All Five Incumbents Re-elected to Council

At Last Meeting Out-Going City Council Strongly Supports Beltsville Farm Plan

As the Greenbelt City Council finished its last regular meeting of this legislative session on September 10, each councilman expressed his pride in council's record and appreciation of the city staff. During the meeting itself, council passed several resolutions and continued to express its concern for Greenbelt's environment, especially for the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC).

Council unanimously stated its Nanna felt questions on the issue should be directed to the attorneys attached to SHA.

Council decided that city representatives would attend the High Point workshop on October 4. Copies of the workshop notice were also referred to the Advisory Planning Board (APB). Councilman Thomts White found it "one of the more peculiar notices of a workshop I've ever seen." He noted the restricted attendance for the workshop. Tickets to attend would be sent to participants by SHA.

Greenway

On another matter, council decided to make APB report 217 about the Greenway Shopping Center site plan the basis for its recommendation to MNCPPC. The report recommended walkways be provided to the Center from the Maryland Trade Center Office Building and nearby apartments. Furthermore, the report specified that the back of the shopping center should be finished attractively. It also stated opposition to the proposed Parkway-Beltway interchange use of property in this par-

Council moved to express its support of CB 97 introduced by Councilman Parris Glendening, although Nanna felt the bill "won't pass constitutional muster." The bill on mandatory dedication allows the Prince Georges Planning Board to require mandatory dedication or that a substitute fee be paid to the city. Nanna, however, felt the county could not take this power away from MNCPPC since the Commission was given the power by the state. Nanna explained, "To make the wishes of the municipality binding on the Commission you have to go to the state legisla-See COUNCIL, page 2, col. 1

President Carter Runs: Greenbelter Beats Him

The following article is a firsthand account of the long disdistance race that President Carter was in last Saturday:

On Saturday, September 15 at Catoctin Mountain National Park near Thurmont, Md., and Camp David, Greenbelter Larry Noel (58) joined President Carter (55) and 900 other runners in a 10 kilometer (6.2 mile) race. The President arrived 10 minutes before the start and instead of warming up and stretching spent the time greeting people.

The cannon went off starting the race and the President made his second mistake running faster in the mountains than he did on the White House lawn. He was with and he charged up a one mile hill and a little later one hill a mile and a half long at too fast a pace.

The President was in front of Noel by a half mile at the 4 mile point where fatigue caused him to stop. This was the President's first competitive race in 30 years since he ran for the Naval Academy

About 90 minutes after the race the President arrived to award the prizes to the top runners. Noel was within a few feet of him and he appeared in excellent health. Undoubtedly Mr. Carter is a better runner than most runners his age and can easily complete 6 miles at a slower pace.

Noel finished 677th out of 900 runners and, incidentally, almost 100 runners did not finish.

GII WEIDENFELD GETS HIGH VOTE OVERPASS, REVENUE BONDS WIN

Election 1979 in Greenbelt was a replay of 1977 - well, almost. This time around Gil Weidenfeld was top vote getter. His 1,472 votes were 50 votes ahead of his biennial rival Richard Pilski, who garnered 1,422 votes. Finishing in third place was Thomas X. White with 1,320 votes, just one vote ahead of Richard Castaldi. Charles Schwan's tally was 1,203.

The electorate overwhelmingly selected the Gardenway overpass in a non-binding advisory question and enthusiastically endorsed revenue bonds in a binding referendum.

All five incumbents pulled over 40% of the vote thus eliminating a runoff. In fact, all five received over 50% of the votes. Konrad Herling made a respectable showing by gathering 48% of the total vote. In seventh and eighth place respectively were Jeanette Gordy and Richard Ley.

The 2,111 votes cast represented 62% of the 3,414 Greenbelters registered to vote. In 1977, 59% of the electorate turned out, in 1975 48% and in 1971 54%. However, in 1969 a hot election brought out 75% of the 2,991 registered voters. (See chart on page 2.)

The incumbents have served together since 1973 when Pilski was top vote getter. However, in 1975 Weidenfeld assumed the mayoral post and in 1977 the see-saw tipped back the other way when Pilski regained the chair.

The new council which will serve for two years will hold its organizational meeting on Monday, September 24 at 7:30 p.m. The mayor will be elected by council and, although the charter is silent on this point, past councils have generally chosen the top vote getter.

Overpass

The overpass issue drew response from 1,881 voters. A whoping 88% cast ballots for locating the pedestrian-bikeway across the B-W Parkway at the Gardenway location. In Greenbriar where it had appeared that residents of Phase I generally favored Mandan Road and those in Phase 2, Gardenway, it was a 2-1 victory for the Gardenway location. The core of Greenbelt voted 18-1 for Gardenway. The big question now is whether or not Phase I will drop its objections to

Gardenway so that condemnation proceedings will not be necessary. The hope of council when the question was placed on the ballot was that Phase I would accept the re-

Revenue Bonds

The referendum giving the city authority to issue revenue bonds passed 2 to 1, with 1,229 of the electorate casting ballots for the charter amendment and 524 against. This opens the door for Greenbelt Homes, the commercial center owner, Charlestowne Village. center apartments, etc., to apply for low-cost financing for rehabilitation of existing structures or for energy conservation projects within

Write-in votes were cast for J. Morales (1), Ashworth (1), D. Beck (2), M. Hoffman (23), Donovan (1), B. Harlow (1), T. Mast (1), H. Savage (1) and J. L. Ball (1).

