Federal Commission Approves Plan For New Courthouse Near BARC

The National Capital Planning Commission (NCP) on July 25 gave its blessing to the location, program and most of the development concepts for the planned United States Courthouse for the Southern Division of Maryland. Located adjacent to the Capital Office Park, but just outside the city limits on the fringe of the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC), the four-story facility will be situated on a 9.3 acre tract north of Cherrywood Lane near Edmonston Road (Kenilworth Ave.)


NCP's approval will be effective when modifications are made to the "Federal Facilities element of the Comprehensive Plan" for BARC. NCP staff will initiate this process to change the courthouse site designation on the plan from "Research, Development Testing Facilities" to "Judicial Facilities." NCP also suggests that the Department of Agriculture "modify its Master Plan, eliminating the courthouse site from its installation." (NCP's role in the reviewing process is advisory since the courthouse land is outside the District of Columbia.)

According to Government Services Administration (GSA) Project Manager Harry Debus, the site has "technically" been transferred to GSA. He noted that there have been discussions with Greenbelt concerning annexation of the property. In October and December, he said, NCP will review more detailed site and building plans for the 180,000 gross square-foot courthouse. Construction is expected to start in early 1992, with occupancy of the courthouse slated for early 1994.

Environmental Assessment

The Environmental Assessment (EA) found that "no hazardous materials are evident on site" . . . fill material will still be required to improve soil conditions for construction purposes. . . and wire mesh control fencing and sediment retention dams could be used to "protect (nearby) wetlands and floodplains." The EA also found that "No endangered plant or animal species inhabit the site."

The EA also includes a Transportation Management Program (TMP). NCP staff recommends that, in view of the remoteness of the courthouse site, GSA "explore opportunities to encourage carpooling, vanpooling, and possible shuttle bus service to the proposed Greenbelt Metro-rail station and thereby reduce the need for employee parking."



TMP improvements also being considered involve lane utilization changes of the northbound and southbound approaches on Kenilworth Avenue and a traffic signal at the intersection of Cherrywood Lane and Kenilworth Avenue.

Road Improvements?

In January 1991, the State Highway Administration initiated a study to "develop and evaluate alternatives for improving Kenilworth Ave (MD 201) Extended and Baltimore Avenue (U.S. Route 1) from the Capital Beltway (I-95) to north of Muirkirk Road. . ." Stage I—Project Planning—is funded and is expected to take three to four years to complete. The following three stages—Design, Rights-of-Way and Construction have not yet been funded.

Greenbelt City Councils have opposed the extension and widening of Kenilworth Avenue, which is expected eventually to hook up with the Intercounty Connector, linking Montgomery and Prince Georges Counties.

The Building

Debus explained that the architectural firm of Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum (HOK) is addressing NCP's recommendation that GHA continue to refine the courthouse design, particularly the main entrance approach, to "express a prestigious Federal presence that symbolizes the judicial function." NCP observed that "As currently designed, the building resembles its speculative office building environment."

According to HOK, by configuring a site that was long, narrow and irregular, wetlands would be avoided and trees would be left standing at the boundary. Tucked into the site from its high point (near Cherrywood Lane) to its low point, the building will feature a fan-shaped facade which would face Cherrywood Lane and house the courtrooms. While architects anticipated the building to have a "cleaner and modern exterior," they emphasized the interior would be traditional.

The facility will serve Prince Georges, Montgomery, Calvert, Charles and St. Mary's counties. It will house seven courtrooms (District, Bankruptcy and Magistrate courts) and space for U.S. attorneys, trustees, marshals, support staff and a satellite office for the incumbent member of Congress.

Debus noted that only about half of the 297 courthouse employees are currently employed by the court system.

Four Year Council Term Supported by GEAC

GEAC (the Greenbelt East Advisory Coalition) has adopted an official position in support of a four-year city council term. Five of the six member boards gave their approval of the motion, calling for a referendum on the issue, that had been passed at the May 2 meeting. (No meeting was held in June.)

