State Legislators

Four Incumbents and Challenger Run in September 12 Primary

Four candidates have filed their intention to run for the Maryland House of Delegates in District 22. Running for reelection are Delegates Anne Healey, Tawanna Gaines and Justin Ross. They are being challenged by Democratic candidate Karren Pope-Onwukwe. State Senator Paul Pinsky is unopposed in the September 12 primary election for District 22.

Paul Pinsky

Senator Paul Pinsky was elected to the Maryland Senate in 1994 after having served two terms in the House. He is a member of the Education, Health and Environmental Affairs Committee and is chairman of its Education Subcommittee. He is also the Senate chairman of the Joint Committee on Administrative, Executive and Legislative Review. Pinsky, an advocate for environmental protection, universal health care coverage and patients' rights, also has a strong interest in public education. For 20 years he taught high

school history in Prince George's County and currently works as an organizer for an affiliate of the Maryland State Teacher Association (MSTA/NEA).

Anne Healey

Delegate Anne Healey was first elected to the House of Delegates in 1990. She is vice chairman of the Ways and Means Committee which addresses issues such as taxes, education and election law. Healey is also a member of the Joint Committee on Spending Affordability, the House Rules Committee and the Prince George's Delegation's Subcommittee on Law Enforcement. Her professional background is in journalism. Healey and her husband have lived in Hyattsville for over 27 years.

Tawanna Gaines

Delegate Tawanna Gaines, a deputy majority whip, was appointed to the House in 2001 and elected in 2002. She is a member of the Appropriations Committee, vice chairman of its Health and Human Resources

Subcommittee and serves on its Capital Budget and Personnel Subcommittees. She is also a member of the Joint Committee on Legislative Ethics, the Oversight Committee on the Office of Children, Youth and Families and the executive board of the Women Legislators of Maryland. For over 30 years Delegate Gaines and her family have resided in Berwyn Heights where she was the first African American elected to the town council and the first female mayor.

Justin Ross

Delegate Justin Ross won election to the House in 2002. He is a life-long resident of Prince George's County and a graduate of Eleanor Roosevelt High School and the University of Maryland College Park with a bachelors degree in government and politics. Ross is a member of the Ways and Means Committee and its Education and Election Law Subcommittees. He

Voters to Choose Candidates For the Elected School Board

Much of the information obtained for this article is taken from the internet and has not been verified for accuracy. A website providing information on candidates for all races is www.gazette.net/election06/pg and a website with information on school board candidates is <http://pgpolitics.esmartweb.com/cand/boe.html>. The League of Women Voters is expected to publish a Voter's Guide prior to the primary election.

After a four-year hiatus during which there was an appointed Prince George's County Board of Education, voters at the September 12 primary election will have the opportunity to vote for a new elected school board. And new it will be since only two incumbents are seeking election to the nine-member board. The new school board will be reconstituted from the last elected board. While still nine members, four will now be elected at-large with the other five elected from five districts.

In the past, all nine members were elected from nine districts. School board districts are not the same as districts for county council or for members of the Maryland General Assembly. Greenbelt is located in District 1, an area that also includes Beltsville, Laurel and Glenn Dale.

In total there were 46 candidates although two have now withdrawn from the race. Seventeen names will be on the ballot for the four at-large spots. Voters will vote for only four at-large candidates. The eight candidates with the most votes in the primary will go on to the general election.

Four names will be on the Greenbelt ballot for the District 1 position. Voters will vote for only one person. The top two vote-getters in the primary will be placed on the general election ballot.

The school board is a non-partisan office. That means that all registered voters, no matter what their party affiliation or non-affiliation, can vote for this office in the primary. (For all other offices the candidates will be seeking nomination as their

party's candidates and only Republicans and Democrats will be able to vote.)

For the most part, the school board race has drawn a group of reasonably well-qualified candidates.

At-Large

Of the candidates, Howard Stone, 53, of Mitchellville, is the best known. He is serving as the vice-chair of the current board. He was chief administrative officer for the county under County Executive Wayne Curry. He has also served as a senior assistant to former county executive Paris Glendening, a legal assistant to Congressman Steny Hoyer, administrative assistant to the county council and chair of the county Democratic Central Committee.

