GHI INFORMATIONAL MEETING COVERS WIDE RANGE OF TOPICS

Twenty-four GHI members gathered in the Greenbelt Library on Monday, April 10, to hear and question the informational reports of GHI's board and management. President of the board Nathan Shinderman presided, as Janet James discussed the status of the management audit and the new parking regulations; David Lange-the architectural survey; Jim Smith-the 3% assessment on resales to increase working capital; Roy Breashears-the planned appeal to the county to reduce the increased tax assessment; Donald Volk-the new hedge regulations.

When Janet James discussed the management audit currently being done by Cresap, McCormick & Pagent, Inc., she pointed out that the investigator Knapp had studied all written material of GHI (legal documents, by-laws, minutes, financial reports, internal reports to members, the working documents of all the staff.) Knapp also had interviews with the board, all management heads, all members who sought him out. He also studied the 700 questionnaires that had been returned to the firm. Miss James added that the firm would have a summary report ready for the membership by the end of April or the beginning of May and that the whole report would be available upon request.

Katherine Keene emphasized the summary would be in the GHI Newsletter as written by the firm and the newsletter staff would not propose any editing.

Architectural Survey

Director Lange discussed the architectural study now in progress. Initially it was to be a comprehensive study of each building but now is a study split into two phases — the first, a preliminary overall view of conditions; the second, reactions to the overall view. Management is extremely happy with the survey since GHI will not get back just statistics but conclusions or solutions. The firm has investigated not only present trouble spots but potential areas of trouble. The firm has done considerable inspection of homes (crawl spaces, attics, removing exterior surfaces to look at interior problems). The report is due within a month.

The first phase of the report will cost \$10,000. The final cost will depend upon the degree and detail of needs gathered from the initial report.

Working Capital

Director Smith discussed the plan to increase working capital by assessing new members (as they bought a home) 3% of the resale price. When the corporation was first formed, purchasers paid 3% of the book value of the homes to develop working capital, but that practice stopped in the 60's when it was thought that the amount accumulated was sufficient. Since that time the cost of materials, labor, and taxes has increased and the amount available for working capital has not increased.

Benjamin Elkins interrupted Smith, roaring that he was not going to sit and have his intelligence insulted. He remembered that the president of the board had stated at the annual meeting that public relations was lacking between the membership and the corporation. Elkins finally thundered "What has happened to working capital?"

Although taken aback at the outburst, Smith calmly answered, "Sir, the cost of doing business has gone up." Then Shinderman took the podium and explained that a million dollar corporation budget is now two and a half million.

Gordon Allen asked why not 2%

instead of 3%. Then he stated that he was surprised that Smith as a member owning a freestanding home, had not suggested a different plan for the townhouses and the four freestanding homes since they would have to own a home for over 3 years before they could see any appreciable equity.

Tom White stated that the membership owes a debt of gratitude to the people who redeveloped this assessment plan. This proposal will allow more money to trickle in without cost to present membership, and allow a flexibility in finance that the corporation has been without since 1961 when assessment was abandoned.

Mabel Kandler introduced a letter that expressed the need for guide lines of working capital.

Tax Reassessment

Royal Breashears, the corporation manager, discussed the need to appeal the new tax assessment.

Mrs. William Feller asked what the tax base was based on. Breashears answered the tax is 65% of the sales prices.

Katherine Keene pointed out that other cooperatives seem to share GHI's tax problems. Assessors will not take into account that the amount of the sales price also reflects services.

Hedges

Donald Volk discussed the 1971 revised hedge regulations. Emphasis was on trimming the hedges

Weekly Paper Pick-Ups

In a short meeting on Monday night, the city council voted to have weekly paper pick-ups. The city had been on a twice-a-month schedule. The new schedule, which will start this week with the Friday, April 14 pickup, is expected to reduce the confusion over when to put papers out. If it rains, the papers are to be held for the following Friday.

