
Four Incumbents, One Newcomer Win Annexation Possibilities Explored Castaldi Gets High Vote **On Properties East of Parkway Weidenfeld Comes Close**

Greenbelt continues to move toward probable expansion of its boundaries south and east from the present city limits. As much as 167 acres could be added to the city through current annexation efforts.

Primary targets for annexation are the new Maryland Trade Center building, and the adjacent Sunstates and Baker-Witt properties on which commercial development is expected. Annexation would mean that the city could expect to gain significant tax revenues and would have some degree of control over the future development of the vacant 45.7 acres included in these properties.

In a secondary move, the city would like to smooth out its un-even border south of Greenbelt Road and east of the Beltway. The owners of four parcels of land, totalling about 114 acres have been asked by the city manager if they would be interested In annexation into the city.

The following summarizes the status of the annexation efforts as of the beginning of September: Md. Trade Center & Sunstates

An annexation agreement and a declaration of covenants have been signed by the city and by the owners of the Maryland Trade Center and the 33.7-acre Sunstates property. (The names Coakley & Williams and Resnick are also associated with these properties.) Execution of the agreements depends on the outcome of efforts by the owners, supported by the city, to gain rezoning of the vacant land from high-rise to commercial. The Zoning Hearing Examiner has not yet issued his recommendation. After he does so, the County Council(acting as the District Council) will have to decide the zoning question.

A part of the zoning issue is the future of traffic flow in the area if the expected commercial development takes place. The city has asked county Chief Administrative Officer Kenneth Duncan to start preparation of legislation that would establish a tax incremental financing district for the extension of Hanover Parkway to Good Luck Road, and for

North End Construction May Disrupt Parking

The City is undertaking street improvement work on Research Road and Hillside Road between Research and Laurel Hill, which will include street resurfacing, repair and widening; parking shoulder construction, parking shoulder repair, curb construction, replacement of valley gutter with curbs, curb and gutter repair; new sidewalks, sidewalk replacement and catch basin repair.

Because of this work, it will be necessary to establish temporary parking restrictions or otherwise inconvenience residents in the area. Residents are asked to please be on the lookout for temporary parking restriction signs, barricades, trucks, and workmen, and to obey all signs. Above all, loave a car in a prohibited do not area. (It can be towed away at owner's expense, if necessary.)

The city will make every effort to keep the inconvenience at a minimum and to restore torn-up areas as quickly as possible. Parents are asked to warn children to keep away from construction areas and off of construction equipment.

other related road improvements in that part of the city. Duncan has replied that the requested legislative proposal will be presented to the County Council at such time as the rezoning is granted.

Baker-Witt

Western Development Corp., as contract purchaser of the 12acre Baker-Witt property, has given the city a letter of petition to annex. The proposed terms of annexation are spelled out in the letter. A final annexation agreement and declaration of covenants have not yet been signed. As with Sunstates, rezoning and traffic flow are pending issues, with Baker-Witt not far behind Sunstates in the rezoning process, and linked with Sunstates as a reason for securing the tax incremental financing of road improvements.

Other Properties

The properties being considered for annexation in order to even up the city's boundary line are the following:

1) The Tidler properties, consisting of one parcel of about 77 acres and a second of a bit over 22 acres, both located to the south of Windsor Green.

2) The Glendale-NASA parcel, about ten acres, located between the Sunstates property and Goddard Space Village.

3) The Jones property of almost four acres, which is on the south side of Greenbelt Road between the Lutheran Church and the B/ W Parkway.

The owners of the Tidler and Glendale-NASA properties have not yet replied to mid-August letters from the city asking about See ANNEXATION page 4, col. 1

In an election that was not supposed to produce any surprises, Greenbelt's native son Richard Castaldi outpolled his rivals and presumably will be Greenbelt's next mayor. Joining Castaldi on the new council will be, in order of their finish, incumbents Gil Weidenfeld, Richard Pilski, Thomas White and newcomer Ed Putens. Castaldi appeared to benefit from being acceptable to a larger number of persons on both sides of most controversial issues than any other candidate.

All five successful candidates pulled over 40% of the vote, thus eliminating a runoff. The four incumbents each received well over 50% (Castaldi 69.3, Weidenfeld 67.1, Pilski 65.4, White 58.7) of the vote while Putens scored 44.4%. Ott followed Putens with 38.6%, Zugby with 33.6% and James 28.7%

The 1,808 votes cast represented 51.3% of the 3,522 Greenbelters registered to vote, down sharply from 1979's total of 2,111 or 62% of those registered. (In 1979 there were two referendum questions on the ballot.) In 1977, 59% of the electorate turned out, in 1975 48% and in 1971 54%.

The four incumbents have served together since 1973 when Pilski was top vote-getter. However in 1975 and 1979, Weidenfeld assumed the mayoral post and in 1977 the seesaw tipped back the other way when Pilski regained the chair. In 1975 Castaldi served as mayor pro-tem.

Potpourri

-The return of the four incumbents for their fifth consecutive term marked an unprecedented vote of confidence.

-Four different candidates led in the four precincts, Castaldi in the 3rd, Pilski in the 6th, Weidenfeld in the 8th and Zugby in the 13th. White's best showing was in the 6th, North End, where he was second. Putens was third in the 13th, Greenbelt East, his home precinct.

