New Research Center Proposed At NASA Challenges Traffic

"Unique contributions to our country's effort to define and maintain the planet's environment and foster U. S. world leadership in operational weather and climate prediction [and] global change research" may become possible in Greenbelt, if the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) has its way. This is the promise made in an environmental assessment report released recently by NOAA. The agency hopes to locate a new Operations and Research Center on Greenbelt Rd. within the campus of the Goddard Space Flight Center.

According to the report, siting the proposed building near the Earth Observing System Data Information System building and the Earth System Science Building, both at NASA, will make possible the assembling of the "essential talents, skills, and disciplines" from NOAA and NASA to bring about such scientific break-throughs.

On the other hand, locating this new building alongside an already overcrowded Greenbelt Rd, may do some earth-changing of its own. "It will stretch Greenbelt Rd. to the breaking point" — that was the gloomy assessment of Greenbelt City Councilmember Thomas White, as he referred to these new plans, which had been made public on the day of a recent council meeting.

Impacts Foreseen

The Environmental Assessment concludes that there is a Finding of No Significant Impact — or FONSI, in governmental jargon. Short-term impacts were conceded during the construction process for the new building, but long-term impacts would be limited to "loss of natural habitat, the use of the facility itself (electricity, water), and traffic-related impacts."

The natural habitat to be disturbed is primarily mature second growth woodland, the report states. About two and a half acres would be cleared for the building and another four acres for a paved parking lot. An auxiliary parking lot, now covered with crushed stone, would also be paved

The primary concern would be the additional 1200 employees that the new facility would bring to the site. Of these some 80 per cent already reside in Prince George's County, most south of Central Ave.; about 16 per cent in Montgomery County; and the rest in Arlington County.

Traffic Impacts

Yet increased traffic constitutes "an adverse impact" to the proposed new facility, the report concedes. Reduced level of service will occur at five of some 21 intersections studied —four of these uncomfortably close to Greenbelt.

Two involve the intersections of Powder Mill Rd, with the north- and southbound ramps of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. The former would move from level-of-service E to F, and the latter from B to C. The intersection of Greenbelt and Good Luck roads would change from See TRAFFIC page 2

Mayor Calls County Bill "End Run" on Planning

A bill scheduled for presentation to the Prince George's County Council on March 10 would allow easier development of property around the Greenbelt Metro station. The bill, CB-35, introduced by County Councilmember Thomas Hendershot, would define a "Metro Planned Community" and permit its use in the I-1 and I-2 zones. Greenbelt Director of Planning and Community Development Celia Craze told the Greenbelt

multiple-family housing at appropriate locations within the community, "obtaining amenities not ordinarily found in conventional zoning classifications (including open arcades, enclosed pedestrian space, rooftop activities, distinctive streetscape or furnishings), providing "the maximum amount of freedom possible in the design of buildings and their grouping and layout," to promote orderly development and attract an appropriate mix of "quality employment, resi-

City Council at its March 9 regular meeting that the bill appears to only apply to the Greenbelt Metro station and the surrounding land.

Mayor Judith Davis described the bill as an "end run" around the planning process. By creating a new "use" within the industrial zones, the bill would avoid the need for a property owner to go through the normal rezoning process. Earlier, representatives of the Smith Brothers, owners of much of the land adjacent to the Greenbelt Metro Station, met with planners from Greenbelt and other communities to discuss in general terms a proposal for mixed use development and legislation to enable such a proposal to proceed without rezoning the land. Owner representatives are believed to have also discussed their proposals with the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority, State Highway Administration, and county officials. However, little information is available on the specific development under consideration.

Council voted to hold an executive session on Wednesday March H to consult with legal counsel. A second executive session, this one with representatives of the developers, will be scheduled. City Solicitor Robert Manzi said that a closed session with the developers could be justified by the need to obtain proprietary information from them, as well as to deal with the expansion of business within Greenbelt.

Metro Planned Community

A "Metro Planned Community" (MPC) would be defined under the bill as "A continuous land assemblage, no less than seventy-five (75) acres, abutting an existing or future Metro platform or station site and planned to be developed with an array of commercial, lodging, recreational, residential, entertainment, retail, social, cultural or similar uses which are interrelated by one or more themes."

