## **CFG Listens to Participants Discuss Metro Area Study**

Citizens for Greenbelt (CFG) sponsored a meeting on January 22 to provide an update on the Greenbelt Metro Area (GMA) Study. Jim Inzeo, President, CFG, chaired the forum-style meeting with three presenters -Thomas White, mayor pro tem; Terri Hruby, Greenbelt city planner; and John Krouse, North College Park Citizens Association. Hruby substituted for the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning (M-NCPPC) staff, who were unable to attend.

Although recent reports suggest that there are groups interested in development, Inzeo was unable to identify them to participate in this meeting. He indicated that one of the site owners is the Washington Metropolitan Transit Authority (WMATA). Although a public agency, it has indicated that their policy is opposed to divulging who are potential developers.

Presentations

White, official city representative to the study, presented background information. He referred to the just-finished "Interim Draft GMA Study" report, which was

to be presented to the M-NCPPC on January 29. The study area is on the western edge of Greenbelt, encompassing Springhill Lake, Beltway Plaza, the unincorporated areas of the A. H. Smith property, WMATA property surrounding the Metro station, and other small

areas. The proposed development sites are concentrated in the WMATA and Smith properties.

Development is hampered by a number of factors. The property is surrounded by three municipalities - Greenbelt, Berwyn Heights, and College Park. One of the most neglected areas of Greenbelt, it is environmentally challenged and also hampered in access. The new Department of Agriculture building, on the northern edge, has no transportation. Springhill Lake Apartments, one of the largest apartment developments on the East Coast, and Beltway Plaza are both aging. There are also lots

of wetlands and bad soil to deal

History of Study

Planning for this study began two years ago. One year ago, a community meeting at Greenbelt Middle School initiated public participation. Fourteen focusgroup sessions have been held. White indicated that he was skeptical about the success of the group at the January 1997 meeting. During the entire process, however, he found participation to be very good, including representatives from Berwyn Heights, MNCPPC, Greenbelt, the property owners, and Capital Office

Terri Hruby spoke next, reviewing some of the unique site issues. The Smith property is in an unincorporated area; the Metro site is in Greenbelt. Restrictions are already in place for development, but Hruby pointed out that the Prince George's Plaza station had so many restrictions that no one wanted to develop nearby. In addition to development at the Greenbelt site, she mentioned redevelopment and revitalization of

### Wetlands Issue Is Debated By Courts, State, Planners by Virginia Beauchamp

A lawsuit involving wetlands near Waldorf, Maryland may have repercussions for the A. H. Smith property, the News Review has learned. In December a three-judge panel for the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals overturned criminal convictions against a developer, Interstate General Corp., which had been accused of illegally filling in wetlands.

In their decision, the Court of Appeals ruled that the U.S. army Corps of Engineers had no authority to regulate wetlands that do not flow directly into navigable waterways, or that were "far" from major rivers or streams. The company had argued that its land was miles from a major river and hundreds of yards from a creek or stream. Traditionally the Corps of Engineers has administered wetlands as a means of flood control.

Currently the Corps of Engineers in this area awaits a report from the A. H. Smith Limited Partnership delineating the wetlands and flood plain that lie within their property. This process must precede a petition for development. The Corps would then rule on whether the development proposal meets its wetlands restrictions or if mitigation plans would be involved.

Apparently the Smith corporation has now held up completing

that report pending a further ruling in the Waldorf case. Federal prosecutors have announced that they will retry the case, as they "routinely" do.

cent Metro tract can be presented for approval to the Washington Metropolitan Transit Area Author-

Impact of Court Decision

According to a January 4 article in the Washington Post by writer Peter S. Goodman, if the Circuit Court of Appeals decision stands, the Corps of Engineers would be forced "to surrender to individual states decisions about how vigorously to protect some wetlands." However, Goodman also wrote that Maryland, which has "a record of aggressive environmental protection might well move to fill any void left by the Engi-

The state, in the form of the Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE), had already taken action concerning the Smith tract. As the News Review reported earlier, a ten-year history of litigation in which the Smith partnership contended that MDE lacked jurisdiction over its sand and gravel operation ended when the Maryland Court of Appeals refused to hear its case.

That refusal left in place an earlier decision by the Court of Special Appeals of the State of Maryland that penalties applied against the company were lawful. Subsequently the company paid a \$49,000 penalty plus \$5,308.34 in

How Far Is "Far"?

