Greenbelt Voters Expected to Show Strong Vote for Richard Castaldi

Hometown candidate for the Prince Georges County Council Richard Castaldi is expected to bring out a big Democratic vote in Greenbelt on Primary Day — September 14, 1982. A native son and the city's current mayor, Castaldi must win big here in order to enhance his chances of victory.

Greenbelters are aching to capture the Fourth District council seat, for without it the City of Bowie will continue to hold a monopoly on all offices the two share. The recently adopted redistricting plan placed Greenbelt with its 18,000 residents in the same district as Bowie, populaic Central Committee hopefuls Jeanette Kimbrough Gordy, an incumbent, and City Councilman Thomas X. White, both of Greenbelt. Gordy and White are seen as favorites among a field of seven because of their slate affiliation. Patrick E. Needham of Greenbelt is running at large for the Democratic Central Committee. His opponent is Joanne L. O'Brien of the Alliance slate. Former Greenbelter Martin G.

Former Greenbelter Martin G. Madden is seeking one of two Republican Central Committee slots. Other candidates are Gloria Baumgartner, Leonard F. Bergstrom and Donald Bruce Mc-Bride.

PRIMARY - SEPT. 14

Primary Day 1982 is Tuesday, September 14. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. at Greenbelt's four polling places — Center School (third precinct); St. Hugh's School (sixth precinct); Springhill Lake School (eighth precinct); and Eleanor Roosevelt High (thirteenth precinct). The latter also includes registered voters who live in Chelsea Woods, Brae Brook Village, Goddard Space Village and Hunting Ridge. Registered in the four precincts are 7,666 persons. Democrats number 4,993, Republicans, 1705 and American Party, 2. Those declining party affiliation number 966. In Prince Georges County there are 227,735 eligible voters - 156,-592 Democrats, 49,234 Republicans, 21,877 Declines or Independents and 32 American Party.

Only Democrats and Republicans, 21,877 Declines or In spective primary elections. Those who decline to declare a party affiliation may vote only in nonpartisan elections, such as an election for a member of the Board of Education. Because incumbent Lesley Kreimer of Greenbelt faces no opposition in her bid to be returned to the Board of Education, Greenbelt's "declines" will not have an opportunity to vote on September 14.

Charlie Schwan: Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen of 1982

"Summarizing the contributions of this year's Outstanding Citizen is an impossible task," explained Labor Day Festival Outstanding Citizen Chairperson Linda Shevitz. As Shevitz began to summarize the achievements co-chair of the Greenbelt Freedom of the Press Committee, President of the GHI Board of Directors, Member of City Council — it did not take the audience long to realize the identity of this year's Outstanding Citizen. From the audience reaction, it was evident that the selection of Charles Schwan as Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen of 1982 met with enthusiastic approval.

For 30 years, Schwan has served the city of Greenbelt. He began as chairman of a committee to establish the city's Advisory Planning Board. Years of service to Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) included terms on the GHI Board of Directors and as president as well as always being a very concerned GHI member. As such he was involved in the construction of the GHI larger homes in the North End, the rehabilitation of GHI homes and in relocating Roosevelt High School to its present location.

When the News Review was sued by a local developer Schwan became co-chair of the Freedom of the Press Committee. The efforts of this committee were rewarded when the newspaper won its appeal before the United States Supreme Court.

From 1971 to 1981 Schwan served as an elected member of City Council. This position was one that put him in the forefront of every major issue affecting the city. "He has never shirked controversy or hedged on an issue for political or personal reasons. His decisions have always come from deep personal convictions and regard for the best interests of the community," testify those who nominated Schwan for the award. They add, "Even though one may not always agree with him. one never doubts that his motives are entirely selfless."

is a person of integrity, commitment and dedication—and also a person of honor, wit and compassion."

Wit and humor were readily apparent when Schwan accepted the award with. "Well, I get to say a few words." Schwan confessed that he was "not entirely su-prised because Gil Weldenfeld gave me some cockamamie story about why I should be here." Reflecting that he had received many honors since retiring from City Council, Schwan drew this moral. "Desert the ship."

