Public Hearing On SHL Flood Plain

A public hearing will be conducted by the Maryland State Water Resources Administration (WRA) on Tuesday, July 9, on an application by the Springhill Lake apartment owners (Greenbelt Associates) for completion of site grading and fill of a natural swale within the flood plain of the SHL industrial park tract.

The land is being prepared for construction involving approximately 3,500 cubic yards of landfill. The hearing will be held at the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission Building on Kenilworth Ave. at 1:30 p.m.

Grading and fill operations on the tract started in 1972 with the approval of all the appropriate agencies. A conflict in regulations resulted in a cease and desist order in early 1974. Upon review of the matter, WRA observed that, while encroachment on the flood plain was minimal, it was in the best interests of all concerned for SHL to file for a waterway permit. WRA also lifted the cease and desist order provided the operation was kept within boundaries specified on the plan.

ORGANIZATION OF GHI BOARD MOVES SLOWLY

Much time was spent talking about paint problems, committee structure, and planning directions at the regular Greenbelt GHI, Inc. board of directors meeting, Thursday evening, June 13, a half-hour beyond the usual cut-off time, as a matter of fact. It was this observer's view that, contrary to a popular stereotype, the talk may have lasted well beyond that except for the strategic interventions of the only woman board member. On several occasions, after the men had been jawing for some time, director Virginia Moryadas pushed for the action decision.

Martin Holly, 45-S Ridge, registered a complaint about paint peeling shortly after members paint their houses, and quoted extensively from a letter in that day's News Review by Ben Hogenesen, who was giving helpful hints about painting. Holly could not understand the position of the manager, who recommended against exterior wall painting until a permanent solution was discovered, when GHI offered paint to members at reduced prices.

Royal Breashears, GHI manager, stated that, years ago, he had taken a vigorous position against wall painting of the homes — that for the brick homes it was unnecessary, and, for the frame homes, no satisfactory results could be expected — but that the membership had acted otherwise.

The provision of paint was offered as a member service, but he asserted that no permanent solution to the paint problem had been found and that members should know that, until it was, there would continue to be problems.

Committee Structure
Smith stated that, after considerable thought, he was urging the board to change the committee structure basically to what it had been a couple of years ago, with some modifications, but to retain the same objectives. Proposed were committees on Parking, Esthetics and Environment, Maintenance, Member and Community Relations, Membership Services and Home Improvements, Member Complaints, Finance, Personnel and Planning (long-range).

He proposed that, for the next year, a board member act as chairman of each of the committees in order to give continuity for the change, but that, in future years, this should not have to be a consideration. He suggested that the Executive Committee should handle legislative matters, and, in the next few years, develop close associations with the other member-owned and occupied housing corporations in the city in order to be able to set in concert on matters of mutual interest and concern. The City Council Coordinating Committee, which has been dormant, will be left in that state, but remain standing in case it is ever needed to function.

Director Hugh O'Donnell apologized for not getting his recommendations to the other board members prior to the meeting, but outlined the structure he had in mind. While he generally agreed with the areas outlined by the president, he stated that he definitely could not see splitting the maintenance and planning functions, and would like to see some of the sub-committees established by his present maintenance committees elevated to full, permanent committee status.

He also urged the establishment of Legislative and Professional Liaison Committees, the latter particularly to be composed exclusively of members who have planning experience and expertise "who can establish liaison with the planning professionals we shall need to rely on if we are to accomplish any consistent long-range planning goals."

He argued that, if GHI is to rely exclusively on member-composed committees to develop long-range master plans, planning will, at best, be intermittent. "What is needed" he said, "are professional consultants who can not only help us with the planning but with how to go about getting the money." O'Donnell requested that the decision on committees be held off until he could get his ideas, in writing, to the other board members.