At the July 11 meeting, held at Windsor Green, host and GEAC vice-chair Sheldon Goldberg recapped the recent city council discussion of campaign reform, including proposals to strictly enforce the 100-foot limit for poll workers and to reduce "sign pollution" by restricting signs to designated locations. He noted the potential conflict of such proposals with the First Amendment's freedom of speech provision.

Two objections were raised to the idea of dividing the city into districts that would elect representatives to the council. Council member Antoinette Bram said that political parties emerge when wards are created. Federal

employees, such as Mayor Gil Weidenfeld and council member Ed Putens, could not take part in Greenbelt government, because of the Hatch Act, if there were political parties involved in Greenbelt elections.

Goldberg also pointed out that districting is done by population, not numbers of voters. Of the city's 21,000 residents, about 6,000 live in Greenbelt East, which has the highest number of registered voters; the Springhill Lake precinct has about 8,000 residents and by far the fewest number of voters.

Ora Glen Traffic Light

Progress on installation of the traffic light at Hanover Parkway and Ora Glen Drive was noted. The light was expected to be operational in five to six weeks. The delay from the original schedule was caused by the decision to create a queue lane for left-turns that required cutting into the median island. (The queue lane provides "stacking space" so that cars waiting to turn left are not blocking the through lane.)

Ed Schilling, noting that two council members were present (Bram and Putens), took the opportunity to thank council for moving so quickly on installation of the light after the work session on February 12. He termed the light "one of the more responsive moves council has made".

Schrom Hills Update

Grading has begun for the construction of Schrom Hills Park, with some modifications made to the plans to preserve noteworthy trees. One of the modifications, creation of an island around the trees to be saved in the parking lot, raised the question of how many parking spaces will actually be needed. That question led directly to a discussion of the lake and lights for the ballfields.

The status of both of those features remains in doubt, said James Foy of Hunting Ridge, who is GEAC chair. Both would undoubtedly draw people to the park. The residents of Hunting Ridge, across Hanover Parkway from the park, are on record as opposing the ballfield lights.

Last year the city council went to look at various lighted fields, Bram said, and even with the best design the neighbors will see the lights. "We need a compromise struck between the need for playing fields and for preserving green space." Lighting the Northway ballfields, which are not near homes, makes the most sense, she said, but a vocal group opposes the idea.

METRO HOLDS HEARING ON F6 ROUTE CHANGE

Several months ago, when news of the reversal of the F6 bus route was first published in the News Review, a resident of the 1 Court of Westway on behalf of himself and his neighbors, visited the city office. He feared that when the bus went the other way up the steep hill, it would make a great deal of noise—more than the considerable amount it was already making. He asked the city to ask Metro to route the buses up Southway, take a right on Ridge Road, proceed to Westway, take a left and proceed on its normal route. The city made this request on behalf of the residents, and Metro looked at the request and declined to make the change.

When the route reversal began on July 15, the city received several complaints from the residents of 1 Court Westway about the noise. The city staff wrote another letter to Metro, noting that the feared problems with noise were now a reality, that few riders would be affected by the change, and that the change would not be a difficult one for Metro to effect. Metro and Prince Georges County staff made a field visit to the area, and have agreed to recommend the requested route change.

In order to make a change in the route (as opposed to the previous change in the F6 route, which involved reversal of part of the route but not a change in the roads receiving service), a public hearing must be held in 60 days. The hearing will be in the council chambers on Tuesday, August 20, at 7:30 p.m. Assuming the change goes forward, implementation will occur 30 days after the hearing.



I have been waiting for the wreckers to arrive and tear down North End School. Empty for ten years, it could be waiting too. But it has not been idle — not completely.

Whenever there was a decent snowfall, the hills behind the school made for great sledding. Dog owners used its lawns for an unobtrusive place to let their dogs run. Some of us used it as a playground: I stood at the bottom of a hill to catch Michael as he ran down, blissfully screeching.

For a while we neighbors voted there. It was almost an unpleasant experience, the smell of mold and mildew filled the unused corridors. Fans were set up to push the air around. They did not help much, but at least the lonely building had some visitors.

