# I. Reuben to Show Paintings In Gallery at Library Here

Paintings by Greenbelter Isidore Reuben will be on display at the Greenbelt Library through the month of June, with the public invited to attend the opening reception on Sunday, June 2, from 1 to 3 p.m.

Over two dozen paintings will be shown. Except for four owned by the artist, works will be loaned by friends and fans who have purchased art from him over the years. He began painting in the mid 1940s, is primarily self-taught, and has painted oils, acrylics, and made drawings with black pen and crayons. He has also set his hand to sculpturing in wood, metal and stone.

Born in 1913, Reuben grew up in New York City, where he met and married his wife, Mollie. Though he moved to Greenbelt in 1942, finding here "no better city in the world in which to live and raise a family." Reuben showed his art in various New York shows as early as 1949. The New York Times of that year notes of the Village Art Center that "in its large and lively exhibition... particularly admirable work is shown by... Isidore Reuben." In another Times review in 1951, of a one-man show at the Mortimer Levitt Gallery, his engaging paintings" were described as having "the look of samplers, for there is a certain naivete behind

their stiff, polka-dot patterns and in their precise encrusted pigment." The review said that "the unusual color harmonies are arranged with genuine originality."

In Washington, D.C., Reuben has shown works at the Franz Bader Gallery and at the Trans Lux Theater, where he had his first solo show in 1950. In 1962 his works appeared with those

# Weekend of Fun and Games Marks 54th Greenbelt Day

Traditionally, the City of Greenbelt throws a big party during the first weekend of June to mark the anniversary of the incorporation of Greenbelt as a municipality. On June 1, 1937 the town charter enacted by the Maryland State Legislature went into effect, providing for the first council-manager type of government in Maryland's history. By the time the law was a year old and the first Charter Day had come, Greenbelt had 610 families and 2,300 people. In 1990, there were about 19,458 residents in 9,455 housing units.

The celebration of the 54th anniversary of Greenbelt's incorporation on June 2 is too big for just one event. The entire weekend of June 1 and 2 will be celebrated with a range of recreational activities for all ages. (See Schedule on page 12.)

Weekend highlights include a Community Sock Hop, the 8th annual Arts and Crafts Fair, Moonlight Jazz Concert, Ride-A-Bike for Retarded Citizens, Greenbelt Day Volksmarch, American Legion Festival, and the Greenbelt Day Ceremony and Concert. Sports activities include softball, baseball, t-ball, tennis and much more.

The anniversary weekend will kick off Friday evening, May 31 at 8 p.m., with the Happy Day's Community Sock Hop at the Youth Center Gym. A D.J. will play music from the '30's, '40's, and '50's up to the present. The dance will feature contests and door prizes. Refreshments will be sold by the Greenbelt Lions Club.

As is traditional, the Roosevelt

Center Mall will be the scene for the Arts and Crafts Fair on Saturday, June 1 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Local crafters will display their talents and works. Featured crafts include quilting, woodcarving, stained glass, pottery, basket weaving and other handicrafts. The fair is sponsored by the Visual Arts Coalition. In the event of rain, the program will be cancelled.

# Spraying Mosquitos

Beginning in June, the Maryland Department of Agriculture will start its mosquito control program in Greenbelt. Spraying malathion will be done only if a request is received and the Department of Agriculture determines the area requested should be sprayed.

The city's Public Works Department, 474-8004, will take citizen's requests for mosquito spraying and pass them along to the Department of Agriculture. When making a request for mosquito spraying it is important to specify the time of day the mosquitos are the worst and describe the exact location of the problem area. Spraying will be done only once a week. If no requests are received prior to our treatment day, no areas will be sprayed.

Mosquitos breed in any water-holding container, including bird baths, wading pools, pet watering dishes, tin cans, old tires, clogged gutters or flower pots. To prevent mosquito breeding in these areas, water should be changed weekly, gutters cleaned out and other water holding containers should be disposed of or stored upside down.

