All-day Kindergarten and Reading Recovery Program Need Help

At Greenbelt Elementary School, big plans for the coming school year are underway. One new activity is full-day kindergarten, which will be a big change for students and teachers alike. Another activity, begun last year and, hoped to expand this year, is the Reading Recovery Program which helps selected first graders learn to read and write on a one-on-one basis. Lee-Ellen Zukauskas (known as Mrs. Z to her students) and her colleague Diane Eades recently described

their activities and plans and what roles parents and community volunteers could play in helping children succeed in school.

Mrs. Z

Mrs. Z is one of three kindergarten teachers at Greenbelt Elementary School (GES). This will be her second year here after teaching pre-school at Kettering Elementary School. She loves teaching kindergarten-age students as "4 and 5 years olds are excited about being in school and wanting to please the teacher." Zukauskas described her philosophy on kindergarten volunteers:

The schoolwork of a 5-year-old is play, but play to learn, she stated. Crafts and games and songs all have a learning objective. There is a wide range of knowledge among those entering kindergarten and the teacher must challenge those who already know a lot while filling in the gaps for those who need more help. Zukauskas could use mentors or volunteers who come into

walking down the hall with them to the bathroom or lunchroom. These volunteers can make the difference between a good day

Help Make a Good School Even Better

The article about two teachers at Greenbelt Elementary School is the first of a series. Other articles will focus on teachers of higher grades and support functions.

The articles are part of a major recruitment program to "Help Make a Good School Even Better." In years past, many people have helped by serving as OASIS tutors, selling books at the PTA Labor Day Festival booth, escorting field trips, or helping in many other ways.

This program is seeking to substantially increase both the number of volunteers and the variety of opportunities for them. Some tasks could be done at home, some require a few hours occasionally, and some — such as tutoring and mentoring — need dependable people to help out almost every week. The articles will describe these opportunities and encourage individuals to sign up.

The volunteer program started with a kick-off meeting on July 18. The principal, Katherine Curl, and four teachers described the school, their instructional program, and how volunteers could help. Several representatives of organizations and agencies offered a wide range of resources. These included the City of Greenbelt, the city's Advisory Committee on Education, the Greenbelt Rotary Club, the National Security Agency, NASA, and a quilter.

County Expands Metroland Uses, High-Rises Now OK

On Tuesday, July 26, the Prince George's County Council met in Upper Marlboro to consider the adoption of CB-47, a revision — essentially an amendment — of the earlier CB-35. Both bills constituted a form of legislative rezoning of the Greenbelt Metro station tract and adjacent A.H. Smith property, thus bypassing the normal rezoning process.

Although the County Council could have delayed action, they chose not to do so. When the vote was taken, the bill passed by 6 to 3. County Council members Walter Maloney, Audrey Scott, and Peter Shapiro were the three opponents.

The meeting was called as a public hearing, at which Greenbelt Community Planner Terri Hruby testified on behalf of the city. Like the College Park representative and several members of CCRIC, Hruby spoke in opposition to the bill. Only one person, Lisa Jackson an attorney representing Metroland Developers, spoke in its favor.

Hruby's Testimony

The city's opposition was twofold: that the bill circumvented the public planning process of the Sector Plan study and proposed Sectional Map Amendment and that the language of the bill was both "subjective and exclusionary." As Hruby pointed out, people representing many different interests, including representatives of Metroland, had been full participants in the Sector Plan process. Therefore, she argued, "there should be no reservation about codifying the major recommendations from the Plan into this legislation."

She also pointed to the "less restrictive language" of CB-47 — so vague that it could even permit industrial uses. In addition, she said, it speaks only of "mitigation," not "permanent protection," of preservation areas like the wetlands on the site. Total freedom in architectural design, including highrise buildings, would also be allowed by the language of CB-47.

Language Problems

Even more troubling, Hruby said, was the subjectivity of much of the language. She called attention to such phrases as "high quality," "fashion sophistication," and "upscale customer commonly viewed as being well-educated, sophisticated in his/her tastes" as specifying future uses of the site. "Who decides what stores meet these criteria?" Hruby asked.

Only a letter of intent from potential retailers was required by the legislation — another major flaw. "There is nothing ... to require that such a merchant actually occupy the retail space," and, she pointed out, "there is nothing to define" other "prospective tenants" who might be allowed to locate there.

Since any development at a Metro site is supposed to increase ridership on the system, Hruby noted the city's concern with the exclusionary nature of the legislation. "It is ironic that at a development at a transit center," she concluded, "we are considering legislation that would consciously exclude those persons who may have the greatest demand for transit."

