# **Adopted Legislation Furthers County Setting Growth Policy**

The Prince George's County Council recently passed two pieces of legislation to upgrade the quality of new townhouses to be built in the county and to eliminate the Moderately Priced Dwelling Units (MPDU) program. These measures are part of the development of a new comprehensive growth policy for the county according to Greenbelt's representative, on the county council, Audrey Scott. Scott says the county council has been meeting in worksessions for the past two years to examine the issue of growth. The council has acknowledged in a mission statement that the growth policy is realistic, fiscally responsible and based on clear legal standards. It will protect and advance the health and safety of the county's citizens, the integrity of their neighborhoods and the quality of their environment while fostering desired economic development in the context of the region's growth. "Like Kudzu"

According to Scott, the new legislation came about in response to a concern that the county, over the past several decades, has become the "affordable housing capital of the region." She noted that garden apartments had flourished in the sixties and seventies and that in the eighties and nineties, townhouses had grown "like kudzu." While the neighboring counties had produced balanced communities with relatively equal shares of upscale and mid-priced family housing, single townhouses and apartments, Prince George's County "developed lopsided ratios with a heavy emphasis on the lower end of the housing market," she said. The new legislation requires townhouses to have brick or stone fronts and minimum square footages of at least 1,250. They will also have to be at least 20 feet wide.

## "The wonder is that, until now, a growth policy had never been adopted in Prince George's County," Audrey Scott, County Council

Other legislation enacted eliminates the MPDU program. That program allowed developers to increase their densities in exchange for providing lower income houses as a percentage of

each development. The lower priced units were supposedly unchanged on the outside, but had fewer interior upgrades. The County Department of Housing and Community Development was responsible for marketing these lower priced units. Scott says the developers' desire for increased densities produced a surplus of MPDU's and many units have been left vacant while the county searched for qualified buyers.

#### **Upscale Housing**

Since there is an inordinate amount of low income housing already available, Scott says the task of the county government is to attract the upscale housing market suitable for purchase by executives. She singles out the Donatelli and Klein developments of Longleaf and Westwood in Bowie as meeting these objectives. These homes are being built on larger lots to sell for from between \$250 and \$400 thousand. The present effort to modify and eliminate some past housing policies is consistent with the recommendations of the Housing Policy Task force established last year by County Executive Wayne Curry. According to Scott, the goal is to establish balance in the housing mix, and to See GROWTH, page 2

Rock Into the New Year Three bands will provide heavy beats in the multipurpose room upstairs. The evening is cosponsored by the Eleanor



#### **GED Programs**

Greenbelt CARES will begin the winter 10-week GED program on Tuesday, January 14, 1997. (The course will end on Thursday, March 20.)

GED I is held from 10:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. GED II is held from 1 - 3 p.m.

GED I is for students who need review of basic math (addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, percentages and word problems) and English grammar skills.

GED II is for students who have successfully completed GED I and/or are ready to learn algebra and geometry, English literature and writing skills, and prepare to take the GED test.

GED is held every Tuesday and Thursday, for 10 weeks, in the Municipal Building Conference Room, 25 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, MD 20770. There is no charge for Greenbelt residents in either course, but students are required to purchase a copy of the textbook (purchased from Greenbelt CARES) at a cost of \$11. Non-Greenbelt residents are required to pay a \$100 registration fee. Students do not have to be 16 years of age in order to take the GED course. Students are eligible to take a GED pre-test given at Greenbelt CARES at no cost. The actual GED test is given by the State of Maryland, not Greenbelt CARES. However, students who are ready to take the test can obtain the application forms from Greenbelt CARES. Questions and enrollment information regarding either GED I or GED II should be directed to Judye Hering, course instructor, at Greenbelt CARES, 301- 345-6660.





## Think Recycling **Even in Holidays**

Here are some holiday recycling tips:

When shopping, be mindful of excessive packaging. Here are some gift ideas that use little or no packaging: diaper service for a new baby, car tune-up gift certificate, homemade gifts and baked goods, framed pictures. tickets to movies, sports events, or concerts, or a basket with goodies and a bow.

Rechargeable batteries and charging unit, a mulching blade for the lawnmower, stationery made from recycled paper, a light timer or a charitable donation made in another person's name are also good environmental choices.

