Storer Cable Opens New Headquarters

Several hundred county residents and governmental officials on October 3 attended the official dedication of the new Storer Cable head-quarters on Annapolis Road in Lanham. The occasion was marked by ribbon cutting ceremonies, tours of the \$1.5 million facility and a press conference. Guests also enjoyed a bountiful buffet.

The two-story, 20,000 square-foot beige brick building houses Storer's administrative, sales and technical staff, a local origination studio and headend satellite receiver. Outside the building, the huge dish provided a backdrop for official picture-taking, and a fleet of 40 Storer trucks lined the street.

D. Wayne Rankin, Storer's system manager, said, ". . . This facility will help to provide our Prince Georges County subscribers with the best, most technically advanced cable services available."

When the system is complete at the end of this year, Storer Cable Communications of Maryland, Inc., will serve 19 municipalities and that portion of the county in the northern franchise area. A 915-mile, dual cable Home Subscriber Network, the system now covers 800 miles and has a capacity of 108 video channels that are transmitted from the headend to subscribers. Eight channels are also available from subscriber locations, such as municipal buildings, senior citizen homes, and Storer studios, to the headend.

Storer's cable system includes a separate, two-way 100-mile Institutional Communications Network which serves and interconnects schools, libraries, Federal, State and local government offices and commercial users. This network has video, audio and data-carrying capabilities in both directions and insures privacy. Moreover, the Institutional Netsee STORER CABLE, pg. 5, c. 3

Major issues covered at the Oct. 3 press conference at the opening of the new Storer headquarters were the status of Storer's sale, concern about the recent raise in subscriber rates, and the benefits that Storer provides to subscribers, and governmental bodies.

In November 1983, former County Executive Winfield Kelly, Jr., vice president of Storer Communications of Prince Georges County and Storer Cable Communications of Maryland, announced that he and a group of local investors would make a public offering of a limited partnership to purchase franchises held by Storer in northern Prince Georges County, Fort Belvoir and Leesburg, Va.

The sale is expected to be wrapped up by the end of the year with Prime Cable, Ltd., as the principal general partner and operating company. Kelly, also a general partner, will be manager of the new company.

"We have applied formally with Greenbelt and other governmental bodies to review the transfer to the new operating company," Kelly said. Approvals must be obtained before the sale is finalized.

According to D. Wayne Rankin, Storer's system manager, "... Storer, when it leaves Prince Georges County, will ... as previously announced, transfer to another company all assets at their actual costs, without profit. Storer will not be reimbursed for operating losses incurred."

Storer officials previously explained that a significant drop in earnings had hurt the company in its total operation. Cable companies have a big capital investment initially and it takes years, they said, to show substantial profit. Experts in the field observe that cable companies in their eagerness to get

franchises had promised "overly" expensive systems. Later, many cable operators reneged on their promises.

Rankin pointed out that "Storer has not returned to franchising authorities as have other operators throughout the country, stating they did not intend to construct systems as promised. . . . Storer forged ahead . . . without crying for relief from the burden it chose. . . ."

Rate Raise

Kelly reiterated the reasons for the recent rate increases — increased operating and programming costs and bringing rates in line with those in other area jurisdictions. A comparison chart of rates and channels shows that Storer's monthly fees for comparable Basic/Satellite service and the Premium service are the lowest in the Washington Metro—See REORGANIZATION, pg. 5

Roosevelt Mobile Unit Coming to Greenbelt

Eleanor Roosevelt will be the focus of two events in Greenbelt on November 26 and 27, both open to all residents. The "Roosevelt Special" will visit the city on those dates, and the Fleanor Roosevelt High School PTSA will sponsor a centennial program.

The traveling exhibit, prepared for the celebration of the Eleanor Roosevelt Centennial, was developed by the Eleanor Roosevelt Institute, the New York State Office of Special Projects, and the Eleanor Roosevelt Centennial Commission to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the birth of "The First Lady of the World." The museum on wheels features photography, documents, and personal possessions of Mrs. Roosevelt.

The mobile unit will be open to the public at Eleanor Roosevelt High School on Monday, November 26, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., and at Greenbelt Center Elementary School on Tuesday, November 27, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Admission is free.

The high school PTSA centennial program will be held at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, November 27, in the school auditorium. The program will feature historian and playwright S. L. Carson, who will speak on Eleanor Roosevelt's youth, and Dr. Hilda Smith, who will offer an overview of Mrs. Roosevelt's place in history. Parents and other members of the community who wish to attend are asked to check in at the school office on their way to the auditorium.

