School Officials Present Options For Upgrading Elementary School

Two options for providing an upgraded elementary school facility in Greenbelt will be formally proposed by school officials at a Public Information Meeting and Hearing on Tuesday, January 10 at 7:30 p.m. in the Center School auditorium. The options—renovation of historic Center School or the construction of a modern new facility at the site of old North End School—will be reviewed by county school administrators and architects.

The Superintendent of Prince Georges County Public Schools, John Murphy, is tentatively scheduled to speak, following opening remarks by District 2 school board member Suzanne Plogman and a slide show presentation dealing with the conceptual design and the positives and negatives of each proposal by architect R. C. Garcia.

The program will also feature presentations by Center School principal John Van Schoonhoven and several of the school's teachers. Closing remarks will be delivered by Edward Felegy, Deputy Superintendent of Public Schools. Frank Tracy, Associate Superintendent of Supporting Services, has prepared materials containing pertinent questions and answers that will be distributed at the meeting.

According to Plogman, a public opinion poll will be mailed to parents and the Greenbelt community early in February. Plogman and the majority of the Greenbelt city council have indicated that the results of the survey will have an impact on their recommendations. The nine-member school board will make the final determination on whether to renovate Center School or to build a new facility. The latter choice would require an amendment to the school system's Capital Improvement Program which for many years has included funds for rehabilitating Center School.

North End Site Favored

School administrators are giving serious consideration to the alternative of constructing a new school on the city-owned North End School site because they believe it would serve best the educational needs of students. This view was conveyed to four members of the Greenbelt city council at an informal meeting in Upper Marlboro on December 20. (Councilmember Thomas White was absent due to the death of his brother.)

A slide show and materials dealing with relative cost estimates, construction timetables and other information about the alternatives were presented to the city council members by the school system's architect, R. C. Garcia, vice-president of the

architectural firm of SHWC which is headquartered in Reston, Virginia. At the July 1988 two-day charette concerning Center School, Garcia had indicated that the best educational value would be achieved by building a new school, but that the best social and cultural solution would be gained by restoring the existing school.

No Clear Signal by Council

School officials had hoped to get a clear signal from council members at the December 20 meeting that council would support the alternative of building a new school at the North End site if there were support from the community. The officials wanted to know the city's plans for Center School in the event an exchange of school sites is recommended. Earlier school officials had announced "If the new school is ultimately approved, the Greenbelt Center Building would be available for local community use in Greenbelt."

Council members told school officials that they remained open-minded about the options. They stressed the need for more detailed information to be presented by school officials at the school system's public information meeting and hearing next Tuesday, including an opinion on which alternative would serve best the educational needs of the students for the present and for future decades. Council members also stated that community reaction and the results of the public opinion poll would influence their positions. They noted their need to receive answers to many questions dealing with the potential use of Center School as a community center. For example, would the funds already allocated for renovation of the city-owned North End School and for proposed programs there be transferable? Would there be adequate parking around Center School?

School officials at the Dec. 20 meeting were informed of the position of the absent White, which White reiterated to the News Review: "My position is that Center School should be renovated as planned and that everything should be done to exhaust all remedies for the ren-

ovation before consideration is given to any other alternative."

(The city council at its meeting next Monday is expected to direct the city staff to draw up a report providing information on such concerns as the condition of Center School, how the facility could be used in a similar way as envisioned for North End school, and how it could handle programs already proposed for North End.)

Comparative Information

Information materials given to council at the December meeting with school officials indicated that the cost of building a "prototype" school on the city-owned North End site would be about \$7,657,520. The total cost estimate for restoration of Center School was \$8,282,212. Included in both figures was the cost of asbestos abatement and demolition operations.

According to these materials, "Costs at North End can be controlled better..." Garcia later told the News Review that there were uncertainties about Center School restoration costs, in particular those involving selective demolition, removal of asbestos and compliance with historical concerns. He explained that there were unknown conditions about part of the building that would require selective demolition.

According to the information materials, a new two-level school (with internal ramps instead of stairs) would provide "improved

Council Looks at Traffic, Pedestrian Safety Hazards

The safety of Frankfort Drive as a two-way road was questioned by Mayor Gil Weidenfeld at the regular city council meeting of November 29.

Weidenfeld told council that a resident of the area had been concerned over the difficulty of turning out of Frankfort Dr. onto Greenbelt Rd. In order to see traffic coming up the hill, Weidenfeld reported, drivers must pull their cars out onto the outside lane of Greenbelt Rd.

The resident had asked the State Highway Administration whether this inside lane could be turned into a right-turn-only lane, in order to avoid accidents between cars on the two roads. The State Highway Administration had replied that, when Greenbelt Rd. is widened up to Mandan Rd., all three lanes will be needed.

