County School System to Have Many Changes in Programs, Procedures, Costs

Schools in Prince Georges County will open Monday, August 29 for approximately 108,000 students (down about 2,000 from last year). Mathematics will receive special emphasis in the 1983-84 school year. The Board of Education has implemented several new initiatives to ensure student mastery of at least functional math skills, to provide opportunity for more advanced work in theoretical and analytical math and to improve student performance on the Maryland Functional Math test. (Pre-liminary testing of last year's ninth graders produced relatively low scores.) Passing the test will be a requirement for high school graduation for those students who begin ninth grade this year (graduating class of 1987).

The Board also increased math credit requirements for high school graduation from 2 to 3, starting with the ninth grade class. Those who plan to attend college are encouraged to take 4 math credits. The Board also recommends that all high school students take one semester in computer literacy or introduction to data processing or a full year in computer mathematics. Also approved was instruction in computer literacy in elementary and secondary schools on a partial basis as equipment permits. The Board has undertaken long-range planning for extra Math teachers.

Registration

State law requires school attendance by every child between the ages of 6 and 16. Those who will be five before January 1, 1984 may attend kindergarten. Parents of students new to the school system who have not pre-registered should bring their child's birth certificate, proof of residence in Prince Georges County (deed, rental contract), record of immunization and the child's last report card if entering first grade or above.

Lunch prices will be the same as last year: 90c for lunch; 40c, reduced lunch; 55c, breakfast; 30c, reduced breakfast and 25c for milk for elementary pupils. Lunch for secondary school stu-dents will be 95c and breakfast

Activity Fee

New this school year is an activity fee of \$5.00 to be charged to all students in grades seven through twelve who want to participate in athletics or other extra-curricular activities. The onetime charge per student is transferrable for students who are reassigned to a new school during the school year. All cards are to be renewed each school year. Students who are registered for the free or reduced lunch program

card at no charge. Students who participate in activities related to a regular class assignment, such as instrumental music students who participate in band, are not required to purchase a card unless they plan to participate in other extra-curricular activities.

Although 20 credits are required to graduate from high school, new graduation requirements for this year's ninth graders increase required credits from 12 to 14 by adding one math and one social studies course. Also one semester of typing is highly recommended for all. College-bound students are urged to add one credit in science and two in foreign languages, leaving only three elective courses.

One change made by the Board affects all high school students (including ninth graders). All students are prohibited from taking courses not consistent with their ability or achievement level. Students will be able to select up but not down in the level of courses.

The Primary Project, which uses the multisensory teaching techniques originally developed under the Specific Language/Reading Development (SL (RD) program, has now been extended to all kindergarten, first and second grades. This specialized teaching involves students in daily letter and sound drills, dictation and sound blending. Additionally it emphasizes the reading of classical children's literature to students and the reinforcement each day of vocabulary words.

The Board of Education has implemented strict policies concerning the expulsion of secondary students involved in the possession or use of weapons, drugs and alcohol. According to the code of Student Conduct, students will be expelled for the first offense involving the use of or possession of weapons. For incidents involving drugs or alcohol the student will be expelled for the first offense involving distribution and the second offense involving possession. Most of these stu-dents are not eligible for readmission to the Prince Georges County school system. Students who are readmitted must remain expelled for at least the remainder of the semester in which the incident occurred and the following full semester. They must also present documentation of satisfactory participation in an alco-hol/drug treatment program.

Speakers Seek Preservation Of Greenbelt Center School

Politicians, historians, community leaders, and concerned Greenbelt citizens firmly stated their positions on the plans for demolishing Center School at the public hearing held by the Prince Georges County Board of Education on August 15. The majority of speakers favored the preservation of the school, one of the best ex-amples of Art Deco architecture in the country.

The Superintendent's proposed Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for the Funding Years 1985-1989 calls for the original building to be demolished and the integration and renovation of the 1968 addition into a new facility. The project would be completed in 1989 at a cost of \$5,-271,000.

Assistant Superintendent Edward M. Felegy, in a slide presentation explaining the CIP, noted that Center School has building code violations and is not well adapted to the needs of handicapped students. Stating that there is a need for an updated facility, he recognized the historic and artistic qualicies of the school. He assured listeners that though the CIP spoke of demolition, the board members did not favor this approach. They would first like to consult with an architect and believe parts of the old building could be pre-

Congressman Steny H. Hoyer and County Executive Parris Glendening stated their positions for preservation of the school via letters read at the hearing. Senator Paul S. Sarbanes and State Senator Leo Green also sent letters, not read that evening. Sarbanes strongly urged that all possible alternatives be considered. Green stressed the school's historical importance.

Delegate Gerard Devlin spoke eloquently on the issue, calling the CIP's approach to the prob-"unimaginative and uncreative." He described the school as "part of the Americana of the 1930's," and stated that "education is far more than bricks and mortar." He saw the possibility for interior modernization.

County Councilman Richard Castaldi, a Greenbelt resident and former pupil at Center School, expressed his awareness of the need for renovation but spoke in favor of preserving the building's historical aspects. He stressed that both cultural and academic points of view must not be forgotten.