Potpourri

The return of the same council for the fourth consecutive term marked an unprecedented vote of confidence.

In this last meeting of the present council term, council disposed of a large number of other agenda items. They passed an ordinance amending financial disclosure regulations for filing of supplemental reports by council candidates; passed a resolution to purchase certain goods and services such as fuel, computer services, and legal ads; passed two resolutions transferring funds within departments: and passed a resolution for the purchase of a snow thrower, mower, and plumbing work in the police station.

Council also decided to participate in the 1980 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program and approved three CDBG projects for this year-hiring of a rehabilitation loan specialist, reconstruction of Hillside from Research to Laurel Hill and the construction of an underpass in the same location.

Several county bills also received Council attention. They expressed support for proposed CB 115 removing areas in municipalities from county designation as parking permit areas and CB 117 requiring a two-thirds vote by county council on sectional map amendments against a municipality's recommendations. On the other hand, they opposed CB 118 freezing the amount of tax differential paid to cities.

Council also authorized the mayor to execute three grading easements for work on private property in connection with the construction of Hanover Parkway and Greenway Center Drive, referred a petition for exclusive parking for residents of Green Ridge House to management, and carried over to a new council an ordinance to amend financial disclosure regulations to include APB and a work session with the Fire Department and Fraternal Order of Police.



Members Earn Record Dividend

During the first half of 1979, Twin Pines members earned more than \$440,000 in dividends on their passbook savings accounts and on their savings certificates.

Twin Pines' total income during this period was \$608,400, while expenses were \$128,200, leaving a net income of \$480,-200. Some \$440,300 of this \$480,200 was paid to members as dividends with the remaining \$39,900 going to reserves.

As of June 30, 1979, members had \$7,093,000 in their passbook savings accounts and almost \$51/2 million in certificates. These member savings provide the funds for Twin Pines' loans, Because of the Association's high-yielding certificate and passbook accounts, members have kept their savings at Twin Pines, and to a limited extent, have added to these accounts. This availability of funds, coupled with good management, has allowed Twin Pines to continue making loans during a tight-money situation that has seen a large number of financial institutions in Maryland and metropolitan Washington stop lending. Despite this, the demand for loans exceeds supply. Currently, the Association has a waiting list of 187 prospective borrowers, mostly purchasers of GHI houses. We encourage members to add to their savings at Twin Pines so that the Association can continue meeting the financial needs of the Greenbelt community.

Twin Pines continues to grow; its total assets as of the end of June were almost \$13½ million, an increase of 3½ percent in the last year.



Council Approves Basketball Court, Eastway Playground

A proposal calling for construction of a basketball ring and backboard at the Eastway Playground was approved at the September 10, City Council meeting. An Advisory Planning Board report also urged the City Council to support County Executive Lawrence Hogan's plans to establish new bikepaths throughout the County, including Greenbelt.

A short debate concerning possible sites for the planned basketball court ensued, with some citizens expressing concern that the proposed court would be an intrusion on residential housing. City Manager Jams Giese intervened, however, by saying, "The court would not be directly in front of any houses, and balls should not be a problem if they get in the playground area."

Councilman Richard Castaldi suggested an alternative site towards the north area of the playground, "Some people in 60 Court are concerned about the proposed site," he said. He added that the residents want ballplaying in the area, but they don't want it to disturb older residents who live near-

Castaldi also mentioned that a resident whose home is near the proposed area wanted to be certain that no lights would be erected for the court. City Manager Giese assured Castaldi that lights would not be erected.

Giese then brought up some possible problems with Castaldi's alternative site. He mentioned that the court would be quite close to some homes in the north part of the playground area, and near the site there would be tree problems. "There is an informal ball diamond in the upper left corner of the playground area that might cause problems," he said.

Councilman Thomas White indicated his support for the relocation. "If the city staff has no concerns about the suggested relocation, and if no problems exist, then it's fine with me," he said.

The council left the final choice of the exact location of the basketball court up to the discretion of the city manager and the Recreation Department. City officials expressed the hope that construction of the court would begin soon.

"The Recreation Department hopes to have the basketball court erected by the end of the year," said Councilman Charles Schwan in a recent phone interview. He added that the department is presently engaged in installing playground equipment at Greenbrian and Springhill Lake. As soon as this is completed, construction can begin on the basketball court.

If the court is completed soon, it will make three youngsters particularly happy. Greg Varda, Brian Van Deusen and Doug Van Deusen had requested in their June 11 petition to the City Council that a basketball ring and backboard be erected at the Eastway Playground.

Presently the children must cross Ridge Road to use the basketball hoop at Mowatt Memorial Methodist Church.

Bike Paths

The Advisory Planning Board also urged the city council to contact Hogan to support his efforts for designating the shoulders along Kenilworth Avenue from Calvert Road to Powder Mill Road as bike paths. Also included in the plans are the shoulders along Greenbelt Road from Lakecrest Drive East.