Use holiday cards that have recycled content, and consider wrapping gifts in paper made from recycled materials. For really big gifts or children's things, use the Sunday comics. Many people enjoy reusable decorative gift bags.

Used wrapping paper (except foil), magazines and holiday catalogs are recyclable and should be set out on recycling day or dropped off at the "mixed paper" bin at Buddy Attick Park.

After the holidays, the city will collect Christmas trees and grind the trees into mulch. Watch the News Review for drop-off locations. Remember to bag those packaging "peanuts" and bubble wrap and bring materials to the Parcel Plus at the Greenway Center or to the Recycling Center for reuse.







## Green Line Extends To Farragut North

Beginning in early January, Metro will operate direct rail service between Greenbelt Station and Farragut North during rush hours and special events. The new service will eliminate the need for passengers on the outer Green Line (Greenbelt, College Park, Prince Georges Plaza, and West Hyattsville Stations) to transfer to the Red Line at Fort Totten in order to go to locations in the downtown area,

The direct service is part of a test project, initiated by Metro, to upgrade customer service and increase ridership. Depending on the project's success, Metro may extend the service beyond the three to six the two outer sections and pro-

month period currently planned.

In addition to increasing ridership, Metro expects that the service between Greenbelt and Farragut North will alleviate parking congestion at nearby Metro Stations, as riders who currently board at Forest Glen, Fort Totten, New Carrollton, and Addison Road use the Green Line stations to travel downtown. Parking at Forest Glen, Fort Totten, New Carrollton, and Addison Road is usually full by 8 a.m., while parking on the outer portions of the Green Line is under-utilized.

vide a direct ride to the downtown area, will be complete in late 1999. The two new stations, Georgia Avenue-Petworth and Columbia Heights, will complete the link between U Street-Cardozo and Fort Totten.

## **Cherrywood Lane Restriped**

Motorists strung up by the pressures of the Christmas rush might wish to drive over Cherrywood Lane between Breezewood Drive and Kenilworth Avenue to see if the city's efforts at traffic calming help. With the assistance of a Prince George's County Department of Public Works and Transportation (DPW&T) line painting crew, the street has been restriped to provide for only two travel lanes for automobiles.

Bicycle lanes in either direction are also provided. Parking along the street has been prohibited, except on the Springhill Lake side of the street from Breezewood to Springhill Drive. There is now a large painted median strip running down the center of the street, where vehicles are not supposed to travel, except for making left turns. If the city council becomes satisfied with the way the new lane markings work and if it can find the money, it may order the medians to be reconstructed as landscaped planting strips.

Greenbelt Public Works Director Carl Hirsch advises that the street marking work is not done, and some of it may not be completed until next spring, unless there is a good break in the weather. Hewould like the county crew to come back to mark a second set of yellow lines for the median strip. City crews also need to do considerable work,

putting on the pavement volunteers to sort and pack crosshatch lines, crosswalks and bikelane symbols.

The new lane markings continue over the Cherrywood Lane bridge, where the county had recently restriped it to narrow the road to two travel lanes crossing over the center of the bridge. This was done as a precautionary measure as the county has found cracks in the outer sides of the bridge structures. Engineerdetermine what the problem is that caused the cracks.

The new lane markings place bicycle lanes immediately adjacent to the bridge sidewalks. This presents no problem according to DPW&T Associate Director of the Office of Project Management, Edward Binseel. Binseel said that the statement in the December 5 News Review that bicyclists are not permitted on the six-foot outer lanes was incorrect as a result of a misunderstanding of his comments. He said there was no problem with bicycles crossing the bridge along the sides.

The city also shifted the two travel lanes away from the center of the bridge in order to provide for the continuation of the median. Binseel expressed no concern either with these changes having

## Holiday Recycling

Remember to recycle during this holiday season. For every ton of material recycled, the city saves \$49 at the landfill. In addition to holiday catalogs, gift boxes and noning studies are being done to metallic wrapping paper, old mail, newspapers and magazines are also recyclable. 





They are described as black males in their 30s. One was 5'11", about 190 pounds, and wearing a black sweat shirt and black knit hat. The other was described as 6'1", 220 pounds, with short black hair and wearing a black parka type jacket.

#### Drug Possession

Another was reported at Boston Market, where money was taken.






