Members Request Board Support For Nighttime Closure of Overpass

The board of directors of Grenebelt Homes, Inc. approved the agenda for the May 17 membership meeting, reviewed the results of radon testing in the cooperative, and heard a member appeal for nighttime closure of the Gladys Noon Spellman pedestrian overpass to help control vandalism occuring in GHI neighborhoods near the end of the walkway.

Roscoe Butler and his brother Glenn, both of Gardenway, asked the board to support a petition they are circulating. The petition asks that gates be installed on the walkway over the Baltimore Washington Parkway, and that the gates be closed from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. Roscoe Butler described increasing instances of vandalism which he believes can be traced to perpetrators who come across the overpass.

He detailed a recent incident when he and his brother caught a man in the act of breaking into a vehicle. When challenged, he said, the man fled in the direction of the overpass.

The petition had 138 signatures; Roscoe said that 50% of those signing wanted the overpass closed entirely. In response to a question, he said that he had not discussed the petition with residents in Greenbriar. Glenn, however, said that he had discussed the matter with people in Greenbelt East and fourd that the same problem exists there. He suggested that perpetrators are parking in Greenbelt East where extra cars attract less attention and then are crossing the overpass to commit crimes.

The board expressed sympathy for the residents whose property is being vandalized or stolen. However, several board members had reservations about the proposed remedy. Director Margaret Hogensen, said that "it is absolutely essential" that the walkway be open for students. She also recalled the protracted effort it took to get the overpass built and suggested that this petition might "open up the whole question again."

Director Chuck Hess queried whether some people might need to use the bridge earlier than 6 a.m. He especially mentioned users of the Metro buses which start running at 5:30 a.m.

Butler countered that, in his opinion, the board is obligated to support GHI members and respond to their concerns. He pointed to information which he said came from the police department that only one officer patrols all central Greenbelt at night. President Wayne Williams pointed out that this kind of incident is the kind of crime where Neighborhood Watches can be most effective but that the board had tried with no success to get GHI members interested in starting such a watch.

The board accepted the petition and agreed to discuss the matter further at the next board meeting on April 27. In the meantime, General Manager Ron Colton was instructed to contact city officials about the problem. Butler said that the petition would be presented to the city council on April 17.

Annual Meeting Agenda


The board approved the agenda for the annual membership meeting. In addition to reports from officers and the Audit Committee, the agenda provides for a vote by the membership on five bylaws changes and a change to the Certificate of Incorporation Charter.

Two of the bylaws changes and the change to the Certificate of Incorporation aim at compensating officers, directors, and employees for liability incurred in connection with their GHI duties. One of the proposed bylaws changes would replace Article XI of the current bylaws, which deals with such indemnification, with wording drafted by the corporation counsel which more fully takes advantage of the provisions of Maryland law. Another proposed bylaw change

enables a one-time amendment of the certificate of incorporation in order to insert a paragraph dealing with indemnification into the latter document Finally, the change to the certificate of incorporation itself is on the agenda.

Three other bylaws changes are proposed. One represents a return to an earlier practice of allowing members to vote for directors and candidates for the Audit Committee after the meeting. This change was proposed by the Nominations and Elections Committee. Another proposed bylaws change would limit the president's obligation to sign contracts to Mutual Ownership Contracts and any contracts which would involve transfer of real property. This change would bring the bylaws into line with current practice in which the gereral manager signs contracts for routine goods and services used by the cooperative.

One other proposed bylaw amendment would be an editorial change which would eliminate a discrepancy in deadlines which was inadvertently introduced into



the document when the bylaws were amended at the last meeting.

Door Prizes

The board authorized awarding a \$100 United States Saving Bond and two \$50 bonds as door prizes at the annual meeting which will be held at Center School on May 17.

Voting for the board of directors and audit committee members will take place from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. in the city council room on May 18.

Radon Testing

According to Colton's report, 407 units (at least one in every row) were tested during last winter. The results summarized for the board show that none of the homes tested reached the level of 4 picoCuries per liter of air (pCi/1) at which the Environmental Protection Agency recommends that some ventilating measures be undertaken. The block, frame, brick and the 25 townhouses averaged less than one pCi/1. The detached homes averaged 1.7. In one home where the measurement was 3.3 (still well below EPA's "action point") Colton noted that the measurement was taken in the basement where slightly elevated levels can be expected.

Colton said that all residents whose homes were tested have been provided with the test results for their units.

Tree Trimming Coatract

The board introduced for first reading a one-year extension of the tree trimming contract with Hall's Tree Service. The maximum amount of the contract is not to exceed \$30,000. Referring to last year's experience with drought and storms, Colton, when pressed by Hess, declined to say that this amount would cover the year's tree service costs but said he hoped it would.

Member Nathan Shinderman argued that the bylaws require that a contract of this size be put out for competitive bids. Colton, however, expressed satisfaction with the present service and pricing method which he thought GHI would have little chance of bettering through See GHI, page 4

Gypsy Moth Update: Spraying Starts Soon


by Renee M. Winsky The Maryland Department of Agriculture will begin spraving between April 28 and May 1, depending on the weather. Bt (Bacillus thuringiensis), a naturally occurring bacteria, will be applied to 668 acres in Greenbelt. An agricultural sticker will be added to the Bt so that it will adhere to the foliage. It will also adhere to other items, such as cars and lawn furniture. If washed off promptly, it should not harm such items. Bt is not harmful to people, pets, birds or other animals, but if ingested by caterpillars, gypsy moth,' tent or others, it is fatal. On the day of the spray, measures will be taken to warn people that the helicopter will be spraying. Again, the spray is not harmful to humans or pets, this is done only as a precaution.

