GHI Board Rejects Proposal for Joint Committee With GCC on Elderly Housing

For the second meeting in a row, the board of directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. considered what relationship GHI should have with the housing cooperative for seniors now being planned by the housing committee of the Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative. At the GHI board's April 9 meeting, representatives of the housing commit-tee urged formation of a joint committee to promote the senior housing plan. They also request that GHI consider leasing to the com-mittee part of the garage site at Parkway and Crescent for the planned apartment development.

At the April 23 GHI meeting, the board considered at length the proposal for a joint committee, which was finally rejected. Instead, the GHI board voted to establish a liaison with the housing committee consisting of volunteer GHI members. Even this rather weak link between GHI and the housing committee did not receive unanimous approval; Directors Janet Cantwell, Mac Wirick and Debbie Hartwick voted to oppose any link. Directors Andrea Haslinger, Chuck Hess, Nancy Hutchins, and Ray McCawley voted to support the liaison proposal. (In the absence of President Margaret Hogensen, Vice-President Wayne Williams was presiding.)

In the discussion, Haslinger defended the idea of staying in touch with the committee. She pointed out that the apartment house which the group plans may impact on GHI, since most of the available sites are adjacent to GHI property. Hess questioned whether a joint committee would give the appearance of GHI's support for the committee's objectives. Several of the GHI members present thought it would.

The reaction of GHI members attending the meeting who are in the age bracket to be interested in senior housing was uniformly hostile to the idea of GHI's participating in a joint committee. Lucille Jacoby led off by saying that she hoped the would not spend any time on this idea. Janet James felt that "it shouldn't look like GHI is a part of this movement." Nathan Shinderman said he had no objection to "cooperation" but insisted that GHI should stay "at arm's length" from the committee in order to retain GHI's flexibility and to avoid any possible conflict between the committee's aims and GHI interests.

Betty Deitch insisted that the burden of providing the viability of the housing plan "falls on the group, not on GHI." She also questioned the grounds for GHI's

"spending all that money" to do research needed to produce what she described as a three-page memo on zoning and other considerations raised by the housing group's proposal. General Manager Ron Colton, who wrote the memo for the last board meeting, said that the basic work had been done when the garage site was considered for the post office and the police station. Therefore, he said, the cost involved was minimal since no legal fees were

Parking Exemption

The board granted the second exemption to the parking policy to the members of the 3 Court of Crescent, who asked to be allowed to retain their restricted parking status instead of having reserved parking spaces assigned. In this court there are eight parking spaces for eight units. The court residents, who all requested the exemption, prefer to keep the court on a first-come, first-served basis. Charles Hagelgans, spokesman for the court, said there were no problems with competition for spaces and that the residents voluntarily limited parking to one vehicle per unit in the court.

Hutchins and Hess both made the point that a newcomer to the court who wanted a reserved spot might be put in an uncomfortable position with his neighbors if he insisted on what is, under the new parking policy, his right. In Colton's recommendation to the board, he noted that the new parking assignments will be enforced throughout the community only on a member's complaint about non-compliance. He therefore suggested that the members of 3 Court could park where they please in the court, as long as agreement on parking was unanimous and no one complained.

Hutchins and Hess supported a motion that the exemption be denied; however, the rest of the board voted against this motion. A motion by Hartwick to grant the exemption was then passed unanimously.

Among board members in favor of the exemption, McCawley said he had no problem with it because it did not violate the principle of one parking place per unit. Cantwell said she saw no difference between this case and the circumstances in the 13 Court of Ridge Road, where an exemption was granted earlier.

Parking Space Construction

The staff presented the board with a prioritized list of courts or areas in which additional parking spaces must be constructed in order to provide one parking space per unit. The first five projects on this list included 14 Court of Ridge Road (five spaces), the 2 Court of Gardenway (10 spaces), 1 Court of Laurel Hill (eight spaces on the site of the old boiler room), about 12 spaces at the site of the old boiler room lot on Plateau Place and the 56

Court of Ridge), and three spaces near the 49 Court of Ridge.

The other projects on management's list included spaces serving the 52 and 54 Courts of Ridge, 4 Court of Gardenway, 59 and 61 Courts of Ridge, the 7 Court of CrescentRoad, and the 44 Court of Ridge Road. However, the staff report noted that a majority of the members in 7 Court of Crescent had voted against constructing parking because of destruction of green space. In the case of the 44 Court of Ridge, the recommended construction would not add spaces but would define the parking area.

The board indicated interest in pursuing the first five projects on management's list and the area in the 44 Court of Ridge. Even the first five projects on the list would oversubscribe the \$15,000 budgeted this year for parking. However, Colton said that the cost figures were tentative. He said it might be possible to realize some savings by doing more of the work at the same time.

Quarterly Staff Reports

The various GHI staff directors presented their quarterly reports to the board. Member Services reported that 28 formal complaints had been resolved, with none outstanding at the end of the quarter. In addition, 94 member concerns which did not result in formal complaints had been dealt with. This department had also begun implementing the parking policy by assigning parking spaces. The report noted that one vehicle had been towed for improper parking.

