## GHI Committee Sees No Need for Another Audit

A Finance Committee report responding in the negative to the request by more than 300 Greenbelt Homes, Inc. members for a complete "independent" audit of the GHI books and records for the last 10 years was presented to the GHI board on Thursday, August 24. The board decided to take no action on the Committee report until its next meeting on Thursday, September 14.

The Finance Committee report submitted by chairman Thomas X. White stated that "much of the information which would satisfy the request of the petitioners is already available." In light of the fact that the board has already contracted for the regular auditing services of J. Henry Oehmann Co., the Committee felt that it would not be the best use of corporation funds to engage a second audit firm at this time.

However, the Committee, recognizing the fears and anxieties of the petitioners about the financial condition of the corporation, urged the GHI board to invite from the petitioners a more detailed or precise statement of financial data desired, so that the Board could appropriately respond to their request. It further suggested that if any information desired is not readily available, the scope of the present audit could be expanded.

To implement these suggestions and to secure the confidence of the members, it suggested a special committee be set up composed of Finance Committee members and interested members, especially drawn from the petitioners.

The Finance Committee report drew the fire of board members Howard Brooks and Tony Lynch, who felt that it was not responsive to the wishes of the members who had signed the petition. Brooks, who is a member of the Finance Committee, repudiated the report, which was signed by White and board members Nat Shinderman and Janet James. (The Committee report actually had Brooks' name on it, but White apologized for including it.)

### Fiscal Status Better

The Committee report, in an attempt to allay the fears of members, summarized what the corporation has done since 1968-69 to reverse the trend of a decreased level of reserves and an unsatisfactory cash position.

Among the measures adopted were: (1) inclusion in the members' monthly charges of amounts for reserves and working capital accounts; (2) limitation of loans for long-term home improvements; (3) institution of capital recovery programs for garage doors and trailer lot construction; (4) accrual to the corporation of appreciation involved in the resale of houses within two years of purchase; and (5) increased working capital assessment on homes at time of resale.

The Committee stated that the previous downward trend has definitely been reversed and that "our cash and liquidity is on a much more solid basis than four years ago. Commonly used accounting ratios used on a consistent basis over the years bear this statement out."

### Minority Views

Brooks charged that the corporation's position is better only because the board postponed such key maintenance programs as the trim paint program. "This will haunt us later," he warned. Brooks said that the Finance Committee report was "a snow job to obfuscate, confuse, and put off action, so that the petition will be buried."

He told the petitioners that "if you allow yourself to be dissuaded from having an independent audit, you will deserve whatever you get." He was referring to the fear expressed by the petitioners that the corporation would commit itself to a rehabilitation program without first determining the sound financial condition of the corporation.

### Wants Immediate Action

Vincent Caruso made a fervent plea to the board to act immediately, but acting chairman David Lange said that the general policy of the board is not to take action on a committee report when first received so as to give the public and the board time to digest the contents.

Shinderman stressed that GHI is already receiving an in-depth audit twice a year. "Let's not spend our money foolishly for something that is already being done," he pleaded. He also noted that the board could ask for additional information from the auditing firm, if the petitioners would identify what it is they want.

Caruso responded that he would like to see a cash audit and a historical allocation of monies. He wanted to know, for example, what had happened to all the money that had been paid to the corporation over the years. "Why don't we have more money in reserves?" he asked.

Caruso also took a slam at the present auditors (Oehmann Co.), stating that they failed sufficiently to warn the members of GHI's alleged fiscal deficiencies and failed to offer advice on how to rectify the situation. Shinderman observed that Oehmann has been providing GHI with more services than are normally provided by auditing firms. He noted that the auditing firm recommended by the petitioners is now handling Greenbelt Consumer Services' account and invited members to compare their reports with those provided by Oehmann.

## Local Concert Band Opens Festival Events

The Greenbelt Concert Band will present a special program this year at the opening ceremony of the Labor Day Festival, on Friday, Sept. 1, at 7 p.m. The band will play "Tales of the Vienna Woods" by Richard Strauss, "A Trumpet Voluntary" by Henry Purcell, "Finale" from the 5th Symphony by Shostakovich, "Festival for Bands" by Jordan Jacobs and special soloists. John DelHomme, director of the Greenbelt Concert Band, studied at the Manhattan School of Music and the Peabody Institute in Baltimore. He has since played with and conducted a number of chamber music and civic orchestras and has been featured as a clarinet soloist.

