News Review Marks Another Anniversary, Starts Forty-eighth Year of Publication

This week the Greenbelt News Review begins its fortyeighth year of continuous publication. Originally, a lettersize mimeographed publication consisting of sixteen pages, then titled the Greenbelt Cooperator, the paper began publication on November 24, 1937 — within six weeks after the first Greenbelt families had unpacked their household belongings.

History

Much is owed to the early Pioneers who recognized the immediate need for a news medium to keep people informed of local events and to provide a forum for the exchange of views. They laid down the principles that still guide the actions of the present News Review — a non-partisan non-profit, cooperative endeavor, whose aims are to print the news accurately and fairly and to reflect the Greenbelt "good neighbor" philosophy of life.

At first the paper was prepared at the homes of various staff members. In January 1938 the Federal Government (which owned Greenbelt at that time) made space available at the center, free of cost, and also loaned much-needed furniture, typewriters, and office equipment. From its original second-floor quarters in the commercial center, the paper moved its offices four times before finally coming to rest in the present basement office at 15 Parkway.

With the withdrawal of the Federal Government from town, Greenbelt Homes, Inc., through its wholly-owned subsidiary, Greenbelt Development Corporation, continued the Federal policy of providing free office space with the paper reimbursing the corporation for out-of-pocket expenses.

Free Delivery

An important development in the history of the newspaper was the decision to deliver the Cooperator free of charge to every home in town, beginning with the issue of September 7, 1939. The additional cost of local distribution was small, and this radical change of policy provided largcirculation figures, which could be used as evidence of the value of advertising in the Cooperator, once its distribution had become community wide. The town government engaged more and more space for publication of pending ordinances, budgets and

The policy of free distribution remained unchanged until July 1953, when the paper was forced by financial straits to go to a subscription basis — \$3 a year. The response was fairly encouraging, but the added cost of maintaining subscription records convinced the governing body that the additional income was not worth the additional workload. More important, the board wanted every resident to receive the paper. In January 1955 the paper returned to city-wide circulation.

Financial difficulties continued

to plague the newspaper, and appeals were made to the businesses and organizations in town for funds. Finally, in April 1959, the News Review resorted to a house to-house community-wide drive for funds. Organized by the drive chairman, Elaine Skolnik, who was aided by 125 volunteer court collectors, the drive netted over \$1,500. It proved such an unqualified success that it was renewed again the following year.

The yield from these drives was sufficient to meet the needs and no drives have been conducted since 1960; however, a fund drive was launched in 1966 by the Greenbelt Freedom of the Press Committee to help the paper defend itself against libel charges.

Libel Suit

The libel charges arose out of the paper's publication of remarks by citizens at a public city council meeting regarding a proposal made to the city by a local developer, Charles Bresler. A Prince Georges County jury found the remarks libelous and \$17,500 judgment awarded Bresler was later affirmed by the Maryland Court of Appeals. The U.S. Supreme Court, however, in May 1970, reversed and vacated the judgment, ruling that the News Review was "performing its wholly legitimate function as a community newspaper when it published full reports of these public debates in its news columns." To hold otherwise, the high court said, "would subvert the most fundamental meaning of a free press."

During the 4-year legal struggle, the Freedom of the Press Committee collected over \$30,000 from the community to help meet legal expenses and to pay the judgment in case of unsuccessful appeal. (\$20,000 was later returned to contributors).

Staffing

The entire staff consists of volunteer workers, most of whom have joined the paper as their contribution to their community's activities. Since March 1957, nominal payments have been authorized to the editorial staff and to columnists — when finances permit, of course. There have been 39 changes in editorship during the paper's 47 years. The position is at present held by Mary Lou Williamson and there are 42 staff members.

An innovation begun five years ago, augmenting the staff through an agreement with the Departments of English and Journalism of the University of Maryland to accept placement of student interns, is being contin-

ued to the News Review's advan-

Interns have participated in the regular work of writing and editing copy for this paper. The program is sponsored by the Alfred M. Skolnik Memorial Fund. This fund also provides for a yearly \$100 Savings Bond to be awarded to an outstanding Eleanor Roosevelt graduate interested in the field of writing.

Except for the interns, all staff members are volunteers — a fact which makes particularly notable the paper's absolute continuity since that first issue 47 years ago.

At present over 9,400 free copies of the News Review are distributed weekly to homes in Greenbelt, including Springhill Lake, Greenbriar, Glen Oaks, Windsor Green, and Hunting Ridge, and to Greenbelt office buildings and shopping centers.

Continuing through the month of December, the Festival of Lights will offer holiday events including decorations contest, caroling, North Pole calling, Santa's visit and much more.

Council Okays Two Temporary Signs On City Land for Greenwood Village

The city Council on Nov. 19, granted the builders of Greenwood Village permission to place two temporary signs on city property.

Greenwood Village, previously known as Green Holly Woods, is a Ryland Homes development at the corner of Mandan Road and Greenbelt Road, adjacent to Eleanor

Roosevelt High School.

Signs are not permitted on city property by city code, but because the land slopes down from Greenbelt Road at the development's southwest corner, the developer may have to use larger less attractive signs according to City Manager James K. Giese. Council agreed that allowing the signs to be placed on city property would result in smaller and possibly more attractive signs.

Michael Ruehr, representing Ryland Homes, said, "If we could come up in front of the tree line near the sidewalk, we could use a smaller sign. The idea is to have the sign as unobtrusive as we can."

Ruehr expects the signs to stay up more than two years, depending on how fast the homes sell. The 197 homes will have a base price between \$80,000 and \$90,000 depending on the number of op-

tions, according to Ruehr.

Council also approved a request by the Greenwood Village developers to allow for driveway entrances to be constructed with asphalt rather than concrete.

