Festival Offers Fun-Filled Weekend

Booths, Parade, Contests, Music

"Unity through Community Involvement" will be the theme again of the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival, when the 26th annual four-day affair begins on Friday, August 29. Volunteers throughout the community have assembled a wide variety of events which promise an exciting and entertaining conclusion for the summer. (See Labor Day Calendar of Events).

Foretelling the upcoming excitement, opening ceremonies at 7 p.m. will include a concert by the Greenbelt Concert Band, a drawing for free carnival tickets and the highly-anticipated announcement of Greenbelts Outstanding Citizen of 1980. The festivities will continue with carnival rides, food and game community booths, stage events, athletic contests, and Art Show and Photography Exhibit, Pet Show, Talent Show, and Parade. The Carnival Midway will be open from 1-11 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday except for a dinner break from 5-6:30 p.m. Carnival devotees can enjoy all the rides for one price from 1-5 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

Miss Greenbelt Pageant

One highlight of the Festival is the Miss Greenbelt Pageant. Seventeen young Greenbelt women will participate this year. The contestants will be presented several times before the queen is crowned on Sunday evening. On Saturday evening the participants will perform an aerobic dance. They will also be eligible to receive valuable prizes, such as a diamond pendant from Theodore Nye Jewelers, Barbizon School of Modeling scholarship, and savings accounts, which have been donated by area businesses. Miss Greenbelt 1980 and her court will make an appearance in the Labor Day Parade on a float which they have been preparing with the help of Sharon Pienak and with time and materials also donated by the Utopia Theater.

Highlights

Many favorite and traditional events will again be a part of the Labor Day Festival. As before, the Lion's Club will sponsor a Pancake Breakfast, their 17th, on Sunday morning in the Youth Center.

The Festival will commemorate the Labor Day holiday on Monday with its Salute to Americans at Work. Numerous interesting occupations, from Revolutionary War costume making, to bicycle repair and violin making, will be demonstrated in the Center Mall.

Artists of all ages will display an infinite variety of art at the annual Art Show and Photography Exhibit. Works can be viewed from 1-6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday in the Municipal Building. Art works will be judged with a special award, the Cipriano Art Award, provided by the Greenbelt Recreation Department for the work best demonstrating the theme "Americans at Work."

Stage events include such old standbys as the Ralph Case Dancers, McGrath Irish Dancers, bluegrass musicians, the Grim Pickers, folksinger Iris Liberman Hirsch, the Port Authority Rock Band and Christian the Magician. Several top 40 bands will perform, as well as the Guys and Dolls cloggers and Sunshine Polka Dancers. Street dances will close the Festival on Friday and Saturday evenings. Dance routines will be performed at 7 p.m.

DIAL-A-RIDE SERVICE

For the fourth consecutive year, free transportation will be available to and from the Labor Day Festival. A new dial-a-ride system will be tried this year, which the Festival committee hopes will be faster and more convenient.

By calling the Festival information number, 474-1518, Greenbelters can arrange to be picked up anywhere within the city limits and driven to the Festival in a passenger van. Members of the Women's Club of Greenbelt will answer the phone and take messages at the Festival information booth. When an individual wants to leave the Festival, a ride can also be arranged at the Festival information booth. The service will be available from 1-10 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday and 1-6:30 p.m. on Monday. Telephone messages will be taken from 1-5 p.m. and 6-8 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday and 1-5 p.m. on Monday.

Capitol Cadillac will lend the Festival its van over the Labor Day weekend for this dial-a-ride service. Normally the van is used to transport people whose cars are being serviced. Jack Curlett, Capitol Cadillac Vice-president, has been instrumental in arranging this contribution.

Previously Prince Georges County Government buses have been used for transportation, with riders shuttled to and from a parking lot. In later years an extended route, with stops in Springhill Lake, old Greenbelt, Windsor Green and Greenbriar, was developed. With a dial-a-ride system and individualized routes, the Festival hopes for better bus service. The City, which reimburses the committee for the transportation system, is also interested in seeing how it works.

Four Employees, Dismissed by GHI, Form Picket Line to Gain Support

Pickets appeared outside the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. offices early this week. Wearing home-made signs proclaiming that GHI was unfair to its employees, four former members of the maintenance department whose jobs were abolished picketed first in front of the GHI offices and later at the corner of Hamilton Pl. and Ridge Rd. At times several present GHI employees joined them.

