Committee Reports Changes In Senior Citizens Bldg.

The Advisory Committee on senior citizen housing met on June 14 in the city council room to hear a report by the architect on some changes that have been made in the plans. Actually they are not very big changes, and could really be called improvements.

In the lobby, the elevators have been relocated so as to be seen from the front desk. On the floor below, a large room has been added for table games, such as billiards. In the apartments, closets have been re-arranged for a more efficient use of space, and a counter top and some shelves will be put into the bathrooms. Outside the buildings, seven more parking spaces have been added, these to be for small cars.

A letter from Mrs. Cornelius was read, in which she suggests some good features that she has found in her present retirement home in Sandy Springs. The committee is recommending her suggestion to provide an alcove to be used as a beauty parlor several hours a week, with an outside beautician coming in. The suggestion to have one meal a day for every one in the dining room was not so acceptable to all the committee members. However, several different programs of furnishing some meals are possible, and it was considered proper to look at them all later.

At its next meeting the committee is to look at various plans for managing the property when it is occupied in the fall of 1979.

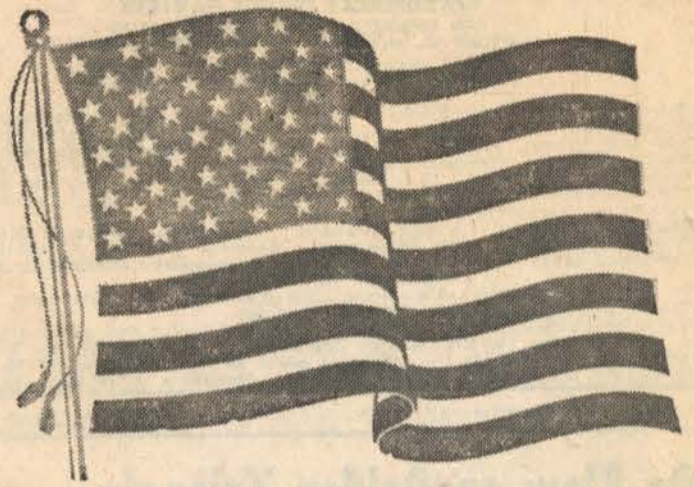
St. Hugh's

Come one, come all, to Greenbelt's apple-pie firecracker-popping Fourth of July celebration! The weekend will begin with a splash as the Municipal Swimming Pool opens its doors on Friday for recreational swimming from 1-8 p.m. The pool will observe its regularly scheduled hours for the remainder of the weekend.

It may not be Wimbledon, but the Recreation Center will sponsor the finals of the Firecracker Closed Tennis Tournament (strictly for Greenbelt residents and Greenbelt Tennis Association members).

Tempers will be high, skills will be sharpened to a fine edge, so don't miss the finals. The Men's Slow-Pitch Softball Tournament is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, and Saturday a "keep 'em rolling" Big and Little Wheels competition is featured for youngsters, ages 3-6. 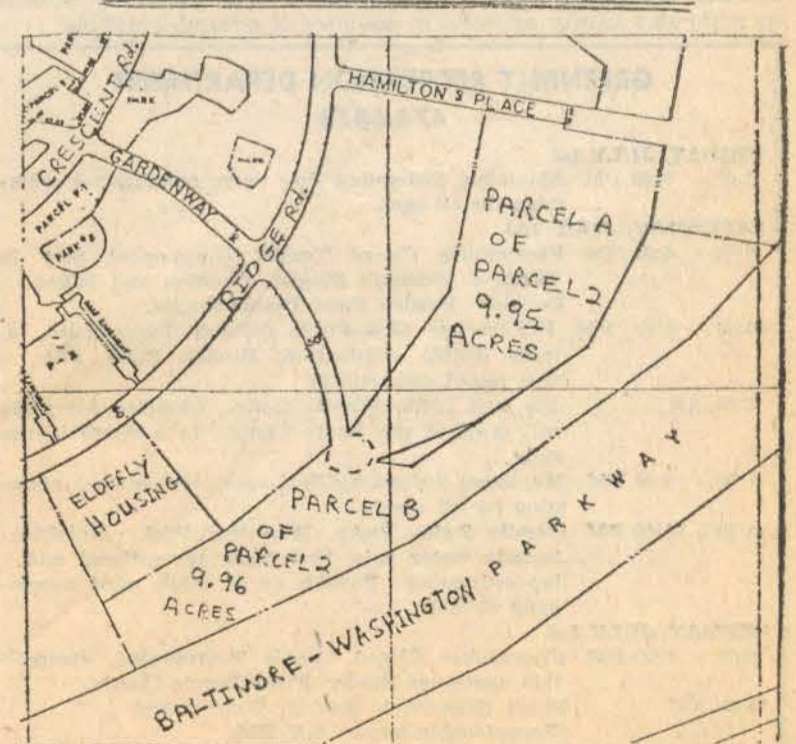
Land Acquisition in Parcel 2

