County Exec. Asked for Commitments In Writing on Nine Benefits for City

At its regular meeting on October 15, Greenbelt city council unanimously agreed to send a letter requesting that County Executive Parris Glendening give the city written commitments on nine points related to amenities and benefits promised to Greenbelt.

The motion passed by council specified that the city would take no further action on the Maryland Trade Center III office building, the addition to the Holiday Inn or the question of county revenue bonds for the Sunrise Apartments until such a memorandum is received.

The motion specified that the written statement from the county executive would be expected to include the following commitments:

1. That the county will do everything possible to meet time schedules for road improvements set up in a letter sent to the city on May 28, 1985.

2. That the county will provide TIF funds for the Greenbelt Road bridge over the Baltimore-Washington Parkway if federal funds are delayed.

3. That progress reports will be provided every three months.

4. That no revenue bonds, financial or special benefits or fast track promotions will be given to developers in the East Greenbelt area without first obtaining the approval of the city council.

5. That the entire 72-acre former Board of Education property adjoining Parcels 1 and 2 at the end of Northway be transferred to the city.

6. That \$100,000 of open space funds be added to the city's normal allocation over not more than a three-year period for park development in East Greenbelt.

7. That the elementary school site on Hanover Parkway in

Greenbriar be transferred to the city, if the site is declared surplus by the school board.

8. That a new transportation study be made along Greenbelt Road including all proposed development within and beyond city limits.

9. That the county notify and give the city a voice in all development along the entire length of Greenbelt Road and in the Greenbelt area.

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld also announced that the city has received from Glendening a reply to an earlier city letter requesting clarification on his authority relating to the above points, but that the council had not yet had time to study the reply.

Weidenfeld said that the city should now get the actual commitments in writing. The county would be taking a position on the revenue bonds next month, he said, and the city should make its position clear.

Petition Drive Saturday

Community Savings and Loan depositors, led by the A.T.O.M. steering committee, will hold a public drive this Saturday, October 26 in front of the closed Greenbelt office of that "locked" institution on Roosevelt Mall, to get signatures on a petition to the state to solve the continuing freeze. Representatives will be present all day, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., to answer questions and give information.

Savings and Loan Purchase By Chase Manhattan Ok'd

The Maryland General Assembly passed legislation early Tuesday morning, permitting Chase Manhattan to purchase Merritt, Friendship and Chesapeake Savings and Loans. "The passage by a single vote in the State Senate of the bailout package should not be overstressed," said Del. Gerard F. Devlin (D-23rd). "All of us, citizens and elected officials, must work together to keep the pressure on."

The General Assembly met in an unprecedented special session, often meeting until the wee hours, as House and Senate leaders attempted to break the log jam which had prevented passage until 4 A.M. Tuesday, of the legislation permitting the giant New York-based Chase to come into Maryland.

In reference to the separate problem of the deposits frozen at Community Savings and Loan, Devlin said the legislative approval of so called hardship procedures permitting certain depositors to withdraw funds is significant; "All depositors have a right to these funds which they placed and kept in Community relying on the word of the State of Maryland. I will not rest until everyone gets his or her money."

"This issue has been dragging along for a number of months now and I think it's important to finalize it," he said.

When asked whether such a letter from the county executive would be legally binding on the county, Weidenfeld said that the city would have to deal with the county executive in good faith and that his veracity and record with municipalities has been good. He added that the county executive's dealings with the city have been above-board, marred only by the fact that the city was not advised in advance about the Sunrise project.

(A reply to the city's request for commitments on the nine points was received just prior to the council's next regular meeting on October 21. The council agreed at that time to defer a final decision to the regular November 4 meeting to give council members time to study

Springhill Lake Owners To Begin Modernization

Springhill Lake Apartment Community in Greenbelt will undergo a multi-million dollar renovation of its apartments and grounds as part of a campaign to improve the quality of life in Prince Georges county.

Lerner Corporation, which has been the owner and manager of Springhill Lake Apartment Community since January 15 of this year, is sponsoring the program aimed at modernizing the complex's 2,899 apartments over the next five years. The theme of the project is "Springhill Lake Changes for the Better."