Greenbelt's 50th Anniversary Committee — in coordination with a number of community organizations — is busy planning the events which will help the city celebrate its golden anniversary in 1987. The subcommittees are: Development of the Greenbelt Museum, Production of the 50th Anniversary Book, Commissioning a statue of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the 50th Anniversary Dance, a National Conference on Planned Communities, House and Garden Tours, Fundraising, and Sales and Promotions. GHI BOARD ADOPTS BUDGET, PLANS EXPERIMENTS ON ATTIC VENTS

The board of directors of Greenbelt Homes. Inc., gave final approval to the 1985 GHI operating budget at its regular meeting on Nov. 8. The final budget figure, revised downward slightly from the original proposal, came in at \$4,886.255. The decrease was due to a cut in money for boiler room renovation, an expense expected to be largely postponed until 1986. The budget was adopted unanimously by the board.

The board received an update on moisture problems and approved a low-cost experiment to be conducted in some block homes. According to General Manager Ron Colton's report, the slate roofs originally were built with a vent at the peak under overlapping slate which prevented rain from entering. During the 1950's and 1960's, as Maintenance Superintendent Joe Whelan said, "99 and 44/100%" of these vents were caulked or tarred shut. With the cooperation of the member at 13-F Ridge Rd., the vent is being unblocked and the moisture will be monitored to see if it decreases. The other experiment involves installation of a cheap "pagoda" devise, which is designed to allow moisture to escape from under the membrane roofs of the block homes. The devise will not be seen from the

In other actions, the board authorized an up-to-\$28,000 expenditure in 1985 to implement the second year of the motor vehicle replacement plan. For this sum or less and the trade-in of a car and two trucks (one in salvage condition), management expects to obtain two vans and a 4x4 with snowplow.

The board received a maintenance report on the free-standing homes on Woodland Way. Items needing replacing or maintenance (mostly trim and gutters) were listed. Colton also reported on plans for repair of the larger townhouses. He said that progress was being made in getting individual water metering for those homes. A considerable saving could be made if the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission does not need to install an outside water cut-off valve. Colton said that WSSC will agree to forgo this installation if GHI will guarantee that the water bills will be paid.

The board also granted permission for a privacy fence at 24-J Ridge Rd. which is longer than the 16-foot standard. The board worked out a compromise between this member (who had, in. fact, already installed the fence) and a neighbor who had some objections to it. An amicable compromise was worked out. However, President Margaret Hogensen emphasized that it is

Mr. Yuk's green face makes clear even to a young child that the substance labeled is not food. For free Mr. Yuk stickers, send a stamped, self-addressed, business-sized envelope to Poison, 20 N. Pine St., Baltimore, Md. 21201.

Officials of the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene said today that the Connaught Company, a Canadian vaccine manufacturer, has announced that a few lots of their Salk polio vaccine did not retain full potency after they were distributed. According to the health department, Salk polio vaccine is not the vaccine most children receive. It is given by injection to people who have or live with people who have conditions that weaken their immune system.

Anyone who was immunized from May 1983 to September 1984 against polio by injection, rather than orally, should return to the health care provider for possible re-immunization.



TV Land Whirl Spins Local Couple's Heads

The \$40,000 Cadillac was tempting, but then there would be all those taxes to pay. . . .

David Kremnitzer, game show contestant/Greenbelt mail carrier, didn't get the car, but he and wife Penny, of 5 Court Laurel Hill Road, spent nine days in California and brought back a little something to show for Dave's appearance on TV.

The show is "Wheel of For-

The show is "Wheel of Fortune," and next Tuesday, November 27, at 7:30 p.m., Dave will appear on local Channel 9 screens to relive his September taping of the game program.

It was his brother Dan's idea. He got Dave to call Hollywood about a Washington-area interview planned by the TV show. Dan (of Martinsburg, W.Va.) and Dave were among 600 hopefuls that showed up at a local hotel in January. They were sorted into groups of 100.

After solving a 5-minute puzzle, Dave's group was down to 19. Brother Dan was out. The 19 played a mock version of the show, and only 6 remained. Out of 600, the finalists numbered 20. The next Friday, Dave's mail-

The next Friday, Dave's mailman pulled a letter out of a pile and handed it to him at work. The return address was CBS Burbank.

In September, Dave and Penny took a plane to LA. Penny took time off from her job at Temple Israel Day Care Center in Silver Spring. Dave took leave from his route—usually Lakeside, Lake-Crest, Hunting Ridge to Chelsea Woods and often the area which includes Green Ridge House. He has delivered mail in Greenbelt for 6½ years, but now he was off to TV Land.

On the day of the taping, it was 108 degrees in Burbank. The pressure of 8 months of wondering would soon end. The day was a bewildering regimen of over 2 hours of going over every detail of the game, time practicing and finally the half hour of actual taping.

