Parkway Study Alternatives to be Presented at Public Meeting June 28

A public meeting to present and discuss alternatives offered in the Baltimore-Washington Parkway Study will be held Monday, June 28 at 7:30 pm. in the Bladensburg senior high school gymnasium. The Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) which is planning reconstruction of the entire Parkway is required to hold meetings affording the public an opportunity to discuss the preliminary alternatives with the Project Planning Team.

A draft report describing the alternatives is available at the library of the SHA office, 9300 Kenilworth Ave.

Interested persons are invited to the meeting to express their preferences. Written comments and/or requests to be included on the project distribution list may be submitted to Mr. Robert J. Council's Position

The Greenbelt City Council, at its regular meeting on Monday, June 14, 1976, approved and discussed the consequences of the Advisory Planning Board's Report #175 on the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. Both Council and the APB had reviewed part of an Environmental Impact Study report and recommendations contained therein for the further study of three alternative improvements to the B-W Parkway. Donald Volk, APB Chairman, made an impassioned plea that Council support option one - namely that no major changes be made to the Parkway except improvements for safety purposes - and urged that no truck traffic be permitted anywhere on the portion of the Parkway under consideration.

Council requested the City Manager to prepare a statement expressing the views of Council to be presented by Mayor Gil Weidenfeld at the hearing on Monday, June 28. The statement indicates Council's preference for Alternative 1, but recommends that if Alternative 2 is chosen there will be no connection to the outer beltway. that I-95 not be routed to the Parkway, that trucks be prohibited. and that the major improvements proposed to the interchange of Greenbelt Road and I-495 not be undertaken

Bike Trails

Gabe Sucher, who was in attendance with his young brother, Anatole, urged that a recommendation be made for the addition of bicycle trails as part of the improvements being proposed. At first. Council thanked Sucher for his concerns and moved on with its business. Councilman Thomas White, however, felt that Sucher should know that his remarks were not being ignored, but that the recommendation was not quite appropriate for the particular report. However, the more Council discussed the matter, the more they began to question why they shouldn't recommend bicycle trails on any and all occasions since they supported the development of these throughout the Greenbelt area. Council finally voted to have the City Manager add this to the recommendations in the position letter he was putting together for Coun-

Six Alternatives

The Maryland Department of Transportation is currently conducting a study on proposals to widen the Baltimore-Washington Parkway and/or allow trucks to use the route. The study is now in its second stage, which involves a preliminary evaluation of six interim alternatives. The alternatives under consideration are:

1) NO MAJOR CONSTRUC-TION. This is the "null alternative" which would involve no widening of the Parkway and no change in the ban on truck traffic. Additional safety features would be provided, however. This is the cheapest of the six alternatives, costing \$104 million if new interchanges are built and only \$46 million if they are not.

2) RECONSTRUCTION WITH MINIMAL WIDENING, LIMITED TRUCK TRAFFIC. This alternative would widen the parkway to six lanes south of the Capital Beltway and north of the Baltimore Beltway. Between the two beltways the parkway would remain a four-lane facility. Projected cost: \$162 million.

3) SIX LANES, LIMITED TRUCK TRAFFIC. Under this alternative two lanes would be added to the Parkway for its entire length. Two bus lanes would be provided between Route 450 and the District of Columbia, resulting in an 8-lane facility for this 3-kilometer segment of the Parkway. Cost: \$204 million.

4) RECONSTRUCTION WITH BUS/CARPOOL LANES, LIMIT-ED TRUCK TRAFFIC. This alternative would widen the parkway to six lanes between the two beltways and eight lanes at the northern and southern ends of the parkway. Two lanes of the 8-lane segments would be reserved for busses and carpools. Cost: \$259 million.

5) SIX LANES, TRUCK TRAF-FIC THROUGHOUT. The main provisions of this alternative are a widening to six lanes and an end to the ban on truck traffic. Cost: \$208 million.

6) EIGHT LANES, TRUCK TRAFFIC THROUGHOUT. The widening proprosed by this alternative would require the acquisition of 107 hectares (265 acres) of land for an enlarged Parkway right-of-way needed for an 8-lane facility. Cost: \$248 million.

. This report recommends that only the first three alternatives listed be retained for further study.