-The vote by precincts varied all over the lot from the North End's 63% down to 21.9% in the Springhill Lake precinct. Center's vote was a respectable 57.6%, Greenbelt East's a disappointing 43.7%. The percentages two years ago were Center 67, North End 69, Springhill Lake 38 and Greenbelt East 56. The lower voter turnout can be attributed to the lack of major issues and the rain.

-Place of residence obviously was significant in determining who among the challengers would join the incumbents. Putens was edged by Ott in all precincts-Ott fifth and Putens sixth - except Greenbelt East where Putens outpolled his rival decisively, 215 to 80, to pile up his winning margin.

-Voters cast ballots for an average of 4.07 candidates in all precincts (4.27 in the 3rd, 4.2 in the 6th and 8th and 3.47 in the 13th precinct). Among those who received write-in votes the leader was Jose Morales, who received the nod of three persons. None of his rivals received more than one vote. They were Bill Wilkerson, Jim O'Sullivan, Walsh Barcus, Don Volk, Dorothy Baluch and David Shu

Her handicap of severe deafness she bore with fortitude and refused to let it deter her from making friends of all ages and enjoying neighbors, family and the social scene.

As a neighbor said to me on hearing of her sudden death at the age of eighty-five (her ap-pearance belied her years) "She made a real contribution to Greenbelt."

If Martha Hutzler's hope was the same as most of us that we shall be held in loving memory after our deaths by our circle of friends and devoted families, she need not have been concerned.

To the Editor:






Charles A. Parsons Charles A. Parsons of 18-Y

Police Blotter

The Greenbelt Police Department was called to investigate the most tragic automobile accident in the city's history on Saturday, September 5, at 7:30 p.m. The accident took place on Kenilworth Avenue at the intersection of old Calvert Road. The operator of the striking vehicle was killed and the passengers of the struck vehicle, two little girls, ages four and one and one-half were also killed. Their father, who was opcrating the vehicle, is in serious condition. One of the causes of the accident was speeding. Investigation is still being made of the vehicles involved. A residence in the 8 Court of

Laurel Hill was entered on September 9 about 10:40 a.m. No force was used in the entry. A strongbox was removed.

A case of indecent exposure was reported in the Braden Field area. The suspect was described as a white male aged 25 or over, approximately 6', 170 lbs, with wavy reddish-brown hair, a short beard and wearing no shirt.

Another no-force entry was reported to a home on Hillside Road. Jewelry was reported stolen.

The above man is wanted for the First Degree rape and daytime breaking and entering which occurred on September 8, in the 5800 block of Cherrywood La.

Two More Rape Cases Increase Concern Here by Mavis Fletcher

Another daylight rape has increased concern about the safety of women in Greenbelt. The latest reported assault took place on September 8 in an apartment in Springhill Lake when the suspect entered the apartment through an unlocked door and forcibly raped the woman occupant. The suspect is a white male about 28 years of age. (See accompanying picture). Another white male in his 20's may have remained outside the building during the assault.

This rape case follows by one week the reported assault on a fema's employee of NASA which took place on September 1 at about 11 p.m. in a wooded area along Greenbelt Road. The woman had waited for a bus at her customary bus stop for more than an hour when she started walking to other stops. When she approached the Greenway Shopping Center area, she was grabbed from behind, her eyes and mouth were covered with masking tape and her hands were bound behind her. She was then raped. The suspect is described as a black Health and Racquetball Club to Open in City in Oct.

City Solicitor Emmett Nanna advised council about provisions of Maryland law which give propertiy owners who do not want their land annexed the right to petition for an annexation referendum. Council members expressed concern that an attempt to annex the additional properties now could jeopardize the almost-assured annexation of the Maryland Trade Center and Sunstates and Baker-Witt land.

Tax Deferrals

City Solicitor Nanna also advised council to amend the annexation agreement with the owners of the Sunstates property. As the agreement now stands, the vacant Sunstates land will be exempt from city taxation until the first building permit is issued. Nanna recommended that a tax deferral for the vacant land should in addition have a definite time limit (such as three years), with whichever event occurs first - issuance of building permit or end of time limit - triggering the start of tax payments. City Manager Giese has asked the Sunstates representative to seek a fixed time limit that would be acceptable to his clients.

Nanna further advised that the terms of tax deferral should be the same for Baker-Witt as for the Sunstates vacant land, in order to provide like treatment of these similar classes of properties as required by state annexation Council must now decide whether to back away from its previous wish to tax the Baker-Witt land from the date of annexation, or whether instead to separate Sunstates and Baker-Witt into two separate annexation procedings.

Changes to Prince Georges General Plan Proposed

A proposed General Plan for Prince Georges County will be the subject of a joint Planning Board /County Council public hearing on October 20.

A briefing on the plan will be held on September 22 from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. at the Hyattsville Library. Reference copies of the plan will be available at libraries, municipal buildings and Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission community centers.

The purpose of the proposed General Plan is to serve as a long-range policy guide, indicating generally where development may occur. The General Plan includes policies and proposals for the environment, housing, public facilities, transportation, land use and related matters. If it is adopted, it would supersede the 1964 Wedges and Corridors General Plan as it applies to the Prince Georges County portion of the Maryland-Washington Regional District. In addition, the Transportation Element of the General Plan will constitute a County-wide functional Master Plan of Transportation and supersede the present Master Plan for Highways.



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
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