Although the complex has been undergoing a slow modernization process during its 22-year history, "We wanted to give just a little extra effort now," said Lew Beall, senior property manager for Lerner Corporation. "Any complex has to start looking to the future and that's what we're doing," he said.

In addition to improvements to the Springhill Lake apartments and grounds, Springhill Lake officials hope to reach a new level of cooperation between the public and private sector.

A reception was held on October 24 at the Springhill Lake Fountain Lodge to announce the modernization program, as well as community programs to be sponsored by Springhill Lake during the next year.

Springhill Lake Apartment Community is one of the largest apartment communities on the East coast. It houses almost 9,000 residents.

New Plans for Greenbelt Metro To Be Subject of Nov. 6 Hearing

The wedding of Greenbelt to the national capital Metro system is currently projected for 1992; but on Wednesday, Nov. 6, at 7:30 p.m., the public is invited to the Eleanor Roosevelt High School cafeteria for a hearing on the pre-nuptial agreement.

Termed a "corrective additional hearing" by Maryland government relations officer Gerald Gough, the hearing will cover three proposed changes to the original Greenbelt station plans.

The Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority, WMATA, proposes: to build the Greenbelt station just south of the Beltway adjacent to the B&O railroad tracks, which the metro line will follow; to construct ramps for east-bound Beltway traffic to enter the station and exit west-bound; and to create a lake-oriented park for the residents of Berwyn Heights and College Park. Access to Metro from the east would be via Kenilworth Ave., Greenbelt Rd., and Cherrywood Lane.

The Greenbelt route has been the subject of more than half-a-dozen studies by WMATA and others since the metro system was first adopted in 1968. The proposed changes reflect

WMATA's belief that the original plan to locate the station in Berwyn Heights would have "adverse traffic effects associated with the station's location on Berwyn Road and reduced ridership due to poor station accessibility and inadequate parking capacity." These views were developed in WMATA's Comparative Alignment Study, Greenbelt E Route, September 1985.

The new plan would increase parking from 1,000 to 3,000 spaces, while increasing accessibility by using the Beltway as a conduit for ridership traffic, according to WMATA.

The park - and lake, which would be reminiscent of Green-

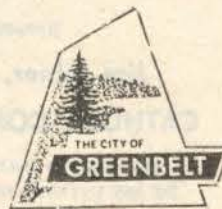

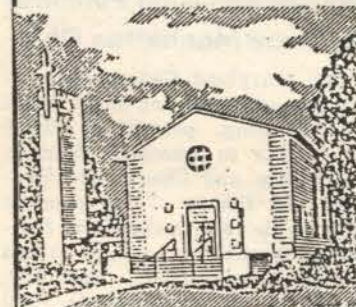

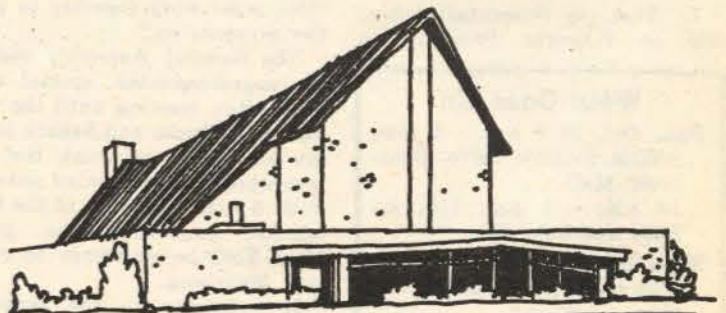

Certainly you have the right to be very upset about what has happened to you. However, you should realize that there is a proper channel of communication you must take advantage of to rectify your trouble. Each and every time you have a complaint, inquiry, or even a compliment, don't hesitate to approach your letter carrier and explain the situation as soon as possible. If he or she can't resolve your problem, by all means come down to your post office and speak with a clerk, or if absolutely necessary a supervisor or the Postmaster. If all else fails, only as a last resort approach higher postal authorities.

Our profession requires tremendous mental and physical discipline. Most of us endure a steady diet of walking up to sixteen miles a day, ten hours a day, six days a week.