Ottilie Van Allen Dies at 102 – A Remarkable Life Story

An extraordinary life came to an end on the first day of August 2006 in the death of Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen for 1995, Ottilie Van Allen. She was 102. She died at a nursing home in Avon Park, Fla., where she had lived for the last few years.

Ottilie – as she was known to everyone in Greenbelt – is survived by a son, John, of Colorado and his wife, Renata, as well as by a daughter-in-law and former Greenbelt resident Norma Van Allen. A son, Peter, preceded his mother in death.

A memorial service will be held at Paint Branch Unitarian Church on Powder Mill Road in Adelphi on Thursday, August 31 at 2 p.m.

Born in Germany as Ottilie Fleishman, she came to the United States at the age of 9. Her father, who was a translator for a large business company, bought an apartment house in Philadelphia, where the family lived. Mr. Fleishman, one of 17 children, had followed two or three older brothers to this country.

Both his father and grandfather had held the ceremonial post of mayor in the small town in Germany where he grew up. Ottilie's mother was a professional pianist and music teacher; her brother was also a pianist.

Ottilie was educated at the University of Pennsylvania and the University of Chicago, being a member of the first class at the latter school to admit women.

Early in her marriage she had worked at Saranac Lake, N.Y., where her husband was a high school science teacher. Ottilie served as a personal assistant and tutor in English to wealthy German immigrants who had fled Nazi Germany and were now patients in a tuberculosis sanitarium.

Sometime later, after a divorce and with two sons to support, she earned a master's degree in occupational therapy. She worked as an occupational therapist in another tuberculosis sanitarium and still later at an institution for recovering alcoholics. She came to this area, buying a house in Chevy Chase, while her sons were still in high school so they would be near their paternal

grandmother. In the early 70s she bought her Greenbelt home in the 18 Court of Ridge Road.

A Lutheran from birth, Ottilie became a Unitarian by chance when she moved to Philadelphia to attend graduate school. She tells how she was looking for a church and found four on the four corners of one intersection in the city. The first she attended, the Unitarian, so pleased her that she never tried the others.

Later she helped to found a new Unitarian church in Germantown, near Philadelphia. When the congregation there was commemorating a major anniversary, she returned as an old lady to help them celebrate, even though by this time she was finding travel difficult.

World Traveler

Earlier she had traveled widely, taking many trips with a sister-in-law, Barbara Van Allen. At around the age of 82 Ottilie joined a Unitarian group for a trip to China. She also visited Alaska and Spain.

A major influence was a trip to Europe including a visit to Transylvania where Unitarianism began. She regularly told stories of this experience to Sunday school classes at the Paint Branch church.

On another trip to Europe she undertook to connect with members of her extended family still in Germany and to find the gravesites of ancestors. To her surprise, not until she explored tombstones in a Jewish cemetery

I believe that Pat and Kevin, and their way of life, exemplify the heart of Greenbelt. They have always strongly believed in the support of Greenbelt businesses. They love the trails and would walk to and from the Center almost every week for movies and dinner.

They believed in a minimal and conservative lifestyle. They signed up for a wind energy alternative. To conserve gas and maintain health, they would bike every day to work at the University of Maryland. They believed in alternatives, when possible, for surgery and medicine, using herbs and acupuncture for both themselves and their three dogs. They were big supporters of "keeping it green," loving the walks every day in our natural woodlands behind Plateau Place. They believed in using alternative remedies for lawn and garden issues instead of chemicals, which could be harmful to animals and the environment.

They are both wonderful neighbors with "Greenbelt" hearts. Kevin, being very handy, was always there to lend a helpful hand to any neighbor. He helped many kids over the years fix their bikes. Pat has a soft spot for all animals big and small, now owning two former strays and a pound dog.

When I was away, my dog went into cardiac arrest. Pat and Kevin rushed her to an animal ER, paid for it, and saved her life. Pat would make yummy things for neighbors; she brought me soup when I was sick. They have both been there for any neighbor in need of anything.

Pat is practicing acupuncture for people and pets; Kevin has just retired after 30 years from the University of Maryland. They leave us, GHI and Greenbelt for retirement in Vermont, where they built their own house.

In Greenbelt, I will dearly miss them but as you can very well see, Vermont's gain, in community and spirit, is substantial.