The purposes of the MPC described in the bill include promoting "optimum use of the transit facilities by assuring the orderly development of land," providing for the needs of the workers and residents within an MPC, providing

dential, retail shopping, restaurant, entertainment and lodging development in the vicinity of major transit stops," and providing "reasonable flexibility in the design of these projects ... while phasing out

heavy industrial uses."

The bill does not specify a maximum building height, building setbacks, tree conservation, land-scaping, or green space. Instead, these issues "shall be addressed in the Conceptual Site Plan approval."

Greenbelt's History

New Deal Garden Cities Are Spearheaded by Rexford Tugwell

Much of the information is taken from the 50th Anniversary book, "Greenbelt, History of a New Town, 1937 - 1987." However, other source material was also used.)

Roosevelt's New Deal "Brain Trust," spearheaded the idea of constructing garden communities. In April 1935, Congress created the Resettlement Administration as an agency within the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Tugwell, then an assistant agriculture secretary, became its administrator.

Even before the Resettlement

Administration was established, the Department of Agriculture began buying land for its expansion and for a new town. Tugwell selected Hurley Hill for the town site. The average price paid was \$165/acre. Of 12,189 acres approved for purchase, 1,996 were allocated for a new town of 1,000 homes and 50 working farms. Another 1,600 acres south of the new town (now Greenbelt Park) were allocated for county recreation purposes.

Under the Suburban Division headed by John Scott Lansill, four garden towns were planned, of which three were built - Greenbelt, Greenbills, Ohio (near Cincinnati) and Greendale, Wisconsin (near Milwaukee). Clarence Stein and Henry Wright, the developers of Radburn, N.J and advocates of planned garden cities, served on an advisory group for the planning of the new towns.

The Washington area was selected because of a housing shortage. Rents here were 30 percent above the national average. Also, there were a large number of workers with moderate, steady incomes

Built Fast

The entire new town of Greenbelt was built at an accelerated schedule unmatched by most of today's construction in order to provide work for the unemployed. In June 1935, Douglas Ellington was hired as principal architect and Reginald Wadsworth as his associate. By the end of the month, Hale Walker was named town planner and road and street plans were completed.

Ground breaking occurred on October 12, 1935, although plans were not yet complete. By December, plans were approved for the town center, D block (located between Gardenway and Eastway), the dam and lake, and a sewage disposal plant (which was built where the State Highway Administration building is now located).

On January 13, 1936, the construction of the first building began in D block and the project was officially named Greenbelt. By March, final contracts were let for completion of construction and work began on E block (between Eastway and Northway).

Roosevelt

On April 30, President and Mrs. Roosevelt reviewed and approved the plans. On November 13, following his electoral victory See NEW DEAL page 5

Late Bulletin

The five-member Prince George's County Council Planning, Zoning and Economic Development Committee (PZED) on March 11 unanimously voted to recommend to the full county council approval of Council Resolution 17. This resolution initiates a sector plan and concurrent Sectional Map Amendment for development of the Greenbelt Metro Station Area. (The PZED committee at its last meeting did not, as had been expected, act on the matter.) This procedure was recommended to the county council by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission's team leaders of the citizen focus group after nearly a year of study.

Although not a member of the committee, an elated county council woman Audrey Scott, who represents Greenbelt/Bowie, told the News Review she attended the meeting and spoke for passage. "It was touch and go until the very end," she said adding "I was very pleased with the representation from the City of Greenbelt. Terri Hruby did a magnificent job. I am happy the integrity of the process is being preserved and there will be ample opportunity for public input."

The full county council could take action on the resolution at their meeting on March 17. However, the date has not been firmed up.

It is unknown when the PZED committee will hear Council Bill 35 (see separate article). This bill was referred to the committee by county council.

Use Native Trees

I was glad to see last week's letter from Carolyn Larkin regarding the selection of trees for the Center. May I also suggest that the city consider some native tree specimens?

These will enhance our environment in many ways, and are generally more maintenance-free than exotic trees. Perhaps of greatest value, native species will attract and nurture the small wildlife that depends on them, chiefly birds and butterflies.

I don't know enough about the characteristics of each species (and its suitability for an "urban" environment like the Center) to make a judgment, but I'm sure City Horticulturist Bill Phelan can choose well. Among the species of small trees that are natives: dogwood, redbud, hawthorn, sourwood, and shadowbush.

Wouldn't it be great to have a Center that's attractive both to people and small creature such as birds and butterflies, with beautiful trees that naturally grow in this region?