All interested citizens are invited to attend a PUBLIC HEARING to be held

Wednesday, July 6, 1977 at 8:00 p.m.

at the Council Room, Municipal Building, 25 Crescent Road. At that time the Council will consider the acquisition of land required to replace the approximately three acres of open space, known as the Ridge Road Center at 22 Ridge Road, which has been designated as the site for the Elderly Housing facility. The Council has indicated its intent to purchase a portion of Parcel 2 as the replacement property and has tentatively designated the area shown as PARCEL B on the map for acquisition. Because of differences in land values, the City Manager has recommended that the city acquire approximately ten acres of land.

It has also been proposed that, if a reasonable price can be negotiated, all of Parcel 2 consisting of 19.91 acres (Parcels A and B on map) be acquired. However, city funds available are limited and may not be sufficient to purchase the entire parcel. The replacement cost for the Ridge Road Center property will be charged against the Elderly Housing facility.

Go Slow on Golden Triangle

Although it is encouraging that the developer has produced an overall concept plan for the Golden Triangle, as presented to council at the May 31 meeting, we nevertheless are concerned that development there may proceed too quickly. Construction begun in advance of completion of roads to support the development will have serious consequences.

This spring, for example, the National Park Service was forced to shorten the hours for travel through Greenbelt Park to cut down on the heavy "commuter traffic" that interfered with normal park use. Although Parkdale High School students may have accounted for much of this traffic, a substantial portion undoubtedly were ordinary rush-hour commuters trying to bypass the congested intersection at Kenilworth Ave. and Greenbelt Rd. Despite some improvements in the interchange, backed-up traffic at the Kenilworth light becomes more and more frequent and lines longer and longer. Further clogging of this intersection is to be expected as the Greenbriar condominium-Glen Oaks apartment development and the Windsor Green townhouse project near completion.

West of Kenilworth Avenue, when the now-vacant Klein's Department Store is occupied, when further development of the Beltway Plaza occurs, and when the soon-to-be constructed Nationwide office building opens, the volume of traffic at the intersection will increase uncomfortably.

Despite this increase in vehicular traffic to be carried by Greenbelt Rd., the State Highway Administration advised the *News Review* only last week that no work on rebuilding the Kenilworth intersection is expected to begin within five years. Eventually a grade separation between the two highways, employing a bridge structure, will be built; but project planning and financing must come first.

Sewage capacity from the Blue Plains Sewage Treatment Plant which serves the Triangle will not be available until expansion of the plant is completed — probably not before 1979. In the meantime, the Prince Georges County Council has been authorizing sewage hook-up for "high quality" projects to the new Anacostia Interim Sewage Plant. Apparently following this definition, the County Council approved sewage capacity for two Triangle projects — the Capital Cadillac Agency and a five-story office building.

Because neither roads nor adequate sewage facilities will be available for some time to come, we urge the City Council to use its influence with the County Council to grant no more sewage rights for any Triangle development that would generate traffic at peak hours, at least until road improvements have been accomplished.