A second application of Bt will be made by the city's aerial pesticide applicator to 410 acres in Greenbelt, approximately five days after the State's application, depending on proper weather conditions. This second spray, necessary because of the extremely high egg mass counts in the northeast section of the city, will provide greater control in this heavily infested area. The same measures will be taken to warn before the spraying.

No Protection To the Editor:

GHI's management, attorney and Nominations and Elections Committee have proposed amend-

ing GHI's bylaws and charter. At its March 23 meeting, GHI's board postponed certain of these proposals for study and directed attorney Marjorie Corwin to revise the proposed amendments on indemnification.

The attorney submitted further revisions on indemnification to the board on April 13. Ms. Corwin's new proposal would have us rewrite bylaws Article XI and insert into the charter a liability proposal which I had never seen until April 11. The proposed liability provis-

ion, locked forever into the charter, says that to the full extent of Maryland law neither GHI nor the membership an sue a LHI officer or director for money damages. And it says not one word about what that person may have done.

What is indemnification? If stmeone faces legal action, and if a corporation (in this case GHI) will furnish or pay for the legal defense and-if the case is lost -pay damages, the corporation has indemnified that person.

We ought to stand behind our elected people and staff if they've done an honest, responsible job. But not if they did wrong, out of malice, gross negligence, etc.

The existing Article XI indemnifies directors and employees provided that the claim does not arise "out of his or her own willful misconduct, gross negligence, or fraud."

Corwin's provision has no such restriction. Instead, she broad-ened the indemnification " to the maximum extent" permitted under Maryland law. She also put in language to assure that no matter what we do about amending or repealing Article XI, it still would be in effect for persons at risk for actions before such amendment or repeal. (This seems reasonable). I objected to taking out the existing restrictions as to circumstances and misbehavior, Corv. in replied that state law covers and will always cover these issues. I do not share her confidence that the legislature will neverrewrite the law to delete its present protections.

I am gratified that Corwin has added to the indemnification proposal the requirement that the GHI person face legal ac-tion "by reason of service in that capacity"-in other words. we'd no longer have to defend

them for actions having nothing to do with GHI. I'm pleased that she also added language that we don't indemnify "if it is proved that such person's actions were in bad faith," dishonest or for improper benefit. Bravo. Now please restore willful misconduct and/or gross negligence

and I'll feel lots better. As to her proposal for affording full liability protection for directors and officers in the charter, Corwin gave us no safeguards in cases of dishonesty, misconduct, gross negligence, etc. Sorry Ms. Corwin. As it now stands, we must vote no on the amendment to revise the charter and on her proposed liability amendment.

Amending the charter worries me. It is a precious monument in GIII history. Parts of it are obsolete or unintelligible. 1 would rather the Board set up a committee to study the charter and the bylaws.

I strongly am for the N&E proposal to let us vote both the night of the membership meeting and the following day. Mat Amberg

CENTER SCHOOL HOLDS ANNUAL SPRING FAIR



Why do dentists use different kinds of x-rays? The type of diagnostic information sought determines

the type of x-ray taken by your dentist. Periapical and bitewing are the two most common types. Periapical xrays show the entire tooth, including the root and supporting structure. They are held in place with either your finger or a specially designed holder. Bitewings, which are held by biting upper and lower teeth together, are primarily used to detect decay between the teeth. Both of these are referred to as "intraoral" types. An additional "intraoral," the occlusal film, is used to examine either the roof or floor of the mouth for cysts and other abnormal growth.

X-rays that are taken with the film kept outside the mouth are known as "extraoral." The most commonly used is the panoramic type. It shows all the teeth and most of the jaw on one large film. Impacted, tilted, or extra teeth, as well as certain fractures can be seen on the panoramic x-ray. Other "extra-oral" types are lateral jaw, which shows abnormalities of the jaw and temperomandibular joint, and cephalometric, which shows all the bones of the head to evaluate growth and development. These two are not routine and are taken only when a specific need exists.

GHI, Cont. from page 1 competitive bids. Since the bylaws specify that competitive bids are required only "when practible," the board chose to consider that the corporation would not benefit from putting out bids since an estimated 10-22 hours of staff time would be involved in doing so.

Household Insurance

In reporting on a recent fire in the 19 Court of Hillside which caused substantial damage to two units, the manager reported that he understood that one member had tenants property insurance to cover the loss of household contents but that, reportedly, the other did not.

Members of the board emphasized the importance of making members aware of the need for such insurance. Shinderman asked whether it would be possible for GHI to investigate "blanket insurance" which members could take advantage of on better terms than they could get individually. According to Assistant Manager Steve Wright such a program was tried at one time but few members showed any interest in it. Williams sugges ;ed that GHI could require new members have such insurance when they come into the cooperative. No actior was taken. New Audit Committee Member

In the absence of Secretar" Betty Deitch who is expected to be away several weeks, Director Mac Wirick agreed to assume the duties of corporation sucretary.