O'Donnell drew support from director Norman Weyel, who stated that, while he did not agree with all of the ideas put forth, he felt that it would be well to wait; that, perhaps, the two lists might then be reasonably combined. Director Donald Volk, urged that, inasmuch as there appeared to be an agreement on some committees, like parking, action should be taken so that these could begin to function as soon as possible. He was concerned that there would otherwise be quite a gap of inactivity.

Director Ted Eyerly was also concerned about the fact that new members needed to be recruited, and that an ad was supposed to have already appeared in the paper to obtain volunteers. He urged that, if the board could not agree on a committee structure, they might consider using the proposed structure of the president's at least as a statement of the areas of activity in which members could become involved, and as the basis for an advertisement.

After much discussion, O'Donnell finally moved to establish a Member Complaints Committee. This carried, and Smith appointed Joe Compton, Breashears, and Virginia Moryadas and Steve Folsch as other board representatives to the committee. Volk then moved to establish a Finance Committee, which carried, and Smith then appointed James Reid as the chairman, and tentatively, Eyerly, Compton, and Volk, with former chairman, Thomas White, to head the list of non-board member representatives. Then, after another push by Mrs. Moryadas, Volk moved that the board approve Parking, Member and Community Relations, Membership Services and Home Improvements, Personnel Organization, and Executive Committees. This was passed unanimously.

Another long discussion took place over planning, after a proposal by O'Donnell that the planner David Ornstein be engaged on a retainer basis to meet with officials from the Department of Housing and Urban Development on the possibility that he could influence legislation or policy to open up funding possibilities for GHI. The rest of the board agreed that they were not being given enough specifics by O'Donnell to make any kind of a decision. They did agree to calling a special meeting if he could later convince Smith of the need for urgency in the matter.

Other Matters

In other matters, the board urged the manager to request bids for fuel oil as of July 1 price quotations, and to canvass all possible suppliers. They also passed the usual resolutions necessary to permit signing of checks by the new officers for the various checking accounts, discussed the auditor's report, and agreed that the problem areas were those known to and resulting from board actions. A special extra hearing charge was removed from one member's monthly charges for an unheated addition that was used exclusively for the storage of paintings, and on which the member agreed to put insulated doors leading to the house to prevent any heat escape.

The board agreed that, in the future, they should try to adhere more closely to their agreed upon closing time of 10:30 p.m. They probably will, too, if they take a lead from their "non-gabby-down-to-business" new woman board member.

The next meeting of the GHI Board will be on Thursday, July 11.

Council Praised Again

For the second time within two months, the city council's audacity, perseverance, and verve have paid off. Through its personal intervention, council has been successful in persuading State officials to reverse earlier adverse decisions to Greenbelt.

The first occasion was an appeal in April to the Governor's Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Justice for full Federal funding of the Greenbelt CARES program. The city's arguments were sufficiently convincing to secure another \$13,140 in grant money (equivalent to 2 cents on the tax rate).

The second occasion was last week's trip to Baltimore to persuade the State Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to approve a sewer connection for the proposed Springhill Lake Recreation Center. Again the city was successful when they pointed out how the need for the facility merited an exception to the sewer moratorium.

On other occasions the council has not hesitated to make its physical presence felt. Included, for example, have been trips to Annapolis, Baltimore, Upper Marlboro, and Hyattsville on the shifting of the METRO station, on municipal tax differential legislation, and on the Greenbriar sewage treatment plant.

While not always successful, the council is fast building up a reputation as a political body that carries a lot of clout. When Greenbelt talks, people listen. And a great part of this is attributable to the willingness of council members along with the city manager and his staff to travel that extra mile, to make that extra personal contact, and to deliver that extra statement.

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CITY NOTES

The City has good news for bicyclers and joggers at last. The general crew has been applying a fine stone to the lake trail, smoothing out some of the deeper ruts, lowering a protruding man-hole to the proper grade, and burying much of the hazardous loose gravel. The stockpile of 80 tons has been used up, but a large section of the south shore was completed.