The Contract Processing and Technical Services Department reported that 34 new-member interviews had been conducted and 30 settlements had been com-

Conference Celebrates Greenbelt's Anniversary

An international conference on new towns, sponsored by the City of Greenbelt and the Maryland Citizen Planners Association has been planned to coincide with the 50th Anniversary of Greenbelt, one of the first model new towns built by the Roosevelt Administration.

Scheduled for May 1-3, the Greenbelt Conference on New Towns will be held at the Greenbelt Hilton and Towers. The conference will open with a dramatic photographic exhibit which focuses on historical Greenbelt during the late 1930s and early 1940s, and features treasured photographs from the Library of Congress and private collections.

Featured speakers include such well-known historians as William Leuchtenburg, Professor of History, University of North Carolina, and author of "Franklin

A reception featuring 42 photographs and a collection of paintings will be held for the opening of the 50th Anniversary Exhibit of Historic Greenbelt, Saturday, May 9, 3-5 p.m. at the Greenbelt Library.

The exhibit is part of the celebration which is marking the 50th anniversary of the City of Greenbelt, one of the three planned "greenbelt" communities developed in the United States during the 1930s.

Dr. David Fogle, a professor of architecture at the University of Maryland, will speak on the significance of the anniversary and the exhibit.





pleted, a lower number than in other recent quarters but in line with the experience in other parts of the real estate market. This department also reported that parking layout sketches for about one-third of the courts were com-pleted. Some 32 resale inspections were performed and 24 building permits issued.


Fiscal Services reported that the automated work order track-ing system is operational and an automated employee leave balance program has been developed in-house. Results of the auditors' examination of GHI's financial statements for last year were also submitted.

The Maintenance Department reported that 2,807 calls for work

orders were received. The total number of calls received was about 3800, including 35 calls for fee-for-service and 588 miscellaneous calls. According to the department's report, the snow storms during the quarter neces-sitated some 1700 hours of unscheduled work.

The board approved a motion to include a recommendation for disapproval with a member petition being put on the agenda of the May 20 membership meeting. The petition would have the membership direct the board not to expend GHI funds to purchase memberships in the Greenbelt Museum (as the board voted to do at its last meeting). It would



The Bard on Stage at Utopia Gives Pleasure to Reviewer

Greenbelt theater-goers should take the opportunity offered by the Utopia Theater to see Shakespear's "Much Ado About Nothing." This play is relatively easy Shakespeare — a double love story with the mistaken identities which characterize so many of his comedies. The language is also relatively easy, with a down-to-earth tone sometimes lacking in his other works.

The play opens with men returning from the wars. Don Pedro, nicely played by James Robertson, is visiting at the residence of Leonato, Governor of Messina. In his entourage is Claudio, who declares himself ready to fall in love now that he no longer has war on his mind, and Benedick, who vows he never will step into the marriage trap.

When Claudio sees the heroine, Leonato's daughter Hero (are you still with us?). He immediately falls in love and a marriage is planned at once. Benedick, in contrast, renews his acquaintance with Beatrice, Leonato's niece, but continues to denounce the married state. Beatrice also vows she'll never fall in love. This witty, articulate pair repeat themselves so much that it is obvious they will eventually fall victims to the very emotion they are so busy denouncing.

Don Pedro's jealous brother, Don John, plots with his follower, Borachio, to slander Hero and convince Claudio that she is not the innocent maiden she seems. Eventually the plot is discovered and the lovers are wed. The other lovers, Benedick and Beatrice, are tricked into falling in love and they discover they like it. (See, there is nothing to it!)

Utopia's "Much Ado About Nothing" is being produced by the Shakespeareans, a D.C. nonprofit organization chartered by the Shakespeare Guild, Inc.

The production is uneven, with some very good performances and some merely adequate. Chuck Coley as Benedick and Lisa Lorraine Holland as Beatrice stand out as polished, professional players. Preston Sweet, as Dogberry the constable, is wonderful. Bill Blanchard as Leonato is good, particularly in his reaction to the slander of his daughter when he positively gobbles with rage. Daniel Awkward as Borachio is

suitably sinister as the instrument of Don John's jealous plot. He has a great voice and good stage presence.

The stage setting is simple but works well. It is essentially one scene enhanced by the various entrance ways and the use of the space in front of the curtain for scenes which require a setting away from Leonato's residence.

The costumes are handsome and look authentic except for Borachio's. Why is he running around in his old brown walking shorts when everyone else is in period

costume?

What the Utopia is offering is not the definitive production of "Much Ado About Nothing." But it is giving a creditable performance of one of Shakespeare's easier plays in which the actors speak the words clearly and as if they understand them. The production gives the town a chance to see a good play with lots of laughs without going downtown or spending next month's grocery money on expensive seats. Greenbelters ought to take advantage of this opportunity.
