Dr. Bergemann's Death Stuns City; Practice Began in 1961

Greenbelters were stunned to with Dr. Aaron Dietz of learn that long-time physician Till Bergemann died on June 4 of complications following cardiac arrest. He had been working out on an exercise machine in the Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center the previous Tuesday afternoon when he was stricken. He was given immediate CPR by pool staff and medical attention locally and transported to the Washington Hospital Center, but did not recover.

Dr. Bergemann opened a medical practice in Greenbelt in 1961 following an association

Hyattsville. Born in Leipzig, Germany, where he attended medical school, he received his M.D. degree at the University of Basel, Switzerland. He later interned at Fordham Hospital in New York City and at Prince George's Hospital, Cheverly.

After practicing in Greenbelt for some time, he later joined a medical partnership with the late Dr. Hans Wodak and Dr. William Weintraub. In recent years he was joined in his practice by Dr. David Granite, who was called to administer aid to his stricken colleague.

Over the years hundreds of Greenbelters came to depend on Dr. Bergemann as their family doctor and to know him as an active participant in community affairs. Many have recounted how he made house calls when they were too sick to reach his office, a practice he still continued as recently as last week. He touched many lives and was a well-loved member of the com-

An avid sportsman, Dr. Bergemann was a skier, tennis player, bicyclist and fitness enthusiast. He was seen four or five times a week at the Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center, swimming laps in the pool and working out on the exercise equipment. He also loved to travel. He had an ongoing zest for knowledge and main-

Funeral services were held at Mishkan Torah Congregation, Ridge Road at Westway, on Wednesday, June 7. Memorial week will be observed at the family residence.

Santos Running For Commander

Richard Santos, a resident of Greenbelt for 31 years, is running uncontested for national commander of the American Legion. Santos, whose election will take place at the national convention on August 31, 2001, is a 33-year member of the Greenbelt American Legion Post #136.

Santos, 54, said that the task of the national commander is to act as a spokesperson for the American Legion by promoting its mandates, but not setting policy. He earned his eligibility for membership in the American Legion through honorable, wartime military service in the United States Navy. He served as post commander from 1979 to 1980, Prince George's County commander from 1981 to 1982, and Southern Maryland district commander from 1985 to 1986. He was elected commander of the Legion's Department of Maryland, Inc. in 1990 during its 72nd annual convention in Ocean City. Santos served the department as its alternate national executive committeeman from 1992 to 1994 and as its national executive committeeman from 1994 to 1996. Not an Opinion

The article I presented to the City Council about D.A.R.E., that you characterized as an "opinion piece" ("Council Vigorously Debates," June 1) appeared on the Federal Page of the Washington Post the day of the council meeting May 22. The article reported the Department of Education promulgated new rules two years ago "Requiring school districts to spend funds... for 'research-based' programs and to evaluate the programs periodically." Seems like a reasonable and appropriate requirement. A University of North Carolina researcher found those programs most popular with the public including D.A.R.E., have not proven to be effective. His survey included Maryland. The end of the article states the National Institute on Drug Abuse has cited some that work, but D.A.R.E. is not among them.

Of course I hope our son never uses illegal drugs (unless he has an illness, God forbid, that would be alleviated by a drug). Isn't it time to rethink putting lots of people in jail and branding them for life? Do you know the U.S.A. is only led in the world by Russia in incarceration rates? Do you know that if the current trend continues, more African-American children will go to prison than college? According to the U.S. Justice Department Bureau of Prisons statistics, 60% of federal prisoners are drug offenders, 3% violent offend-

The Republican governor of New Mexico, Gary Johnson, who proposed the decriminalization of marijuana, can admit to illegal drug use, and still get elected twice by the citizens of New Mexico, but we can't hire him as a policeman in Greenbelt.

Instead of attacking those who raise questions about the status quo, couldn't we Greenbelters be more thoughtful, willing to seek out creative solutions to issues of hiring enough law enforcement officers and the detrimental effects of drug use?

The Recycling Bin

Dear Lorax, I've recently been diagnosed with Diabetes and need insulin shots. My problem is I don't know how to dispose of the needles. Can you help? A Sick Friend.

Dear Sick Friend, The proper way of disposing of a needle is by putting the cap back on the needle and placing it in a plastic bottle with the lid screwed on tightly. You can throw the bottle out with your household trash. Thank you for asking. I hope things go well for you.

Dear Lorax, I recently painted my house and I have some paint left over. How do I dispose of the paint? Painter on Plateau

Dear Painter, You should let your left over latex paint air dry away from children and pets. One method is to pour the latex paint into a paper box or bag, and add an absorbent material such as shredded newspaper and cat box filler to speed drying. Recycle the empty paint can, and then throw the dried paint away with your normal trash!

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

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A Greenbelt Gardener

by Rosie Rhubarb

The weather has been a bit cooler and rainier than it usually is this time of year and that makes the gardener's job easier. I've seldom had to water. New plants need to be watered very frequently so with rain every few days watering has been one job less to do.

The weeds seem to be growing slower than usual, too, another reduction in the work load. The heat loving weed plants usually have jumped up by now. Keep ahead, get rid of weeds now by hand weeding or hoeing the garden patch. Then lay down a layer of mulch which prevents all but the occasional weed from growing in your garden patch.

Grass clippings, autumn leaves, pine needles, bark nuggets, and small stones are just some of the materials that can be used as mulch. By laying

down the same material in the garden bed a neat, uniform appearance is achieved.

On the GHI house and garden tour this weekend I saw several yards where bark nugget mulch was used on the ground among the flower plants. The yards appeared neat, tidy and weed free. The perfect solution for a shady yard where grass won't easily grow and for the gardener who wants to cut back on time spent in the garden doing chores, mulch also keeps the ground from drying out in the hot summer sun. This means the garden bed has to be watered less fre-

Using plant material as mulch feeds the garden plants. Leaves, grass, and bark nuggets will decay and add nutrients to the soil. But bear in mind that leaves are not the most attractive of mulchs and probably should be used in spots that are not in the view of

A further labor saving step is to put down a soaker hose and then lay the mulch right over the ground and hose. A soaker hose under mulch is a very efficient way to water a garden bed. Just turn on the hose rather than hand water the bed.



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

Safety Message

The Greenbelt Department of Planning and Community Development offers these safety tips regarding gas appliances. Pilot lights automatically light the main burner when a gas appliance is turned on. Should the pilot go out for some reason, use the following safety procedures to re-

1. Read the instructions in the owner's manual or on the instruction plate attached to the appliance.

2. Do not strike a match until enough time for unburned gas to leave the room - approximately five minutes.

3. Use a match holder to light the pilot and be sure to light the match first, and then turn on the appliance.

4. If the pilot or main burner fails to stay lit, call the gas company.