"Hamlet, Revenge!" will be performed in a Celtic Dog - Greenbelt Arts Center production at Buddy Attick Park the weekends of August 19-20, 26-27 and September 9-10 plus the weekend of September 2-3 at Greenbelt Arts Center. All shows will start at 5 p.m.

Director Ryan Anthony is working with producer Gretchen Jacobs and other local and area specialists as well as "a stunning company of players - some familiar to Prince George's County theater, some fresh faces."

Anthony chose the earliest published version of Shakespeare's "Hamlet," "known as the First Quarto (and) much shorter and textually quite different from the better-known versions." Further, he notes, "I trimmed it to smooth out some of the garbled language, cut extraneous characters and made it

really quick, funny and exciting." The new title - "Hamlet, Revenge!" - is meant "to suggest the differing nature and swashbuckler attitude."

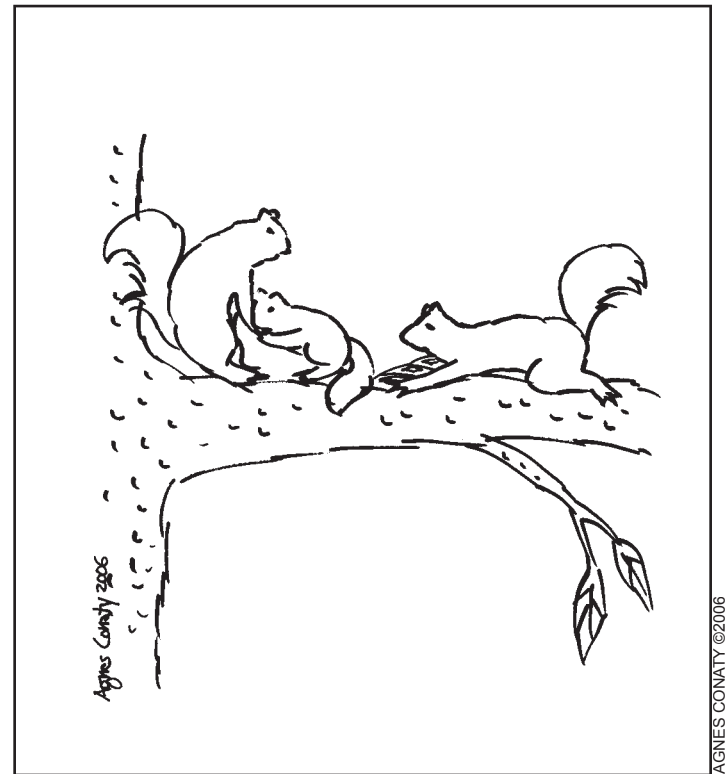

A Review

"Death and the Maiden" Is an Intense Drama

Sit-on-the-edge-of-your-seat intensity marks the current play at the Greenbelt Arts Center, "Death and the Maiden." The psychological thriller, with underlying themes of forgiveness and healing, is the first play of the 2006-07 season. Written by Chilean-American playwright Ariel Dorfman, it is set in an unnamed tropical country that has gone through a period of dictatorship from which it is slowly recovering.

Act One introduces husband and wife, Paulina Salas (played by Anna Maman) and Gerardo Escobar (played by Jeff Landou), as they struggle in a flawed marriage. Paulina is a fragile person. It is revealed that while a university student 15 years before, she was abducted, tortured and raped. Gerardo is a lawyer and has just been appointed to a presidential commission to investigate events that occurred under the dictatorship. A local doctor, Dr. Miranda (played by John Decker) arrives after having helped Gerardo with a flat tire and after a few drinks, decides to spend the night at the couple's home. The act ends on a shocking note, with Paulina abducting the doctor from his bed at gunpoint, tying him up and announcing that he is her rapist and she intends to have a "trial" in their home. Among the ways she recognizes him as her attacker is a recording he has in his car of Schubert's composition, "Death and the Maiden." Even though Paulina remembers this musical work being played during her attack, it also serves as a metaphor for her of her carefree life before the attack, in which she was fond of classical music, especially Schubert.