Metroland Response

Richard ("Chip") Reed of Wilkes, Artis, Chartered, representing the Metroland Developers, told the News Review that Jackson's presentation before the County Council did not deal with the issues raised in the City of Greenbelt's opposition. Instead Reed noted that the presentation focused on how CB-47 facilitated municipal input and conveyance to the state of the required 77 acres of the property's wetland section to free up state funding for its acquisition. In that way Metroland would have the 150 contiguous acres as required in CB-35 and CB-47 for a "Metro planned community."

Reed observed that negotiations with the state are going along in "a positive direction."

The developer expects "soon" to present a concept plan for the development, which is being prepared under the direction of the environmental firm ED&W.

Council Votes to Seek Bay Partner Status

Whether to apply for a Chesapeake Bay Partner Community Designation was debated at the July 10 Greenbelt City Council meeting. The purpose of this designation, sponsored by the Chesapeake Bay Program, is to recognize, encourage, and support local governments in the Chesapeake Bay watershed whose actions demonstrate commitment to the protection of the bay, its rivers and streams.

The application involves no cost to the city and places no requirements on Greenbelt. The program requires that sixty percent of the benchmarks in at

least four of the following six categories be met: development that works, preventing pollution, conserving and preserving living resources, valuing trees and forests, conserving the countryside, revitalizing communities, and community participation. The number of categories in which a community qualifies to compete determines whether it receives a gold, silver or bronze designation.

A discussion ensued, with Councilmember Thomas White stating that he felt that the designation was a "worthy" one, but that as far as he knew, this was the first time the council had

heard about the application and he had a problem with the process. He asked City Manager Michael McLaughlin if it occurred to the staff to have this proposal discussed with the Recycling and Environmental Advisory Committee (REAC).

McLaughlin replied that it had not been referred because the program placed no requirements on the city. He further commented that a review of the application by the staff indicated that the city meets the criteria. The issue could still be referred to the committee, he said, which might pick up on one of the criteria in which more could be

done to "enhance our reputation."

A July 14 deadline was mentioned. Mayor Judith Davis commented that the application could be sent in and also referred to REAC.

Councilmember Alan Turnbull stated that he felt "skeptical" and that "I can't support pushing forward until I know what the standards are... and consider it for a 2001 application."

Councilmember Rodney Roberts asked what the designation will do. McLaughlin replied that he views it as an exercise for communities to determine what is already being

OBITUARIES

John A. Del Homme

John A. Del Homme, 89, of District Heights, died of cancer on Thursday, August 3, 2000. For 26 years he was conductor of the Greenbelt Concert Band.

A Brooklyn native, Mr. Del Homme studied at the Manhattan School of Music. Later he attended the Peabody Institute of Baltimore before coming to the Washington area in the late 1940s.

During World War II he performed for U.S. fighting troops around the world as a musician with a U.S. Army Band, finishing his military career with The United States Army Band at Ft. Myer, Virginia. This is one of the elite service bands.

Mr. Del Homme has played with and conducted a number of chamber music and civic orchestras. Often he was the featured clarinet soloist. He was a member of the National Band Masters Association, serving on a committee on community bands.

He became conductor of the Greenbelt Concert Band in 1968. In May, 1991 his friends threw a surprise birthday party for him on his 80th birthday, interrupting his conducting to sing "Happy Birthday, John." The City of Greenbelt honored him on his 80th birthday with a proclamation stating, in part, that under Del Homme's leadership the band has made its presence known throughout the Washington Metropolitan Area. The proclamation, signed by the then Mayor of Greenbelt, Gil Weidenfeld, noted that the band was greatly appreciated by hospital patients, shut-ins, Greenbelters and guests at "Buddy" Attick Park, and at recreation centers throughout Prince George's County.

Mr. Del Homme played with a music chamber group that entertained at the retirement of two of Greenbelt's notable younger persons, City Manager James Giese and City Clerk Gudrun Mills at Martin's Crosswinds in 1991.

Although he retired as conductor of the Greenbelt Concert Band in 1994, he came back and

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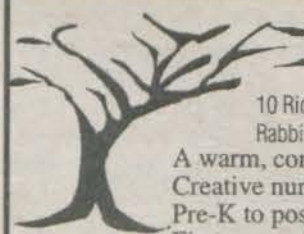

listening to and talking with the kids. Other needs are for chap-ones on field trips or help in decorating the classrooms. Sometimes just being an audience for a student activity is very important.

Zukauskas stated that the teachers "want the community to feel welcome in the school." She herself is not only a teacher at GES, but also a parent of a GES student and a Greenbelt resident who feels "it's great to work in the school."

