Lake Park Landscaping Stirs Comment at Council Meeting

Residents watched with pleasure as the curb and median were constructed, eliminating the unsightly shoulder that once provided extra parking for visitors to Buddy Attick Park at Greenbelt Lake. But pleasure turned to dismay as jagged boulders were planted in the earth and trees and bushes carefully sculptured at the Lake entrance. Japanese tea garden? Cemetery? Disney World? Greenbelt residents aren't sure.

The two major problems citizens are having with the landscaping are the suitability of the design for the park entrance and the lack of opportunity for citizens to participate in selection of the design.

According to City Manager James Giese, the park entrance was intended to be more formal than some of the other areas in the park because this area was chosen as a memorial garden in memory of the late Albert S. "Buddy" Attick, longtime city employee and former Director of Public Works.

Lowell Owens, dismayed at the lack of citizen involvement in the landscaping project at the entrance to the lake, brought a petition before the city council on January 7, asking that the project design be referred to the city's Parks and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB) for consideration and possible modification. Owens presented his petition with some trepidation as the project is complete.

In his letter to Owens, Giese explained the long-term objectives of the design. The large stone on the pedestal is to hold a bronze plaque dedicating the park to Attick. Eventually the evergreen plantings will become clusters without a clear shape and the lawn will take over the shrub line. The shrubs planted among the rocks will also fill the voids and partially cover the rocks.

In response to Owen's petition, councilmember Toni Bram admitted she was not an expert on landscape design and asked, "Why didn't this project go through PRAB?"

Giese explained, "There was a time element and criticism that it had not been landscaped sooner. With the weather coming and Mr. Doornekamp retiring, we had received a request from Mrs. Attick that Mr. Doornekamp do the layout of the entrance to the park, which would be a memorial to Mr. Attick. That's why the subject never came up."

"Mr. Giese is correct that the actual improvement has been an item that the council has been interested in for quite some time," said councilmember Thomas White. "I think everyone was glad to see the curbing and the design at the entrance way."

Councilmember Ed Putens asked Keith Chernikoff of PRAB, "Weren't those studies and drawings presented before PRAB on the Lake Park master plan?"

"In the last year-and-a-half, I know that some drawings were

submitted, but nothing very detailed," Chernikoff answered.

"I agree that it was a big shock," Mayor Pro-Tem Richard Pilski said, "to see that all of a sudden it was completed. I'm not going to agree with some that it appears to be an entrance to a cemetery. I don't have any problem sending it to the board for citizen inquiry, because we'll learn from it."

Council received another letter regarding the lake entrance from Janet Kuhn, who agreed with Owens. Kuhn, who thought that the primary objective had been to keep the park in a natural state, said in her letter that the addition seemed out of place. The large rocks seem to be the major offender aesthetically, not only to Kuhn but to Steve Curtis, a Greenbelt resident who also spoke at the meeting.

"I think one of the reasons that it is genuinely stunning is the fact that you don't find large pieces of quartzite in Prince Georges County," Curtis explained. "No amount of overgrowth is going to change the fact that it looks like it came from somewhere else, which it did."

In summing up the response of council to Owens, Mayor Gil Weidenfeld said, "Mr. Doornekamp has done so many nice pieces. We got a lot of nice comments on it that we didn't think about doing a whole lot about having the design approved. I have no problem with sending it to PRAB," he added.

The Council then voted unanimously to submit the plan to PRAB. The plan will be included on the agenda for PRAB's January 16 meeting.

Ten Top Stories of 1984

In accordance with its annual custom, the Greenbelt News Review has selected the ten top Greenbelt stories of 1984. This year the following were chosen.

Metrorail

1984 begins with no-holds-barred stance by County Executive Parris Glendening demanding work begin on Metrorail's Green Line. By October Greenbelt rejoices in Glendening's success. Metro board approves plan which includes construction of Greenbelt's part of the line to begin this fiscal year and to be completed by 1992. At year's end Congress approves and the President signs a continuing resolution authorizing completion of the entire 101-mile Metrorail system.

City Budget

The city budget climbs 18 percent but taxpayers get significant relief. Elimination of double taxation gives city taxpayers a 39-cent drop in the county tax rate, more than offsetting the city's tax rate increase of eight cents. Growth in the tax base from new development gives Greenbelt the chance to bolster city services to keep up with growth. Among new services is Dial-a-Ride Bus Service, begun in mid-December on Wednesdays and Sundays. Council also considers a \$6 million capital improvements bond issue.

Police

It is the end of an era in the Greenbelt city police department when William T. Lane, Greenbelt police chief for 20 years, retires on June 30. Lane, who built the department from seven officers to a professional force of 30, is succeeded by Frank T. Hutson, a veteran of the Baltimore County Police. In his first six months in his new position, Hutson faces not only new problems but also some left over from the past.