The city's crews also serviced all the drinking fountains, cleaned out brush along the roadsides, and cut several tall stands of grass. Ball-fields and the golf course received seasonal manicures. Two badly worn tennis nets were replaced at the courts on Lakecrest Drive.

Commuter parkers at Greenbelt Lake Park have been receiving notices that their cars must be parked at other locations in the city. With the advent of good weather, there is increasing use of the parking lot by visitors to the park, and the lot is now close to full capacity. Recommended locations are: Greenbelt Armory, Beltway Plaza Shopping Center, and the rear parking lot (Southway & Crescent) of the Greenbelt Commercial Center.

The old landfill is being graded, roadsides cleaned, and some asphalt work done on a park pathway at Fayette Place in Lakewood. Mari-golds were planted in the beds at the entrance to Boxwood Village.

The refuse crew operated last week with only one loadpacker and an open bed truck. The two other loadpackers are still awaiting parts.

Last week's paper collection amounted to just over 1 1/4 tons.

The first concert of the 1974 season at the Lake Park was attended by over 375 spectators.

Pet License Deadlines

Prince Georges County Chief Animal Control Officer Ivernon W. Gal-lough has issued a reminder that June 30 was the deadline for county pet owners to secure new dog license tags. He warns that late applicants will be charged an additional fee after Aug. 1. After that date, owners of unlicensed dogs picked up by animal wardens will be required to pay a levy. Proof of current rabies vaccination is the only requirement pet owners must meet when applying for the tags.

Tags are available from the County Animal Shelter in Forestville and at the County Service Building in Hyattsville. The animal shelter may be reached at 338-3221, and information is also available from the Department of Licenses and Permits at 779-8850.

Greenbelt pet owners are also required to license their pets Dogs and cats — with the city. Licenses are issued by the Police Department, and the deadline is Aug. 1. Proof of vaccination is required.

CITY ASKS FOR PUBLIC COMMENT ON PURCHASE OF PARCEL 1 LAND

A public hearing will be held on Monday, August 5, to consider various proposals for city acquisition of land in parcels 1 and 2 (the land between the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. property and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway). Under the terms of the donation by the Federal Government of 14 acres of surplus Agricultural Research Center land east of parcel 1, the city has to augment the 14 acres with another 15-acre purchase of adjacent land as well as develop a park plan.

The city council, after receiving the conflicting advice of the city's Advisory Planning Board and the Park and Recreation Advisory Board, has developed a proposal for acquiring a strip of land along the northern boundary of the city connecting Laurel Hill Road to the recently acquired surplus land and a second strip of land along the eastern edge boundary of the city connecting the surplus land to the Board of Education property adjacent to the landfill. These lands amount to 28 acres. In addition, the council has proposed acquiring four acres, on the south side of Hamilton Place (in parcel 2) opposite the GHI Administration offices.

The APB and PRAB, while concurring with the parcel 2 purchase, have some reservations about the parcel 1 council recommendations. As a result, city council at its regular Monday night meeting on July 8 decided to hold a public hearing to get citizen input.

The APB in its Report #135 originally had recommended acquisition of a 30-acre strip extending from the northern city limits to the Board of Education property in the south, along the eastern border of parcel 1 for use as a wilderness park. The bulk of such an acquisition would be a stream valley and flood plain. In its subsequent Report #148, it considered the council proposal an acceptable alternative but questioned its economic and personal benefits in view of the fact that acquisition of the flood plain acreage would probably be cheaper.

The council has generally held that there is not much to be gained by acquisition of flood plain land since such land, regardless of who owned it, would have to stay in an undeveloped form.

PRAB, while agreeing with the undesirability of acquiring flood plain land, opposed in Report #11-74 the acquisition of a strip of land along the north side of parcel 1, noting that the Research Center property adjacent to parcel 1 is not to be declared surplus and thus will continue to serve as a buffer. Instead, PRAB recommended the acquisition of 15 acres north of the city landfill and adjacent to the surplus land donation to meet the city's requirements for use as a neighborhood park. They also recommended that this acreage not include any of the Board of Education's land that lies north of the landfill.

