Castaldi Wins Sweet Victory

In a surprise and stunning victory, Greenbelt Mayor Richard Castaldi trounced his opponents and captured the Democratic nomination for the Fourth Councilmanic District seat. A win for Castaldi was considered almost impossible because the recently adopted redistricting plan placed Greenbelt with its 17,000 residents in the same district as Bowie, population about 34,000. In November Castaldi will Cace Republican Kenneth Powell in the general election.

An elated Castaldi told the News Review "It was a community victory which extended from Greenbelt through the Lanham-Seabrook-Glenn Dale area and on to Bowie, I shall do my best to justify the confidence shown in me and work hard to unite the entire district."

Castaldi swept Greenbelt, taking 79% of the Democratic vote. District-wide he received 41% and chalked up impressive tallies in nearby precincts in Berwyn and Lanham (see charts). The key to his victory was the bigger voter turnout in Greenbelt and its environs than in Bowie. In these areas Castaldl and his supporters concentrated their efforts. Targeted also was Bowie's Pointer Ridge area.

Among the Democratic Central Committee candidates for the 23rd District, Councilman Thomas X. White copped top vote with 1,184 and incumbent Jeanette Gordy came in second with 725 in Greenbelt. Districtwide they were first and second respectively. Greenbelter Patrick Needham lost to member Joanne O'Brien in the at-large race, 530 votes to 881 in

Greenbelt voters split fairly evenly among the four candidates for Delegate. High vote went to Joan Pitkin, followed by Gerard Devlin, James Hubbard and Charles Ryan in that order. Districtwide the winners were Pitkin, pevlin and Ryan, who will be challenged in November by Republicans.

There were no surprises in either party's governor races. The team of Harry Democratic Hughes and J. Joseph Curran, Jr. will oppose Republicans Robert A. Pascal and Newton I. Steers, Jr. in November.

Incumbent Democrats Paul Sar-

their opponents. Sarbanes will engage in battle with Republican county executive Lawrence Hogan for the United States Senate seat while Hoyer duels with Republican William P. Guthrie for the congressional slot.

Parris Glendening had no trouble winning the Democratic bid for county executive. He will be in a face-off with Republican Ann Shoch.

Because many offices were uncontested in the Republican primary, the turnout was light. In Greenbelt only 30% of the eligible voters cast votes (see charts on page 8.).

County Acts to Transfer North End School to City

County Executive Lawrence J. Hogan on September 7 transmitted to the county council a resolution which would authorize him to transfer the closed Greenbelt North End Elementary School to the City of Greenbelt.

"The city has developed plans for use of this property and obviously I am gratified that, through this transfer, we will achieve a future use that is compatible with the community and which will fulfill the city's needs," Hogan said.

Greenbelt's Mayor Richard Castaldi and the city council sub-mitted to Hogan a request for transfer of the school to the city earlier this year. "I am most grateful that the County Executive has agreed to the transfer of the building to the city at a nom-inal cost," Castaldi told county officials, adding that possession of the property by the city would enable it to carry out its plan for accommodating certain recreational and community services at the school.

As provided in the resolution Hogan forwarded to the county council, the property's transfer to the city will be contingent on release of the school by U.S. District Court in Baltimore, which is expected to render a decision soon in the NAACP busing suit. It also will be contingent on approval by the State Interagency Committee on School Construction and the State Board of Public Works, which is customary in all transfers of closed schools.

A native of Plymouth, Mass., Mrs. Baldovin moved to Greenbelt in 1945, where she became active in church and community affairs. A member of St. Hugh's Catholic Church, she served as Prefect of the Ladies Sodality, as a member of the Ladies of Charity, and was a member of the Retreat Committee. She also served in wider Catholic circles as a member of the Washington Archdiocese Council of Catholic Women and its Sodality Union.

Mrs. Baldwin had worked for the federal government in Boston before coming to this area. After coming to Washington she held a position as correspondence clerk for the Treasury Department until her retirement in the mid-1960's. She remained active in Democratic circles as a member of the Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt Democratic Club and as chief election judge at the North End precinct, where she was noted for the efficiency and careful attention to regulations with which the elections were conducted. She was also a member of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad.

Her late husband, John A. Baldovin, died in the early 1940's. Survivors include her daughter, Judy Boone of Greenbelt, three grandchildren, and two brothers, Walter R. (Bud) Dean of Leesburg, Florida, formerly of Greenbelt, and Paul F. Dean, Sr. of Silver Spring.



"Kaleidoscope" Opens In Greenbelt Recreation Review

Cliff Smith has put together a darn good musical revue. But hardly anybody knows it.

Some top-notch talents opened their throats, kicked up their heels and made a few people laugh, love and feel last weekend at the Greenbelt Cultural Arts Center. Only

"Kaleidoscope," Smith's creation, smacks of professionalism, Among the performers there are some superb voices attached to bodies which really know how to dance. This revue was put together quickly, making use of the vocal styles and talents that became available to Smith after the company had been selected, and the hand tailored quality is ob-

To suit the talents available to him, Smith had to change his original idea-a presentation of the evolution of the blues. When he realized his company didn't have enough singers in the right style, he convinced musical director Sally Hershey that they could "take the talent we have and make a revue of it."

