Two Foot Snow Does Not Faze Dedicated Public Works Crews

Although Greenbelters faced high piles of snow in front of their driveways and beside cars parked on the streets, they still wondered what all the fuss was about in the rest of the Washington area with streets closed and transportation services canceled. As usual, the Greenbelt Public Works Department came through with flying colors and kept city streets open to necessary traffic and emergency vehicles.

"I went out with Kenny Hall [Public Works Superintendent of Operations] on Monday and drove all over town," Mayor Antoinette Bram reported. "It's amazing the work that the city crews had done as compared to the conditions on the state highways such as Greenbelt Road and Kenilworth Avenue."

How deep the snow was in Greenbelt depends on whom you talk to. The wind did cause drifts that made some parts deeper than others. One television station reported a snowfall of 18 inches in College Park. Hall thought it was more like 25 inches. Whatever, the street crews worked around the clock from Saturday to Monday evening keeping all city streets in "passable" condition, with crewmembers taking only brief rest breaks.

"Slap in the Face"

On Tuesday, crews began the day concentrating on clearing out parking lots and opening up roadways to full widths. However, a predicted snow flurry that turned into a fall of several more inches of snow forced city crews to go back to plowing the streets again. Bram called the unexpected added snow a "slap in the face" to the "excellent and constant" effort of the city crews.

In snow emergencies, first priority is given to the main roads with every effort given to keep the minor streets and cul-de-sacs open for essential travel. Once the snow stops and the streets are open to travel, the crews then concentrate on clearing city parking lots to enable city and commercial facilities to open for business, and to widen streets from curb-to-curb.

Once the city crews returned to clearing parking lots and widening roadways, they faced an arduous task expected to take many days to complete. These jobs require the use of the city's limited number of heavy duty trucks and front end loaders. There was too much snow for the plows to just push it to the side in the parking lots, and the snow had to be loaded onto trucks and hauled away to the Northway ballfields.

Public Assistance

Parked cars make it difficult for plows to do their work. Hall urged residents to keep cars off the streets as much as possible, to keep them to one side of the street until the plows clear the other side and then to move them so that plows can get to the other side of the street. Public Works Director Carl Hirsch noted a special problem caused when cars

park on both sides of the entrance to the turnarounds at the end of dead-end streets. He urged residents to throw the snow from driveways and around parked cars onto the area behind the curb rather than into the streets. Snow thrown into the streets will most probably be pushed back into driveways and beside parked cars again.

Hall thinks the department is in pretty good shape to face another snow storm. "We'll start the process all over again," he said. Although minor equipment breakdowns have required extra effort by the city's auto repair mechanics, there have been no major breakdowns. The city's road salt supply is plentiful and plenty of salt is on hand at the suppliers. Also on hand is a supply of sand, used as an abrasive when it is too cold for the salt to melt show.

Outstanding Job

Hirsch could not praise his crews enough for the outstanding job they did. He made a point to include the crew at the mechanic's shop for commendation. The blades on snow plows regularly wear out from scraping the streets and need to be replaced. Hydraulic hoses on equipment also wear

out and break, requiring replacement.

Two new dump trucks are on order. Hirsch is grateful that the city council approved their purchase and that the city is replacing 1 1/2 ton trucks with heavier duty 2 ton trucks. He believes that the larger trucks will be more useful to the city in dealing with snow emergencies. He only wishes that he had had them for this storm.

The city has hung on to an old bulldozer that it once used in operating a landfill many years ago. Although it sits idle for most of the time, it really becomes useful when a major snow storm occurs. No other piece of equipment can push a big pile of snow as well. Not scheduled for replacement, it will be kept for snow emergencies, Hall says, until it breaks down and repair parts are no longer available.

Oops!

A snow crew did get into trouble pushing a pile of snow with another piece of equipment, according to Hirsch. It turns out that there was a small car under the pile, which sustained some damage. It is not unusual for snow removal equipment to hit parked vehicles sticking out farther into the roadway than other cars when plowing during heavy snowfalls, even though a second crewmember usually rides "shotgun" on the truck.

During the snow emergency, the department responded to several special requests. Some were to help fire department ambulances and police vehicles get to emergency scenes. One special request was from a resident in Greensprings to open up his driveway so that he could take his wife, who had begun labor, to the hospital. Public Works crews also opened up the entrance to the Greenbelt Nursing Home and Convalescent Center for emergency use, if necessary. Once the vehicles are dug out and put on the road, the city crews

planned to clean out the parking area for postal vehicles.

Although most residents were pleased to see the plows go by at any hour, one woman did call the department late at night to complain that the noisy plows had awakened her grandchild. There were also the usual complaints about plows pushing snow back into cleared driveways and against parked cars just dug out from the snow.

