City Sets Hearing on Capital Improvements Wish List for Possible 1985 Bond Issue

Better and more ball fields at Braden and Northway Fields. Widening of Hanover Parkway at Mandan Road. More parkland. A salt storage dome. Bike trails. New or enlarged police station. Enlarged office area for administration. Renovation of streets in old Lakeside. Attick (Lake) Park improvements. Swimming pool improvements. Indoor pool. New parks maintenance building. Improved animal compound. Renovation of North End Center.

The city council will hold a public hearing on Oct. 29 to consider the above list of major capital needs which could more appropriately be financed through a bond issue than in the city's annual budget. The hearing is designed to give citizens a chance to comment on particular items on the list—which projects look attractive, which should be postponed or scrapped, and whether additional ideas the council and staff haven't thought of yet should be added. The advantage of a bond issue as a means of financing major capital improvements is that the tax burden is spread over a number of years and, therefore, over a number of taxpayers.

Later this winter voters will get to turn thumbs up or down on a more finely tuned, and council hopes acceptable, bond issue package at a referendum.

In the last capital improvements bond issue which voters approved in 1969, the city sold \$950,000 worth of bonds. Taxpayers received double their money in return as the city financed well over \$2,000,000 worth of land and buildings and other projects from the bond issue with the help of added monies in grants from federal and state governments. The 1969 bond issue monies have now run out.

Council has been seriously interested in another bond issue since June 1979 when it held an all day work session to review a staff wish list. But during the intervening five years, the bond market and other factors declined to cooperate. Now this fall the bond issue is again on the front burner. The old 1979 list of likely projects has been reviewed and updated. Some items have been largely completed or are now funded in other ways—through community block grants, for example—and have been dropped from the list. These include GHI neighborhood street and sidewalk reconstruction, resurfacing of other city streets, and limited city bus service.

Some ideas are new: an enlarged or new police station to house an expanding force (and at the same time take care of the need for increased office space

for administrative services). Ideas range from using a portion of the North End Center to construction of a new building between the fire department and St. Hugh's rectory.

North End Center

One of the larger projects is renovation of the North End Center. Here there are many ideas to be looked at. The city would like the now vacant school building open for some limited use as quickly as possible, but a major problem—a broken heating plant—must be corrected first.

One means of cutting potential renovation and later operating costs appears to be razing the original wing of the center. According to the city manager, the older section has sustained the most internal damage from water leaks and would be the most inefficient to heat. At the same time, however, it has the nicest amenities. The recreation department would like to see an exercise/gymnastics wing added to the Youth Center, but perhaps appropriate space could be found in the North End Center. Another possibility is construction of an indoor pool with shower and changing areas provided in the existing building. Several groups have expressed interest in renting one or more rooms, for example, for child care.

"An unlimited amount of money could be poured into the building," cautioned Mayor Gil Weidenfeld at council's most recent work session on the bond issue held in July. "There is a limit to the money we can spend here."

Updated old ideas include improving ballfields and extending the planned perimeter trail for

pedestrians and bicyclists. The lake park trail is heavily used. Braden field needs to be reconstructed to improve drainage and new turf established. A field layout study could alter existing layout. Other items around Braden field would be considered also—improved pedestrian and separate vehicular access, a new multi-purpose court with rebound wall for tennis and handball.

Northway Ballfields

The Northway ball field is partially developed. If more land can be acquired from the county, additional fields could be constructed for football, soccer, baseball and softball. Paving the road and constructing a pedestrian walkway, restroom, storage, picnic shelter, announcer's booth and lights are also possibilities.

The additional land could also provide a site for a parks-maintenance building, possibly including a salt dome, and a linking section of the city's planned perimeter trail. The city is currently working on a hiker-biker trail plan for the entire city. The separate paths include the perimeter trail mentioned above, a bike path from Greenbelt Center to Springhill Lake, and the extension of the Lakewood path to the perimeter trail.

Several improvements have been suggested for the Attick (Lake) Park, including improved toilet facilities, a picnic shelter providing for between 10 and 20 tables to be placed under a roof in inclement weather, a storage area, an improved stage, and possibly a barbeque pit. Work also needs to be done on the shoreline, dam, stream channel, and spillway.

"Sister City" Group Plans New Mailing and Public Forum

The Greenbelt-Rezekne Exchange Project invites Greenbelt residents to contribute to a second mailing to our "sister city" of Rezekne, Latvia, U.S.S.R. The co-ordinating committee for the exchange project is planning to send the second package on Thanksgiving. They will be collecting post cards, photographs, or pictures with a one or two sentence message on the back, directed to the Mayor of Rezekne. The theme for this mailing will be "Thanksgiving in Greenbelt."

Because the "sister city" project is meant to be a vehicle for individuals from different societies to learn more about the values that all share, messages should be non-political. Contributions may be left in specially designated boxes in the Greenbelt Co-op grocery or downstairs in the Greenbelt Library.

It has been six months since Greenbelt mailed its invitation to Rezekne to join with Greenbelt as a "sister city." In addition to the official invitation to Rezekne from the Greenbelt City Council, the original mailing included letters from Greenbelt organizations and individuals depicting life in Greenbelt and expressing hopes for establishing new avenues for people to work together towards building a more peaceful planet. A copy of the original mailing is available for viewing in the Tugwell Room in Greenbelt Library.

Despite six months of silence from Rezekne, the Greenbelt-Rezekne Exchange Project's co-ordinating committee remains hopeful of a positive response

from Rezekne. The committee has been advised by Soviet experts that the present status of U.S.-Soviet relations makes likely a long wait for a response. Dr. C. Grant Pendill, Deputy Director of the American Committee on East-West Accord, who has agreed to use his resources to stimulate a response from Rezekne, suggests "persistence and creative patience."

Public Forum

Meanwhile, the Greenbelt-Rezekne-Exchange Project will be co-sponsoring a public forum at Greenbelt Library on "Impressions and Conversations—Traveling in the Soviet Union." The meeting will be held in the large meeting room on October 23 at 7:30 p.m. Sylvia Eastman, Russian language student, and Florence Widutis, participant in the Volga Peace Cruise, will share some of their experiences and conversations with Soviet people during recent tours in the Soviet Union. A more comprehensive update on the status of the exchange project will be included in the agenda.

Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative Member News

University of Maryland Price Comparison

Another local price comparison has been done and once again the Greenbelt Cooperative has proven to be very competitive. This survey began with information gathered by Diamondback reporters C.M. Crowley and John Springer. The University of Maryland report used 23 common grocery items and priced each at four area stores: Jumbo, a food discount store in Hyattsville, Giant, the A&P in Beltway Plaza, and the Safeway in Greenway Center. Jumbo came in with the lowest total of \$40.96; then came Giant where the total cost was \$44.55, the A&P with \$45.54 and finally Safeway with \$45.75.

The items listed in the Diamondback survey were later priced at the Co-op. The total cost of \$43.15 was lower than the total cost at the other three stores in the immediate area.