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld expressed his appreciation for Super-

The next step is for the State Interagency Committee to review the proposals.

intendent Feeney's willingness to work with Greenbelt on the issue of Center School. He came out in favor of preserving the exterior while modernizing the interior and informed the Board that the Greenbelt City Council recommended an architectural evaluation as the first step. Councilman Ed Putens proposed an ad hoc committee of citizens, Board of Education members, and members of historical and art societies to reach an amicable agreement on plans for the school.

Historians Speak Richard Striner, Ph.D. in American History and President of the Art Deco Society of Washington (ADSW), made a strong case for preserving the entire See ART DECO, p. 5, col. 1

Fifth grade will be staffed by Carol Lubetzky (5/6 last year) and newcomers Myla Bastin (previously at Woodley Knoll) and Deidre O'Connor - Montefione (from Skyline).

Sara Sutton returns to 6th grade, along with Marcia Marino (4/5 last year) and Donna Sturgill (arriving from Woodmore).

Pat Green, who previously taught 6th grade at Bladensburg Elementary, will be Center's Ele-mentary Instructional Administrative Specialist. The new reading teacher will be Bernice Bloom, who was at Glenarden Woods last year, and Mary Rosewag is the new speech therapist. Diane Jordan returns after a year's absence as instrumental music teacher. Lillian Datcher comes to Center as a Chapter 1 aide and Nancy Addison will teach physical education part-time. Barbara Weeks will be Center's Resource teacher (the position Peg Rudd had last year).

Weeks formerly taught a self-contained resource class at Center. Although that class has been transferred to Glen Ridge, Center School remains part of a State Department of Education learning disabled project designed to look carefully at identification of children who have learning disabilities and to seek more effec-tive ways of identifying these students.

Also gone from Center is the program for the hearing-impaired. This program will be housed this year in the Springhill Lake diagnostic wing.

The First Day

On Monday students are to as-semble on the blacktop according to grade. Teachers will take their classes from there. In case of rain, students should assemble in the gym. Afternoon kindergarten classes should arrive about 12:25 at the back door nearest to the Youth Center. School will start at ten of 9 the same as last year and dismiss at 3 p.m. Van Schoonhoven asks that walkers not arrive before 8:45 a.m.

A hot lunch will be available the first day but breakfast will not be served until the following morning. A bulletin will be sent home with each child Monday giving general information to par-

There will be a mid-day bus for kindergarten children only. Morning pupils will be delivered to North End School about 11:40 a.m. and afternoon pupils will be picked up at North End at 12:20 p.m. Kindergarten children will be expected to walk at the times the other school children are walking. Buses will also come from Greenbriar/Glen Oaks and Washington Heights.

Programs Along with Center's major thrust on mathematics, Van Schoonhoven plans to continue the use of computers to teach computer literacy. The school now has a dozen computers and Van Schoonhoven hopes to see computers available to more of the

lower grades.

The assertive discipline program, under which positive behavior is rewarded and consequences are set for inappropriate behavior, will again be used. Van Schoonhoven hopes to have materials this year on this program to distribute to parents.

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

building which he stated was "a classic example of streamlined Art Deco" and "architecturally the heart and soul of its community." He informed the Board that ADSW has already initiated steps to have the school declared a Prince Georges County Historical Site, protected under county law. The efforts of the Society have received the support of both Parris Glendening and Steny Hoyer, said Striner. The position of ADSW is that, at the very least, the exterior walls of the school must remain absolutely inviolate.

Alan Virta, chairman of the Prince Georges County Historic Preservation Committee, urged the preservation of Center School, calling it "a national treasure." He conceded that, by modern standards, the building has its flaws, but felt they are remediable. Said Virta, "We should not destroy it simply because it is old and in need of repair."

A letter from James M. Goode, Keeper of the Smithsonian Building, was read by Striner. Goode noted: "In addition to the outstanding value of the building itself, the destruction of this school would seriously damage the overall integrity of the master plan of Greenbelt."

Joyce McDonald of the County Historical and Cultural Trust favored an addition to the school and the preservation of the interior.

The Dean of the University of Maryland School of Architecture, John Ames Steffian, expressed his position by letter and said "the loss of the building would constitute a tragedy, both for the legacy of the 1930's design and for the history of urban planning in America." James Flack, a historian at the University of Maryland speaking as an individual, said the school building exemplified the progressive thinking that typifies Greenbelt.

Greenbelt community figures addressed themselves to the Center School issue. Konrad Herling, President of the Greenbelt Cultural Arts Center, favored the preservation of the school. President of the Greenbelt Center Elementary School PTA Leta Mach stated that the school, "while a fine building with a personaity all its own, is really not adequate for education today." While admitting the beauty of the building, she asked only for preservation of the front wall and its incorporation into a better structure.

Greenbelters Jim Beane and Eileen Peterson asked for exterior preservation and interior modernization, and former Greenbelter Elizabeth Allen, librarian in charge of the Tugwell Room at the Greenbelt library, said that to demolish the school would be to deny the history of Greenbelt. Of greater concern to Donald Wirick was the low pay teachers in the county receive. He would not like to see the school rebuilt until the county's educational standards have been brought up to those of other county schools in the surrounding areas.

Driver Education

The county school system's Driver Education program will hold its fall registration from Aug. 31 through Sept. 9. Registration is for programs beginning in September, October, November or December. Forms may be obtained at any county high school by persons between the ages of 15 and 18.

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
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