The second act twists and turns as the three characters interact. Paulina vacillates be-

tween childlike and ruthless in her desire to find justice and kill Dr. Miranda should Gerardo find him guilty. Gerardo is tormented by his desire to uphold his years-old promise to his wife to find her attackers and yet find the truth, knowing his career on the president's commission may be lost as a result. Dr. Miranda has some great lines that show the effects of the political upheaval on average people. His speech about violence begetting more violence is especially effective, given current world events. But was he really Paulina's attacker?

All three actors are superb and the sets are very creative and well done. Director Lenora S. Dernoga and producer Beatriz Mayoral have set the bar high for the remaining productions of the season.

"Death and the Maiden" will be performed on Fridays and Saturdays August 11 and 12, 18 and 19, 25 and 26 at 8 p.m. and Sundays August 13 and 20 at 2 p.m. Greenbelt Arts Center is located at 123 Centerway, and tickets may be purchased from the box office at 301-441-8770. This production contains adult language and there is a loud sound simulating a gunshot.

Beat the Heat Tips For Seniors, All

The county Department of Aging offers the following tips for seniors (and everyone) to beat the health impacts of summer:

Keep cool – Spend as much time as possible in cooler surroundings such as an air-conditioned shopping mall, senior center, public library or movie.

Use an air-conditioner or fan – Air conditioning can provide life saving relief from heat stress, especially for those with a medical condition like heart disease. Fans can draw cool air into the home at night or help provide good indoor air circulation during the day.

Baths and showers – Cool baths or showers (with water temperature around 75° F) provide amazing relief from the heat 25 times faster than cool air.

Clothing – Wear as little as possible when at home. Lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing is more comfortable in hot weather. Cotton and other natural fabrics are very comfortable. Wear a hat or use a parasol or umbrella for head and neck protection when outdoors.

Drink often – In hot weather the body needs more water. Don't wait to feel thirsty, because the body needs more fluid than thirst will indicate. Thirst may be an indication that dehydration is already occurring.

Avoid alcohol – Alcohol interferes with the body's fight against heat stress. It can put a strain on the heart.

Slow down – Take it easy, especially at the start of hot weather when the body is less prepared for the heat. Physical activity produces body heat.

Monitor food and salt intake – Avoid hot foods and heavy meals. They add heat to the body. Try using the stove less. Cook meals during the cooler part of the day.

did she locate some from the older generations. The younger generations had become Lutherans.

She was surprised when contacted by members of a Fleishman family in Virginia who were planning a gigantic wedding for a daughter and were reaching out to all they could find of the extended family. This group had descended from Bavarian Catholics. Otilie attended the wedding and stayed connected with the family thereafter.

Another family anecdote concerned her father's two sisters who trained as governesses and served in England in that capacity. One of these women never married and in her old age lived with Otilie's family. She recounted how the aunt had sewed herself an elaborate wardrobe of clothing when she first left for England and had the misfortune to arrive shortly before the death of Queen Victoria. In this period of elaborate grief for the deceased monarch, the young woman had no choice but to dye black all her beautiful new clothes.

Feminist

As a Greenbelter Otilie became associated with a number of feminist organizations. She was a long-time member of the League of Women Voters and an early member of the National Organization for Women. As a fellow NOW member, I remember meeting her at someone's home and finding

her avidly stuffing envelopes to get out a mailing. She was also active in the D.C. chapter of Planned Parenthood.

Every summer for many years Otilie attended a summer camp program which focused on science and religion at Star Island off the coast of Maine. Through her influence many other members of the Paint Branch congregation also began participating in the program.

One of her lasting contributions to the Paint Branch community was her invention of the mitten tree – a Christmas tree erected each year in the church and hung with hundreds of pairs of original mittens, which she knitted and sold for charity. Ever since Otilie's departure from Maryland, women of the church have continued the tradition, which they call "Otilie's corner."

Otilie's friend Marge Owens, who has contributed so much of the anecdotal material for this memoir of a remarkable woman, emphasizes that throughout her life Otilie Van Allen struggled with bouts of a recurring and sometimes debilitating depression – severe enough to cause her hospitalization perhaps half a dozen times. Owens regards her ascendance over this infirmity and her long and creative life as signs of the extraordinary courage of Greenbelt's very own centenarian. Truly an Outstanding Citizen.

Foreign Students To Enroll with ISGO

All foreign-born students, K-12 and evening high school who are in the following categories are required to enroll through the International Student Guidance Office (ISGO) before being admitted to their local schools: all students who are not U.S. citizens; all U.S. citizens whose primary language is not English; and all students whose transcripts are from a foreign country.