Left somewhat murky by the Appeals Court decision in the Waldorf case is what is meant by "far" from major rivers or streams or those "that do not flow directly into navigable waterways." On the Smith tract an unnamed tributary has carried run-off and pollution from the sand and gravel operation into Indian Creek, from there into Paint Branch, into the Anacostia, then into the Potomac and ultimately into Chesapeake Bay. As far north as Bladensburg, the Anacostia is currently navigable for small craft.

According to the Post article, a spokesman for the Corps of Engineers had commented that on the East Coast most wetlands "lie adjacent" to clearly navigable rivers and "should not be affected by the decision."

#### **Approval Sought for Plan** For Zoning Near Metro

A Sector Plan and a concurrent Sectional Map Amendment (SMA) for the Greenbelt Metro Area will be submitted in draft Resolution form to the Prince George's County Council (sitting as District Council) by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission's (M-NCPPC) Planning Board. This action was agreed upon at the Planning Board's January 29 meeting. At that time M-NCPPC team leaders led by Joe Chang, project director, and Monty Kolste, facilitator, presented the interim report of the Greenbelt Metro Area Study Focus Group.

The interim report supported the Sector/SMA planning strategy to achieve development in the "focus" area composed of the Greenbelt Metro station and A.H. Smith Limited Partnership properties (see map on page 9). The focus group preferred the Sector Plan/SMA amendment as the best tool to "address comprehensively the community-wide issues, including environmental, transportation, urban design, land use and zoning with a public participation program consisting of a community with the three local municipalities, a planning group and several focus groups.

The report was prepared by the M-NCPPC planning team, in coordination with a community focus group composed of civic groups and elected officials and property owners from the municipalities of Berwyn Heights, College Park and Greenbelt. In their deliberations from April to De-

cember 1997, the group also studied communities and businesses surrounding the "focus" area (see map).

The District Council is expected to adopt the Resolution calling for an amendment to the Approved Master Plan for Langley Park-College Park-Greenbelt and Vicinity, no later than February 17. This action would signal the initiation of the Sector Plan/ SMA in order to develop a comprehensive approach to the unique development and redevelopment potential around the Greenbelt Metro Station. It would also give the green light for a public forum on April 16, sponsored by the Planning Board.

Public Forum

Chang told the News Review that, in preparing for the upcoming public forum, staff is compiling a brochure describing, for example, "... existing plans, planning issues, boundary zoning, land use, goals, guidelines, Public Participation Program (PPP) and schedules." Following the forum, staff will review and summarize public comments, then transmit them along with the finalized "Goals, Concepts and Guidelines" to the Planning Board on May 7. The M-NCPPC staff will then present these findings at a District Council worksession on May 19 and request final approval by the Council on June 9.

Assuming that a Sector Plan (Master Plan Amendment) and a concurrent SMA is approved, it is expected that completion of See PLANNING, page 9

#### **Moms Morning Out Lets** Tots Play - Moms Get Away

When Diane Huisenga gets out, she jets to Europe as a flight attendant. When Nancy Kylis gets out, she volunteers at her older children's school, and when Lillian Johnson gets out, she takes aerobics classes.

These Greenbelt mothers are able to get out of their homes and into society partly due to the Mom's Morning Out program sponsored by the Greenbelt Recreation Department. Mothers drop off their three-to five-year-old children for social, motor, learning, and listening skills development at the Youth Center's arts and crafts room.

This program is not new. It was born about 10 years ago when Julie McHale, recreation supervisor, saw the need for pre-school programming during the big baby boom. Then, six children ranging from three to five years old took the classes two days a week for two and a half hours. Today, 44 children enrolled, including McHale's three-year-old twin

Teacher Gaye Houchens works with a group of three to five year olds on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings and with another set of three and four year olds on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 9 to 11:30. The four and five year olds come to her colorful classroom every weekday afternoon from 12:30 to 3.

"I absolutely love it," says Johnson, whose four-year-old daughter is a student in the three-day program. "I think Gaye is wonderful, and she is great with the kids."


the planning process will occur by fall 1999.

Uncertain at this time is whether Smith representatives will submit legislation to the County Council calling for a Zoning Ordinance Text Amendment. This amendment to the existing light and heavy industrial zoning (I-1 and I-2) would allow the Smith property, for example, to develop different uses under these zones. About 51% of the focus area is undeveloped, of which 91% is zoned for heavy industrial use.

group Reed said that the report was "on hold," citing the recent ruling of the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals. He later explained that the decision "called into question the definition of what a wetland is" and that the issue is being evaluated (see separate article on page 1).