Furthermore, Greenbelt's similar street names and numbers can create unique problems. For instance, here are some prefix and suffix examples:

- 1.) Lake - side Dr., - crest Dr., - view Circle; 2.) Green - belt Rd., -hill Rd., -knoll Ct., -tree Ct., -way; 3.) Mandan - Road Terrace, and Court; 4.) Breezewood - Drive, Terrace, and Court; 5.) Springhill - Drive, Terrace and Lane; 6. Cherrywood - Lane, Terrace and Court and 7.) -Way -North -South -East -West -Park -Emilys and -Garden.

Anyway, my point is under these circumstances we're inevitably going to make errors. Yes, it may be hard to believe but we are all only human.

However, as a team at the Greenbelt Post Office each and every one of us will be proud to admit we're giving 100% effort all the time. 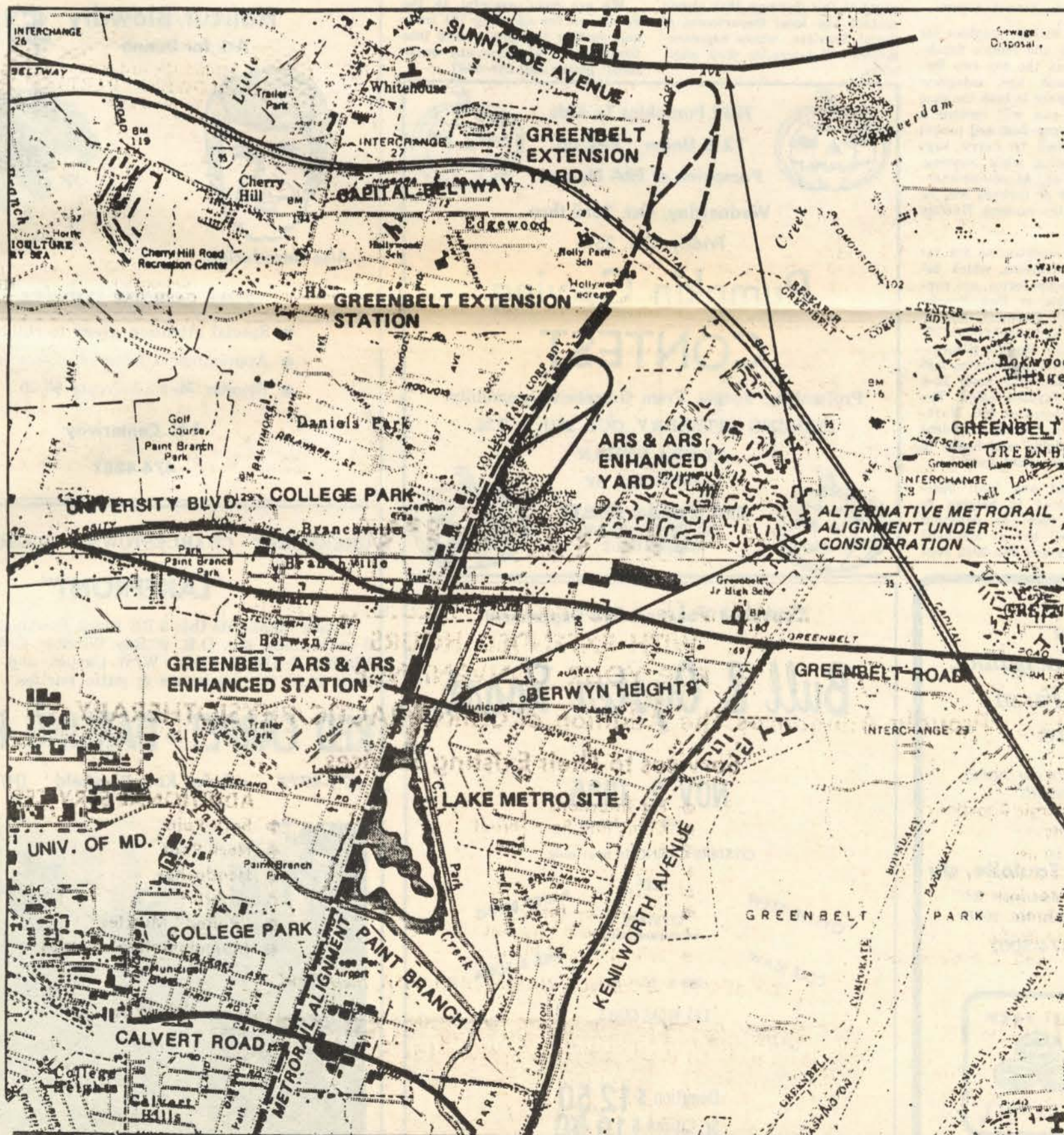

