Studies to Begin on Extending Kenilworth Avenue; Phase I Will Explore Build Options

The Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) has initiated project planning studies for the improvement of Kenilworth Ave. Extended (Edmonston Road/Md. 201 and Baltimore Ave./U.S. 1. Successive Greenbelt city councils have fought the extension of Kenilworth Ave. since the 1970s, believing that such widening would bring increased traffic, especially trucks, into the city. Similarly, city councils have opposed the construction of the Inter-County Connector on the grounds that the ICC would hook up Kenilworth Avenue Extended and funnel traffic through the city to the Baltimore-Washington Parkway and the Beltway.

The project study staff will develop and evaluate alternatives for improving Kenilworth Avenue Extended and Baltimore Avenue from the Capital Beltway (I-95) to just north of Muirkirk Road. Expected to take about two to three years, the initial process is split into three major phases, each separated by a public forum, according to SHA project manager Alan Straus.

This phase includes "agency and public involvement, the review of all reasonable build alternatives and the no-build alternative, as well as social, economic and natural and environmental analyses." In the 1970s a study was made of the proposed extension but location approval was not given. The impact on the environment and local opposition were cited as reasons at that time for no further action on the project. Since then, however, the Capital Office Park complex, consisting of six office buildings, was constructed. Two more buildings are also projected. The proposed federal courthouse is also expected to rise at the intersection of Edmonston Road and Cherrywood Lane.

Straus notes that during phase I of the project planning phase, considerations will include the no build alternatives, various Master Plan alignments and additional alternative road alignments "to solve the transportation needs and goal of the project." Upon completion of the preliminary concepts, he said, there will be "a public information meeting to inform the public and obtain comments."

Straus said that in phase 2 "we will go back to the drawing boards with information, including comments received, and come up with detailed alternatives." An environmental document will be prepared prior to phase 3, the "locational phase/design phase." The phase 3 public hearing is a "recorded, more formal

meeting," Straus observed, adding that the presentation will include maps and "discussion of individual needs and desires."

The comments from phase 3 will then be analyzed and a team composed of representatives from various counties and disciplines will come up with a recommendation which will be forwarded to State Highway Administrator Hal Kassoff.

Funding is available only for the project planning study.

Straus said that citizen involvement in the planning process is encouraged. ICC

Council Reschedules Traffic Work Session

The city council work session scheduled for 9 p.m. on Tuesday, March 5, on traffic enforcement issues, was cancelled at 8:10 that evening. City council was meeting in executive session with City Manager James Giese and Chief of Police James Craze on personnel issues before the scheduled work session. hook up with Route 198, which in turn ties in with Route 1.

SHA Project Manager Carl Teits said, "Basically, we are now responding to concerns expressed by environmental agencies during the review process." He explained that a new alternative northern alternative N1, N2—has been drawn up that basically follows the Master Plan for Md. 28, connects Md. 28 to Md. 198, then runs north of Md. 198 and ties back into I-95 at I-198. After the analysis of the northern alternative is completed, it will be evaluated by the various environmental agencies. Location approval must also be obtained from the Federal Highway Administration before the final design process can start.

During the design process, Teits noted, "We will then continue efforts to purchase the remaining rights-of-way."

Two segments of the ICC are funded for construction in 1996 in the Maryland Department of Transportation's Consolidated Transportation Program-1991 to 1996. These segments run between I-370 and Md. 28; and U.S. 29 and I-95.

Metro Will Hold Hearings On New Fare Changes

The Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority will hold public hearings in March and April on proposed Metrobus and Metrorail fare changes. The Transit Authority has proposed increasing the base transit fare from 85 cents to one dollar, with an average 18 percent increase in fares. The hearings will be held as follows:

Recycling to Begin in April, Council Appoints Committee

The city is gearing up for full participation in the county's new recycling program by increasing the number of members on its Recycling Advisory Committee from nine to 11 members. Recycling will begin in mid-April.

Members were appointed at the March 11 regular city council meeting — some for three-year terms, some for two-year terms and some for one-year terms, with the idea that not all appointments will terminate at the same time. Designation of length of term was made arbitrarily.

Those appointed were:

Beth Anderson, Deborah Henson, Bonnie L. Jenkins, and George P. Kreis, terms to expire January 1994;

Charlene MacAdams, Leonie Penney, Martha Price, and Hildie Sheffel, terms to expire January 1993; and

Brian Almquist, Alan Turnbull, and Charlotte Johnson, terms to expire January 1992.

CFG Presents Panel On Barnes Commission

2020. The Barnes Commission. A vision of Maryland's future. Governor Schaefer's Commission on Growth will be the featured topic at the Citizens for Greenbelt (CFG) Annual Meeting, Thursday, March 21, 8 p.m. at the Municipal Building. CFG's program, entitled: "Responsible Growth: The Barnes Commission Report and Beyond," will include panelists Steve Bunker, staff scientist with the Chesapeake Bay Foundation; Tom Burke, director, Chesapeake Bay Communications Office; Tom Dernoga, president, West Laurel Civic Association; and Susan Gray, Howard Countians for Responsible Growth.

Among the Barnes Commission's objectives are to provide greater growth controls in the Baltimore-Washington corridor and thereby reduce environmental damage to the Chesapeake Bay. The report's draft statement indicates that the State would play a stronger role in the oversight and coordination of future growth. However, critics of the report respond that this area would see increased density of development if the proposals were implemented. Others suggest that the State would be allowed to take too many powers away from the County regarding land use policies.