Proposals

The Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) is now reviewing development proposals for the Greenbelt Metro Station area. Several proposals have been submitted from developers seeking a partnership with WMATA, including one that is a joint pro-

Richard Reed of Wilkes, Artis and Lane, representing Smith, said earlier that a text amendment would take less time to complete than the Sector/SMA. However, the study focus group's Interim Report noted that the Sector/SMA would be a "very effective" planning tool in carrying out the umbrella vision for development of the Greenbelt Metro Station area. both in planning strategies and in involving the public throughout the process. The report rated the zoning text amendment as "less effective" in terms of the foregoing categories.

Also unknown at this time is when Smith's consultant will complete a report delineating the areas of flood plain and wetlands in the focus area. At the January 15 meeting of the study focus posal for both the Smith and

WMATA properties.

Concerned that there is a limited opportunity for input from the city and the public — only one city representative is permitted at WMATA meetings where proposals are discussed — the Greenbelt City Council has requested more representation. Celia Craze, Greenbelt's director of Planning and Development, was designated as the city's representation.

areas such as SHL apartments and Beltway Plaza.

Hruby also provided more environmental information on the A.H. Smith site. Over half of the property is in the 100 year flood plain. Forty-three percent of the land is wetlands, some natural and some based on the earlier industrial activity. One-third of the property is woodland.

Access to the site is problematic also. Only a one-half entrance ramp to the Metro Station exists from the Beltway, so regular roads such as Kenilworth Avenue, Ivy Lane and Cherrywood Lane would be used to access the developed site.

Open space is an issue. Hruby commented that the WMATA area is a beautiful site. Recreation should be considered there. Current design guidelines focus on Greenbelt Road as being a gateway to the developed property.

The final speaker was John Krouse from North College Park, a community on the west side of the proposed development. He indicated that he has attended almost all of the focus group meetings and is satisfied with the report regarding environmental concerns. He mentioned that the development site is situated in a low area, which will be overlooked by surrounding communities. A similar comment has been lodged by Berwyn Heights with regard to the siting of the Washington Post printing plant on the south side of Greenbelt Road. Krouse hopes that some of the land will be set aside for recreational use by SHL residents.

Next Step

After the M-NCPPC receives e report, changes may be eded. It will then go to the

the report, changes may be needed. It will then go to the County Council. It is likely that there will then be a sector plan and sectional map amendment. The county would like to expedite the latter process, but it could take as long as 12 - 18 months. If all goes as planned, the full process could be completed in late 1999.

Langston Terrace provided affordable, clean housing for the underprivileged in the years after the Great Depression. Designed by African-American architect



Robinson, Langston Terrace consisted of 274 housing units. As in Greenbelt, prospective residents had to meet certain requirements in order to qualify to live in this community.

Residents had to be African-American families headed by two parents, and households could contain up to seven members. Rents ranged from \$19.50 for a two-room home up to \$31.50 for a five-room home. Residents had their own newspaper, credit union, theater, recreation center and public art. The entrance to the community is framed by a large frieze titled "The Progress of the Negro Race" and a "Madonna" or mother and child sculpture.

Pioneer residents of Langston Terrace celebrated a 50-year anniversary in 1988. The film features some of these residents talking about their years of living in this "utopian" community.





from the program, begins each session with circle time. Here she introduces the letter and color of the day and discusses the day's weather and date. Then, students work in small groups to socialize and practice various motor skills activities.

"You do stuff and have fun," says four-year-old Meghan Huisenga who dressed up as a cowgirl during the session. Her twin brother, Nathan, also attends the three-day morning program.

Some of the other stuff the kids learn are manners, how to get along with one another, and how to be responsible. To help the children develop their social skills, they visit places such as the post office and the fire station. The children also can play in the birdseed box, build Legos, put together puzzles,

and frolic in the playhouse. "I like to play house," says four-year-old Emily Johnson, Greenbelt resident, as she cradles a doll. "I like to play with babies and give them a

The children also perform specific tasks called "helping hands" to give the pupils a sense of responsibility. These tasks involve leading the line, holding the door, and picking up books and the carpet pieces after circle time.

Houchens, who is assisted by Carol Mealey, carries on upbeat dialogue with the children while leading them in fine motor skills activities. These exercises include writing with a pencil, cutting paper, and gluing dried peas onto construction paper into the shape of the letter of the day.

Houchens has taught for 15 years and enjoys working with the children. She says, "I get a lot of satisfaction that they're learning."