Students in pre-K may register directly at their boundary school if a program is available. School registrars will then forward the registration information to the ISGO for recording.

The family (or school personnel assisting the family) should call the International Student Guidance Office at 301-445-8460 to schedule an appointment before going to that office. This procedure will ensure that the family has all necessary documents to register and that a counselor will be available to complete the registration. The ISGO will provide students with any other paperwork.

Foreign-born students already enrolled in a Prince George's County public school may transfer from one county school to another without going through the ISGO. If a transferring student is currently enrolled in the ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) program, the original school should call the ESOL Office at 301-445-8450 with the student's new address and ask for the name of the transfer school.

The ISGO is located at the Judy Hoyer Family Learning Center, 8908 Riggs Road, Adelphi.

Save Sales Tax August 23 – 27

Maryland state sales tax will be waived on most items of clothing and footwear priced at \$100 or less and purchased August 23-27. Most accessory items do not qualify for the tax break. The purpose of this tax break is to encourage shopping and at the same time provide consumers with a savings opportunity at the beginning of the school year. Virginia and Washington, D.C. have also sponsored tax holidays.

Volunteer to Pick Food for the Hungry

It's time for volunteers to pick produce for those in need. Harvesting via the USDA Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC) began on July 17 and ends in mid-October. Volunteers may pick on Mondays, Thursdays and Sundays, weather and crops permitting. See www.foodforothers.org for specific dates.

Volunteers have an opportunity to meet U.S. Department of Agriculture staff, learn about research and help low-income families in the area. All volunteers get to bring home some produce for their own families. It's good exercise too.

Stone has also had a variety of other county-appointed positions. He has an BA from Rutgers University and an MPA from American University. He claims the endorsement of his candidacy by the Prince George's County Educators Association (PGCEA), the AFL-CIO, Congressman Albert Wynn, County Executive Jack Johnson, former executive Wayne Curry and County Councilmember Doug Peters.

Gloria Lawlah, who chose not to run for reelection to the Maryland Senate, became a candidate when she thought there would not be enough qualified candidates running. However, she has since announced that she will not campaign for election, although this decision was made too late to remove her name from the ballot.

Donna Hathaway Beck, 50, of Upper Marlboro, is a well-known civic activist involved with Parent Teacher Associations. In that capacity she claims nine years of perfect attendance at Board of Education meetings. She has been president of the county Civic Federation, served on county council task forces, the Parent and Community Advisory Board, the Committee of 100, the Home School Advisory Board and as president of the Frederick Douglass High School, the James Madison Middle School and the Melwood Elementary School PTAs as well as being a lifetime member of the Maryland State PTA.

She was one of 24 women in Maryland to become a Maryland Women's History Project honoree in 1996. For three years she was a columnist with the Prince George's Journal and currently works on the Help Desk at the Census Bureau. In response to questions by the Gazette Newspapers, she refused to rate the current school board and responded that the school system could always use more funding. She claims endorsements by the PGCEA and Greenbelter Suzan DePlatchett, retired principal of Frederick Douglass High School.

Ken E. Johnson, 52, of Mitchellville, chaired the last elected school board, the one dissolved by the Maryland legislature because it was considered dysfunctional. He is a manager for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In response to the Gazette, he is critical of the current board for doing a less than fair job because it did not manage the superintendent well, had a problem with getting school audits completed and was not connected to the community.

Sherry A. Strother, 49, of Landover, is a public health manager who claims endorsements from the PGCEA and the AFL-CIO. Her only political involvement was as an unsuccessful candidate to the Democratic National Convention. She attended Prince George's Community College and Liberty University, where she obtained nursing and psychology degrees. She told the Gazette that she rates the current school board as doing a good job by building a solid foundation for a successful quality program plan. She feels that funding is at the appropriate level for staging the plan.

Nate Thomas, 25, of Suitland, also claims support from the PGCEA and the AFL-CIO. He is a resident teacher at the Forestville

Military Academy, where he is an instructor in government, U.S. history and student government. He also claims support from County Executive Jack Johnson and Howard Stone. He is a former student of county schools and has a BA from Hampton University in political science and a MS from Trinity University in educational administration. He feels that the current school board was a good steward for the past four years and accomplished the task assigned to it. While the school budget has been fully funded, it will need more in the future and he would look to greater revenue from private sources.

