# Mosquito Control Spraying Begins

The City is once again participating in the State of Maryland Department of Agriculture's mosquito control program with spraying on Tuesday and Friday. It will continue throughout the summer on an as needed basis with periodic checks by the Department of Agriculture to determine the need. Malathion, to be sprayed this summer, is regarded as non-hazardous to animals and humans and is approved by the Environmental Protection Agency. Applications concentrations are determined on the basis of findings of such responsible agencies, as the Maryland State Board of Agriculture, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Agency and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

# GreenbriarDay-CareCenter Denied Special Exception

Denial of a special exception for the proposed day-care center at the Greenbriar condominium project was handed down by zoning hearing examiner Barry S. Crump on June 20. George Brugger, attorney for the applicant, Campus Center for Early Learning, has filed an appeal with the county council, sitting as the district council, and will present oral arguments to the council within 30 days.

# Seek County Solution To Trash Disposal

Prince Georges own version of Mt. Trashmore — today's most innovative method of trash disposal — may well be rising in the vicinity of five northern municipalities as a result of discussions between Prince Georges councilman David G. Hartlove Jr. and five county mayors.

Convinced that above-grade landfills can transform barren acres into recreational treasures, Hartlove has persuaded the mayors of College Park, Bowie, Laurel, Greenbelt, and New Carrollton to sell the idea to their legislators and citizens.

Bowie Greenbelt, and College Park will be faced with a solid waste dilemma within two years when present landfills are filled. Hartlove, anxious to get a pilot project operating in Prince Georges County, firmly believes that piling and seeding compacted trash and soil on marginal land, is the method of trash disposal for the future. And he believes just as firmly that a municipal operation may be the place to start. "A single visit to Virginia Beach, where the original Mt. Trashmore style waste disposal started, will convince any serious individual that burving out paper towels, bottles and scraps really is a waste of time and materials." Hartlove noted. "We can use all that in the most massive recycling effort any community can undertake and end with a more beautiful site than we had when we began."

In Virginia Beach, a soap box derby ramp now sits where a city eyesore once was located. Officials are moving ahead with plans to build an amphitheatre overlooking one of the two lakes created out of landfill borrow areas around Mt. Treshmore. The lakes are stocked for recreational fishing.

Council several months ago endorsed the concept of above-grade landfills and asked the county's Solid Waste Task Force to evaluate the system as a means of reclaiming strip-mined or other marginal land. The resolution, sponsored by Hartlove, also asked the county to identify five potential five-year sites to be filled with 60 percent compacted refuse and 40 percent earth.

The pilot program, in Hartlove's view, should be a shorter

The applicant had requested a special modification of the offstreet parking requirement of 12 additional parking spaces for 70 children on the ground floor of the Greenbriar Recreation Building on Hanover Parkway. (The code provides that for every 6 children, 1 parking space must be provided.) Twenty-nine spaces are already located adjacent to the recreation building but these spaces were provided to satisfy the zoning ordinance requirements generated by the residential units of the Greenbriar project.

#### Arguments For Exception

The applicant pleaded that the 12 additional spaces were not needed because:

(1) The day-care center will be used to accommodate mainly the students, faculty, and staff of the Laurel branch of the Prince Georges Community College. (The Campus Center for Early Learning is a facility of the PG Community College which enables students, faculty, and staff to leave their children at the facility while they attend school and work.) These children will be transported back and forth by a fleet of maxi-wagons, hence a reduced need for parking space.

(2) The balance of enrollment will be generated from the residents of the Greenbriar complex, many of whom will be able to walk to the center.

(3) Almost all of the activities scheduled for the recreation building other than the day-care center will take place in the early evening, at hours other than when the center will be operating.

#### **Reasons** for Denial

Despite recommendations of approval by the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission and the Greenbelt City council, the zoning examiner denied the request on the grounds that the record is devoid of evidence of special circumstances or conditions peculiar to the subject property that would statutorily satisfy the waiver.

"Should we approve this modification," the examiner said, "we would be extricating the applicant from a condition knowingly entered into by those who sought and received the earlier special exceptions and parking waiver for the Greenbriar complex." Reference here was to the special exceptions regarding green space and parking that the developer, Alan Kay, successfully secured from the county council in September 1972 when the Greenbrian project was developed. Construction of additional parking space would violate the green space requirement contained in the special exceptions. The decision acknowledged that the day-care center will serve an excellent purpose in that it will provide a service to the community, but concluded that the proposed use is not in harmony with the purpose and intent of the zoning ordinance. The examiner also felt that if the parking modification were granted, the boarding and discharging of pupils in a parking lot provided for residential users could potentially create a safety hazard to both groups.

