New GAIL Program to Offer Health Care Guidance

A new program to ease concerns of residents suddenly confronted with the need to locate home health care providers, such as aides and practical or registered nurses, began in Greenbelt on June 1. The culmination of a year-long research process carried out by a special committee, the Home and Health Care Study Group (HHCSG), the Preferred Provider Program provides information on providers of such services who emerged from a careful screening process.

The goal of this program is to provide eligible Greenbelt residents access to affordable quality home healthcare services at a below-market rate. The Preferred Providers have submitted their responses to a request for proposal (RFP) that was sent to over 85 providers. The HHCSG has selected the top five candidates based on their written responses, financial stability, years of experience, references, staffing, training, disciplinary procedures and other factors. Monthly quality assurance reports are required.

The HHCSG, chaired by Thomas X. White, is a subcommittee of FORA (Friends of the Resource Advocate), which works with Christal Batey, director of the Greenbelt Assistance in Living Program (GAIL)

The first of its kind in Maryland, the Preferred Provider Program is another tool in the GAIL program's array of services to help residents remain in their homes.

The Preferred Provider Program offers several advantages to Greenbelt residents: guaranteed best prices; providers evaluated by the Greenbelt HHCSG; multiple payment options including Medicare, medical assistance, private pay and longterm care insurance plans; and resident satisfaction surveys.

Perry Becomes Youngest City Animal Control Officer

Even Elaina's Aunt Carol has adopted a cat through the Greenbelt Animal Control program. Council and city staff said they were proud to present this status award to such a remarkable, thoughtful young girl.

Survey of City Services Released

The May 8 City Council meeting included a presentation by Assistant City Manger David Moran on the 2005 Election Questionnaire. The results and findings of the 2005 Election Survey were summarized in a booklet and distributed at the meeting. Chiaverini Senior Services International tabulated the survey data. There were 687 completed questionnaires, meaning that just 34.8 percent of the people who voted in 2005 took time to participate. Thirty-eight percent of all responses came from GHI; 45 percent of respondees have lived in Greenbelt more than 20 years. A key goal of the survey is for citizens to rate city services. The average rating of the services was 3.56 on a five-point scale. Senior Programs and Fire & Rescue were leaders, while Youth Center, Street Lighting and Springhill Lake Recreation Center were among the five lowest rated services in Greenbelt. Possibly Rabid Raccoon Appears at Church Mass

Last Friday morning on June 2 St. Hugh's parishioners at the 7:15 morning Mass were startled during prayer by the arrival of a raccoon in their midst. In pleasant weather the church doors have been left open during Mass, which offered an entryway for this raccoon.

The animal's daytime appearance, looking decidedly ill, deformed or injured, left Mass attendees scrambling to stand on pews. It made its way to the baptistry in the front of the church. When a parishioner tried to shoo it outside, it turned and bit her shoe.

The raccoon did leave the church and was seen by St. Hugh's School personnel who called the police. It crossed the parking lot and school grounds, then disappeared into the woods. Staff at the fire house were alerted.

Adopted Cat Tests Positive for Rabies

On May 24, a 10 week old gray kitten was adopted from the Greenbelt PetSmart through Last Chance Animal Rescue. A few days afterward, the cat began behaving strangely and was brought back to Last Chance to be examined. While there, the cat bit the director of Last Chance, prompting a rabies test, which came back positive.

NAMI Presents "Ask the Doctor"



Edward "Danny" Blake

A former Greenbelt police officer, Edward Daniel Blake of Stevensville, Md., died Friday, June 2, 2006, of cancer. He was 58 years old.

Mr. Blake was born on Sept. 21, 1947, in Richwood, W.Va., the son of the late Leo and Edna Blake of Richwood. After graduating high school, he entered the Marine Corps in 1965 and served until 1969. In 1966 he served in Vietnam and was awarded the National Defense Service Medal, Vietnamese Service Medal with two stars, Vietnamese Campaign Medal with Device, Purple Heart Medal, Presidential Unit Citation, Good Conduct Medal and the Pistol Sharpshooter Badge.

In 1969 he married Nancy Ann Harvey of Richboro, Penna. In 1970 he graduated from the Anne Arundel Police Academy and worked in Crofton and Greenbelt as a police officer until his retirement in 1984. In Greenbelt he joined the police force as a dispatcher on December 10, 1971, and was sworn in as a police officer after completing police academy training on July 26, 1972. In 1981 and 1982, Mr. Blake was named Greenbelt policeman of the year and outstanding employee of the year. He retired from Greenbelt's police department August 1, 1984. Later he worked for area builders and owned his own handyman business, crafting custom-made furniture.

Mr. Blake was a member of the FOP and the American Legion. He loved his grandchildren, fishing and being in the West Virginia mountains.

He is survived by his wife of 37 years, Nancy Ann Blake of Stevensville, Md.; his two children, Christine Blake of Chester, Md., and Patrick Blake and his wife Angel of Greensboro, Md.; five siblings: brothers, Doug Blake and Denis Blake of Ohio; sisters, Shirley Bills of Penna., and Jean Truman and Jackie Roach of W. Va.; two grandchildren, Noah Reem and Hailee Blake and numerous nieces and nephews.

In Memoriam – Bill Devlin

Bill Devlin died in early May 2006 in Florida, where he lived his entire adult life. He was 59 (same as me). Bill spent six of his childhood years growing up as a Greenbelt boy. It's been a long time, mind you, but when I think of him, I think of summer. I see his sun-bleached hair and his sun-burned red face and then I see that great smile and hear that quick laugh.