Weidenfeld suggested that council ask the State Highway Administration for recommendations as to how the situation can be improved.

Councilmember Thomas X. White advised that council bolster its request with possible solutions, such as those mentioned at the meeting: putting on Greenbelt Rd. a flashing yellow light, a reduced speed limit, or a hidden entrance sign.

However, Weidenfeld pointed out that a hidden entrance sign won't prevent Frankfort Dr. cars from having to pull out onto the inner lane. He suggested the possibility of making Frankfort Dr. a one-way road so that no cars would exit it onto Greenbelt Rd.

Bus Stop

Council also discussed the new Metro bus stop at Capital Office Park. The city approached Prince Georges County nearly a year ago about building such a stop, since the nearest stop at the moment is at Crescent and Ridge Roads. However, county officials were not willing to consider the proposal until buses had a way to move through the office park without turning around.

With the construction last summer of Cherrywood Ln. between Kenilworth Ave. and Ivy Ln., the buses can now make a circuit. County officials have notified the city that bus service to the office park is scheduled to begin in February 1989.

The matter was brought up at the meeting because council had received a letter from Ralph A. Bram expressing his concern for the pedestrians walking in the Crescent Rd. roadway from the Crescent and Ridge bus stop to Kenilworth Ave.

Staff reported that a sidewalk will be built from Crescent and Ridge to Ivy Ln. and Kenilworth Ave. Said Assistant City Manager Mike McLaughlin in his report, "This walk will follow Ridge Rd in front of the new police facility and cross over to Kenilworth at Ivy Ln. This sidewalk will not be constructed until the building contractor has completed his work."

In the meantime, council decided to send a letter to the county urging that service be started earlier than scheduled.

Miscellaneous

In other business, council: Received petitions from the Windsor Green Homeowners Association, one opposing extending Mandan Rd to Brae Brook Dr, and the other opposing the purchase of park land by the city "at a cost exceeding that set forth in the current Capital Improvements Program without a city-wide referendum."

Authorized the city to seek a to end the city's lease with the house on the former Schimmel property as of May 31, 1989. The property was acquired by the city as an addition to Schrom Hills Park, and the house will need to be destroyed in order to build the park.

Contributed \$1,125 to the Council of Governments as start-up funds for the implementation of its drug program in the D.C. metropolitan area.

Authorized the city to seek a Departure from Parking and Loading Standards (DPLS) application from the Planning Board in order to allow the Greenbelt Museum more off-street parking spaces. These are necessary because the museum plans to convert the garage at 10-B Crescent Rd. into a museum office.

Joined the Council of Governments in awarding the 1988-89 bid for road salt to Morton Salt Division at a cost of \$27.72 per ton.

Thanked Valerie Siegel for her service on the Crime Prevention Committee, upon receiving her letter of resignation.

Discussed the possibility of council meeting on some night other than Monday, since Monday night meetings so often have to be changed to another day.

Approved the purchase by staff of a high-speed computer printer. Learned from City Manager James K. Giese that work on the planned forebays at the peninsula end of Greenbelt Lake, which was scheduled to begin this winter, is still awaiting approval by the U.S. Corps of Engineers. While answering related enquiries by Mayor Pro Tem Joseph Isaacs, Giese said, "The indication is that (the approval) will not be forthcoming timely."

Question is Cost

To the Editor:

In response to Elaine Skolnik's article entitled "Modern Elementary School is Planned For Old Greenbelt - Question is Where," I direct some questions to our city government.

To quote (the) article, "An important factor in the choice (between a renovated Center School and a new school on the site of North End) would be cost." Architect R.C. Garcia has said that a new school would cost \$7,660,000 and a renovated Center would cost \$8,280,000. \$1,425,000 of this would be construction costs. Why is this renovation so expensive? Garcia's response was that the specialty (historical) items were very costly.

Could a new owner of this building renovate with less historical accuracy and therefore more cheaply? At the June open meeting at Center School, Richard Striner of the Art Deco Society promised that his organization could and would tie up all state funding unless the renovated building met the preservationists' demands. If your city becomes the owner of Center School, could we taxpayers afford to historically renovate this 57,500-square-foot building?

Two major expenses must be added to renovation costs, the price of blacktopping a minimum 100 additional parking spaces and adding two elevators to make the building handicapped-accessible. What are these costs? If the city takes occupancy (of Center), all current building codes would have to be met. What are the associated costs? Has anyone calculated the operating costs for a 57,500 sq. ft. building?

A survey will be mailed to each residence in February. How can the citizens make good judgments (without knowing) the real cost of owning Center School? Can we afford to own the school? If the city can't afford it, then we must ask the county public schools to renovate it! I believe renovation of the existing structure (as a school) is the most advisable alternative.