We also bring to the council's attention the fact that as access roads are cut into the Golden Triangle site and as intersection improvements and projected new exit ramp for the Beltway interchange are constructed in the southeast corner of the tract, chaotic jams from road-building equipment, commuter traffic and local traffic will be inevitable. During this period of road construction, air pollution generated by stopped vehicles on these clogged arteries may pose an actual danger. The effect of future development on the quality of air we breathe also needs careful monitoring by state and county agencies in advance of ground-breaking.

Historic Pen, Awards Given to Greenbelt

At the June 13 city council meeting, Delegate Gerard F. Devlin, Delegate of the 24th Legislative District, presented council with a pen that was used by Acting Governor Blair Lee to sign House Bill 169 into law. This law gives incorporated communities 7.5% of the taxes paid by their residents to the State of Maryland back to the community. Prior to this law, the "piggy back" tax was computed on 0.375% of the net taxable income of the resident. This new law should bring in more revenue to the City of Greenbelt in the future. The City of Greenbelt has asked for this legislation for the last ten years.

At the same meeting Don Pollock of the Prince Georges Association for Retarded Citizens, speaking for Mrs. Eileen Labukas, thanked the city council and the mayor for the city's support of the annual Bike-A-Thon by presenting a Certificate of Appreciation to the council and another Certificate of Appreciation to the mayor. City manager James Giese was presented with two other Certificates of Appreciation addressed to the Police Department and the Department of Recreation.

Century Patches were presented to two Greenbelt youths, Bill Wheatley and John Anderson, for cycling over 100 miles. Patches for over 50 miles were presented to Eric Clausen, Jerry Davis, Jim McCann, Jim White, and Paul Tousignant.

Duane Bowman, of the concession stand at the Lake Park, received a Certificate of Appreciation for donating the bicycle that was used for the raffle prize. The *News Review* also received a Certificate of Appreciation for its role in the Bike-A-Thon for Retarded Citizens. (The reporter was so busy recording the event that he forgot to go to the podium to receive the award.)

Ass't Scoutmaster Receives Award

Timothy Moore of 1 Lakeview Circle, an Assistant Scoutmaster of Troop 746, was presented with the Hornaday Conservation Medal at the Patuxent District Recognition Dinner held recently at Eleanor Roosevelt High School. 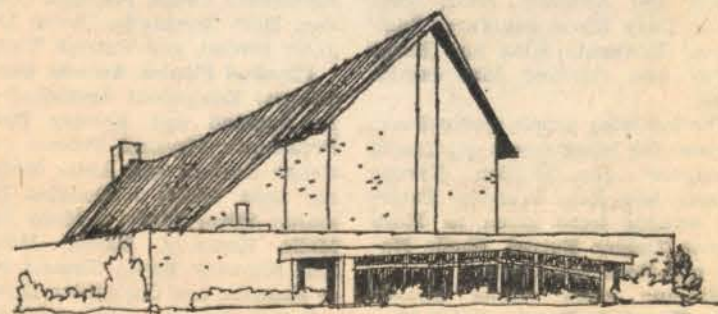

Greenbelter Mark Henry Among Corcoran Winners

A visitor to the Corcoran Gallery of Art would be treated to a current exhibit entitled "Washington Today." This show features work in black and white executed by Washington area students. A participating student is Mark Henry of Woodland Way, who will be a junior at Eleanor Roosevelt Senior High School. His work was one of 82 pictures exhibited, chosen from the entries of 43 high schools.

Henry entered a brush and ink of birch trees with Washington seen in the background, as viewed from a nearby park. The competition "Washington Today" was part of the celebration of the centennial of the Washington Post and was co-sponsored by the Corcoran Gallery of Art. It was designed to elicit area high school students' artistic impressions of Washington. It was hoped that the chosen drawings would serve as a pictorial record of our time.

Mark Henry is enrolled in several art courses at Eleanor Roosevelt. His preferred mediums are oil and pen and ink. He enjoys capturing nature subjects and recently entered a brush and ink of rabbits in an art show in Laurel. The drawing won first prize in its division and is now on display at the Laurel library.