## Something For Everybody At Labor Day Festival

The 18th annual Greenbelt Labor Day Festival gets underway on Friday, September 1 and will run for 4 days. Among the many attractions will be the parade on Monday, the crowning of the Festival Queen, and numerous contests, booths and exhibits.

The Festival will reach its climax on Monday, Sept. 4, at 10 a.m. with the traditional Greenbelt parade. Led by a pair of lively and popular nonagenarians — Grand Marshals Jerry Goodin and Joseph "Pop" Cipriano — the parade will feature more bands and floats than usual as well as a variety of other attractions.

The parade will start at Crescent and Northway Roads, then proceed up Northway to Ridge and turn right on Ridge and down Ridge to Gardenway, right on Gardenway and into the Center. Many national, state, and local dignitaries will be in the line of march. Among the participants are the Prince Georges County Clown Unit, Ronald McDonald, the University of Maryland Medieval Mercenary Militia, the First U. S. Army Band from Ft. Meade, and many other units.

### Opening Ceremony

This year's Greenbelt Festival gets underway with the opening ceremony at 7 p.m. Friday evening. Mac McGarry, host of the WRC

TV show, "It's Academic," will again be the Master of Ceremonies. In addition "Pop" Cipriano and Jerry Goodin, the two Parade Marshals, will be honored. Mayor Richard Pilski, council members, and other dignitaries will be presented and the Greenbelt Concert Band will perform.

### Special Events

Spreading over the fun-filled four days will be such events as a contest crowning the Queen, adult variety show, art show (CREAT-EO - 72), Lions' pancake breakfast, square dance, crab feast, pet show, craft demonstration, street dance, performing musical arts, talent contest, bicycle rally, folk singing and guitar playing, furniture exhibit, used book booth, teen dance on Friday night, (music by Fragile) basketball foul shooting contest, model rocket demonstration, Krazy Kats, organ concert, clown diving show, instrumental quartet, 2 mile race, 9.3 mile race, first aid demonstration, pony rides, family swim relay, golf tournament, and chess match. Also A.A.U. swim meet horseshoe tournament, tennis tournament, softball tournament and many other races and contests for young and old alike. On Monday night at 8 p.m., the fabulous 75th Army Band from Ft. Belvoir will present a concert. Also on Monday, after the Parade, there will be an antique car show. See schedule for time of events.

### Model Rocket Demonstration

A model rocket demonstration will be held in Braden Field at 1:30 p.m., Sat., Sept. 2, by Joel Kastner, Mike McAndrew and Tom Savage. Various types of model rockets will be displayed, including two-stage, parachute, streamer, featherweight, and homemade designs. The launch area will be marked off.

### Carnival Area

This year's carnival area will have many booths (49) again operated by the participating Greenbelt organizations. All types of food will be available for sale — hot dogs, hamburgers, pretzels, sloppy joes, pizzas, frozen custard, ice cream, cakes, cotton candy, peanuts, sno-cones, soft drinks, and many more.

Most of the popular games will be back including cat toss, zoo dip and spinning wheel, which were introduced last year and proved successful. Once again, the Rosedale Amusements will operate the rides with ticket booths manned by the Golden Agers.

### Exhibits

Interesting exhibits and displays will be at the local post office including those featuring the F.B.I., the Secret Service, National Park Police, Goddard Space Center, and State Roads Commission.

Other exhibits will include photographic and poster displays of the Festival at the Greenbelt County Library (exhibition case) and an adult and children's art show at Center School (gym).

# FESTIVAL PARADE WILL BE LED BY TWO POPULAR NONAGENARIANS

Two Greenbelters, one 93 and the other 94, are being honored this week by a community in whose growth they have played a unique role. Jerry Goodin and Joseph "Pop" Cipriano, have given much over the years to a town they both love, a town that now — by making them the 1972 parade marshals for the Labor Day Festival — shows its affection for them.

### Cipriano

Joseph "Pop" Cipriano, too, has given the town he loves some very special contributions; and the city has proclaimed him one of its favorite sons.