"I pulled out some songs I liked and some they liked," Smith says. The disadvantage to this method is that continuity may suffer, "I wanted very much to have something that flowed," Smith says.

Surprisingly, it does.


Dividing his potpourri into two sections, songs with a country theme and those with an urban flavor, Smith gives us humor, pathos, aspirations, disappointments, wit. The songs and dance routines are not always obviously connected. But the comfortable flow from one to the next somehow survives.

Choreographers Rita Criggar, Jill Kaufman and Porter Koontz have come up with some lively stylistically appropriate dance numbers guaranteed not to bore you. Even the costumes are fun to look at.

Using individual abilities to best advantage creates not just a quality production but piques audience interest so that what could have been a mere medley of tunes becomes a parade of personalities as well. Betty Xander's marvelous ability to mimic and spoof balances well with the sparkling strong voices of Porter Koontz and Michelle Rios, who together do a sensitive rendition of "Tonight" and individually lend their intensities to some powerful num-

bers. Ken Jackson's witty presentations leave the audience hoping he'll come back to do more. Rita Criggar and Helene Davis, superbly versatile in their abilities to sing and dance, will make you smile with pleasure. Not everyone in the company has professional flair, but so many do that this should be hailed as a delightful moment for the Green-

Sally Hershey's nimble fingers



on the keyboard and the "just right" lighting truly set the stage for an evening of good entertain-

Smith, an old hand at directing ("Grease," "Cabaret," "Equus" and many other shows) was hospitalized during the last week of preparation when rehearsals were most intense. Koontz, Assistant Director, took over and enriched the show with his input.

Would Smith like to create another revue? "I would love to,' he says, "but not in Greenbelt. There are so few people in the audi-ence." It is "demoralizing" for the performers, he explains, to open to a nearly empty house.

Looking for some good entertainment? "Kaleidoscope" will be playing Sept. 18, 24, 25 and 26.



Carol Pelosi: Crossbow Advocate, World Champion, Humanitarian

In March of 1973, an intrigued Greenbelt resident observed people brandishing bows and arrows going to and from the Greenbelt Sports Center. Gilbert Frey, crossbow enthusiast extraordiniaire, saw the young civil service employee and in a rare twist of fate held out his crossbow and said "Here, let's see you try this."

Carol Pelosi did, and with Frey at the helm she has won award after award, breaking one record after another while storming the ranks of crossbows to become the most dominant figure the sport has ever known, William Tell a-

siae.

Carol is a seven year resident of Greenbriar. She currently serves as vice president of the Bowie S.P.C.A. and newsletter editor. Talk to Carol Pelosi and she would rather talk about humane treatment for animals than her incredible odyssey which crowns her queen of the crossbowing elite. Long overdue, her recognition for both achievements remains dulled, even today.

In the past, Carol appeared on "To Tell the Truth.", Although she didn't stump Kitty Carlisle, the nation glimpsed her remarkable marksmanship. So consistent has she been, that "That's Incredible" TV show asked Carol to reproduce the age old adage William Tell and impale an apple from atop someone's head. Carol personifies her refusal of national fame, explaining that at various shows and exhibitions a volunteer is asked to brave such a feat. Sure enough someone "always volunteers." Carol insists, though, on one practice shot using "a dummy." Instantly the arrow soars, imbedding "right between the eyes." "That usually brings them around," Carol quips.

Carol Pelosi demands respect for her sport in more positive ways. Representing the United States in the first World Crossbow Championship held on July 3 in Mikbeli, Finland, she convincingly took home the Women's World Crossbow championship. Four days later she won an International tournament at Harnsand, Sweden. Prior to these competitions she has won a staggering total of seventeen national titles, sixteen consecutively. She set new records in the Quadruple International Round competitions held with the nationals in August, 1978. She has to her credit five successful efforts in the special six arrow King and Queen competition held each year at the N.A.A. Nationals. She is the only person, man or woman, to shoot a perfect bullseye in international finals competition. The list seems endless, yet in the Carol Pelosi story, it is only the beginning. The Crossbow

For those not familiar with the crossbow, it was the type used by William Tell to shoot an apple from his son's head. The bow parts are mounted on a wood stock which is likened to a large rifle stock. The bow is aimed like a rifle at ten ring targets up to 71 yards away.

Carol takes a unique, relaxed approach despite the tension usually bred by the requirement of pinpoint accuracy. It is her opinion that the results she achieves are simply not important. She enjoys the sport, and the excitement that surrounds national and international competition. Unlike many world champions, Carol is friendly and easy to approach.

Like a true champion with a cause, she fights for the rights of animals. If anyone could put the word humane back in humanity, with her dedication and modesty, Carol Pelosi could. She tirelessly edits edition after edi-

letter "Heads and Tails," enlighttion of the Bowie S.P.C.A. Newsening darkened attitudes, hoping to bring relative justice and interest to a closet subject. She organizes demonstrations and affirmative action meetings, matching in public the spirit she compels in private.

A "Senior Citizen Identity Card" is available for those over age 60 from the Prince Georges Department of Services and Programs for the Aged. With this free card comes a list of stores and other services that give discounts to caru holders. In addition, the card identifies you as a SC even if you look a lot younger. For a payment of \$2.50 SC's will receive a monthnewspaper "Senior Citizen." which lists events for SC's and activities in which they can particpate. 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