Resident

Ronald L. Watson, 40, of Upper Marlboro, claims to be a 40 year resident of the county, growing up in District Heights and graduating from Central High School. He retired as a major in the U.S. Army in 2006 and is now a business and IT management consultant. He holds a doctorate from Binghamton University in system engineering, an MBA from George Washington University, an MS from Binghamton in advanced technology and a BA from Morgan State University in electrical engineering. He is the son of two principals. He claims endorsements from PGCEA, Senators Lawler and John Giannetti and three delegates. He told the Gazette that he thinks the current board did a good job in stabilizing the educational system, hiring a visionary CEO and helping to successfully fund the educational budget and believes the current funding level is about right.

Tony Lee, 37, of Fort Washington, is the founder and senior pastor of Community of Hope A.M.E. Church and the former senior minister to young adults at Ebenezer A.M.E. Church who has been recognized for his youth work. He holds a BS from the University of Maryland and a master of divinity from Union Theological Seminary. He believes the current board did a good job but that the school system needs more funding. He has proposed a tax increase upon local developers.

Deborah O. Driver, 52, of Fort Washington, is a realtor who is the founder and president of the Potomac Charter School, Inc. She also is president and founder of the urban teachers assistance program and a former vice-president of a PTA. She holds an MBA from George Washington University and a BS from Tennessee State. For the Gazette she refused to rate the current board stating that her focus is on describing the school system needed for the future. She applauded the county executive and council for funding the school system at the present level. She would be a helper to other charter schools.

Carletta Fellows, 36, of Upper Marlboro, is now an independent consultant who was a teacher in the District of Columbia and formerly taught for 10 years in the county. She holds a BA from Kent State University in psychology and an MA from Baldwin Wallace College in education. She told the Gazette that rating the current board serves no useful purpose and it is now time to move forward with an elected school board. She notes that the

funding for the past three years is what the school board asked for.

Attorney

Jeana Jacobs, 38, of School District 5, is an attorney who has been a hearings and appeals examiner for the Board of Education since 2003. She works for the county Department of Corrections as the division chief of program services. She is also an adjunct professor at the University of Maryland University College. Her BA degree is from Maryland and her LLD is from the University of the District of Columbia. She claims endorsement from the AFL-CIO. She told the Gazette that the present board sought to ensure no appearance of division between the CEO and the board and there has been some improvement in test scores. The board has achieved the funding level set forth by the Thornton Commission and more funding must be linked to student achievement.

Tammie L. Page, 37, of Clinton, has 31 years of military experience and is the manager of the Robotics Mental Protegee Program for the Department of Navy. She is also an adjunct professor at several universities including Maryland. She holds a doctorate degree and is a motivational speaker and a freelance writer and author. She told the Gazette that the current board is doing a fair job although it has been humiliated by reports of scandal. She believes the current funding to be adequate.

Larry C. Reid, 59, of Lanham, is a retired U.S. Army master sergeant who is a Junior ROTC instructor at the Forestville Academy. He holds a BS in business management from the University of Maryland University College. He is an appointed member of the Democratic Central Committee. He rates the current school board as poor for poor oversight of the superintendent and lack of involvement with teachers. Current funding is adequate, he says, but poorly used.

Others At-Large

Alicia Darenbourg, 38, of Clinton, is a former county teacher. Kenneth Fox, 76, of Bowie, is a semi-retired lawyer with a background in science and mathematics who is presently working on a critique of Maryland's high school assessments, mainly in

algebra. Milad Pooran is a Beltsville physician. Walter J. Searcy, 55, of Mitchellville, is a real estate and business strategist and a former PTA vice-president.

District 1 Candidates

The field of candidates for the District 1 seat on the Board of Education is much smaller. One candidate is a Greenbelter, another a retired teacher, the third a Howard County school ombudsman and the fourth an attorney.

