EXHIBITS AND DEMOS AT LABOR DAY FESTIVAL

Numerous exhibits and demonstrations are being planned for this year's Greenbelt Labor Day Festival. As in past years, the Art Show attracts many local artists and this year the paintings, drawings, and sculpture promise to reflect the best of Greenbelt's talent. There is a special category and prize for the art work which best symbolizes the theme, "Americans At Work." Last year, this prize was awarded to the person who submitted a drawing depicting Meanor Roosevelt in many moods and vocations.

For the first time this year there will be a photography exhibit. Persons still interested in exhibiting their photos may call 474-5310 to register.

Home grown vegetables will be on display in the Garden Club booth. Residents will have the opportunity to purchase or win the freshest produce.

The Prince Georges County Library will be touring the Festival area with their Bookmobile. Resideats may take out a library card, check out a paperback, or pick up a bookmark or brochure on library

NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center will have two exhibits: the earth resources exhibit and the model of the lunar lander.

The International Ladies Garment Workers' booth which attracted much attention last year will return for all three days, and will again feature a demonstration of sewing skills with many free articles to be given away.

The Greenbelt Fire Dept. will be

demonstrating methods of putting out fires. Members of the Dynamo Weightlifting Club will demon-strate Olympic-style lifts and power lifts in addition to discussing competitive weightlifting. The martial arts will be demonstrated by a group of karate experts.

NASA's model airplane club will put on a demonstration with radiocontrolled planes. And a Green-belt 4-H club will be busy showing interested people how to make moon flowers.

For the past two years the Festival has honored working Americans with a Labor Day Salute on Monday afternoon. This year, many diverse jobs will be represented. The tentative schedule includes beekeeping, chair caning, plaster-ing, transmission rebuilding, carpentry, bricklaying, upholstery, blacksmthing, pottery-making, and a demonstration by Greenbelt Homes, Inc. on how the workmen run tests on the hot water heaters to determine if there is efficient burning.

Football Practice Begins At E. Roosevelt School

Local Press Fascinated By Greenbelt And People

The city of Greenbelt - its history, background, and people continue to be a source of interest to the area press. Last spring, the Prince George's Journal ran an article on Greenbelt, entitled 'Greenbelt: The Oldest New Community Around." Now, the Prince George's Sentinel in its issue of July 28 gave first-page promin-, ence to the city under the headline: "Greenbelt: Despite Changes, Suburb Retains Cooperative Spirit."

A prominent part of the article is devoted to interviews with local inhabitants by the reporter, Vivian Rigdon. The theme stressed was the friendliness of the town and its many features which make the community so attractive, especially to the youth. A front-page photograph shows two lads fishing at Greenbelt Lake.

The article also contains a description of the city's beginning as a federal housing project including the reminiscences of public works superintendent, Albert (Buddy) Attick who, as a youth, worked on the project . Cited was the development of cooperative projects during the first years and the continuation of that spirit in Greenbelt Homes, Inc., though, the author notes, not without some dissension.

Interviews with Mayor Gil Weidenfeld, city manager James Giese, police chief William Lane and assistant recreation director Harry James, are also featured, from which the reporter concludes that Greenbelters are proud of what the city has to offer

Two Tragedies In Greenbelt Car Accident Sends Eight to Hospital

A collision at the intersection of Lakecrest Drive and Greenbelt Road on Friday, July 30 at 10:30 p.m. injured eight Greenbelters, seven seriously. Involved was a car driven by a 26 year old resident, Dudley Kenneth Sparks who was turning left into Lakecrest from Greenbelt Road and one operated by Edis Starnes, a 29 year old resident traveling westbound on Greenbelt Road. He was the most seriously injured and transported by helicopter to the Shock Trauma Center in Baltimore where he is in stable condition. Both cars were demolished, and two persons were trapped in the wreckage.

Responding to the scene were Greenbelt police officers who have the case under investigation. The U.S. Park Police assisted in traffic control. The police said that none of the injured wore seat belts.

According to Deputy Randy Houche, the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire and Rescue Squad called for additional assistance since the squad was already occupied with another accident on the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. Squads Berwyn and ambulances from Heights, Branchville, W. Lanham Hills #2 and Cottage City responded. A Greenbelt ambulance, after returning from the previous run, helped transport the injured to Prince Georges County Doctor's Hospital.

Using special equipment, the rescue squad worked ten minutes to remove a victim trapped in the eastbound car which careened into the Bicentennial flower bed on Lakecrest and Greenbelt Road. It was almost 30 minutes before the person was freed from the other car which came to a halt in the middle of the intersection.

The driver of the westbound car was transported by ambulance to the State Highway Administration building on Kenilworth Avenue where he was transferred to a helicopter for the flight to Baltimore. The seven occupants of both cars are being treated at Doctor's Hospital.

Fire At 11 Hillside Routs Family at 3 AM

long-time residents Mr. and Mrs. George Daffan, 11-A Hillside, early Wednesday morning, August 4. The couple was not hurt, but there was extensive structural damage to their 3-bedroom home as well as loss of personal property. A Greenbelt Homes Inc. spokesman said that "it was fortunate that substitute GHI housing was available for the Daffans". It was estimated that repairs would take about 1 month and a half to complete.

According to Greenbelt Fire Chief Michael W. Dutton, the alarm was received at 2:54 a.m. and was answered by 15 volunteers from Greenbelt as well as personnel from Berwyn Heights, Branchville, West Lanham Hills, Beltsville and Cheverly. The fire was brought under control within five minutes of the arrival of the first pumper from Greenblt but not before it had completely engulfed the first floor and gained some headway on the second floor. The fact that the fire was contained to one unit was due largely to the quick agressive attack by the first arriving fire-

The damage was assessed at \$12,000 to the structure and \$5,000 to the contents. No injuries were reported and all fire apparatus was cleared from the scene by

FIRE FUND SET UP

Members of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. and other Greenbelt residents who wish to assist Mr. and Mrs. George Daffan, may do so by sending or taking their contribution to the "Mr. and Mrs. George Daffan Fire Fund" that has been set up at Twin Pines Savings and Loan.

The Daffans are in need of household items, especially living room furniture and kitchen materials as well as clothing. Contact Nancy Spong of Greenbelt CARES who will be coordinating this effort at 345-3456.

Two factors contributing to the spread of the fire were delay in calling the fire department and lack of smoke detectors. Damage could have been decreased considerably had the Fire Department been called promptly or had smoke detectors been evident. Citizens are urged not to attempt to extinguish fires themselves but to call the Fire Dept. at 911 immediately.

The cause of the fire has not been officially determined. Red Cross

On the scene also was an American Red Cross Volunteer worker who assisted Mr. and Mrs. Daffan and gave them a "comfort kit" which contained towels, toiletries, etc. According to Mrs. Elaine Gray of the Red Cross Disaster Service, the couple went to Red Cross headquarters where they received help to meet their medical needs and a few basic household Additionally, they were items. given "dispensary orders" for some clothing and groceries. Area de partment and other stores and food chains cooperate with the Red Cross in honoring "orders" for materials to families who are victims of a disaster.