By October, Hutson has administratively closed a departmental investigation into the actions of city police officers involved in the arrest of a motorcyclist more than three years earlier and has reaffirmed the dismissal of a former city police lieutenant who had been removed from the force 19 months earlier. Also in October, the city council chooses a firm to evaluate the department, an undertaking rooted in citizens' demands from the 1983 city elections.

At the end of October, the city council formally adopts the long-awaited 12-point program of its advisory Crime Prevention Committee. Key recommendations are for increase of the police force to 40 sworn officers, development of a sound crime statistics program, and establishment of various citizen crime prevention efforts.

Co-op Grocery Store

Greenbelters are stunned and Greenbelt Cooperative, Inc. members enraged when GCI board of directors, without membership input, decides to sell off all Co-op food stores and gasoline service stations in the chain, including the founding store in Greenbelt. Two groups form, one trying to fight divestiture in the courts, the other setting up a new co-op. The latter group, incorporating as Greenbelt Consumers Cooperative, places winning bid and takes over operation of the Greenbelt food store and pharmacy in June. The gas station goes to a private bidder. At year's end the first group withdraws its court action to avoid jeopardizing new GCC operation.

Historical Greenbelt

Greenbelt residents are reminded of their historical roots during 1984. The News Review runs a series of articles tracing the beginning of the city from its conception to construction and habitation. The 50th Anniversary Committee is appointed by Greenbelt city council to prepare for the city's golden anniversary in 1987. Eleanor Roosevelt is remembered on her 100th birthday October 11 with a celebration and other events. County approves Councilman Richard Castaldi's legislation to place Center School on the county's Historic Sites and District Plan List, a move that would require review by the Historic Preservation Commission before renovations can be undertaken. Greenbriar celebrates its 10th anniversary and the Lakewood development its 25th. Finally, the News Review celebrates completion of 47 years of continuous publication.

Greenbelt Homes

At the end of July, Greenbelt Homes, Inc., winds up its program for rehabilitating the townhouses which form the core housing in old Greenbelt. Some of the houses are almost 50 years old and the "rehab" project has extended over five years and cost more than

Josephine Seay

Josephine Susan Seay died on January 1 after a long illness. Her husband, Randolph W. Seay, had preceded her in death. She is survived by two children, Joseph Seay of Raleigh, N.C., and Patricia Caldwell of Virginia Beach, Va.; by two grandchildren, Elizabeth and Nathaniel Lee Caldwell; and by nine sisters and four brothers. Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated for her at St. Hugh's Church on January 3, with interment in Oakwood Cemetery in Falls Church, Va.

Before her illness, Josie was very active in community affairs. For many years she served as an election judge for the city and for general elections. She went to the elections laden with food so that the election workers need not go hungry during their long day. This was typical of Josie's thoughtfulness for her associates.

Josie served two two-year terms on the Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, the 1964-1965 term and the 1967-1968 term. For many years after that she was chairman of the Nominations and Elections Committee of GHI, and even after illness forced her to retire from that work, she was a valuable reference source for later N&E Committees.

Less than three months before her death, she was leading citizen participation in the redesigning and improving of Plateau Place. She wrote and got signatures on a petition to stop a planned island at the intersection of Plateau and Ridge because she felt it would be hazardous.

This writer first met her when Josie was a hostess at a reception for new members of Greenbelt Homes in the GHI Board Room. We new members were made to feel at ease and to have a sense of belonging by her easy grace and her matter-of-fact attitude, which seemed to say, "Of course, you are one of us."

Josephine Seay made Greenbelt feel like the friendly, neighborly place that it is. We miss her.

To the Editor:

I agree with Mr. Lowell Owen's article "What Have We Here?" which appeared in the Greenbelt News Review, Jan. 3, 1985.

As a resident of Greenbelt, I, too, appreciate all efforts made to beautify our small rural town with landscaping befitting its natural habitat.

I'm sure considerable planning went into designing, selecting trees/shrubs and hauling in large boulders for the formal garden site to the Buddy Attick Park. The end result, however, is definitely "overdone". Mr. Doornekamp did make an attractive landscaped garden on Greenbelt Rd. and Lakecrest Drive. I'm sorry he did not keep the Buddy Attick Park entrance garden more in harmony with its natural surroundings.

More important, let us keep our park/lake area clean—shoreline free of cans/bottles, tree branches, tires and algae. Also, much needed attention should be given to the streams that flow into its water. Let us again try putting trash receptacles in appropriate areas and add a few "No Littering \$..... fine" signs and enforce payment.