There will be a question and answer session after the panelist's presentations.

The membership will also elect new officers to the Board and vote on a proposed change to the organization's bylaws. The meeting is open to the public.

Penney, who was present at the council meeting, also recommended that the Greenbelt Greens, who featured recycling programs at the Labor Day Festival booth, should also be invited to participate.

Refuse Changes

City Manager James Giese noted that the city's refuse collection program will change drastically following the initiation of the county's recycling program. The Wednesday pickups of newspapers will be discontinued, he said, and special trash pick-ups rescheduled for Wednesdays only. He anticipates reductions in personnel for refuse collections.

Hunting Ridge Recycling Wins Award, Expands

The Hunting Ridge Recycling Committee received a Certificate of Recognition from Prince Georges County's Citizens Concerned for a Cleaner County. This is the second year Hunting Ridge has received recognition for the program.

The pilot recycling program has been expanded to include plastic bottles and all types of metal cans, in addition to newspaper, glass and aluminum.

Unlike the soon-to-begin county recycling program, which will accept only aluminum cans, the Hunting Ridge program recycles bimetal cans. Plastic items that are recyclable are soda, milk, water and detergent bottles, not bleach, antifreeze or motor oil containers.

The Hunting Ridge Recycling Committee meets on the third Wednesday of every month at the clubhouse. The next meeting will be held on March 20.

Publick Playhouse Presents Play of "Steel Magnolias"

"Laughter through tears is my favorite emotion," declares Truvy Jones, proprietor of Truvy's House of Beauty in Chinquapin, Louisiana. Prince Georges Little Theatre's production of *Steel Magnolias* offers plenty of "laughter through tears," as well as just plain laughter.

The six characters in the play show their strength and beauty, along with their foibles and fears, enthusiasms and pet peeves as they come to Truvy (played with verve by Helen Cameron) for their ritual of beauty on Saturday mornings. Key events in the life of Shelby (played by Danielle Levitan) form the focus for the four scenes, just as Shelby herself serves as a catalyst for change and blossoming in the lives of the others.

The opening scene takes place on Shelby's wedding morning. She and her mother, M'Lynn (Wanda Hurley) have come to have their hair done for this important day and to share the last-minute tensions and arguments traditional for a bride and her mother.

The romance of the bride sparks happy remembrances from neighbor Clairee (Mae Tawoda), widow of the former mayor. Her late husband couldn't quite last until their 50th anniversary, "but at least he made it through the football play-offs."

Neighborhood curmudgeon Ouiser (Eugenia Sorgnit) complains with spit and vinegar that all of her magnolias have been stolen for bridal decorations and her dog is being driven to a nervous breakdown by the wedding preparations. She doesn't hold it against the bride or her

mother but woe betide the father of the bride when he crosses her path. Sorgnit manages to show that Ouiser's crabby crustiness is her defense against life's hard knocks, but she's still susceptible to kindness—incoming and outgoing.

It is Ouiser's simple method of direct questioning that reveals the mystery surrounding newcomer Annelle (Megan Richardson). New to town and unwilling to explain herself on this, her first day of work at Truvy's, Annelle can't keep her secret against Ouiser. "Where do you live? Are you married? Aren't you? These are not difficult questions." Her comic tale of woe brings forth an invitation to the wedding and a dress to wear from Shelby, along with kindness and more substantial aid from the others.

While the play is structured on Shelby's reaching for "thirty minutes of wonderful instead of a lifetime of nothing special," in their humor and resilience the characters embody M'Lynn's simpler philosophy, that "life goes on." A lot of life goes on in this play.

Steel Magnolias is being performed for the next two weekends at the Publick Playhouse. Shows are Friday and Saturday evenings at 8 p.m., March 15, 16, 22, and 23; and on Sunday, March 17 at 2 p.m.

More Lake Park Concerns

To the Editor: The February 28, 1991 News Review reported on a public meeting with Greenhorne and O'Mara who have proposed a lake park plan. The article attributed three statements to me. One indicated I had complained about the unsightliness of the concessionaire's boats and quoted me as stating they "ruin the whole atmosphere" of the lake. Another part of the article claimed I complained about the appearance of the playground equipment. I made neither of those statements, although the article correctly indicated the concerns I expressed about group picnic facilities.

The February 28 article failed to mention the major concern I addressed — that the Lakeside Citizens Association had proposed a comprehensive plan, which was a compromise not reflecting some strong reservations many members voiced about existing problems, but which was designed to be acceptable to all of Greenbelt. I also enumerated a long list of parts of the LCA plan which the consultant had not addressed.

Among the major LCA proposals were:

- The development of maintenance standards.
- Use of natural materials for facilities, paths.
- A long-range plan to reduce the sedimentation rate and other pollution of the lake.
- Informal picnicking should be precluded at certain locations.
- Enforcement of park rules.
- A schedule of dredging, maintaining settling basins, storm water control, sediment control.
- Erosion control for Parcel 15 and the WSSC right of way, as well as a study of sedimentation flowing into the lake from areas outside the park.
- Limit the number of the concessionaire's boats.
- An annual report on the Lake Park. Hugh D. Jascourt

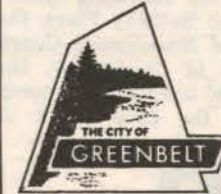