George Martin Gates IV, 42, of Greenbelt (Mathew Street), claims eight years of legal, legislation and law experience in a law practice. He has been a special education attorney, a Congressional staffer, a school board administrator and a school teacher. Gates is a graduate of the Southern University Law Center where he obtained his JD, the University of New Orleans (MPA) and Deland University (BA in business administration). He is a member of the Greenbrook Estates Homeowners Association. For the Gazette he rated the current school board as good by overcoming insurmountable challenges and for establishing current stability as a foundation for the elected board. He also feels that there is always room for more funding of schools.

Rosalind A. Johnson, 61, of Laurel, was a school teacher for 35 years. She was the president of the Prince George's Federation of Teachers from 1982 to 1990. She attended Morgan State University, the University of Maryland and Howard College. She has been endorsed by the AFL-CIO and claims to have had in attendance at her fund-

raiser County Councilmembers Tom Dernoga and Doug Peters, former school board member Vera Teasdale, current candidate Donna Hathaway Beck and Delegate Mary Conroy. Johnson told the Gazette that the current school board has overall done a good job and has created a more fiscally stable and professional atmosphere. Funding of schools is just about right, she said.

Robin Barnes Shell, 46, of Glenn Dale, a Howard County school ombudsman, is an attorney, counselor, volunteer mediator in the District Court, a member of the Governor's Commission on Service and Volunteerism and a board member of the Prince George's Volunteer Center. She received a BA degree in economics from Howard University, a JD degree from Georgetown Law Center and a degree in Christian counseling from the Capitol Bible Seminary. She claims endorsement from the PGCEA. Shell told the Gazette that she thought the current school board had done a good job in working to build new schools, improve some existing schools and in creating a system of accountability. She noted that the school board had achieved full funding.

Dennis Whitley, III, 34 of Laurel, is an attorney with practice areas in civil litigation, personal injury, administrative law, domestic relations, landlord and tenant disputes, bankruptcy, tax foreclosures, land use and zoning and appellate work. He received a JD from Rutgers University School of Law in Newark, New Jersey and a BA at Morgan State.

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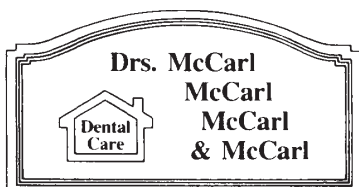


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Battle of Bladensburg to Be Reenacted

In August 1814, a disheartened Rosalie Calvert, the mistress of Riversdale, described the Battle at Bladensburg: "You have heard the news of the battle of Bladensburg where the English defeated the American troops with [President James] Madison 'not at their head, but at their rear.'" Flush with success, the British then burned Washington. Happily, events turned a few weeks later in Baltimore and the "Star-Spangled Banner" was born.

On Saturday, August 12 from noon to 4 p.m. costumed interpreters portraying both British and American War of 1812 troops at Riversdale House Museum allow a peek into camp life on the eve of battle. Cannon firing, gunnery drills, children's activities, camp and kitchen displays and refreshments all happen on the grounds of this gracious contemporary of the White House. Author Anthony Pitch will discuss his book, "The Burning of Washington." Federal period civilians and the mistress of Riversdale will be on hand.

All events on the grounds are free. House tours have a nominal fee but are free for children under 5. The Riversdale Kitchen Guild will sell historically inspired refreshments and ice cream from the University of Maryland Dairy. Riversdale, a National Historic Landmark, is located at 4811 Riverdale Road in Riverdale Park.

Registration Figures for Primary Election

The primary election is only a month away. Greenbelt has always been a Democratic stronghold. Again this year in the city, it appears that registered Democrats will outnumber Republicans by a 5 to 1 margin.

Although the official primary registration figures are not yet available, the chart below shows the four Greenbelt precincts and the

5th Congressional District as of the Presidential election two years ago. There were slightly fewer than 11,000 registered voters in Greenbelt (including about 2,000 who belonged to other parties or were unaffiliated who may vote only in the Board of Education primary).

Registration had increased slightly by the 2005 city elections (11,350) but it may decrease somewhat as registration records are culled after a presidential elec-

tion. A voter must vote in one of the last two presidential elections to remain on the voter rolls.

While the 5th Congressional District was only 55 percent Democratic in 2004, in Greenbelt it was 67 percent. Of the four local precincts, the percentage of Democrats ranged from a high of 71 in Springhill Lake (which usually has a very low voter turnout) to 60 percent at Greenbelt Elementary School.