Jaycees Sponsor Race To Benefit News Review

The Greenbelt Jaycees have announced plans for a 10-kilometer road race and "fun run" to benefit the Greenbelt News Review.

The Sunday, November 24 "Turkey Trot," the first such event the Jaycees have sponsored in this area, will begin at 9 a.m. at Braden Field. The 1.5 kilometer fun run/walk will begin at 9:05 a.m.

"We're trying to establish this as an annual event," said race director Suzanne Hartley. A runner herself, Hartley said she "knows the ins and outs" of how to promote such an event and hopes that area runners will see the race is highly organized and come back year after year.

Hartley said most of the proceeds will go to the News Review, with the rest to cover race expenses, including prizes and post-race refreshments. She said money will be raised through sponsorships, in which people pledge a certain amount for each kilometer their runner covers.

Prizes will include trophies for the first male and female finishers, as well as the top two finishers in each age category. Every participant in both the race and the fun run will receive a "ripper," a velcro-fastened pocket attachment used to carry keys and identification while running. In addition, an as-yet-undetermined number of turkeys will be raffled off to the runners, Hartley said.

There is a registration fee for the race; applications, which include sponsorship forms, are currently available at Ben Franklin's, Greenbelt Cleaners, High's, the Sub Shop and the Jaycees office next to St. Hugh's Elementary School. Pre-registration will be held November 23 from 12-6 p.m. at the Jaycees office. The field will be closed at 500. Hartley said she is "pretty confident we'll fill the field," and hopes to expand the race next year.

Hartley said any local businesses interested in helping to sponsor the race or donating prizes can call her at 596-9493 during the day and 964-3952 evenings.

State Changes Guidelines

Maryland residents whose assets are frozen in one of the state's four savings and loan institutions with total withdrawal restrictions may be eligible for Medical Assistance from the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, according to State officials.

Based on a recent decision by the Medical Care Programs Administration, unavailable assets will not be considered as resource in determining eligibility for Medical Assistance. If declared eligible, a person will be covered for all medically necessary services rendered during the eligibility period, with no repayment to the State.

The usual medical assistance program guidelines will be applied to all applicants. However, if declared eligible, a recipient must notify the program of any change in financial status, at which time a determination will be made whether to continue the Medical Assistance.

If residents believe they qualify for Medical Assistance because of this decision, they should contact the local Department of Social Services, where representatives will determine their eligibility.

New Plans for Greenbelt Metro

belt's Buddy Attick Park, replete with amphitheater, fish-stocking, and boating concession, would be a fortuitous and fortunate wedding present.

Greenbelt Metro construction necessitates acquisition of park land, which must be replaced in kind. At the same time, construction requires a flood control facility and thousands upon thousands of yards of fill dirt. WMATA's answer is Lake Metro. The 38-acre lake will provide flood control, the excavated earth will provide fill dirt, and the money saved on purchasing fill dirt will provide revenue for park beautification.

The park would be owned and operated by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission. Lake Metro would be nestled between the Metro line and Indian Creek north of the College Park airport.

The new configuration would also move the service inspection and repair yard, a major facility to store and care for hundreds of metro cars, from south of the Beltway to its north.

Al Roohr, senior transit planner for WMATA, said the new plan "looks good to me now. I think it's a great idea. I think it's great for the community. Most of our readings have been favorable. The College Park council has passed a resolution favoring us."

Maryland government relations officer Gough agrees. "Maybe ten years ago, everyone said move it near the Beltway," he said. "Now we have plans for exit and entrance ramps. We have never had a hearing on these. We thought the State Highway Administration would hold hearings but they did not."