Becoming serious, Schwan said, "It is a great honor especially in this community where service to one's fellows is prized so highly and undertaken by so many." Schwan told the News Review, "There's no question that it's a great honor." To be nominated, he feels, is even more of an honor. Nominated by Greenbelt citizens, the Outstanding Citizen is chosen by a panel of judges rep-resenting different geographical regions of the city. The Outstanding Citizen received a \$100 bond from the Bell System Telephone Company, a dish garden from Beltway Florist, a Greenbelt is Great t-shirt from the Greenbelt Nursery School, an engraved plaque and a proclamation from Governor Harry Hughes' office. Council Schedules New Public Hearing on Honoring Roosevelt

At its work session of August 30, the City Council again dealt with proposals to commemorate Franklin D. Roosevelt and Albert S. Attick by naming city facilities in their honor . Council noted the lack of consensus among the citizens attending the Public Hearing held on August 23. At that time a wide variety of proposals were received for commemorating the two men who played significant roles in Greenbelt history.

Council reached tentative agreement at the work session to rename Greenbelt Lake Park in

honor of Buddy Attick. The members indicated the need to commemorate the many years of service to the City given by the former Public Works Director and noted that no other suitable proposals had been made. Staff was directed to prepare an appropriate resolution to rename the park. The selection of a facility for Roosevelt proved more difficult. Council noted the Roosevelt Commemoration Committee's support for renaming Greenbelt Lake in honor of Roosevelt. While not ruling out this proposal, Council members expressed the belief that naming the lake for Roosevelt while naming the park for Attick tended to take away from the honor given to either of the men. Three other proposals for honoring Roosevelt were then put forth and considered by Council. 1. Rename North End School. The City expects transfer of this property to the City this fall. The school will become the largest city-owned public building. It was originally built during the Roosevelt Administration. Since it will

no longer be a school, it will need a new name; it could be called the Franklin D. Roosevelt Community Center. While a dedication could not be made at this time, an announcement of the City plans could be done with an appropriate ceremony undertaken at an appropriate time after the City converts the school to other uses.

2. Name the center area. One of the significant features of the Greenbelt Plan was the clustering of business, civic, educational and recreational facilities in the center of the planned community

This proposal gives recognition to the great interest Roosevelt had in swimming for exercise and recreation. The swimming pool is one of the original recreation facilities and remains today much as it was when originally built, with the exception of the diving pool which was added in 1965.

Council members then decided to have another public hearing to hear further citizen comments on the three new proposals for Roosevelt, as well as any further comments on the proposal to name Greenbelt Lake in his honor. The public hearing will be scheduled for the same evening as the next regular Council meeting, September 20, and will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the Council Room of the Municipal Building. Council anticipates taking final action at the regular meeting.



Council Tidbits

At its last two regular City Council meetings council accepted several advisory board reports which deal with current Greenbelt topics of interest. At the August 9 meeting a Park and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB) report on land acquisition and an Advisory Planning Board (APB) report on North End School Adaptive Reuse were accepted.

At the July 19 meeting another PRAB report noting unsightly pipeline vents at the Lake Park was considered. The vents are related to the WSSC ninety-sixinch water main. Giese reported that WSSC work is not completed and should include plant-ings around the vents. Mayor Richard Castaldi suggested berms might be used also. Councilman Gil Weidenfeld agreed with the criticism. "We ought to go on record right now," he said. Accordingly, council moved to express its concern and hope that the vents would be adequately screened.

Council approved the bylaws of the new Greenbelt Crime Prevention Committee. The committee had sent a recommendation that funds be budgeted to purchase audio-visual equipment for the Police Department in its crime prevention program. Council, in turn, authorized the city manager to purchase the equipment.

Council passed an ordinance providing for a \$25 fine for violation of handicapped parking regulations. First reading was given to two resolutions—one for purchase of radios and another to provide for increased landfill costs.

Personnel Matters

Turning to personnel matters at the August 9 meeting, council declined to act at this time on a request from the Greenbelt Fraternal Order of Police to be officially recognized as the sole representative organization of the rank and file of the Greenbelt Police Department and as the sole spokesman for the rank and file in matters of concern to the city and the membership.

It was explained to Daniel P. O'Neil, Vice-President of F.O.P. Lodge 32, that it would be necessary to consult with the city solleitor prior to taking such action in order to avoid any danger of setting a precedent in dealing with possible future employee organizations which might seek to

A breaking and entering took place on the night of Sept. 4 in the 9100 block of Springhill Lane. Entry was gained by breaking out a window of the master bedroom.


A few hours later on the same night another breaking and entering occurred in the 9300 block of Edmonston Road where entry was made through a sliding glass door.


Greenbelter Liz Phelps, a sophomore at Ohio Wesleyan University, recently completed a recordshattering track and field season for the state-champion "Battling Bishops."