A letter from the developer's attorney said the concrete driveways are more subject to damage during construction and asphalt has a better appearance.

Giese said the workmanship of concrete is often poor and it is more difficult to repair concrete than the asphalt. "A well built concrete driveway can last forever" he said, but a poorly built concrete driveway may last only a few years.

The city will be responsible for maintaining Mandan Terrace, which provides access to the four entrances, but will not have responsibility for the driveway entrances or their parking lots.

Council also cautioned the developers about the possible overuse of "Mandan" in naming the development's streets.

Trade Center III

Council put off approving the site plan for Maryland Trade Center III until more information can be gathered concerning timetables for road improvements. Council also wanted the

city's Advisory Planning Board to take a second look at the plan and make a definite recommendation regarding a 69,000 square-foot increase in the building's size.

Russell W. Shipley, representing the developers Coakley and Williams, said the extra space would provide about \$3 million in additional assessed value for the city.

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld said he wanted the APB to "look at this item once again with the most up-to-date information we have." He said the council could give the developers a decision in about a month.

"I think we are all in favor of it," said councilmember Edward Putens. But Putens wanted the APB to take a second look considering all of the developments in the Greenway Center-Maryland Trade Center area.

Crushed Stone Purchase

Council waived bidding procedures and authorized the purchase of crushed stone from Rockville Crushed Stone. According to Giese, the public works department found that Rockville Crushed Stone sells its stone for less than the low bidder awarded purchase by the county. The city is currently using stone in its curb and sidewalk work. The cost of the stone will exceed \$2,500, according to Giese.

Council increased the Crime Prevention Committee's size from seven to nine members. Two people who were on a waiting list were appointed to the new positions.

Council authorized Police Chief Frank Hutson to execute the Greater Metropolitan Washington Area Police and Fire Mutual Aid Operational Plan on behalf of the city. This plan establishes a procedure for requesting assistance from other jurisdictions.







Fire and Rescue Review

The Greenbelt V.F.D. & R.S. responded to 65 fire related incidents, and 63 Rescue Squad incidents, during the first 3 weeks of November.

Malicious False Alarms

False alarms pose a very serious hazard to the public and to the firefighters that respond to help those in need. Needless energy and time is spent answering false calls, not to mention the risk to those who answer the call for help. As many as 70 fire and rescue personnel and 10 pieces of emergency equipment may respond, only to find that one person has decided to cause excitement. The risk of serious injury and even death can be just as high as in a real fire or rescue situation. So to those who report false alarms, think of this and the penalties of both fines and imprisonment. And to those citizens who are concerned, become involved and contact Police or Fire officials if you suspect or have information regarding false alarms. The Greenbelt Fire Department responded to 6 false alarms this month alone.

Fire Log

November 10: 11:25 a.m. . . . a report of fire in the new Maryland Trade Center building on Greenway Center Drive seemed confirmed to first arriving units due to "smoke showing" conditions. 


The 1984 season ended for the Greenbelt Boys and Girls Club 110-lb. football team Saturday afternoon, November 10, with a hard fought Raider Bowl victory over their regular season rivals, Bowie #1. The 12-6 win gave the Raider 110-lb. team an overall season record of 5-4. During the regular season the team won impressive victories over College Park (19-6), Bowie #2 (47-0), Forestville (19-7) and Kent, losing only to Bowie #1 in an evenly matched contest, 12-6, on a late TD by Bowie.

Mark Wilson (QB and middle linebacker) won "Best Defensive Back," Jack Trumbull (noseguard and offensive tackle) won "Best Defensive Lineman," Kevin Thompson (fullback and safety) won "Best Offensive Back," and Larry McKay (center and defensive end) won "Best Offensive Lineman" for the Raider Bowl

game. An impressive performance was also turned in by John David Jimenez (running back and safety), who had a 50-plus yard run and a TD. Also giving cutstanding performances were Ronnie Rowe, John Andrew Noftsinger and Grafton Plater in a true team effort. George Clinedinst, the team's starting defensive end, had to miss playing because of a broken finger.

Tony Molden, the team's other defensive end and utility player, was a recipient of the Club's Chip Sacra Memorial Sportsmanship Award, as was Johnny McLane of the club's 75-pound football team, and Richard Cantwell of the 95-pound football team. They were presented with their awards between Raider Bowl games.

Because of the team effort put in by all the club's players and coaches in 1984, football lives in Greenbelt. The club's 1985 season begins August 1 at Braden field.



At its regular meeting, held on November 5, 1984, the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland, adopted Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1984-3 (Resolution No. 580), and the following title of the Resolution is a fair summary of the amendment:

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL", SUBTITLE "HOME RULE", TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, FOUND, IN WHOLE OR IN PART, IN THE COMPILATION OF MUNICIPAL CHARTERS OF MARYLAND (1983 EDITION AS AMENDED). AS PREPARED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 77 OF THE ACTS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND OF 1983, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SECTION 36, TITLE "SAME-POWERS", TO PROVIDE THAT THE THIRD PARAGRAPH SHALL BE TITLED (c) APPOINTMENTS BASED ON QUALIFICATIONS; DISCRIMININATION PROHIBITED., AND TO BROADEN THE PROVISIONS OF THIS SECTION.

The above Charter amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective observed as such, upon the 25th day of December, 1984, unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 15th day of December. 1984, there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that the above Charter amendment be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt. A copy of the above Charter Amendment Resolution 1984-3 is posted in the Greenbelt Municipal Building in accordance with the requirements of Section 13(d) of Article 23A of the Annotated Code of Maryland, and may be obtained from the City Clerk 25 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, Maryland - Telephone 474-3870 or
