# **Council Tentatively Approves Commerce Center 3 Despite Traffic Count Dispute**

Attorney Richard K. Reed of Fossett & Brugger, Gary Modjeska of the Midland Companies, and other members of the Commerce Center team appeared before Council on Monday, September 19, to present their argument that no greater traffic would result from their present development plans than what was expected in 1985. Council grudgingly gave tentative approval, but only after the Commerce Center team offered a guarantee: an actual traffic count would be taken one year after the buildings are fully leased, any vehicular trips over the limit would trigger mitigation plans financed by the developer and put into play by the city. This agreement. by which council will allow the developers to proceed to the county planning board with their site plan, came after long and heated debate. The Commerce Center develop-

er, the Midland Companies, is to work out with city staff a mitigation plan agreeable to council. Specific suggestions included van pools or an additional left turn lane from Hanover Parkway (northbound) to Greenbelt Road (westbound). Also in the offer, to hold down the possibility of a traffic overrun, is a promise to lease to an I-3 type of business (a low traffic generator) for the one-story building currently under construction on Lot 3 and no leasing to the medical professions (a high traffic generator) in Commerce Center 3, the general office building the Midland Cos. want to build on Lot 2.

#### January Approval

A meeting between council and the developers in January had set out the limits of what could be built on Lot 2 - a 106,000sq. ft., five-story building of general office space. However, the developers were to show that traffic generated would not exceed the 1985 levels derived from an earlier development plan. The developers were also directed to seek approval from the Greenbelt East residential communities.

#### Plans Change

Covenants signed in 1985 by the developer and the city spelled out the types of development permissible on each of three lots, but then offered the right to substitute if the traffic to be generated would not exceed the old plan. In the intervening years none of those original plans have remained the same. The 128,-000 sq. ft. commercial townhouse development for Lot 1 was changed to the now completed midrise general office building on five floors at the corner of Hanover Parkway and Greenbelt Road. That building opened in March.

The original plans for the other two lots were: a 144-unit corporate hotel suite (a low traffic generator) on Lot 2 and a 175,-000 sq. ft. mid-rise office building on Lot 3.

Traffic Reduction The city gained a traffic reduction when the Midland Cos. changed the plans for Lot 3 lowerthe square footage from ing 175,000 to 128,500 sq. ft. (a 46sq, ft. one-story building 089 and an 82,411 sq. ft. three-story building). When no developer came forward to build a corporate suite hotel on Lot 2, the Midland Cos. sought approval to construct Commerce Center 3, a building to match the adjacent Commerce Center 1. The traffic to be generated not only would eat up what was gained on Lot 3, but would exceed the 1985 numbers. Council has demanded over the past year that the size of the building on Lot 2 be scaled down to meet those 1985 figures. The Midland Cos. have argued that it is economically not feasible, though they have now accepted 106,000 sq. ft. on five floors, down from their first proposal of 128,000 sq. ft. in six floors.

#### Massaging the Numbers

To make the numbers come out right, Reed explained to a doubting council, the figures on Lot 3 can be adjusted to reflect the lower level of traffic now expected to be generated by the corporations the Midland Cos. expect to move into the two buildings on Lot 3. A special traffic category for hi-tech — showing lower trip generation — has been accepted by the federal highway administration and some other area jurisdictions, but not yet by Prince Georges County. A look at the specifications of the building shows some significant differences from the general office building construction. These differences are designed to make the structure amenable to companies who have a higher number of computers and other heavier equipment and fewer people for the floor space, that is, hi-tech or research and development companies. Building architect Alan J. Lockman outlined those differences for council. The one-story building has been deigned for R&D use and the three-story building for hi-tech.

Reed used the hi-tech rate of traffic generation for the two buildings to reduce the over-all traffic generated from all three lots to meet the equivalency test.

A second method of arriving at a lower figure, one that the city's Planning and Development Coordinator Celia Wilson preferred, is to use the I-3 rate. I-3, a special category under Industrial Park zoning, is frequently used for R&D buildings and has an even lower traffic generator rate than hi-tech. Wilson found the design and specifications for the 46,000 sq. ft., one-story building to fit the I-3 category sufficiently well to allow use of the lower figure for traffic generation. The 82,000 sq. ft. three-story building, she told council, cannot be argued for anything less than general office. Council, she suggested, could find that Lot 3 could generate the "right numbbers" by using whichever method it preferred. City staff, she said, was willing to agree to the probability that traffic figures on Lot 3 will turn out to be less than originally anticipated when the change in development plans was made from mid- to low-rise office buildings with a lower square footage. The types of buildings have now been set and construction is well underway. The design dictates how the buildings will be used, Reed told council, and Wilson generally agreed.