"Pop" Cipriano can truly be described as a Greenbelt pioneer. He came to the area in 1910 and bought 100 acres of land (which contains the house he still lives in). In his youth he had been a metal worker, a circus strongman, and a farmer. He continued the farming, supplementing his income by becoming a supervisor for county roads. Single-handedly he made the mud-covered street that is now Greenbelt Rd. passable during the winter months by laying tree trunks on the road and covering them with packed dirt, gravel, and cinders, raising the level of the road by three feet.

"Pop" was instrumental in obtaining funds for cutting the road which would connect Glenn Dale with Branchville, and performed much of the necessary work himself. This feat shortened the distance between Branchville and Glenn Dale from 17 to 6 miles. The road was opened in 1932 and was followed by a party for 500 people at Cipriano's farm house.

Cipriano Rd. (formerly Telegraph Rd.) is of course named to honor his early achievements in road building.

Later "Pop" worked as a carpenter and maintenance worker for the city of Greenbelt, retiring at the age of 72 after an accident to his back.

"Pop" is familiar to most Greenbelters each Labor Day as he waves to the crowd from his flower-bedded donkey cart. He has entered a float in each Labor Day parade for the past 18 years.

Living still on the family homestead on Greenbelt Rd., "Pop" is visited often by many of his five children, 19 grandchildren, and 13 great-grandchildren. He keeps busy by taking care of his house, doing his own grocery shopping, tending his tomato plants, and reliving the highlights of his long life.

## County Bill Creates New Planning Areas

One of the key land planning mandates of the Prince Georges County Charter was fulfilled August 15 when the County Council approved a bill creating the countywide planning areas required by the home rule document. Passage of the measure, which was introduced by the full Council, came after the Council adopted some 37 minor amendments introduced by Councilman Francis W. White of Greenbelt.

The new law, under study since May, establishes 32 planning areas, roughly equal in geographic size, for the purpose of updating old master plans, devising new ones and drawing up a comprehensive zoning map for the county.

### Goodin

Jerry Goodin came to Greenbelt 31 years ago when the town was the newly-created brain-child of Franklin Delano Roosevelt. He was a laborer then, as he is now. The shopping area was all government-owned and Jerry was in charge of cleaning up the food store, theater, offices and beauty parlor, barber shop and service station. "Just about every week" he proudly proclaims, "I wore out a 32 oz. mop."

He also takes a great deal of pride in remembering the names of the first managers he worked for, Walter Mott and Sam Ashelman.

Up until three years ago, Jerry drove to work from his home in North Brentwood, where his wife, Mamie, and one of his sons still live. But for the past three years he has maintained a room at the Center.

In recalling those days 30 years ago, Jerry doesn't see too many changes in Greenbelt. He remembers how he helped measure off the land and drive in the stakes for what is now the Co-op Supermarket many years ago. "I've always enjoyed myself with the nice people in Greenbelt," he affirms.

Jerry shakes his head in some bewilderment in recalling the city's honoring him with a proclamation. "I couldn't understand it," he chuckles, "But good things comes to those that wait."

The most important thing to Jerry Goodin, he says, and the reason for his awards is his motto: "Be kind to everyone—especially little children." Next in his thoughts are the servicemen, boys he knew as children growing up, playing around the Center, for whom he prays daily. "My main object everyday is to help someone," he says.

Jerry attributes his long life to following the lessons of his father and mother. "Hear, O my son, and receive my sayings; and the years of thy life shall be many," he quotes from Proverbs.

Jerry's family consists of four daughters and three sons, more grandchildren than he can keep track of (somewhere around 20, he thinks) and five great-grandchildren. Most live nearby. But Jerry Goodin has a larger family — all the people of Greenbelt who have seen him over the years in his familiar necktie and long white apron, a cane or a broom in his hands. On humid summer days or bitter winter mornings, Jerry Goodin greets you with a warm and friendly "hello."

"I love Greenbelt," Jerry proclaims. And Greenbelt loves Jerry Goodin.

H.E.L.P. sends messages by radio in co-ordinating the Greenbelt Labor Day Parade and delivering information to the reviewing stand.

In addition, the group takes care of the stage and other areas in arranging, setting up and operating the sound systems, etc.

There are 21 volunteer members including an underwater rescue team, and they operate without charge, aiding flood victims, locating lost kids, or in traffic control serving the Parkway, Beltway, Rts. 95 and 50.