In a related matter, council authorized the city manager to apply to the Federal Government for a donation of 2 1/2 surplus acres located on the city side of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad tracks near the Springhill Lake Industrial tract and the Capital Beltway. The city would be required to maintain the property.

Other land development matters occupying the council's attention concerned the application of Springhill Lake owners for a permit to fill flood plain land and a preliminary plan for locating a Pepco substation on the Golden Triangle.

Waterway Permit The Water Resources Administration has requested Springhill Lake to apply for the permit because of confusion over whether the filling had been done to date was in accordance with State regulations. The permit, a hearing, on which was scheduled for July 9, would allow completion of fill within the flood plain of Indian Creek. The land fill is needed for preparation of a right-of-way into the SHL industrial tract.

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NASA Studying Favorable EIS Decision on Greenbriar Plant

According to informed sources, a favorable Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) regarding the Greenbriar sewage treatment plant is in the hands of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) officials in Washington. It appears that officials at NASA in Greenbelt are sticking with their original findings that "upon the developers obtaining an EPA permit, the easement can be granted." This conclusion was reached in the draft EIS released in February 1974, reaffirmation of which will permit the piping of treated sewage effluent from the Greenbriar plant for a distance of 150 feet across NASA property to a discharge point on an unnamed tributary of Beaver Dam Creek, also on NASA property.

It is expected that a decision will soon be coming out of NASA's Washington headquarters, after which the EIS will be sent to the Federal Council on Environmental Quality for publication in the Federal Register. The record will be open for 30 days for comment.

Sees No Dangers A NASA spokesman in Greenbelt said: "It was our carefully considered opinion that if the appropriate environmental agencies determined that there would be no harm to the environment and, if our consultant and our investigation indicated that there would be no harm, then we could not deny them an easement."

State permits for construction of the treatment plant and discharge of effluent have been approved and issued. However, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has been unwilling to make a decision to grant a permit until NASA acts. NASA has long maintained that it is a non-technical agency lacking expertise in the area of treatment plants and must look toward EPA for guidance and decision-making.

NASA officials said that since the May EPA hearing in Greenbelt, they have reviewed the draft statement, taking into consideration many comments and objections raised by interested persons, organizations, and governmental bodies. Carroll Dicus of NASA in Greenbelt said "We are trying to be responsive to what's right... we have tried to be forthright, and a tremendous amount of time and hard work by many was put into this project."

NASA is also asking that Greenbriar developers provide a bond to cover such things as planting trees along the fence line.

Testing Continues In the meantime, testing of the Greenbriar temporary sewage treatment plant, which will serve the 1,198-unit condominium development, continues. Testing of the plant using clear water and activated sludge have been accomplished, and raw sewage is now being hauled in from the Parkway Plant. Greenbriar consultant Dr. John Cookson, who is directing the shakedown operation, is now evaluating the tests taken on the activated sludge which was used to seed the plant. The activated sludge contains the bacterial colony ("bugs") that will digest and degrade the raw sewage into gases, inorganic ions and water.

It is expected that the testing period using raw sewage will take about two weeks. Raw sewage is now being run through the plant processes, treated, taken to the lowest point in the plant for recycling in the surge tanks, and finally hauled back to the plant.

Basically, the Re-examination emphasizes the need to broaden the scope of the Year 2000 Plan to include human and environmental resource problems as well as physical development problems. It also stresses the need for implementation of plan proposals.

Of interest to Greenbelt is COG's recommendation for a Fair Growth Policy in the Washington area. How much growth should be permitted for each jurisdiction? What are the forces causing growth? How much influence can Greenbelt have in establishing a Fair Growth Policy?

The city was also informed that as soon as revisions are made, a complete set of condominium documents will be furnished to council.