Phelps finished second at the NCAA Division III Championships in the grueling seven-event heptathalon. She amassed a school record 4486 points in the event and in the process broke her own school high jump record with a 5-5 effort. She also broke Ohio Wesleyan records in the 100meter low hurdles and the 400meter intermediate hurdles with respective times of 15.4 seconds and 69.3 seconds.

Phelps won the Division III state heptathalon title as well, raking up 4107 points. She also was second in the high jump (5-4), third in the 100-meter low hurdles (15.4) and third in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles (69.6).

The heptathalon consists of seven events: the 100-meter low hurdles, high jump, javelin, long jump, shot put, 200-meter dash and 800-meter run.

WITT THE ROOM TO TRANSFER

by Sandy Smith A new contract to complete the vinyl siding on the frame homes was approved at the August 26 meeting of the Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. Mead Aluminum and Vinyl Pro-ducts was selected from the four vinyl siding companies which submitted bids for the job. Mead is the contractor for the on-going gutter replacement work, another part of the rehab pro-gram. More requests for exemptions from the rehab program, an appeal for ex-emption from fence regulations, and other rehab-related items completed the agenda.


Vinyl Siding The completion of the siding work by Mead Aluminum and Vinyl Products will be performed for a cost not to exceed \$431,000. The contract calls for this work to be completed by the end of this December; however, the contractor expects to finish a month earlier. Mead has agreed to side the additions for which members have signed contracts at a price comparable to the one agreed to with Beltway Aluminum. There is also a separate one-year letter of agreement for any corrective work to be executed at a set price for labor and materials


Directors Mark Dombrowski, Janet Cantwell, Frank Gervasi and Margaret Hogensen wanted to know how many companies had been contacted and felt that the final number of companies did not offer much choice. Assistant General Manager-GHIDC, Gary Morningstar, said that 12 companies had been contacted-the original list developed from the Yellow Pages or from recommendations, and that there was a need to resume the siding work as soon as possible.

Exemptions

As has been the case for many of the recent board meetings, a number of members presented requests for exemptions to the rehab program. The first was the raised the issue of the kind of substances Abramowitz kept in his unit and if they required such special handling that they might be a hazard and not appropriate to keep in a GHI unit. Cantwell and Hogensen tried to find a way that Abramowitz could keep current windows and replace on re-Director Wayne Williams sale said that there was policy and that it should be followed-new windows or storm windows. Ultimately this request for exemption to the window replacement was defeated with Directors Jenkins, Gervasi, Williams, Smith and John Lewis voting against. A request from members in

two adjacent units to keep their current heating system was quickly defeated by the Board. In this instance the Board had not received a technical proposal indicating how these members would maintain their boiler.





Utopia Theatre Plans Classic Film Series

The Greenbelt Cultural Arts Center's Film Committee has been planning a film series for the Utopia Theatre which, pending the securing of sponsors and a substantial number of film club members, would commence in November and run roughly once per month through August 1983.

The Committee has taken a market study which surveyed residents of New Carrollton, Silver Spring, Landover, Laurel and Greenbelt. The study was prepared by Dik Cripe and showed that Thursday evening was the most desired time for films. with Sunday afternoon the second most popular time. Most likely, the series would consist of films beginning on Thursday evenings and running through the weekend, concluding on Sunday afternoon. The most popular films were musicals, comedies and adventures. In terms of the era of films most desired, classics from the 1930's through the 1960's showed up highest. The committee is planning a series which would incorporate those interests. Consequently, the series would feature well-known artists such as Henry Fonda, Peter Sellers, Alfred Hithcock, Woody Allen, Alec Guinness and musicals such as "Oklahoma."

The Committee is determining the hypothetial schedule and will also be negotiating with film distributors from whom the films will be rented. Bill Cornett and Konrad Herling have met in an initial session with Films, Incorporated. Followups with other members of the Committee will be occurring in the near future.

Two essential elements to making this project possible will be securing business sponsors and the formation of a film club whose members would help subsidize such a series. The establishment of a film club, in which one could buy a series of films for less than it would cost to buy one ticket at a time at the door. Such theatre programs, such as those at the Biograph and the Kennedy Center's American Film Institute rely heavily on funding from club members.

The Arts Center now has, through City Council funding, new equipment which will enable resident viewers to enjoy this potential series. The Center has a new projector and a new screen (when the Arts Center began programming three years ago, there was no screen nor a projector) and