"My senses were numb," he recalls, "and I was mentally drained." He . . . well, that would give away the program.

Afterward, Dave and Penny took in "The Tonight Show" and "The Price is Right." The man next to them won a car. They sat in on a taping of "Give Me a Break" with Milton Berle as a guest star. They were in the front row of the Merv Griffin show.

Trips to San Diego, to Tijuana, Mexico, topped off tours of studios and other sights. Then it was home.

Dave and Penny have lived here only 3 years but Dave's family joined Mishkan Torah congregation in 1966. Dave's widower father, Abraham, lives in Calverton.

Construction Begins On Detour Ramps At Kenilworth Ave.

In about two years one of Maryland's largest traffic bottlenecks will be gone, according to the State Highway Administration. In the meantime, however, Greenbelt residents will have to deal with the construction of a new intersection at Routes 201 and 193, Kenilworth Avenue at Greenbelt Road.

The Highway Administration has notified utility companies to begin relocating sewers, powerlines, and other utility equipment at the intersection. A request was made to Pepco for underground wiring, but no decision has yet been made about whether this is possible.

The A. B. Williams Construction Company won the \$13 million project, which is scheduled to start Monday, November 26, with detours being built east of Kenilworth Avenue on the Golden Triangle side.

L. Rent, a construction engineer for the state, told members of Citizens for Greenbelt at their meeting on November 14 that the detours will be constructed of asphalt and will be well marked. "The detours should be completed by late spring," Rent said, "and construction will not interfere with winter traffic."

"I estimate if we (the State Highway Administration) don't do something about the traffic hazard now, it will soon be impossible to get through." Rent reported that 50,000 vehicles per day pass through the intersection.

After the detours are completed, major construction work will begin. A bridge will be built to extend Greenbelt Road over Kenilworth Avenue, and rid the intersection of traffic back-up.



politan area.

Kelly pointed out, "We have to compete with Marquee and other apartment systems and VCR's. We can't price ourselves above them."

The rate raise ignored franchise agreements that gave municipalities and the county the right to approve such increases. However, the action was not considered a violation because recent decisions by the United States Supreme Court and rulings by the Federal Communications Commission invalidated portions of the franchise agreements. It was ruled that the competitive marketplace, rather than local government, would determine the proper level of subscription rates and program lineup offered by the cable operator.

The only channels now subiect to local rate regulations are those in the free Basic service tier (formerly Universal). However, the recent passage by Congress of the compromise Cable Television bill provides that after a two-year period cities and counties will no longer be able to regulate the fee for basic services. The bill apparently will not affect the franchise provision that cities can collect up to 5% of the cable operator's gross reve-

Benefits

Kelly and Rankin opined that, while the rate increase received much coverage by the press, the benefits provided by Storer have been overlooked.

Rankin noted, "Storer has provided cameras, equipment for citizen use, and personnel to assist in developing programming and cablecasting of municipal meetings and announcements." "Full color studios have been in operation in Hyattsville and College Park for several years for the public's use," he added.

said that thousands Kelly (over 4,000) of persons have been trained free by Storer to use the equipment. Another benefit mentioned was the assistance given to municipalities in seeking FCC approval to charge Storer 5% instead of 3% of the system's gross revenues.

work can be interconnected with the Subscriber Network, enabling programming that originates on Institutional Network to reach home subscribers. In Greenbelt, the network has not yet been activated.

Storer officials point to the use of addressable converters - the box that sits on television setsas an "outstanding" feature of the system. These converters 'provide subscribers with an individual electronic address and allow for immediate installation of premium services and movie channels by simply entering information on a keyboard at the (Lanham) headend." These converters can also "assemble audiences, if desired, home-by-home and person-by-person, for programming." An example of a application would be medical programming, which could be disseminated only to doc-

According to Rankin, there are 29,000 satellite subscribers and 56.000 premium channel subscribers (HBO, Showtime, etc.). Storer's public access studios are located in Bowie, Hvattsville and College Park. A mobile unit and six electronic field production units are also available for public use.

The cost of the Storer system in Prince Georges County is \$45 million. The company has 85 employees.

Plenty of Belly Laughs In Comedy at Utopia

Greet the holiday season by going to see the delightful farce at the Greenbelt Cultural Arts Center, November 23, 24, 30, or December 1. Peter Shaffer's "Black Comedy" is filled with outlandish characters who prance and crawl and bump around the stage, and otherwise behave in a manner that will keep you laughing.