D to E, and Greenbelt Rd. and Lanham-Severn Rd. also from D to E.

The report recommends a traffic signal at the northbound B-W Parkway ramp at Powder Mill Rd.; an additional through/right turn lane on westbound Greenbelt Rd. at Good Luck Rd.; and additional left turn lanes in both directions at Greenbelt Rd. and Lanham-Severn Rd.

With or without construction of the NOAA facility, traffic on Southway at the B-W Parkway ramps will change from the present F to A with the projected new Southway light, the report states.

In the year 2000, however, traffic projections Southway at Greenbelt Rd. indicate level-of-service C without the NOAA expansion; with it, D. In either case, traffic congestion at Hanover Parkway at Greenbelt Rd. is projected at level-of-service

Copies of the report, including colored maps of two proposed sites, are on reserve at the Information Desk in the Greenbelt Library.

A Greenbelt Gardener


It has been a mild winter, but it is hard to say whether there will be an early spring. Some flowers have been blooming early, but others have not. Some plants will bloom early if there is a warm spell, but others will wait until the days are longer.

Some of the early bloomers are growing in a sheltered spot so that the warmer than average temperatures seem even warmer to them. South facing slopes and warm spots near south or east walls tend to be a bit warmer than the rest of the garden. Keep this in mind for when you want to plant something that needs extra shelter.

The ground is too wet to work in so the usual early spring chores of transplanting trees and shrubs and soil preparation are out of the question until the soil dries out some. Remember the old test - take a handful of soil, squeeze a bit, then drop it. If the handful breaks apart when it hits the ground then the soil is dry enough to work. Some gardeners have at least one raised bed so they can start their garden a bit earlier in the spring. Raised beds will dry out faster than the rest of the garden.

It is likely that vines, shrubs and trees that you never planted have grown up in your yard. Vines snaking through the hedges and saplings growing up next to the house, garden beds, or hedges make the garden look unkempt. To my mind nothing says the homeowner has neglected the yard work like a large sapling in the hedgerow.

The proper tools for the removal of big saplings are saw and garden cutters. If you do not have these tools this is the easiest time of year to remove vines and saplings. The ground is so wet that if you grab the vine or small sapling at the base of the plant and pull, then enough of the root will come

out, in most cases, to take care of the problem. For saplings up to several feet in height try using a shovel - just slide the shovel in next to the plant and rock it back and forth a little. Chances are good the plant will come out.

Saplings in the hedgerow can be harder to remove. At the very least keep them cut back. Most types of trees will die after a while of this treatment.

You do a tree no favor to let it grow right next to buildings, walkways, or crowded in a hedge. It will never reach its potential and could damage a building or walkway. If you like a small tree, such as dogwood or holly that grew up in your hedge, that is your business. But oaks can grow more than 70 feet tall and such a plant is really out of place in a six foot tall hedge.

at the polls for a second term of office, Roosevelt came to Greenbelt to inspect its progress. Special accommodations were made for the handicapped president to tour the model units at 33 Court of Ridge Road. He was quoted as saying, " I have seen the blueprints of this project and have been greatly interested, but the actual sight itself exceeds anything I have dreamed of. This is a real achievement and I wish everyone in the country could see it."

First Tenants

The first tenants moved in on September 30, 1937. Originally budgeted for less than \$10 million, the original appropriation was for \$6.95 million. The project wound up costing over \$13,000,000, which resulted in a great deal of criticism from the opponents and skeptics. However, part of the cost was for relief employment, which would have occurred in any event. Over 13,000 people were ultimately employed on the project.

Instead of building the 1,000 units originally planned, the project was scaled back to the 574 townhomes, 306 apartment units and five single-family prefabricated houses actually built. A few farms were remodeled and 10 steel-frame dwellings known as Parkbelt on Forestway were privately built. Not built was a bathhouse, boathouse and beach at the lake and the Greenbelt Inn which was to have been located on Parkway. Although fewer garages were planned than a study indicated were needed, only 375 of the 500 were ever built. Underpasses for Ridge Road were deleted. Churches were not built because of separation of church and state, and the new churches formed by the residents had to buy land and build their own edifices.

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City Notes

Over 44 tons of mixed paper, more than 15 tons of commingled materials and more than 5 yards of debris were collected for recycling by the refuse collection crews. 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
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Dead Beaver Found At Recycling Center