Reason for Hearing

The main reason for the hearing is to avoid legal problems. "This hearing is over and above our ordinary hearings," Gough said. "Our attorney feels we should have this public hearing so we're not liable to law suits."

In a recent case, the courts held that a WMATA board of directors-approved plan was invalid until additional public hearings were held on changes made in the original plan.

"There was a court case on the F-route," Roohr said. "We had a change in the alignment in

the district, from an environmental study, a change from Branch Avenue to Rosecroft." A suit was filed and the judge "granted an injunction: no money was to be spent on planning or staff other than to have a corrective hearing" on the changes to the original plan.

The Greenbelt hearing will not only cover the proposed changes, but it will produce a General Plan which will serve as part of the instructions for the final design.

All issues and comments made by participants at the hearing and any written comments submitted to WMATA within ten days after the hearing will be addressed in a report made by the planning department for the WMATA board of directors.

A minimum of two weeks after giving the report to the board, the planning department will make a presentation of the report to the board including any public comments about the report. The board will consider the information in making a final decision.

"In the end, they are the boss," said Roohr.

After the decision is made, the actual process of procuring designs and contracting for construction begins.

Hearing Procedures

Those wishing to speak at the hearing should furnish in writing their name, address, telephone number and organizational

affiliation, if any, to Mr. Fairfax McCandlish, public hearing assistant, office of general manager, WMATA, 600 Fifth St., NW, Washington, D.C. 20001. one name per letter only. Public officials will be heard first and allowed ten minutes each to speak. Others will be given five minutes. Unregistered persons may speak last for up to three minutes.

According to Roohr, following the hearing the report to the board should be ready in two or three months, but, he added, "I've seen it take years for a real controversial report. If we had a real simple hearing, we could rip the report out in a month."

Roohr said that after the board makes a decision "it takes about five or six years to complete construction."

With a wedding that long and such a resolute marriage to follow, November 6 is the time to speak now or forever hold your peace.

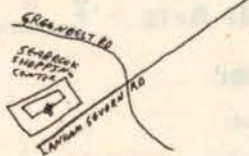

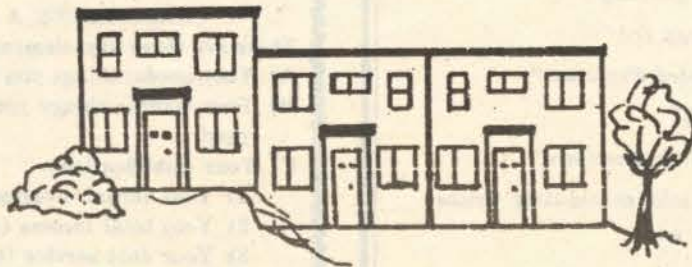

What are the different parts of a tooth?

Teeth are composed of 2 main parts, crowns and roots. The crown is the portion that you see when you look at your teeth. The shape of the crown is determined by its function in chewing. Front teeth are shaped like chisels because they cut food. Back teeth, which tear and grind food, have pointed or slightly rounded elevations called cusps. These cusps fit into grooves of the opposing teeth when you chew.

About 2/3's of the length of a tooth is the root. It is normally not seen except in periodontal (gum) disease or severe injury. Roots serve to hold the tooth firmly in the jawbone. They have a hollow central chamber called the canal. Nerve fibers and small blood vessels enter through the tip of the canal to bring "life" to a tooth. The number and size of the roots vary according to the role played in chewing, but in general front teeth have one root while back teeth are multi-rooted.

County is Asked for Commitments

the county executive's reply and to discuss it at a work session on October 28.)

Lake Area Erosion

In other action, at the suggestion of councilmember Antoinette Bram, council agreed to have a "neutral" party examine the erosion and/or sedimentation problems in the peninsula area of the lake and suggest solutions. A dispute had arisen between the city administration and Clifford Brown with regard to improvements to the shoreline area of the lake behind his residence.

City Manager James Giese said that the retaining wall which had been erected in that area created an unnatural shoreline and that the retaining wall contributes to other soil problems. He said that Brown had been told not to make improvements on city property but had continued to do so.