# Council Recognizes Labukas; Listens to Citizen Concerns

The May 13 regular city council meeting dealt with the "Ride-A-Bike for the Retarded" program, the displaced homemaker program, and concerns of citizens at Windsor Green. City Manager James K. Giese did not attend since he was called out of town.

### Ride-A-Bike

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld presented a proclamation recognizing Eileen Labukas's work in the Ride-A-Bike for the Retarded Program. Margie Deakman accepted on behalf of Labukas, who was unable to attend. June 2 was proclaimed as Eileen Labukas Ride-A-Bike for the Retarded Day. Greenbelt has been a co-sponsor of the event since its inception in 1971, and Labukas has worked on the program all 20 years.

Alfred McMasters was honored with the Hosie D. White Memorial Award as the participant who displayed outstanding achievement during the annual statewide program. McMasters raised \$1,335 last year for the 19,000 citizens of Maryland with mental retardation.

### Windsor Green

Sheldon Goldberg, Secretary of the Windsor Green Homeowners Association addressed council over the concerns of homeowners in that development that city bonds may be released prior to the completion of work by the builder, specifically the removal of dead trees. City Planner Celia Wilson stated that she was aware of the problem but that it was not covered under the city bond and therefore the bond cannot be evoked to get the situation corrected. She agreed to schedule a site meeting with all parties involved.

Councilmember Ed Putens pointed out that 10 years ago a system was set into place with the city stating that, "when the city was about to release a bond they would have an officer of the board of directors sign off on the bond to insure that nothing was still outstanding."

### Lakewood, Stormwater Management

Putens asked Wilson the status of the Lakewood Stormwater Project. Wilson reported that a draft was approved and that a waiver was needed from Prince Georges County of the purchasing requirements. As for the delay, she stated that "the red tape was not here in the city." Putens suggested bringing in Prince Georges Councilmember Richard Castaldi, "to get the situation straightened out." Weidenfeld concurred, stating that "citizens perceive the problem being with

the city" not being aware of the problems the city is experiencing with the county. Wilson mentioned that a draft was approved in advance, then the county attorney's office asked that the city comply with county regulations. This is no longer possible, since contracting firms have already been hired, a situation similar to that of Greenbrook Lake, which now forces the city to seek a waiver from county regulations.

### Displaced Homemakers

B. Barbara Lilly addressed the council to discuss the Career Paths Program at the New Ventures Counseling Center in Bowie. She noted that New Ventures' Displaced Homemakers' Program provided career counseling and support groups for displaced homemakers of at least 30 years of age who have lost their primary source of income as a result of separation, divorce, death or disability of a spouse. The program helps the women to identify their marketable skills and teaches strategies for reentering the workforce. New Ventures is located in the YMCA Building at 3501 Moylan Drive in Bowie, their phone number is 464-2622.

# Hoyer Initiates Wetlands Action

Congressman Steny Hoyer has requested the State Highway Administration to review a proposal that "would acquire and preserve as wetlands approximately 17 acres" of the Jaeger tract. The proposal calls for the acquisition to be made "through an exchange of wetlands that may be required for highway construction elsewhere in Prince Georges County." The wetlands, surrounded by Greenbelt Park, are on the tract that also houses the Westchester Park development, located off Kenilworth Avenue.

Hoyer also requested that an additional eight acres near Good Luck Road, also surrounded by the Park, be examined "for the possibility of acquisition."

In his March 15 letter to SHA Administrator Hal Kassoff, Hoyer said: "The National Park would greatly appreciate the acquisition of this land to provide a more logical boundary to the Park." He noted that State Senator Leo Green supported the land acquisition "either for Greenbelt Park or for the State as open space."

According to Charles Siegel, Hoyer's press secretary, SHA is currently reviewing the issue.