### The Police Blotter

A 1965 Chevrolet stolen in Springhill Lake was recovered by Ocean City police a short time later, as a result of our lookout via the MILES terminal. Three juveniles from Beltsville were arrested.

Two juvenile suspects were apprehended in Springhill Lake in connection with several stolen bicycles. Two bikes were recovered, along with several bicycle parts. Parts were being exchanged with stolen bikes in order to conceal identification. In connection with this case, the Department is very grateful to the Scoutmaster and Boy Scout Troop of Springhill Lake, who assisted our officer during the investigation.

A tape player stolen from a car in Springhill Lake was recovered when a Berwyn Heights resident was arrested by the Berwyn police for assault and battery. The tape player was identified because the serial number had been recorded by the owner. The suspect was thus charged with assault and battery and being in possession of a stolen article.

Over 100 speeding tickets were issued over a 3-day, eight-hour period in August on several city streets. According to Chief William Lane, all the speeders were driving well over the legal limit.

On August 13 two juveniles living in Springhill Lake were arrested for stealing bicycles and bicycle parts. According to police, the youths may be part of a group who stole many bikes in SHL, using the basement storage areas for the base of their operation. The boys, 14 years old, were apprehended following assistance given police by the local Boy Scout troop who volunteered to look at bikes and identify parts.

Any SHL resident whose bike has been lost recently is asked to contact the police, during the day, to determine whether one of the apprehended bikes might be his. In addition, all residents are encouraged to make use of the free bike registration performed regularly by the police.

Recent use of the new computer terminal readily demonstrated the rapidity with which suspects can be apprehended. A car stolen in Greenbelt was recovered the same day in Ocean City and three juveniles, one girl and two boys, from Beltsville, were charged with theft. The trio also possessed several stolen credit cards.

The police have received many citizens' complaints about young people riding their bikes in the Center. People can walk their bikes in the Center or park them in the racks provided. Bicycle ordinances passed by the city are enforceable on public property only, not private property. Most of the Center Mall area is private property. Therefore, the police's policy now is to issue a written warning and to contact parents.

Littering in the Center has been another grievance citizens are asking the police to crack down on. The police will be issuing warnings and summonses to any person caught littering. A new state law also enables the police to arrest any driver throwing objects from his vehicle onto the street.

### Long Distance Races

This year, on Sunday, Sept. 3, the annual Greenbelt 15 kilometer run has been granted official sanction as a National Junior Championship race. Few towns the size of Greenbelt have Greenbelt's stature with three races each year, two of which are national in scope. This year's 15-kilo run can be expected to draw fifty runners from as far away as the mid-west. From Greenbelt, Larry Noel, Jr. and Bob Harper should place among the earlier finishers. Not far behind should be Martin and Milton Greenbaum and Mike Talbot.

The 15 kilo race will start at 5 p.m., and be preceded at 4 p.m. by a two-mile non-competitive run. Trophies will be awarded to all finishers for the two-mile, and to all Greenbelters for the 15-kilo. The start/finish line is at Braden Field. ### Festival Chess Events Feature Local Expert

Greenbelt chess fans who missed the boat to Reykjavik will have an opportunity to play and view their favorite game at this year's Labor Day Festival. Two chess events will be sponsored by Greenbelt CARES, both featuring Joseph Sucher, a chess expert who has lived in Greenbelt for 15 years.

A simultaneous chess match is scheduled for Saturday afternoon, Sept. 2, at 3 p.m., at which Sucher will take on as many players as wish to participate, up to 16 at the same time. Tables will be set up under the trees next to Candy Cane City, and Sucher will circulate among them, playing a move at one board and then proceeding to the next board; and so on until all the games are concluded.

A Chess Marathon is planned for Sunday night, Sept. 3, from 9 p.m. to midnight in the booth area.

A small registration fee will be charged for these events, with the proceeds going to Greenbelt CARES, a citizen group which is sponsoring a professionally run counseling center. The center, which uses a behavior modification approach, will reopen in September.

Advance registration would be helpful to the scheduling committee, and chessplayers who wish to participate are asked to call 345-9421. Additional entrants will be accepted at the time of the match, on a space-available basis. Players are asked to bring sets, if possible.