Upon the recommendation of the city manager, the council voted to put a moratorium on the sale of lots in the city cemetery. At the time the Federal Government withdrew from Greenbelt, it dedicated the cemetery, which is located near the State Roads Commission building, to the city. The cemetery contains several graves of original inhabitants and the city laws authorize the sale of lots to Greenbelt residents. Recently, there has been a flurry of activity in the sale of lots and the council wants to take another look at its policy on this "grave" issue, as one council member put it.

Council adopted a resolution congratulating the Greenbelt city employees' basketball team on its recent victory over the Parkdale Senior High School faculty.

City Budget Proposal Could Raise Property Tax Rate 2 1/2%

A Greenbelt municipal budget that could call for a raise of 2 1/2 cents in the property tax rate was submitted to city council by city manager James K. Giese last week. Giese said he was not recommending an increase of such dimensions, but he wanted council to review a budget of such scope so it could determine what items are sufficiently important to the needs of the city to merit keeping in the budget. The present city tax rate is \$0.84 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

The budget as presented calls for total expenditures during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1973 of \$1,254,300. This represents an increase of \$121,700 or 10.7 percent over the 1972 fiscal year appropriation of \$1,132,600. About \$7,000 of the increase represents expenditures of self-supporting activities which would be covered by an increase in fees to users. For example a 25-cent a month increase in the basic refuse collection fee (to \$4 a month) is being proposed with appropriate hikes in other refuse collection fees. However, no increase in swimming pool rates is being proposed.

A major factor responsible for the anticipated increase in the property tax rate, in addition to increased expenditures, is the fact that, unlike the situation in other years, there is no unappropriated surplus available from previous years' operations to apply to next year's budget. In fiscal 1971 and 1972, there were applied surpluses of \$68,465 and \$46,500. No surplus is anticipated for 1973. Every \$6,050 of reduced income (or increased expenditures) accounts for one cent on the tax rate.

Slow Growth

On top of this, the lack of growth in the city has kept the assessed valuation down. Nevertheless, as the result mainly of reassessments by the county, the city's tax base for fiscal 1973 is expected to rise by \$5.3 million — from \$48,526,830 to \$53,800,000. In contrast, the city's tax base rose by less than \$400,000 in fiscal 1972.

Giese noted that the last year in which there was any substantial amount of new residential construction was 1969. Since that time there has been a virtual halt in new construction. "At first," Giese said, "this was due to the poor money market and high interest rates. Now, the sewage moratorium has stopped growth."

Eventually, Giese said, the construction of the Greenbriar and Glen Ora apartments will substantially improve the city's financial situation. "However," he said, "it appears at this time that sewage hookups will not be available for two or three years. . . . During this time, we can only look forward to increasing the property tax or cutting back on the level of services."

Revenue

The budget anticipates revenue from sources other than the real property tax of \$689,400 (\$366,200 from State shared taxes, \$54,500 from State or Federal grants, \$173,900 from self-supporting operations such as swimming pool and refuse collection, and \$94,800 from other sources), leaving \$564,900 to be collected from real property taxes. Applying this amount against an assessable tax base of \$53,800,000 yields a tax rate of \$1.05 per \$100

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Mosquito Control

To the Editor:

As was reported in the News Review's story of city council actions taken last week, \$380 was appropriated for the mosquito control program over the objection of councilwoman Cohen who favored biological controls instead of spraying.

Lest it appear to any citizen that the remaining members of council favor spraying over biological control, allow me to explain that in fact every member of council spoke in favor of biological mosquito control.

However, the city has, to date, been provided no data regarding a county biological mosquito control program. We have no information on when the program will be available, what the cost to the city would be, or how effective the method is compared with spraying.

The State Entomologist advised the city that it must notify the county council no later than April 15, as to whether Greenbelt would, as in the past years, participate in the University of Maryland mosquito control program.

Four members of the city council endorsed the idea that biological mosquito control be considered for next year, but to insure Greenbelt of adequate mosquito control for this year, we voted to participate in the U. of Md. program.

