided under similar conditions as it has in the past when 1040A filers could make this choice.

Taxpayers are asked to supply the same information on this year's form that they gave in previous years; the basic change is that the information is organized differently.

The new one-page Form 1040 asks for the same information that had to be entered on the front and back of the old 1040A but has a few added lines for flexibility. Taxpayers with special income and expense situations can supplement the new one-page form with the additional schedules provided in the tax package.

Machiz said nearly half the nation's taxpayers—about 31 million—will need just the new one-page form. Another 22 million will need to attach only one schedule to the form.

## Lutherans Take City's Bid for Church Site

The congregation of the Holy Cross Lutheran Church has notified the city of its willingness to sell to the city the church property at 22 Ridge on the basis of the city's offer of \$80,000. At a meeting last week, the congregation authorized the appointment of a committee of trustees to negotiate the details of the sale with the city. In the meantime, the city has written to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, seeking approval for the city to proceed with the acquisition of the 3.1-acre tract.

Nominations are being received, and all information will be furnished to the judging committees on January 30. Winners of the two separate programs will be honored at an Awards Banquet to be held on February 14.

## Norman Weyel Elected to Fill Vacant Post on GHI Board

The Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors on Thursday, January 22, elected Norman Weyel to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of director Jim Smith. The results of the secret ballot were four votes for Weyel, two for Walsh Barcus and two for William Lathom. According to the GHI by-laws, a candidate is elected if he receives a plurality of 50 percent or more of the votes of the remaining board members. Thus, four votes were needed. (The News Review previously reported incorrectly that five votes were needed for election.)

Weyel had previously served on the board from 1964 to 1969. He was unsuccessful in his bid for a third term at last May's annual membership meeting.

Weyel will serve until this May's annual election, when the membership, in addition to electing four board members for two-year terms, will elect a fifth to fill out the remaining one year of Smith's term. Prior to the voting last Thursday, Mrs. Josephine Seay, who had

been nominated at the previous meeting, announced her withdrawal as a candidate. However, she said that she would be a candidate in the May elections.

#### Townhouses For Rent

With two of the new townhouses still unsold, the board authorized management to occupy the homes on a temporary rental basis. The motion, which would permit non-GHI members to rent as well as members, was passed with opposition from directors Alex Chavrid and Douglas Hawes. Hawes stated that before renting he would prefer making the homes available to non-members on a sales basis. He thought that a rental policy was undesirable because the property would not be maintained.

The majority of the board, however, thought it premature to relinquish its policy of selling the homes only to GHI members. It felt that such purchasers would be forthcoming when the weather warms and that the only need now was to have the homes occupied immediately so that there would be no revenue losses. It was made clear that long-term leases for renters would be discouraged.

The board also directed management to publicize its lease purchase arrangement and to give priority over renters to members wishing to use this arrangement. Under the lease-purchase arrangement, a member would be able to move into a new townhouse while awaiting the necessary funds for the down payment from the sale of his old GHI home. He, in effect, would be renting but with an option to buy within a nine-month period, part of the rent being applied to the purchase price.

At the same time the board directed the Larger Homes Committee and the Finance Committee to make a study of the desirability of selling the townhouses to non-GHI members and what the ramifications of such a policy would be.

By the end of last week, seven members had moved into their new townhouses and it is expected that all the townhouses will be available for occupancy by March 1 at the latest.

#### Other Matters

The board is scheduled to meet with city council this week to consider an agenda consisting of the following topics: abandonment of Southway Rd.; access routes to school sites and perimeter road; Lutheran Church site; sidewalk on Laurel Hill; and trash collection services.

The board received a communication from its attorney, Al Ginsberg, that in his opinion the corporation could lend funds to members for purchase of such items as dishwashers, washing machines, and refrigerators. The question hinged upon whether these items could be interpreted as "improvements," which are permitted to be financed by corporation funds under the by-laws. Ginsberg said that under modern concepts even such items as wall-to-wall carpeting are often considered integral parts of a house. The board sent the matter to committee since it had not yet made up its mind whether it wanted to engage in such a program.

The results of a questionnaire on what GHI members would like to see included in the GHI Newsletter were announced. Only 26 members voiced their views, but the majority wanted to see more home improvement tips and advertising for firms providing services. The majority also voted for stories recapping board actions and new regulations. Some members asked for more frequent issues of the Newsletter but a majority thought the present schedule was satisfactory.

## NEW POSTMARK FOR GREENBELT

As of Jan. 10, letters mailed in Greenbelt no longer carry the Greenbelt postmark. In its place appears the postmark "Prince Georges, Maryland." The change came about when the new sectional mail sorting center in Riverdale went into service. The Riverdale facility handles from five to more than eight million letters a week.

Thus far, according to James L. Roby, manager in charge, there have been no complaints about the new postmark.

Other towns affected by the change are: Beltsville, Bladensburg, Bowie, Brentwood, College Park, Glenn Dale, Hyattsville, Lanham, Laurel, Mount Rainier and Riverdale.

## Three Greenbelt Locations Named Historical Sites

Three Greenbelt historical sites were among those approved by the Prince Georges County Planning Board when it adopted on Wednesday, January 21, its portion of the bi-county Historic Sites Identification Map, as an amendment to the General Plan for the Physical Development of the Maryland-Washington Regional District.

These three sites — Indian Springs, Walker Cemetery, and the original City of Greenbelt — were among 187 designated on the map as having "historic value for the area, and in many instances, historic significance for the country."

A description of the Greenbelt sites follows:

**Indian Springs** where Indian tribes held their conclaves prior to the arrival of the white man. Among the list of the local tribes to inhabit the area were the warlike Senecas and Sinehannas. Until recent years, arrowheads were found in the woods.

**Walker Cemetery** where revolutionary war figures, Isaac Walker and his son, Nathan, were buried. In 1756 Isaac Walker received a patent of land for 200 acres for the south-western portion of Greenbelt. A descendant sold the property to the Federal Government when the town of Greenbelt was in the early planning stages. A monument was erected here by the DAR in 1938.

**City of Greenbelt**, a development potentially historic by virtue of its having been the first experience by the Federal Government in providing planned community housing for the low income level. Only the oldest portion of the town is of the original design.

**One-Man Ragtime Show Now at Ford's Theatre**

Max Morath a kind of hip master of ragtime, recalls the era of 1890-1920 in a delightful two-hour show now appearing at Ford's Theatre until February 15.

With an unsentimental, yet nostalgic approach, Morath presents his one-man show with music, dances, songs, and monologues, with the aid of some marvelously tinted stereoscopic slides which are projected onto two screens designed as windows in his Victorian style set.

Morath traces not only the history of ragtime, selecting favorite pieces from such of his heroes as Scott Joplin, Jellyroll Morton, Bert Williams, and Irving Berlin, but also delivers some delightful character sketches which play up the fads and foibles of the era. For instance, the musician's union forbade its players to play ragtime, thereby giving ragtime music a daring and illicit flavor.

Morath comments on history, in the sense of how much things stay the same even as they change. For instance, in the '20's pot was legal, but alcohol was illegal. And, of course, bootleggers were never more prosperous.

Morath's finest moment on-stage, I believe, is when he shows how Jellyroll Morton developed a ragtime piece from the quadrille, fitting in the traditional waltz, polka, promenade, et al., rhythms into the fast-paced music of ragtime.

**The Police Blotter**