When asked by councilmember Edward Putens how the dispute had arisen, Giese said "the staff probably has erred in not stopping Mr. Brown sooner."

Brown, who said he put the first path along that section of the lake in 1961, read portions of an engineer's report which concluded that his landscaping had not caused the erosion in that area and suggested that he be allowed to protect the bank adjacent to his property. He also presented a petition signed by residents in the area, but Giese stated that none of Brown's immediate neighbors had signed.

Weidenfeld said he is hesitant to have citizens go out and make whatever solutions they deem proper to problems they see on city property since such solutions have as much chance of being wrong as they do of being right. He said that citizens should present the problem to the city staff and if the staff isn't addressing the problem, they should come to the council.

When a neutral party was suggested to propose solutions, Giese suggested the soil conservation service. The council unanimously passed a motion to ask that organization to examine the area in and around the peninsula and Brown's home on Lakeside Drive and to determine if there is an erosion problem and suggest solutions.

Signs and Site Plans

Council also accepted the city's Advisory Planning Board (APB) report on signage for Martin's Crosswinds. The APB had asked for elimination of the champagne glass symbol. Representatives of Martin's told the council that they would be willing to eliminate the glass from the sign on the side of the building, but wanted to keep the glass on the sign in front because it is the logo of the company.

When councilmember Joseph Isaacs suggested that the champagne glass be replaced with a glass of milk, a lawyer for Martin's pointed out that the champagne glass had been their symbol for years and said that it was not a sign encouraging drinking, but rather a sign encouraging good times, in "the Lawrence Welk tradition."

The APB report recommended shortening the length of the sign on the side of the building by one-third to one-half and requiring the owner to remove the sign if and when the building is expanded.

Council also approved a revised site plan for the Exxon gas station at Hanover Parkway. The revised plan request was to ex-

pand the existing islands and canopy on the site so that one additional gas pump can be added to each island.

Weidenfeld said that Exxon should address the problem of cars waiting for service, and Bram and Putens requested clarification on the sales policy which allows the owner of the property to have a truck on the property selling non-automotive items.

Kathy Kieffer, a project engineer for Exxon, said that dealers are discouraged from using the property to allow sales of non-automotive items and that the dealer at the Hanover Parkway Exxon has been asked not to do so in the future.

When Putens said that he would like to see the practice stopped, Kieffer said, "We would also, and it has been brought up to the dealer."

Crimesolvers

In another action, council unanimously approved the donation of \$40 to the private corporation of Crimesolvers of Greenbelt, the installation of a special phone line in the police department, and encouraging the city manager, city staff and the police department to cooperate with Crimesolvers on the installation of the phone and its use by police personnel.

The purpose of Crimesolvers of Greenbelt would be to assist the city police department in obtaining information on criminal activity, develop a community offensive against crime, motivate the public, provide rewards and awards, and raise money.

The phone line would be answered with a "hello," not with "Greenbelt Police Department," according to Valerie Siegel of the Greenbelt Crime Prevention Committee. "The idea is to get the information to the police department," she said. "Information with a number attached to it is pursued."

Rex Smart, also speaking for 6690.

the committee, said that the phone line would be answered by police personnel, and that Police Chief Frank Hutson had agreed to that procedure. After a tip, Smart said, the board of directors of Crimesolvers would meet and decide if an award should be given.

Siegel pointed out that Crimesolvers would be a private corporation with no connection to the city. Weidenfeld directed the city staff to run the idea and procedures by the city attorney as soon as one is hired, just to make sure there would be no legal problems in the relationship between the corporation and the city.

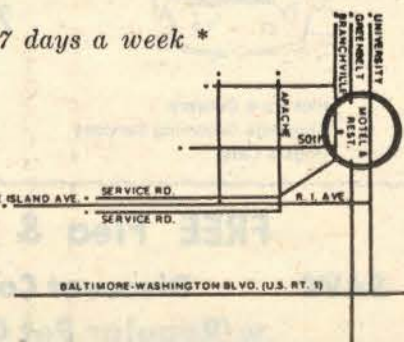