Greenbelters are familiar with Mark Henry's work from Greenbelt Labor Day Art contests. He has won that competition for two consecutive years, 1975 and 1976. In 1975, his first place prize winner was a pen and ink of a mountain man, which he subsequently sold. Henry won first place in 1976 with a snow scene done in oils, and second place with a watercolor of a sailboat.

Henry plans to attend art school upon completion of his high school education.

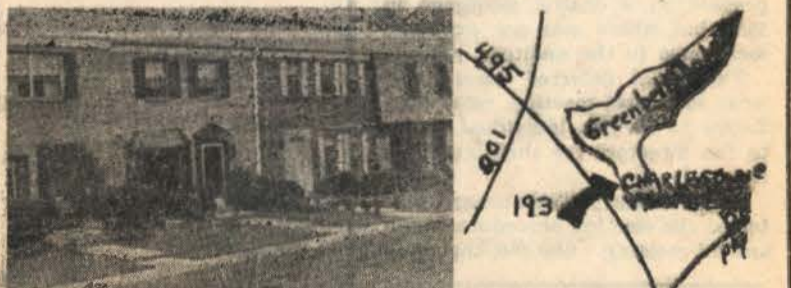

About an hour was spent discussing a demographic survey to be prepared by Morton Hoffman Co. and expected to be paid for by a grant. The purpose of the study as reported in previous articles is to inform GHI on needed improvements, plus ability of members to share improvement costs for refurbishing. Also studied will be age of members, families, an average of how long people expect to live in GHI, etc.

Sales Procedures

The board acted on several problems related to resale procedures. Recently the board and the sales office have been criticized by some members for their handling of problems related to bringing a unit up to sales inspection standards. Some of these standards are GHI's, others such as the electrical requirements are county requirements.

As in several meetings since the first of the year, a member protested against being responsible for correcting electrical deficiencies that were extant before she purchased the house.

Until the board develops a complete revision of sales procedure, the directors proposed an interim policy:

Where inspections have been made and letters asking members to correct deficiencies have been mailed out, and the selling member or broker fails, or refuses, to set up a final inspection, that \$1000 be withheld from settlement and the buyer allowed to be brought to the Corporation for approval.

This money will be held in escrow and any remaining amount will be returned to the seller.

On this same question, a memorandum by new Director Margaret Hogensen spells out four alternative policies that GHI could adopt so that all members could be treated alike:

1. Members pay all costs.
2. Costs are shared equally between members and GHI.
3. GHI pays all costs.
4. Selling members and buyers negotiate which should pay.

The board deferred this to a later meeting.

Audit Committee Report

George Taube, new chairman of the Audit Committee, requested on behalf of the committee that the board ask auditors Wolfe and Co. for further explanation of their work in three areas. The first concerned in depth audit procedures promised to test documentation carried out by the maintenance department. The second concerned "holders of Notes and Mortgages" which the auditors had omitted to disclose. A third related to an amount of \$40,000 which was prepaid on a chattel mortgage in 1953, but which was not explicitly mentioned in the auditors' report.

The board deferred these questions to a later meeting, requesting Taube to furnish individual copies to the directors for their information.

Member Mary Tschabrunn, protested the election procedure at the annual meeting. She felt that ma-

chines should have been used at the meeting instead of paper ballots. (Machine voting was used just for the 2nd election day only.)

Member Eunice Coxon voiced similar complaints, saying that several years ago she was instrumental

in changing the voting method from paper ballots to machine.

In response, President Jim Smith explained the predicament of the Nomination and Elections Committee: First, the bylaws require voting to be held the night of the annual meeting and resume the next day. Neither, Center School nor the city offices were available as polling places. Second, it is too risky to move the machines and get accurate totals. Thus the commit-

tee used the paper ballots the night before and the machines the next day. Smith explained that complaints would have to be directed

to the Nomination and Election Committee since the bylaws require the independence of the committee from the board and management.