I'm happy to see a clean up has begun on the peninsula that juts out into the lake. Until recently, October 1984, the removal of vines choking the life of the few existing trees there has too long been neglected. The weeping willow's long dead limbs were left hanging and bee infested stumps (yellow jackets known for their painful stings) still have not been removed. I was stung twice requiring medication this past summer.

Stockpiles of tree branches, leaves and cans remain on the peninsula and along its shoreline awaiting repair of the mulching machine. Many Greenbelters and visitors frequent this area to fish and just relax. The debris could be removed elsewhere. A clean, well-kept park/lake area is very eye appealing and should be less expensive than maintaining and replacing elaborate gardens.

I know Greenbelters are proud of their small rural town and natural park areas. After all, who can beat "Mother Nature".

\$17½ million. The end of the long effort is celebrated in October with an end-of-rehab party for all members.

With rehab over, GHI embarks on another major innovation in its corporate history when the membership approves GHI's participation in the Share Loan Services Corporation in partnership with the National Cooperative Bank. By year's end SLSC is becoming a force in financing sales of homes in GHI.

The management team which has shepherded GHI through intricacies establishing SLSC and has pushed the last rehab work to conclusion by the midyear deadline, barely outlasts the end of rehab, as both General Manager Shekar Narasimhan, and Assistant General Manager Gary Morningstar move on to other jobs. Before the end of the year, GHI has in place a replacement team in General Manager Ron Colton and Assistant General Manager Stephen Wright.

Greenbelt East Development

The eastern section of the city is enlarged by almost 274 acres as city council, responding to petition from Hunting Ridge residents, annexes not only that community but large adjacent area of undeveloped properties as well. Annexation gives city added influence in controlling future development in the area.

Concern for highway improvements is tied closely with every proposal for new development in east Greenbelt, as city-requested study by Park and Planning finds Greenbelt Road threatened with saturation levels of traffic. Second Maryland Trade Center building, 12 stories high, is completed, but city approval for start of third MTC high-rise is withheld pending progress on critical highway improvements. These include extension of Hanover Parkway south to Good Luck Road and widening of Hanover northward; added west-bound lane for Greenbelt Road between Hanover and B-W Parkway; and improvement of northbound ramps between B-W Parkway and Greenbelt Road. The Park and Planning study also recommends widening Greenbelt Road to six lanes east of Mandan Road.

Because of traffic concerns, city also looks with disfavor on several initial proposals presented for intensive development of Smith-Ewing tract and newly annexed Tidler property east of Greenway Shopping Center. Witt tract, earmarked for storm water management use, also gets a frown when townhouse development is proposed. But groundbreaking for scaled-down Martins Crosswinds banquet facility occurs in November, with its major use in off-hours seen as having minimal impact on traffic congestion.

Long-demanded traffic light at Mandan Road is authorized after state legislators and county officials intervene with Maryland's Dept. of Transportation. Later, the accident-prone intersection with Greenbelt Road (still minus traffic light) has its first fatality.

Greenbelt West Development

City council views preliminary plans for future growth west of B-W Parkway. Plans for an additional 20 service bays for Capital Cadillac move ahead. Northridge - 14 individuals band together to build their own homes. Lakeside West - a flurry of plans appearing early in year apparently leads nowhere. Oxford - the nation's 8th biggest development company - designs "gem" for its corporate headquarters on the Golden Triangle, and Prudential completes its second building. Across Kenilworth Avenue, Capital Office Park's fourth office building opens in May, and Greenbelt Hilton is under construction. At Beltway Plaza two new restaurants - Popeye's and Bennigan's open; eight movie theatres, Greenbelt's second Mexican restaurant and 900 more parking spaces are planned, with protest from city council and Springhill Lake residents. Council does agree to help gain traffic improvements - double left turn lanes out to Greenbelt Road (opposite Marshall's) and a new signal at the Big Boy's entrance. Initial work begins on Kenilworth Avenue underpass/interchange at Greenbelt Road.

Cable Television

In September the city's cable TV franchisee, Storer Communications, reneges on promise not to raise rates without city okay. City and citizens are angered but helpless to take action as U.S. Supreme Court and FCC decisions allow the FCC to preempt regulation of the cable industry. By year's end, council looks into cable-casting its meetings and its ad hoc citizen committee completes study of how to operate the public access channel.

BARC Land Sale?

A running battle pits Greenbelt and state and Congressional representatives against U.S. General Service Administration over GSA decision to sell 260 acres of land at Beltsville Agricultural Research Center. Maryland's senators and 5th District congressman introduce federal bills to prohibit the sale, but the bills die at close of Congressional session. At year's end, GSA may have won. Having given 25 acres to U.S. Dept of State, GSA plans to sell remaining 235 acres immediately. Only reintroduction of federal bills, plus committee chairman's request, can defer the action.