While GHI Board members expected a reduction of the work force sometime in the future, they had not been informed prior to the dismissals that took place on August 18. In a lengthy executive session on August 21, the board stood by General Manager Ken Kopstein's action although

some directors were unhappy that they had not been consulted and that the method of termination appeared to lack compassion. Apparently the directors agreed with Kopstein's conclusion that speed was of the essence and that services to members would not be adversely affected.

The former employees expressed resentment because they had been individually called into Kopstein's office and informed that their jobs had been abolished. They were terminated immediately, with a month's severance pay and six months hospitalization benefits.

Pointing to their signs, the employees emphasized that the picketing was being done by the men as individuals, not as affiliates of any labor organization. The picketers felt they had not been fired according to seniority. They also maintained that they would be

willing to take a cut in salary and accept retraining for another position within GHI, even at a lesser grade. They asked why jobs could not have been found for them under the rehabilitation program.

Three Reasons Noted

Kopstein noted three main reasons for his action. He was, first, to reduce staff where he could, following an assessment of needs in conjunction with the rehabilitation program. He felt that GHI members understood this would have to be done as rehabilitation progresses.

Looking at staff as a whole, Kopstein found that there was no big backlog in carpentry (some is now covered by rehab) so there was no longer a need for three carpenters. It was therefore possible, he said, to let the two junior carpenters go. (This differs from the pickets' viewpoint that

County Schools Open Tuesday

Tuesday September 2 is the first day of school for approximately 120,000 students in Prince Georges County, down from 128,000 last year.

State law requires school attendance by every child between the ages of 6 and 16. Children who will be five years old on or before January 1, 1980 may attend kindergarten this fall. Parents registering their children for kindergarten or to begin school in Prince Georges County for the first time should bring the following: proof of birth-date, preferably the child's birth certificate; record of immunization for children entering kindergarten through grade 6 — diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles (rubeola), and rubella (German measles); record of rubeola for all students through grade 12; legal proof of residence — settlement papers, rental contract, etc.; student's transfer card or last report card from previous school for students entering above grade 1.

Time Changes

The elementary schools within the city limits will all have a change in opening time with North End's change being the greatest, moving from 9:30 a.m. to 8 and closing at 2 p.m. Both Center and Springhill Lake will be open from 9 to 3. Opening times for other schools — Greenbelt children attend remain the same as last year: John Carroll: 8-2; Magnolia and Oakcrest: 9:30-3:30; Greenbelt Junior High: 9-3:30; Bethune Jr. High: 7:50-2:20, and Eleanor Roosevelt High School: 9:30-4. For the first time Greenbelt ninth graders will attend Roosevelt.

Food Services

Regular lunch meal prices will increase to \$.65 for elementary school students and \$.70 for secondary students. Adult meals will increase to \$1.25. Prices for a la carte lunch items will increase slightly. Milk prices will be 15c per half pint for students. Prices for a la carte breakfast items, vegetables, desserts and other items will increase slightly this fall. Breakfast for students will be 50c and adults 60c.

County schools offer free and reduced-price breakfasts and lunches to youngsters whose family size and income entitle them to eligibility. The formula for determining eligibility also takes in-

to account unusual family expenses for medical bills, shelter, casualty losses, or special education costs. Application forms will be provided all children at the beginning of the school year. All information is treated as confidential. About 28% of the lunches the Prince Georges Schools served last year were free or reduced price lunches under this program.

(Actually, no student pays the entire cost of the regular meals served. The federal and state governments are expected to put more than \$4.5 million into the school lunch program in Prince Georges County.)

seniority should be based on the length of time employees had worked within GHI rather than one specific job.) Two positions in the heating program were also considered unnecessary.

Only minimal preventive maintenance work is occurring because the heating systems will be replaced. Because the midnight to 5 a.m. shift had so few calls for service, this time slot was abolished and a man placed on call instead. Kopstein did not feel that services would suffer because of these cuts.

The second reason, Kopstein stated, was based on budgeting needs for next year. At present GHI is able to keep its expenditures under its revenues. But, he said, projected escalating oil prices would mean that the budget for next year would be tight. Unless some economies are taken, probably more than a 10% increase would be required. Since the membership this year twice voted down such increases, Kopstein said he has been "trying to economize in many areas." In order to maintain budget flexibility, Kopstein felt this decision to abolish jobs was necessary. Besides saving actual salaries, he said, GHI would also save 20% in overhead (hospitalization, social security and employee fringe benefits).