Diane Eades

Diane Eades, the reading recovery specialist, is beginning her seventh year at GES. She has also taught first grade. She described the reading recovery program, a concept that may not be familiar to many in the community. This system is based on an Australian program where the term "recovery" is a nautical term meaning to "save the boat." The program is set up to save children who are having substantial problems with reading and writing in the first grade. It is a one-on-one program with Eades as the teacher, working for 30 minutes daily with each identified child.

How can a volunteer help with this program? One of its aspects requires the child to review the day's work at home each night with parents. But unfortunately this is not always happening. Eades would like to involve volunteer mentors to serve in place of the parents or baby sitters to hear the child read and help with specific topics that need to be reviewed. This would help the student move into the mainstream reading group more quickly.

Chinese Art Opening

An exhibit of traditional Chinese paintings by Margaret Lu Tso opens is on display at the Greenbelt Municipal Building. Several scrolls are featured along with framed works. Tso's painting reflects connections with two distinct styles of Chinese art; delicate, serene, and occasionally allegorical nature studies, complement a selection of bold, colorful, "child-like" images in thickly applied watercolor.

The exhibition runs through September 29. Gallery hours are Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. when the room is not otherwise in use. She would also like people to work with the second graders who completed the program last year to help them get back to speed after the summer break. Although there are some guidelines and a brief training session for this type of mentoring, Eades indicated that all with an interest could help.

Children are excited to read to someone new, so there is always a need for volunteer listeners. For those who may want to work with older children, they might be able to help them write a short story, which is good practice for the MSPAP tests. This type of reinforcement is often not received at home.

The vote to support the application was 3-2, with Turnbull and White opposed. White stated that in the future, when this type of issue appears on a council agenda, it ought to be presented with a recommendation to refer. Council informally agreed, and Davis asked McLaughlin to note the request.

A Review

Funny and Likeable Cast Makes GAC Play a Big Hit

Comfortably seated in the coziness of the Greenbelt Arts Center, theatergoers became intimately acquainted with the Tucker family of Big Stone Gap, Va., at the opening of "Big O' My Heart" on Friday night, August 4. The comedy-drama revolves around this dysfunctional family, whose problems include homosexuality, ex-convicts and senility.

Oldest sister, Donna Rae Tucker (Kate Blackburn), who runs a family daycare from her home, has a lot to deal with when her younger brother, Leroy (Brian Summa), returns to Rocky Gap with his new black male lover, Willie Nelson (Larry Graves). Her eccentric, ex-con mother Doris June Tucker (Norma Ozur) has also returned to the home. To top it off, her very pregnant younger sister, Peanie (Malinda Logan), has run

away from her husband. Along with all these problems, Donna

Rae must also deal with her senile "Grammy" (Ginny Zanner).

All the characters were funny and likable, but Logan as "Peanie" and Zanner as "Grammy" stole the show with their hilarious lines and antics. Peanie's brother, Leroy, has returned to Big Stone Gap after discovering while in prison and through the help of his doctor, Willie, that the reason he led such a troubled life in Big Stone Gap was because he was repressing his homosexuality. In one of her memorable lines, Peanie replies, "Leroy went to prison and got rehabilitated into a homosexual..."

Perfectly Cast

Ozur, a frequent cast member and director at the Arts Center, is perfectly cast as the mother and is charming with her flamboyant clothes and wild wigs. Logan, who plays Peanie, is a bachelor of fine arts major attending Ithaca College in New York. She has experience in stage, film and TV productions. Zanner has over 70

years experience on stage, specializing in character parts.

The set is simple and makes people feel that they are inside the Tucker's living room. It functioned well as a daycare/living room and there were few set changes.

The play does include some obscenity and some scenes not appropriate for children, although some child actors played the daycare children.

The play is written by Bruce McRae and won the Greenbelt Arts Center's recent play writing competition that called for origi-

nal, full length, 20th century plays. It is directed by David Senatore.

The cast includes familiar GAC actors as well as newcomers Logan, Summa, Graves, Daniel Replogle, Brett Rohrer, Vic Carr, Tera Ford and Dillon Fink.

The play runs weekends, through August 19 at 8 p.m. The Sunday matinee on Aug. 13 is at 2 p.m. There is no show on Friday, Aug. 18. Reservations may be made by calling 301-441-8770.

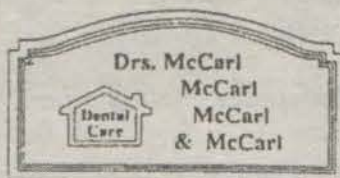