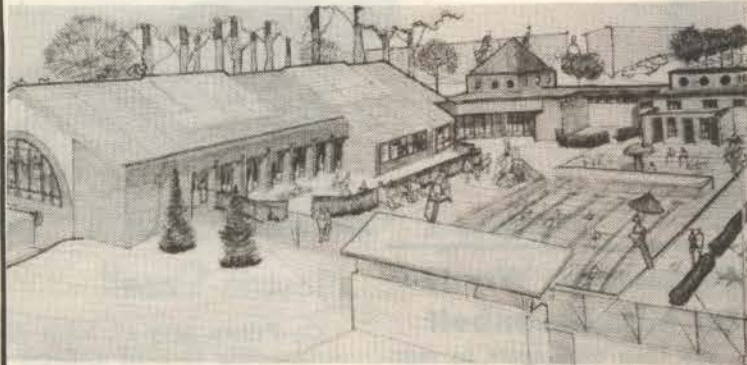

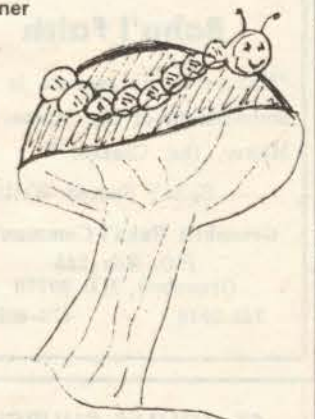

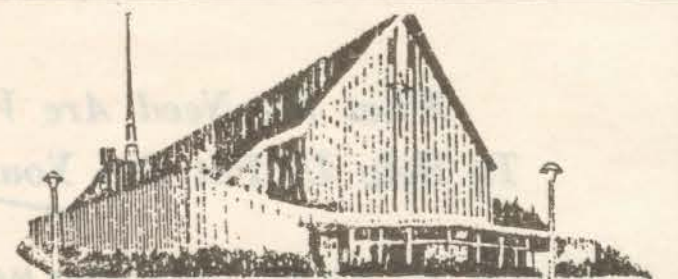

"the most original . . . with bold, flat designs."

The most descriptive review in his collection seems to be the Art Digest's July, 1951, review of 57th Street (New York) gallery shows: It says that "there is a fearful symmetry in Isidore Reuben's canvases of flat-patterned still-lives and views (with) vague suggestions of things as various as primitive embroidered samplers. . . . Reuben's work has a distinct personal stamp which defies pigeon-holding."

Reuben has often participated with paintings and drawings in the Greenbelt Labor Day art shows. In 1938 he was awarded first prize in oils for one of his flower paintings. Besides those mentioned, he has had one-man shows and taken part in group shows in Maryland.

The artist's sense of humor helps him bear the vagaries of the artist's life. He says that people viewing his paintings often have strong reactions pro and con, and he relates an incident when he was in a group show in a Georgetown gallery where a wife was urging her husband to purchase a penguin painting and the husband resisted and won. But in another incident in a Bethesda gallery, a man brought along an interior decorator he had hired to redo his place. Over the decorator's insistence that it had no place in the planned redecoration scheme, the man bought one of Reuben's nudes.

He would warn anyone wanting to be an artist to avoid painting pictures that might have "charm, freshness and simplicity" (a quote from a museum curator that turned down the gift of some of Reuben's paintings) or that person won't be able to give the paintings away. Reuben estimates his paintings and drawings number over 1500.

He hadn't intended to have another show of his works but was persuaded by long-time family friend Barbara Simon, who has done the preparation for the exhibition and who will enlist husband Tom, a Greenbelt librarian, to help her hang the works for the Greenbelt show.

The gallery is open Monday through Thursday from 2-8 p.m. and Friday and Saturday from 2-5 p.m. It is located on the lower level of the Greenbelt library.

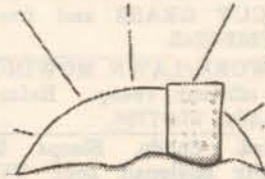

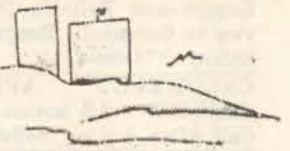