After the June 28 public meeting is held the study process will enter its third stage, during which the number of alternatives under consideration will be reduced from six to three. These three remaining alternatives will then be evaluated in more detail. Stage 3 will culminate with formal public hearings scheduled for sometime in February 1977. The hearings will be followed by the preparation of a final environmental impact statement.

Under Alternative 1, this interchange would remain as it is now
except that speed change lanes
are provided under the bridge by
shifting the pavement lanes. Further improvements would require
both land acquistion and reconstruction at a scale beyond that

is that the Capital Beltway and Greenbelt Road interchanges are too close together to permit sufficient weaving distances between the twelve ramps entering or exiting the Parkway. Vehicles must slow down considerably resulting in congestion.

To alleviate this problem, the scheme proposed for Alternative 3 replaces the ramp from Md. 193 to the southbound Parkway with two new ramps south of the Capital Beltway interchange. This eliminates the existing conflict flict between vehicles entering the Parkway from Md. 193 and those exiting the southbound lanes to the Beltway west. (See 12-C below)

I-495: Capital Beltway

This existing cloverleaf interchange, with its short weaving sections and speed change lanes, is inadequate for the high volumes of interchanging traffic it must handle. Under Alternative 1, the interchange would be altered. Under Alternative 2, the interchange would be expanded, generally in its present configuration. The loop ramp in the NE quadrant would be replaced by a directional flyCouncil from page 1

cil to present in its response to the draft report. Councilmen Richard Pilski, Charles Schwan and Richard Castaldi, as well as White and Weidenfeld, pointed out that youth are listened to on policy decisions when they take the trouble to use the political process. They commended Sucher and his young brother for their efforts.

Finally, Council's statement also reiterated its request that noise and air pollution studies be made in the vicinity of Greenbelt Road and the Beltway.

over ramp to ease and speed the flow of traffic from the northbound Parkway to west on the Beltway, this being the heaviest interchanging movement.

Under Alternative 3, major reconstruction is proposed to improve service for other major movements - southbound Parkway to east on the Beltway and northbound Parkway to west on the Beltway. (See 12-f below). Two directional diagonal ramps passing beneath the Beltway would replace two existing loop ramps, thereby eliminating the weaving movements that presently cause congestion

Braden Fields Are Separate and Unequal To the Editor:

After the downpour on last Wednesday night, and during the early morning hours of Thursday, I entertained doubts as to the playing of the 15 and under girls softball game on Thursday evening. My doubts were somewhat subsided afte a call was placed to Park and Planning and it was learned that all Girls' and Boys Club games would be played as scheduled. However, I was informed that Braden Field #3, the girls softball field, was in no condition for a softball game. Therefore, a call was placed to the Greenbelt Recreation Department. The reply came that they had been working on the field all day and that it was ready for the game that evening. But which field had they been working on so diligently? Certainly not Braden #3, but field #1 where a men's softball game was played. This fact became apparent upon arrival at the . There was a mud slop behind home plate in which the unfortunate umpire and catchers were forced to stoop. There was an enormous pool of water along the third base line, avoiding which would be a difficult maneuver. Many bats and balls landed in this water. The field was obviously untouched since the rain; the infield was unlined and appeared as if it had never been raked.

Furthermore, the teams and spectators who attend these games soon become discouraged when they realized that the field and its surroundings are unfit for a decent game of softball. The pitcher's mound was improperly placed, making the need to measure the distance prior to every game mandatory. The bike and pedestrian path is in "fair Anyone passing play' territory. by is in danger of being hit. Percasually walk through the outfield during the game, and play was temporarily halted on Thursday because a tennis ball rolled onto the field. Those playing tennis paid no attention to where the ball went, nor made the slightest attempt to retrieve it.

Along with my teammates, I feel terribly uneasy when a team comes to play us on our own field. They have no bench to sit on. Needless to say there is nowhere for the spectators to sit, and some have even resorted to bringing lawn chairs in order to view the game. Recently, the opposing team arrived before ours did, causing us to sit on the grass in front of the tennis courts. We then realized how the other teams felt, sitting on the ground, and dodging bike riders and other people in an effort to approach the plate. No other teams in Greenbelt, other than those using this "field," and no other teams in any other city are forced to give their guests such poor hospitality. I am thoroughly annoyed and upset with this situation. The City of Greenbelt should be disgraced to allow their teams to play under such adverse conditions.