Union Petition

Thirdly, Kopstein acknowledged that he had received a call from the Teamster's Union the previous week informing him that he would soon be petitioned by the union to take a vote. (A referendum last year opposed the union by one vote). Since Kopstein would be unable to reduce staff once a vote was actually called for and since budgetary pressures necessitated his having flexibility to abolish jobs not needed under the rehabilitation program, Kopstein moved quickly. (The petition from the union arrived on August 19.)

Kopstein defended his method of firing by stating that this (on-the-spot dismissal) was standard termination policy followed by GHI. He felt that giving a month's severance pay was fair and would give the men time to look for another job. Kopstein did not see any jobs at present for which the men could be retrained, because different kinds of jobs will be needed after rehabilitation is completed. The number of employees will be further reduced at that time. In general, several departments will be restructured, including the warehouse department, and eventually certain services will be contracted out.

As for finding the men jobs under the rehabilitation program, Kopstein explained that this is contracted out and GHI does not do the hiring. Subsequently, Kopstein told the News Review that management is providing assistance to the separated em-

ployees for finding other jobs in the rehabilitation program. Letters and personal contacts with subcontractors are being made, he said.

Board Not Notified

When asked whether the board had been aware of his actions in firing the men, Kopstein admitted that it had not. "In retrospect, I should have consulted them," he said. Management, however, has the right to hire and fire, he observed. The matter was discussed in executive session after the board's special meeting on Thursday.

When queried, vice-president Joe Jenkins, presiding officer in the absence of president Don Volk, speaking only for himself, backed the management's actions. We "have to save the money," he said, noting that the board had been aware that "we would have to make a reduction in the work force." Jenkins said there was no motion or vote taken on the matter.

Director Bobbi McCarthy was distressed that the board had not been notified. "The board," she said, "has a function in the determination, especially the timing, since a reduction in force is the outgrowth of budget policy." She didn't think the board would have altered the manager's decision had it been consulted, but "we

could have had an effect on how the manager handled the matter." She hoped that there would be improved communication between management and employees with respect to rehabilitation's effect on jobs and retraining opportunities.

Director Margaret Hogensen felt similarly. "In general it would be well that the Board was notified ahead of time, but I think there were extenuating circumstances that can justify his (Kopstein's) action. I doubt the end result would have been different but we could have influenced his techniques in dealing with the matter."

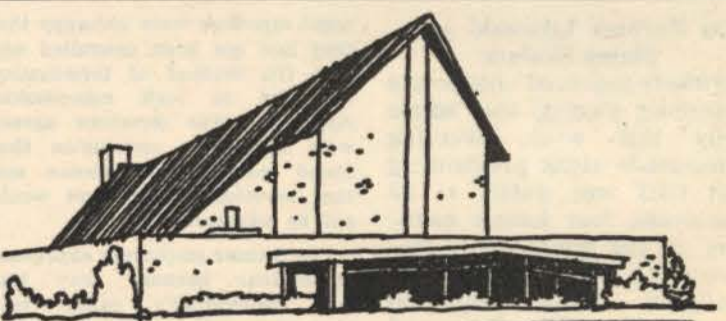

GHI Board Approves Hiring of Consultant for Phase II

In a special meeting Thursday, August 21, the GHI Board voted to permit the hiring of a consultant for three months at a salary of \$15,000 to help with the Phase II bid specifications. Manager Ken Kopstein explained that the GHI staff was trying to do too much with rehabilitation concerns added to their own work, and were about 1/2 month behind in bids. He, therefore, needed someone for a 3 month period to help move things along expeditiously for Phase II; basically this would include verifying bids to see that they are reasonable.

This need not be a full-time individual, but might be a firm on call. He suggested a salary of \$15,000. When questioned about paying \$15,000 for 3 months work, Kopstein said that was the going rate for consultants, about \$60 per hour. Kopstein planned to take the money out of GHI funds until such time as money is granted for Phase II rehabilitation. When reminded by Director Bobbi McCarthy that GHI didn't have the money, Kopstein told her, "That's why we did what we did Monday—to improve the cash flow." (referring to the firing of 4 workers). Kopstein further stated that GHI shouldn't have to borrow this year, but he warned that it may be necessary to borrow for fuel oil early next year. He assured the board he was trying to economize as much as possible so that it wouldn't be necessary to raise charges over 10%. "Since the 5% increase was not passed . . . we are in tight shape," Kopstein added.