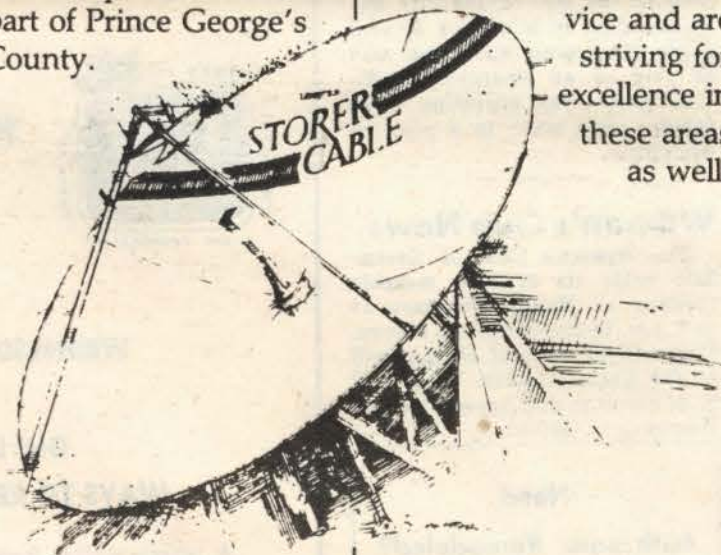

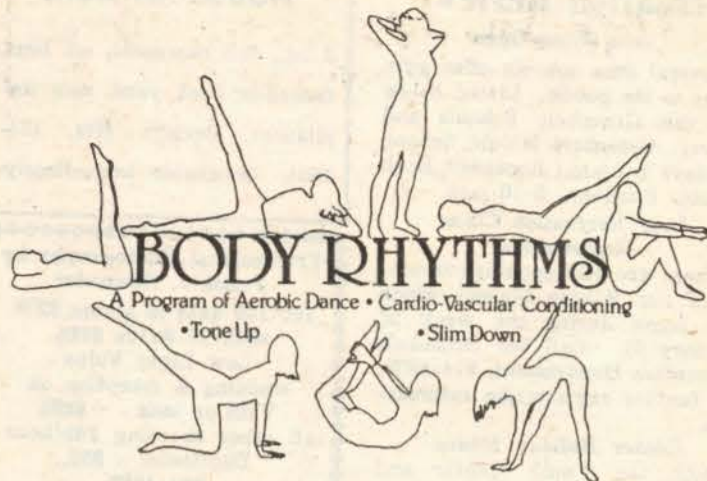

CHARTER AMENDMENT

At its regular meeting, held on January 7, 1985, the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland, adopted Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1985-1 (Resolution No. 588), and the following title of the Resolution is a fair summary of the amendment:

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL", SUB-TITLE "HOME RULE", TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT FOUND, IN WHOLE OR IN PART, IN THE COMPILATION OF MUNICIPAL CHARTERS OF MARYLAND (1983 EDITION AS AMENDED) AS PREPARED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 77 OF THE ACTS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND OF 1983, BY REPEALING AND RE-ENACTING WITH AMENDMENT SECTION 40, TITLE "PURCHASES", TO PROVIDE THAT THE COUNCIL SHALL PRESCRIBE BY ORDINANCE A COMPETITIVE BID PROCEDURE AND SHALL ESTABLISH A DOLLAR AMOUNT OF PURCHASE NOT TO EXCEED TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$10,000) ABOVE WHICH THE TAKING OF COMPETITIVE BIDS SHALL BE REQUIRED SUBJECT TO EXCEPTIONS AS MAY BE PERMITTED AND SET FORTH IN THE ORDINANCE, SUCH EXCEPTIONS TO INCLUDE AWARDS OF PURCHASE BASED UPON BIDS RECEIVED FROM OTHER AGENCIES, THE PURCHASE OF SPECIAL CATEGORIES OF SUPPLIES, MATERIALS, EQUIPMENT OF CONTRACTURAL SERVICES FOR WHICH THE COUNCIL DETERMINES A COMPETITIVE BID IS NOT FEASIBLE, AND THE AUTHORIZATION FOR NEGOTIATED PURCHASE WHENEVER IT IS DETERMINED TO BE IN THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CITY OR AN EMERGENCY EXISTS

The above titled Charter amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 26th day of February, 1985, unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 16th day of February, 1985, there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that the above Charter amendment be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.

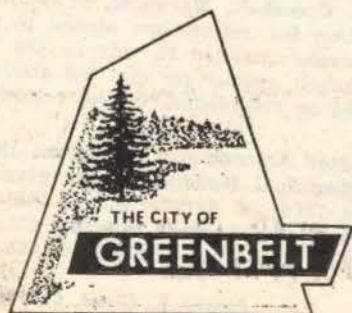