Joseph Sucher, a professor of physics at the University of Maryland, has lived in Greenbelt since 1957. A native of Vienna, Austria, he came to the United States as a child and eventually became a citizen. He developed an interest in chess at the age of 12 and frequented the Marshall Chess Club in New York, where he played against some of America's best players.

In addition to chess, Sucher enjoys music - he plays the piano and prefers Chopin - foreign languages, gourmet food, and travel. He has just returned to Greenbelt from a year in Paris, where he was able to indulge all these interests simultaneously. Sucher's wife, Dorothy, is a former editor of the *Greenbelt News Review*. They have four children, three of whom play chess. Rumors that Sucher has demanded exclusive use of the Greenbelt pool on Labor Day have been denounced by him as baseless.

## Plain Talk for GHI From Analyst

"You people are not really part of the 20th century. You want to stand fast with your 1937 homes in an inflationary era; that is your problem."

With these provocative words, James P. Lind, a planning consultant and senior budget analyst from Montgomery County, shook his Greenbelt Homes, Inc. audience at last Thursday's special board meeting. Lind said that he could say such unpopular things because he was looking at Greenbelt from the outside. He explained that his "think tank" had been analyzing future possibilities for GHI as an exercise project and was invited to make his group's observations available to GHI.

As long as the members are unwilling or unable to pay for the services needed, Lind said, then GHI will have an economic problem because it has no separate economic base. One answer therefore is to try to generate an economic base.

He noted that GHI has some undeveloped land and suggested, among other things, the development of high-rise, profit-making, apartment-commercial "corner-towers" in the periphery of the core. These projects, he indicated, could help to subsidize the housing costs of aged and retired members.

Another solution for GHI, he said, partly with tongue in cheek, is to run the project into the ground and then raze it for redevelopment. "After all," he said, "the greatest asset you have is the trees, not the homes. The land is becoming more valuable than what is on the land."

"Or," he added, "since you insist on living at the poverty level, why not take advantage of that position by seeking some government assistance?" The problem, he admitted, with all these redevelopment ideas, is that whoever puts up the money will want the right to control the destiny of the project.

Lind was not completely pessimistic. He spoke strongly of the community values developed in Greenbelt and the tragedy that it would be if this community were to go down the drain. He therefore thought it important that GHI members sit down and find out where they wanted to go, as well as identify their goals. He suggested a survey to get members' views and a profile of their characteristics.

## CITY NOTES

The city's efforts at recycling waste materials got back into gear on August 25 when paper pickups resumed. Almost 20 tons were turned in, at a resale value of \$10 per ton.

A load of glass taken to Baltimore, last week netted the city \$65 for 6,530 lbs. Although a load of discarded appliances turned in for recycling netted no money, it saved precious space at the landfill site.

A contractor replaced bad sections of sidewalk in Charlestowne and Boxwood subdivisions; the city crew graded lawns along Lastner Lane that had been excavated for installation of a drainage pipe, and the embankment next to the recently reconstructed spillway in the stream flowing between Lakewood subdivision and Northway. The city crew also cleaned debris from culverts under crosswalks in the original part of town.

During the last two weeks of August the Parks crew cleared walkways of overhanging leaves and branches, cleaned the city right-of-way in Springhill Lake, and painted above-ground bulkheads along road shoulders to make them more conspicuous to motorists.

With local citizens apparently starting fall yard work earlier this year, the brush chipper machine has already been utilized to reduce branches and tree trimmings to mulch.

As usual in the week before Labor Day, city employees assisted with supplying power for carnival rides, setting up festival booths and repairing horseshoe pits and ball fields.

## Children's Pet Show

The third annual Children's Pet Show will be held this year between 2 - 4 p.m. on Labor Day on the Center School playground. All varieties of pets may be entered.

There will be eighteen categories of prizes including most unusual, smallest, longest tail feathers, least mobile, loudest noise (for dogs), closest to ground, highest from ground, longest ears. In the feline category, the competition will include blackest cat, whitest cat, most colorful, longest hair, largest, etc.

Each pet must be registered by Sunday on forms obtained at Twin Pines, Ben Franklin, Variety (tobacco store), or municipal swimming pool. The owners or person responsible for the pet must have it under control at all times. Also, proof of rabies shots may be required in some categories. Children under 6 years with pets must be accompanied by a parent. Finally all pets will be required to be on a leash or in a container.