The board voted to authorize Kopstein to hire the consultant, with Director Wayne Williams opposed.

To a query from member Bill Feller that "we hear about the pickets", Jenkins explained that it would be taken up in executive

session. Kopstein said he had consulted GHI's attorney and had been told he had acted properly.

Orientation at Bethune

PILSKI SEEKS P.G. COUNCIL POST

Sixteen-year veteran of the Greenbelt City Council and former mayor Richard Pilski has thrown his hat into the ring for the soon-to-be-vacated post of Prince Georges County Councilman when current incumbent Francis Francois leaves to take a new position as executive director of the American Association of Highways and Transportation officials. The Francois resignation becomes effective September 1.

Following the urging of many local supporters, Pilski said, he decided to present his credentials at a public meeting before the 24-member State Democratic Central Committee. "I feel strongly that it's about time," he said, "that someone begin to consider the fact that Greenbelt should have some representation someplace. If nothing else," he continued, "I would do it in protest."

The latter comment referred to the situation that Francois' seat is often considered "the Bowie seat" on the Council. But this is an at-large seat," Pilski said.

The procedure for filling the vacated seat is as follows: candidates place their credentials before the State Central Committee, which in turn selects three among this list to be sent to the County Council. From among these three names the Council chooses the new member to join their ranks. If by October 2 the Council has been unable to choose someone for the position, the power to choose then devolves upon the County Executive — in this case Republican Larry Hogan. (No one can imagine that the Democratic County Council will permit such an eventuality to occur.)

In citing his many years of ex-

perience with issues of government—zoning, parks, police departments, senior citizens, and housing—Pilski said he felt he was "the best qualified" among the candidates he knew about. Many have experience with some

of these issues, he said; but none have served "in a capacity that gives an overall background."

Pilski said he would have been equally willing to support another Greenbelter for this important County post.

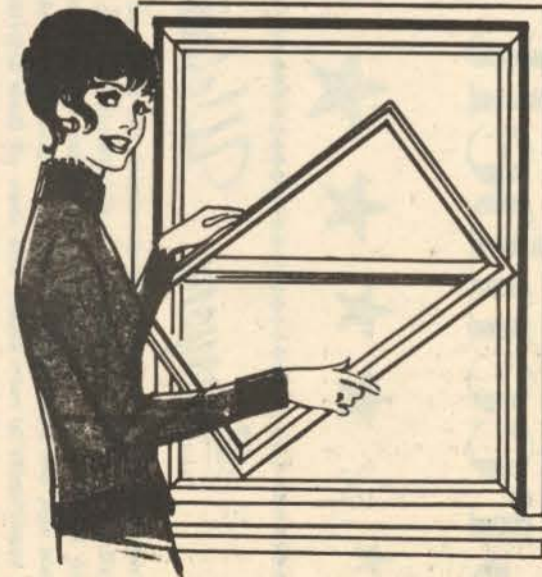

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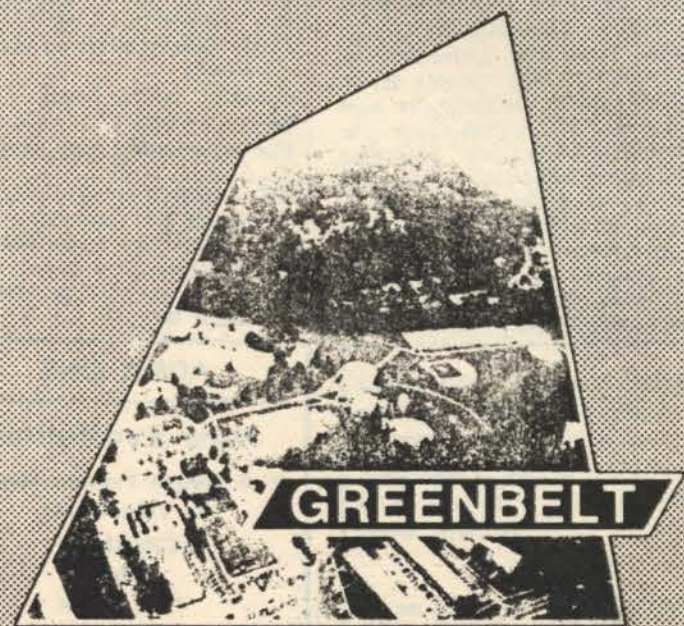
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