The Real Story


To the Editor:

Parcel 1 Water & Sewer Category Change Asked

City Manager James K. Giese reported last week that Rocky Gorge Communities, the contract purchaser of Parcel 1, has filed a request with the county for a change in the water and sewer system area designation for the tract. The request, if granted, would change the service priority from the current 6 to 4. A service area 4 designation is considered no planned service, while an area 4 designation means that construction of new systems will be programmed for a three to six year period. When in area 4, moreover, the property may be given conditional approval for service area 3, which gives immediate priority to new system construction.

Discussion of the request has been put on the agenda of the January 8 city council meeting.



ESTABLISHMENT OF TWO NEW CITY COMMITTEES

The Greenbelt City Council recently established two new city committees. One, the **Greenbelt Arts Advisory Committee**, shall be responsible for guiding the implementation of a city arts policy and shall consist of the following: One member from each of the three areas of the arts — performing, visual, and literary; one member with a background in arts education; at least two members of the business community; one member in good standing of the Park and Recreation Advisory Board; and a non-voting city staff member.

The committee shall write a proposed, formal arts policy for the city; provide advice on matters relating to the arts, including policies, programs, arts in public places, funding for private groups, and facilities for the arts; promote increased citizen participation in city and non-city arts programs and activities; assist city arts organizations in fund raising by providing information and assistance; supplement city staff as a liaison with arts-related organizations and aid in the planning and annual evaluation of the city's arts programs.

The second, **Greenbelt Foundation Ad Hoc Committee**, shall develop a framework for a Greenbelt Foundation and, to that end, shall recommend the purpose and goals for the foundation, its organizational framework, the makeup of the board of directors, draft articles of incorporation for the foundation to establish its tax-exempt status, define the foundation's relationship with the city, and make such other recommendations needed to establish the foundation. The ad hoc committee shall consist of two members of the Greenbelt business community, two residents of Greenbelt, and one member of the Community Relations Advisory Board.

Indications of interest are being sought from Greenbelt citizens and the business community.

internal circulation" over the five-level Center School. The "lower school building area (would generate) lower utility costs." It was also stated that the "site at North End provides 13 acres vs. six acres at the existing Greenbelt (Center) site" providing "substantially better playground area . . . better access to common spaces (dining, library, gym, etc. . . . better teacher interaction" and "access to more walking school children than" Center School.

History

When school administrators this past fall considered an alternative to the longstanding plan to rehabilitate Center School, the Greenbelt city council and residents were dismayed to learn that a proposed alternative was to build a modern elementary school and possibly a new middle school on part of the 72-acre surplus school land between Northway Extended and Hamilton Place in Old Greenbelt. After protests by city council, school officials withdrew any consideration of that land as an alternative for an elementary school.

The surplus school land was the center of a bitter dispute in the middle and late 1960s when the then-school board bought the land from a local developer for an elementary, junior high and senior high school complex. Greenbelters and successive city councils vehemently opposed building the schools on the virtually land-locked tract. The battle, which also spilled over into the courts and brought state and county officials into the Greenbelt camp, ended in 1971 when the school board decided to build the senior high school in Greenbelt East.

In April 1978 the surplus school land was approved for transfer from the Board of Education to the county government. Then in July 1986 the State Board of Public Works approved with conditions the transfer of the surplus land from Prince Georges County to the City of Greenbelt for use as "park, open space and other municipal purposes." The land is expected to be formally transferred to the city after negotiations between the state and county are settled and after the Prince Georges county council gives the required final approval.







What is a partial denture?


Although in most situations a nonremovable bridge is the preferred method to restore one or more missing teeth, it may not always be feasible or practical. Partial dentures are removable appliances which can also replace missing teeth. They are held in place by clip-like structures called clasps. The clasps are designed to encircle the designated teeth to provide support and resistance to movement of the partial denture.

Partial dentures are utilized in situations where either many teeth are missing or the remaining teeth are not strong enough to support a bridge. Since crowns are usually not needed for the supporting teeth the cost is somewhat less than a bridge. All factors must be thoroughly evaluated by your family dentist in determining the proper type of restoration for your particular needs. In most cases a choice of treatment plans can usually be offered.

JOE'S TIPS OF THE WEEK

Happy New Year!

We're another year older and so is your vehicle. Let me share a little tidbit with you so we can get your vehicle into the following years. On a couple of the warmer days lately we've noticed a white filmy residue on the oil level dip stick and underneath the oil fill cap, not in excessive amounts but enough to be concerned about. This residue is the reaction in a warm engine in cold air or a cold engine in warm air of the crankcase ventilation system which is supposed to circulate air through the engine in an uninterrupted flow by way of the PCV valve and breather filter element. This condition could be misdiagnosed as a coolant leak internal to the engine when in fact the recirculation system (PCV for short) just needs some attention. Till next week.