Wants Clarification

To the Editor:

The letter from Mr. Schwan appearing in your April 6 edition requires a reply. It would have been nice if Mr. Schwan replied to the points made in the letters he referred to, but he did not. He spoke of documented facts but has produced only rhetoric, poor rhetoric at that. I challenge Councilman Schwan to document that any statement I have made in opposition to the sewage plant is specious and fallacious. More specifically, I challenge Mr. Schwan to refute, if he can, the 10 points I made in a report to council on January 10, 1972. I submit that those 10 points calling for council's rejection of the sewage proposal were valid then and have been further confirmed by time, events, subsequent testimony and pertinent facts in the case.

Instead of covering his tracks and touting the so-called "calm and reasonable approach of Council," it would be well for Mr. Schwan to clarify the Greenbelt city council's position on the sewage plant. It desperately needs clarification for the following reasons:

1. County councilman White in a letter to several Greenbelters dated March 9, 1972 (city council received a copy) stated that the city council in Greenbelt was not opposed to the sewage plant.

2. Another county council member and sponsor of CE-45 also communicated with Mayor Pilski, commending him for his statement of February 14 in favor of the plant.

Now, when citizens who deserve to know where elected officials stand, attempt to find out, they are greeted by the obfuscating tactics of Mr. Schwan. Greenbelters are well aware of his tactics and his ploys such as: "Why! that's like asking a person when did he stop beating his wife?" I think that the time is fast expiring when Greenbelters can be duped by such efforts. In the words of a former president of GHI "what we have here is a canard." Mr. Schwan will have to do better — the canard will not work.

G'belt Park Race Results

On Saturday, April 8, a five mile and a two mile long distance running race were held in Greenbelt Regional Park with a total of 63 runners competing. This was the first of a series of three races held in the Greenbelt area each year, a 15 Kilo (9.3 miles) during Labor Day Festival and a 20 miler on Thanksgiving weekend are the others with a two mile also being held each time.

In the five mile handicap race (slowest runner starting first) Vena Novy won in 43:32 with a 13:30 handicap. Greenbelters finished in following order with handicap in parenthesis: 4, Ken Pugh 46:14 (15:00), 7, Hugh Jascourt 47:27 (14:00), 9, Drew Talbot (10 yrs.) 47:29 (11:00), 22, Harvey Geller 49:52 (14:00), 25, Milt Greenbaum 50:18 (17:30). Joe Boyle of New York Athletic Club had the fastest actual time of 27:11 but he had the largest handicap of 23:00 finishing in 24th place in 50:11. In the two mile, a non-competitive race principally for joggers, Jerome Carson won in 11:24 with the last place being 19:47 for 33rd. back so that they would not overhang the sidewalks. Seven feet was maximum height allowed by GHI except for hedges bordering drives or cross streets; the maximum height there would be three feet. If a member does not comply GHI will trim to a height of three feet regardless of location. The cost of trimming will be charged to the violators of the regulations.

Other Matters

It was suggested that signs saying not to block the garages be posted. Shinderman agreed but said the signs would have no great effect.

Shinderman then reported some good news to the audience. First, a gain of \$79,000 in the budget — \$39,000 of which had been planned (build up the reserve fund) \$8,400 came from money allotted to heating the frames, partially the result of a mild winter. However, the heating cost for the bricks was in the red. The second item — the replacement for Kirk Brasfield as administrative assistant would be Phillip Ackerman, a 27 year old Gaithersburg resident, who has a bachelor's degree from American University in Business and Public Administration.

50 MILE RUN-HIKE

One Greenbelt man finished the 10th Annual John F. Kennedy 50 mile Run/Hike event in Hagerstown, Md. on 25 March. Over 1100 started and 308 finished the full distance, with recognition being given to those finishing various intermediate distances. The race started at Boonsboro, Md., went over a mountain along the Appalachian Trail, followed the C and O Canal for 26 miles and then over roads to finish at Hagerstown, Md. Park Barner, the current U. S. champion at 50 miles, from Enola, Pa., won in 6 hours, 29 minutes and 27 seconds.