#### Guarantees?

Council was not enthralled with redefining Lot 3 for the benefit of Lot 2 and sought iron clad guarantees. Define hi-tech, demanded Joseph Isaacs, and write that definition into lease agreements for the two buildings on Lot 3, added Edward Putens. Can't be done, said Reed emphatically. Too many parties have signed all the agreements for those ouildings. To reopen those agreements would be impossible, he said.

Guarantee that the nature of the businesses in those buildings won't change in the future, if the R&D market turns down, said Antoinette Bram. Can't be done, said Reed.

If you can't guarantee, then I can't accept your plan, asserted Putens. The design of the building is your best guarantee, responded Reed.

Thomas White continued to express his opposition to allowing any increase in traffic generation on Lot 2 above that of the corporate suite hotel. He wasn't interested in discussing Lot 3.

To suggestions of further deferral from Bram, Reed challenged: "Do not defer any longer, just deny it."

Reed was frustrated by a council he thought had been more congenial in January when it approved changes in the covenants on the land and pointed the way developers to proceed. He felt the conditions that had been sought by council in January had been satisfied and turned on council to question their good faith. He reminded council of the 14 months of public scru-tiny the project has received, the generally favorable comments by the homeowner groups of Greenbelt East, approval of the use of the hi-tech traffic and approval of using all three Lots to prove equivalency by the Legal staff of Park and Planning, the

The meeting, sponsored by city council and the city's Crime Prevention Committee, will be the latest in a series of work sessions to find answers to the drug and alcohol abuse problem. Pfc David Buerger of the Greenbelt Police Department's Drug Investigation Unit will lead off the meeting with a presentation about the illegal use

of drugs in Greenbelt. Invited panelists include Dr. John J. Boren of American University's Psychology Department, Mrs. Linda Roebuck of the Maryland State Department of Education, Rosalind Redman, and Stephen Millertlov of Offenders Utilizing Treatment Inc.


Last year, the Community Relations Advisory Board and the Crime Prevention Committee were authorized by city council to study recent efforts to curb illegal drug use in areas such as Washington County, MD, and Rockville, MD.

They found that efforts to work with teenagers and children were not enough. Programs must include the families and the community.

In other meetings the consensus has been that a variety of different programs along with community involvement were needed. At the August 24 meeting of the city council, Councilmember Toni Bram said that Greenbelt's approach should include enforcement of drug laws. Rockville's Youth Services Su-

Rockville's Youth Services Supervisor, Rusty Wallace, said at an August 10 council worksession, "You can't deal with drug abuse with just a youth services bureau, just with education—

selors were available to people seeking help, said Wallace. An example of Greenbelt's new educational programs, Project D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education), is run by Pfc. Buerger. The 15-week drug education program for sixth-graders also teaches self-esteem and that police are friends the stu-

dents can trust. Forty-three states have D.A.-R.E. programs. Greenbelt Police are the first in the Washington Metropolitan area to enact this program.

city's Advisory Planning the Board and the willingness of city staff to approve the traffic equivalency test. With both sides at a standstill

and the clock showing well past midnight, Mayor Gil Weidenfeld summed up the situation: "We've asked for a guarantee and you can't do that. Council is looking for a greater comfort level. We'll see whether council will accept your proposal."

The Commerce Center Team then adjourned to the hall outside the council chambers for 15 minutes. They returned to offer their version of a guarantee: limit leasing for the one-story building on Lot 3 to an I-3 user; no leasing to the medical professions in the general office building on Lot 2; verify the traffic count and mitigate, if necessary, to get cars off the road. The mitigation, Reed suggested, could take the form of vanpooling, with van or vans to be purchased with funds put in escrow by the developer for use by the city.

In commenting on the offer, Wilson struck down the first item saying I-3 zoning is not restricted to R&D, so nothing would be gained toward restricting traffic. Under mitigation, she said, the city would prefer to use funds to provide an additional left turn lane from Hanover Parkway onto Greenbelt Road. Reed suggested the city could choose how to use the funds provided. Council told the developers to work out the details with the city staff and return for approval.

In calling for the final vote. Weidenfeld Weidenfeld reminded Reed. "Council's comfort level is notvery high. You'll need to give us your best shot." Putens, Weidenfeld and Bram voted in favor of the conditional aproval, White and Isaacs voted no.

function to a tooth which is structurally defective or has been broken down by decay or injury. With few exceptions, most crowns completely cover the tooth.

Complete crowns are made of metal acrylic, or porcelain. alone or in combination. The most natural looking and durable material is porcelain fused to a metal core.

In preparation for a crown, a small portion of the outside of the tooth may have to be reduced in size. This is to al-low adequate room for the thickness of the crown material. In this way the completed restoration duplicates the original contour and size.