One winter we took a chilly tour of the vacant school. Architectural drawings for a potential community center were posted beside a hot coffee pot. City leaders and interested neighbors commiserated with members from Greenbelt's various committees about what could be done with the derelict building. As we sipped coffee, we talked excitedly about fulfilling our dreams through remodeled school rooms. Somehow these hopes trickled over to Center School, leaving North End all the more desolate.

In the beginning North End School was full of children and their dreams. I imagine them sitting at their wooden desks, staring out the windows onto Ridge Road. From my kitchen windows I watched those children amble to and from school. When North End closed, I missed that young traffic. It reminded me of my own happy, dream-laden walks to school.

Yet there is a dream to come. It is a vision of my own children walking up Ridge Road to their brand new North End School.

There are over 30 Alcoholics Anonymous meetings a week there, as well as Narcotics Anonymous, Chemical Dependency Anonymous, Alanon, Co-dependency Anonymous, and Adult Children of Alcoholics. Coda, Alanon, and A.C.A. are support groups for friends and loved ones trying to deal with the terror, resentment and heartbreak caused by another's alcoholism or drug addiction. Also in the club there are Gamblers Anonymous, Overeaters Anonymous and, coming soon, Debtors Anonymous. When meetings aren't going on it's a drop in for coffee, soda and understanding.

The club is open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday. Friday and Saturday nights there are midnight meetings. Also the club opens for an hour Monday through Friday at 6:45 a.m. for sunshine AA meetings.

Aug. 15 Is Deadline For Extended Taxes

Taxpayers who didn't file their federal tax return by the April 15 due date, but took advantage of a 4-month automatic extension by filing Form 4868, are reminded that they have until August 15 to mail their tax return to the Internal Revenue Service.

Taxpayers who included a payment when they filed the extension form back in April should be sure to enter that payment on line 58 of their Form 1040. Those who file Form 1040A should include the amount paid in the total on line 28d and write "Form 4868" and the exact amount in the space to the left of the line. Form 1040EZ cannot be used with an extension of time to file.

Recycling to Start In County Schools

The Prince Georges County Office of Recycling has awarded the County Board of Education a three-year grant of more than \$350,000 to start a system-wide recycling program. The grant monies will enable the school system to purchase the necessary initial equipment, vehicles, staff and materials to begin operating a comprehensive recycling program.

Dubbed SIR, for Schools Involved in Recycling, the program is designed to significantly reduce the amount of trash sent to the county landfills by phasing in paper and aluminum recycling programs in all of the county's public schools. Implemented in annual phases, the SIR program will involve roughly half the schools or sites in the county during the first phase of operation.





Traffic Concerns

The Greenbelt Road-Frankfort Drive intersection continues to be of concern. Dorothy Pyles of Greenbriar asked whether the flashing yellow light that had been installed was working during the summer school session. Goldberg gave his opinion that even during the school year the light is flashing for too short a period directly before or after the opening or closing of school. The intersection is dangerous not just for school children but for everyone who uses it, he said. Foy was directed to look into the question with the school board and the State Highway Administration.

Concern was also raised about speeding on Ora Glen Drive and Greenbrook Drive. Several Windsor Green residents were considering requesting lower speed limits or "No Through Traffic" signs to slow traffic on Ora Glen. Putens suggested that it is not the through traffic but the residents who are the most frequent speeders, offering anecdotal evidence of encounters with violators who turned out to be neighbors.

Katie Calder of Greenbrook Village called for enforcement of the existing speed limit, saying it is "totally unacceptable that speed limits are not enforced in Greenbelt East."

It was agreed that GEAC would write to Greenbelt Police Chief James Craze to request stepped up enforcement and suggested that all of the member boards should do likewise.

Foy Is Leaving

The August 1 meeting of GEAC featured the election of a new chair. James Foy, who is in his second year in the post, tendered his resignation from chair and from GEAC. He is buying a new home outside of Greenbelt.




Henderson Will Head HMO Association