# Berkofsky to Perform In July 5 Concert

Greenbelters will have a rare opportunity to hear one of their own in concert at the Meriweather Post Pavilion on Saturday, July 5 at 8:30 p.m. Martin Berkofsky and Justin Blasdale, with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, will perform Max Bruch's "Concerto for Two Pianos." Sergiu Commissiona will conduct.

Max Bruch's "Concert for Two Pianos" has been called the "Mystery Concerto" because of its strange history. Two Baltimore sisters, Rose and Ottilie Sutro, were well-known as a two-piano team in Europe and America for over two decades after their debut in London in 1894. In 1911 the Sutro sisters visited Max Bruch. whose works they had played on the concert stage, and asked him to write for them a concerto for two pianos, a request which he granted. Either they couldn't play as written, however, or they didn't like it, for they made literally thousands of changes. Under the baton of Stowkowski, they played a version of it with the Philadelphia Orchestra and another version with the New York Philharmonic with Stansky conducting. Then the Concerto dropped out of sight. Even a Sutro version left with the Library of Congress for copyright disappeared, later to be found in Ottille Sutro's effects after her death.

Nathan Twining, a young Baltimore pianist, attended an auction of the Sutro effects after Ottilie's death in 1971 and came away with a pasteboard box of unidentified manuscripts for which he paid \$11.00. In it he found a bound manuscript of a concerto for two pianos, skillfully written which he and his friend Martin Berkofsky played through. On the last page they found the signature "Max Bruch." Then came a long period of research by Berkofsky and Twining to identify the original Bruch opus without the sturo chan-Through the study of other Bruch manuscripts made available to them with the help of Max Bruch's son Ewald, still living near Berlin, they were able to understand Bruch's musical shorthand and produce the scores required for performing the original work. Although the piece was recorded in November 1973 with the London Symphony Orchestra, with Berkofsky and Twining at the pianos. the performance on July 5 will be the first "live" performance. Berkofsky has asked a rising young pianist, Justin Blasdale, to play the other piano with him for this and future performances.

### **Greenbelt** Commended To the Editor:

Perhaps it is just human to write about governments when they fail to perform up to standard. Only rarely is public notice given for a job well done. This letter is an attempt to do just that.

This year spokesmen for the Maryland Municipal League described the 1975 session of the General Assembly as the most productive year ever for legislation of benefit to taxpayers living in incorporated cities and towns. Several bills of note were passed which provide tax relief for those of us who all too often pay twice once to our city and once to Prince Georges County - for the same services.

As a member of the House Ways & Means Committee I served on the Committee handling tax legislation. I learned to lean heavily upon the research sources provided by the city of Greenbelt. Indeed, no city in Maryland provided more assistance than the Greenbelt City Government did for its legislative delegation.

Before the session began, the Mayor and Council provided a comprehensive legislative package and an extensive briefing for us on municipal legislation, attended by every elected member of the city government. This material was constantly up-dated during the session.

Mayor Pilski wrote to me on every legislative matter of concern to Greenbelt during the session. Mayor Pro-tem Weidenfeld doubled in brass as an effective spokesmon for the city of Greenbelt and the Maryland Municipal League before the Prince Georges delegation and several legislative committees, earning the respect of all.

The Mayor, Mayor Pro-tem, and Councilmen Richard Castaldi, Charles Schwan and Tom White do not always agree within the council on all issues. Nor should they. However, when it comes to taking a position on matters of a broad concern they speak as one loud and effective voice. As a freshman lawmaker I wanted to publicly thank Greenbelt's city fathers for a job well done in






James Richard Hahn



# **Twin Pines Will Figure** Interest on Daily Basis

Previously, it didn't matter what members did with their money at Twin Pines for the greater part of the month. As long as money was in by the 20th, interest was figured on it for the entire month. Starting July 1, however, that will change, as Twin Pines converts to a plan of figuring interest on a daily, rather than its present monthly basis.


Supported by claims from Twin Pines manager, Steve Frankenburg, that the action would save money for Twin Pines, the board of directors voted at their regular meeting last week to implement this change. It is designed to encourage savers to keep their money in Twin Pines for a greater part of each month by granting a higher interest yield. It will also be less advantageous to take money out during the first part of the month only to return it by the 20th, because interest will only be paid for the days in which the money is in the account.

Although the compounding method is different, dividends will still be paid on a quarterly basis. This is provided for in the Twin Pines bylaws and would require the membership vote to change.

Also approved at the meeting were the payment of dividends on July 1. Manager Frankenburg estimated that about \$75,000 would be paid in dividends this quarter.

On July 16 a Twin Pines membership meeting will be held at the Twin Pines office, in order to continue the vote on the articles of amendment. Persons who have not yet voted are urged to do so. as over a thousand more votes are needed.