The play centers around an avant garde sculptor, Brindsley Miller, whose name should tell you something about his character. Miller, humorously played by John Harty, wants to show his works to a rich collector. Trying to impress the collector, Harty and his fiance Carol, played by Beth Quinn, steal their neighbor's furniture so that Harty will not appear impoverished before the collector and Carol's father, Colonel Melkett, Melkett, played by Vince Carrol, is also about to visit. Just before the two arrive, the lights go out and the fun

Stealing the show are Mike Katz as the gay friend, Harold Gorringe, whose furniture is stolen, and Judith Holland as the neighbor, Miss Furnival. Gorringe is full of not so subtle innuendos en his relationship with Harty, and with arching eyebrows, mischievous, high-pitched voice, and constantly moving hands, he carries out his comic role to perfection. Miss Murnival's tipsy, spinsterish behavior compounds the already bizarre turn of events.

With the lights out, and practically a full cast of characters on stage, Harty moves the furniture out of the apartment. The result is a horrendous ordeal for Harty, but great fun for the audience.

The cast is ably rounded out when Harty's former girlfriend arrives on the scene. Clea is skillfully played by Donalee Hill, whose vampish good looks are a welcome addition to the cast. Bob Vandenberg plays Schuppanzigh, the man who comes to fix the lights and is mistaken for the collector, Georg Bamberger, played by Jonathan Goldstein. Schuppanzigh's brief moments on the stage are wonderfully funny.

The play is directed by Frieda Schwartz, who moves furniture and people about the stage with admirable skill. The set enhances the small stage and serves both "Black Comedy" and "Riders to

the Sea" equally well.

Unfortunately, the first play on the bill of fare, "Riders to the Sea," does not gain momentum as the plot unfolds, leaving one feeling as depressed as the unsmiling

"Riders to the Sea" is a tale of an Irish mother who loses her sons and husband to the sea. One could fall in love with the play from an actor's point of view because it permits a range of emotions from despair to utter tragedy - all in dialect. Unfortunately, that range is beyond the capabilities of the cast. In mastering the dialect, Brianne Brubaker and Linda Martin, as the daughters, and Kathleen Stirling as the mother seem to lose their characters. They speak their lines hastily and without conviction, Stirling further distracts the audience because her face appears smudged with coal dust. Jonathan Goldstein as the son, Bartley, is too smirking in his manper to earn our sympathy on his tragic end. The play is directed by Judith Holland, who also has a minor role.



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City Buys Buses For Services Here

by Michelle Meyers

Greenbelt has just purchased two buses to be used for an inner city bus service. The starting date is yet to be determined.

The service has been budgeted by the city for one full year. A resolution setting rates was considered by the Greenbelt City Council on November 19.

The buses will run on an experimental Dial-A-Ride basis two days per week to determine the demand for the system and if there is potential ridership for establishing a fixed route system.

After the test period ends, regular bus service may be increased to more than two days per week, depending upon its popularity. No staff has been hired yet. but funds have been set aside for paying bus drivers and a parttime manager.

According to the City Council's resolution, Dial-A-Ride charges will be as follows: free of charge for ages below six; 50c between 6 and 18 and over 60; and \$1.00 between 19 and 60. Charges for regular bus routes will be as follows: free of charge below age six; 25c for ages 6 to 18 and over age 60; and 50c for ages 19-60.

At a meeting on November 14 of Citizens for Greenbelt, a city council member said that the buses can be considered community property and may be used for special purposes. Cost for this use must be negotiated with the city manager.

Questions were raised at the meeting about bus service to and from church on Sundays and about a shopping center route.

CHARTER AMENDMENT

ESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF AR-TICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND 1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MU-VICIPAL", SUBTITLE "HOME RULE", TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, FOUND, WHOLE OR IN PART, IN THE COMPILATION OF MUNICIPAL CHARTERS OF MARYLAND (1983 EDITION AS A-MENDED) AS PREPARED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF LE-GISLATIVE REFERENCE PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 77 OF THE ACTS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND OF 1983, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMEND-MENTS SECTION 36, TITLE "SAME-POWERS", TO PROVIDE THAT THE THIRD PARAGRAPH SHALL BE TITLED (c) AP-POINTMENTS BASED ON QUALIFICATIONS; DISCRIMIN-INATION PROHIBITED., AND TO BROADEN THE PROVI-SIONS OF THIS SECTION.

The above Charter amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective observed as such, upon the 25th day of December, 1984, unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 15th day of December. 1984, there shall be presented to the Coun cil of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by regis tered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that the above Charter amendment be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt A copy of the above Charter Amendment Resolution 1984-3 is posted in the Greenbelt Municipal Building in accordance with the requirements of Section 13(d) of Article 23A of the Annota ted Code of Maryland, and may be obtained from the City Cler' 25 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, Maryland - Telephone 474-3870 or