Refuse Service

The city cancelled refuse service for most, if not all of the week, with regular service to be resumed Monday, unless another snow emergency occurs. Crews are not working not only because of difficulty in accessing refuse containers but also because crew members are snowed in at their homes. Residents are urged to clear paths to their refuse containers.

Recycling collections also were cancelled and will probably not be resumed until late this week or early next week.

We're Baking Bread" - Co-op

"We're selling virtually everything we have," said Bob Davis, manager of Greenbelt's Co-op grocery, during Tuesday's post-blizzard mob scene at the store. "No one in Greenbelt is going to starve, but we're kind of harried around here."

Closed Sunday during the height of the storm, the Co-op was open for business on Monday and Tuesday and served record crowds. Fortunately, half of the staff lives within a mile of the store, said Davis, and "a good group of core employees came early and stayed late."

Deliveries were way down. Only three deliveries were received on Tuesday, instead of the usual 40. The store's stock of milk and bread ran out on Tuesday afternoon. "We're baking bread and rolls in back of the store to make up the shortfall," said Davis. "If we only had cows, we'd do some milking."

The Jan. 13 Open Door Meeting with Maryland legislators has been cancelled due to the snow. The meeting will be rescheduled.


State Tax Offices Open on January 15

Maryland State Comptroller Louis L. Goldstein says all state income tax offices will be open on Monday, January 15, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. to assist Maryland taxpayers. Most other state and federal agencies will be closed due to the observance of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday.

In addition to Monday, January 15, the Comptroller's Office will be open for business while other state offices will be closed on the following holidays: Monday, February 12, Lincoln's Birthday; Monday February 19, Washington's Birthday; Monday, March 25, Maryland Day; and Friday, April 5, Good Friday.

Twenty local taxpayer service offices will be open on each of these dates, and tax officials will help complete Maryland returns, answer questions, or provide tax forms and other information. The addresses and phone numbers of the offices are listed on the back of the Maryland Income tax booklet and in most local phone directories.

The office closest to Greenbelt is located at 2730 University Blvd. West, Wheaton. A new office is scheduled to open at 8181 Professional Place, New Carrollton.



POLICE BLOTTER

Based on Information Released by the Greenbelt Police Department

Based on information released in the Weekly Activity Report dated January 5, by the Greenbelt Police Department.

A woman was robbed at gun point on the evening of Thursday, Jan. 4, in the 6000 block of Springhill Dr. While walking to her residence, she observed two men who appeared to be arguing. As she entered the apartment building, the two men walked up to her, one grabbed her around the neck, produced a handgun and demanded money. After telling the men her money was in her vehicle, she was forced back to her car. The men took her money and jewelry, and fled the scene on foot towards Springhill Lane.

The suspects are described as: 1) a black man, about 26 years old, 5'7", 160 lbs., dark complexion, wearing all black clothing, displaying a handgun; and 2) a black man with dark complexion, wearing dark clothing, also displaying a handgun.

Responding to a report of a vehicle illegally parked in a handicapped space in Greenway Center on Sunday, Dec. 31, the officer asked the driver to move the vehicle. After the woman responded using profanity, the officer issued a parking citation. When he noticed a two-year-old child standing on the back seat of the vehicle, he inquired as to the location of the safety seat. At this time the driver attempted to drive away, and the officer told her to park the vehicle and produce a driver's license and registration

At this time the adult passenger began yelling profanities at the officer, causing several people

to gather. The passenger was told to cease or be placed under arrest. When she continued to be abusive, the officer ordered the passenger out of the vehicle. While attempting to handcuff her, the officer was struck in the head by the passenger. The driver exited the vehicle and also began striking the officer. A second officer, who responded to assist the arresting officer, was also assaulted by the two women.

Both women, non-residents ages 32 and 24, were arrested, charged with battery, disorderly conduct and resisting arrest. After appearing before a District Court Commissioner, the women were released pending trial. A 15-year-old non-resident juvenile passenger in the vehicle was also arrested, charged with disorderly conduct, and released to a parent pending trial.

Thefts

A man reported a burglary in

progress at his residence in the 5900 block of Cherrywood Lane on Thursday evening, Jan. 4. Upon returning home, the man noticed from outside, that the lights of his apartment were on and that someone was looking out through the balcony door. The man saw a possible suspect running from the apartment building while he believed another suspect remained inside. Officers checked the apartment for other suspects, though none were found. While a burglary occurred, nothing appeared to have been taken. The suspect was described as a black man with dark complexion wearing dark cloth-