He liked to make fun of you not to laugh at you but with you. He was just as quick to make fun of himself and together you could have a little joke at life's expense. He was friends with Ricky Barber and Jimmy Hetzler from his neighborhood on Ridge Road and by extension a friend of mine, too, when I was a skinny kid growing up on Eastway.

From all I've gathered, he carried the spirit of Greenbelt well in Florida. His sister, Kathy Reynolds, said Bill just lived to make other people happy. He was a Santa Claus (that is he helped Santa by making personal appearances in his honor, kids!). Thousands of children sat on his lap (not all at one time, silly!) and related to him their wish lists for the season. He loved it, I think partly because like most of us who grew up here, he still kept and cherished the kid inside of him. (The little humourous aside above is the kind Bill liked.)

Bill had a heart attack in 2002 from which he never really recovered. Not long after, he developed pulmonary fibrosis which dictated oxygen for him at all times and took away nearly all of the activities on which he thrived. He was a decorated Marine and wounded in Vietnam. His ashes will be inurned at Arlington National Cemetery in September.

Kathy held a benefit dance at the Riverdale Pizza Pub at which our band performed. Those who attended contributed some \$2,000 toward his expenses. I know some of you did not know Bill but you gave gladly for a fellow Greenbelter simply because we told you it was a worthy cause for a good guy. You marked him in this way as one of the family. I spoke to him on the phone then and he was just overwhelmed. I suppose I could brag of various associations throughout my life but none makes me more proud than to be a part of that same family. Greenbelt is great! Bill's brother Gary Devlin is still in the area. Bill's mother Adele, his son William Charles Devlin, Jr. and a younger brother Jack live in Florida.



councilmember from the small city of Clarksburg, W.Va. "In fact, a majority of U.S. cities are under 50,000 people. Every day, and in many small ways, small towns are making a difference and improving the quality of life for their citizens."

Clay Ford, mayor pro tem of Gulf Breeze, Fla., thinks small towns are desirable because people "can call City Hall if they are upset and they know someone will listen." It's that feeling of connection, that access to decision makers that builds trust and gets people involved in the democratic process. Being closer to those providing city services also leads to more people knowing what their taxes are paying for according to Scott Ford, Dade City commissioner and Small Cities Council vice chair.

Families are a big part of the equation when it comes to living in small cities. "Raising another generation with the same sense of caring for others, particularly for our youth and our seniors – that's what it's all about," notes Putens.

Later Friday afternoon the story took another turn when Bill Cornett saw an extremely sick raccoon, presumably the same one, in the creek behind 36 Lakeside. He already knew about the morning incident and that the police had been looking for the raccoon between the St. Hugh's parking lot and the fire house.

He reports: "I was walking

He reports: "I was walking along the lake path and heard the weirdest cry coming from the creek. After deciding it wasn't a bird, I went back to investigate and saw the waterlogged creature. It was so bad off it could hardly move, it just lay in the water and periodically gave off with a loud, painful cry. I called Animal Control on my cell phone and kept the raccoon in sight until Susie Hall got there."

"Capturing the raccoon was not a challenge since there was no question of the animal's moving fast enough to get away. The Animal Control officer said that it could also have distemper or some other illness but rabies was near the top of the list."

Cornett goes on to warn, "Watch your pets and keep away from wild animals. When I review the overnight recordings from my video security system, I see lots of free-roaming cats. If one of them should get in a tussle with an infected animal or eat off of an infected dead carcass and carry the disease back to the family, that could cause a huge tragedy."

This is not the only report of a possibly rabid raccoon. About

two weeks ago Virginia Beauchamp of Maplewood Court found a dead raccoon in the morning near the front corner of her house. There was no visible sign of injury.

Anyone observing the daytime appearance of raccoons should be alert to potential danger. Such an animal may be aggressive and/or rabid. Those seeing a fearless or oddly-behaving raccoon or any nocturnal animal during the day should not approach it and should immediately call 301-474-6124. At night and on the weekend the non-emergency number at the Greenbelt Police Department may be reached at 301-474-7200.





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Schools Adopt New Wellness Program

The Prince George's County Board of Education approved a wellness, nutrition and physical activity policy for Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) during the May 18 board meeting. By establishing a school wellness policy prior to the next school year, the board fulfilled its obligation under state and federal law to support wellness activities for students.

On June 30, 2004, the President signed the Child Nutrition and WIC (Women, Infants and Children) Reauthorization Act of 2004. School districts must set goals for nutrition, education, physical activity, campus food provision and other school-based activities designed to promote student wellness. Additionally, districts are required to involve a broad group of individuals in policy development and to have a plan for measuring policy implementation.

The Prince George's County School Health Council was charged with crafting a policy with input from school and community stakeholders. An Internet survey was conducted on the school system's website, gathering input from nearly 5,000 respondents. Almost half of the web surveys were completed by students.

The board used this and other information to design a policy that promotes the development of lifelong healthy habits. The PGCPS Food and Nutrition Services Department employs a fulltime registered dietician who analyzes all menu items for nutritional integrity. Currently, no foods are deepfried and schools offer a variety of healthy choices in the cafeteria and vending machines.

Recognizing that significant research supports a positive relationship between good nutrition, increased physical activity and academic success, the board directed its chief executive officer to complete the following: ensure that all schools participate in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs; promote the physical, mental and social health of students through a coordinated school health program; enforce the current health education and physical education requirements as mandated by the Maryland State Department of Education; conduct a study to consider increasing the number of credits in health education and physical education required for high school graduation; provide a safe, healthful and pleasant environment with adequate time and space to eat, socialize and participate in a quality physical education program; and include separate facilities for physical education and food services in all new construction.

The board also directed the CEO to develop an administrative procedure for this policy to include nutrition education goals, physical activity goals, nutrition standards, other school-based activities and evaluation.
